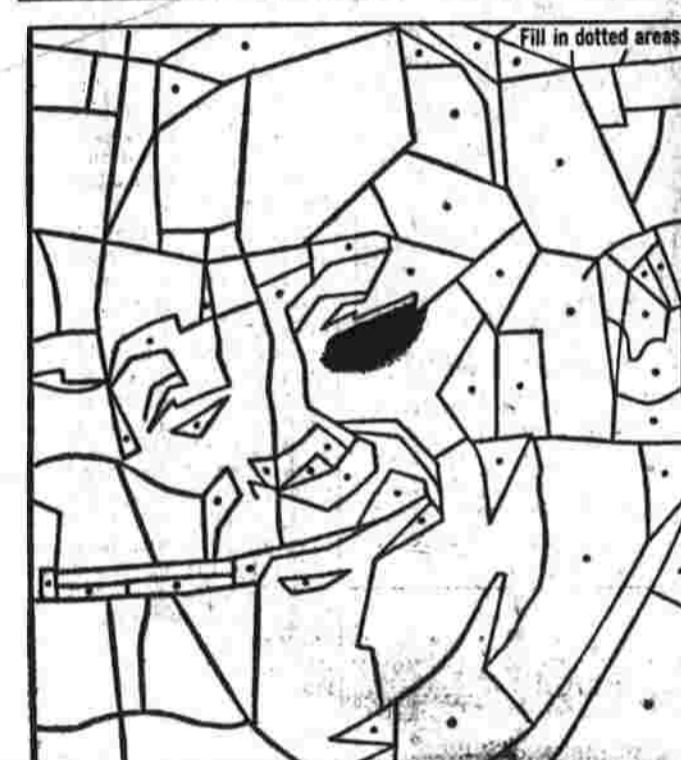

For the result of the poll was that the name of Richard Milhaus Nixon led them all, with 28 per cent of the first choice designations.

So, for the headlines over one poll report, Mr. Nixon is tagged as the party's leading candidate for 1968.

Is this realistic? In there are 28 per cent—there is as much as a one in a hundred chance—that Mr. Nixon can win his party's next Presidential nomination?

There are, of course, all kinds of possibilities in love, war and politics. This world and this nation could change so drastically as to seem to lend validity and vindication to the kind of candidate Mr. Nixon has already proved himself capable of being.

But such possibilities are not calculable today. As of today his chances at the 1968 nomination should be rated as no more than zero. And only today they get any higher ranking in a poll which asks an unreal question at an unreal moment of a Republican voter who knows that the answer he gives is not supposed to be real or project even his own individual decision for 1968.

Could the question be asked realistically in a realistic atmosphere of party members who could somehow be brought to think that the chips were all the way down, the answer would be almost the last Republican party member would expect or prefer to have a chance at the 1968 nomination. He would be near the bottom, not the top, of the list. And this would be so not because of his lack of any special qualities, or tarred with any special deficiency, but primarily because even the most unimaginative machine politician knows that 1968 calls for some fresh kind of image capable of some creative kind of impact upon the American people.

The Travelers. Now, when the wind blows strong across the meadow in the late afternoon sun, the particles dancing up and down the rays of light are no longer likely to be the insects of summer. They will be the parachute, sails, kites and microscopic gossamers of seeds navigating the wind to plague or bless, according to the nature of the Russians are, according to the Chinese attack, even guilty of trying to bring about peace in Vietnam, instead of insisting upon all-out victory there.

And all this appeasement, the president of Communist China warns the Russians, will not bring the peace the Russians tell themselves they are seeking. To the contrary, says the Chinese, appeasement merely increases the danger of larger war.

Such the oratory, the logic, and the conviction of the extremist left, as it is expressed by the official voice of Communist China. The oratory, the logic, and the conviction should all be familiar to Americans, even though they may not have seen any report of this particular Chinese speech. Take the labels off, and the substance is precisely the same as that offered by the extremists of the right in the non-Communist world.

We must not, they say, be so cowardly and timid as to settle for anything less than a total victory. We must not be guilty of giving any one the impression we will welcome negotiation or compromise. We must, of course, remember that the only language the other fellow understands is that of force, standing on his neck. And appeasement never brings the peace it seeks, but increases the inevitability of war.

If these two extremes are right, then there is nothing for it but for everybody to be at everybody's throat until there is only one set of hands left alive.

But such extremes are never right, and have never proved themselves right, and the world has lived only by continually extricating itself from the desperate showdowns such theories have helped set in motion. The deeper into each such showdown the world allows itself to go, the greater the harvest of future extremism, and the greater the danger that the world, some day, will go down so far it will never come up again.

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Vietnamese Children Cross Flooded Rice Paddies Far from Any Sign of War Unknown in Lush Mountains, Fertile Delta  
**Viet Nam Is Land of Contrasts**

BAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—What's it like, this land where nearly 100,000 American military men now find themselves? Some of it is unbelievably lovely.

The mountains in the west, sweeping toward the border of Laos, rise to 7,000 feet and are as dark green and deeply forested as the Canadian Rockies in summer.

The coastal plains on the east, all the way from the 17th Parallel to the border of North Viet Nam, south almost to Saigon, run down to jewel-like bays as beautiful as any in the Caribbean. These abound in broad, empty beaches that would tempt the imagination of a master builder.

In between, almost at the dead center of Viet Nam, lies a dead-end country, wide expanses of flat plains tufted with tall grass. Just to the north of that is tiger country, deep jungles where in the days before there was a war hunters used to come to hang on their belts the most prized of all trophies: a tiger paw.

South is the Mekong River delta. Broad muddy rivers run down to the South China Sea in countless rivulets and irrigating a lush land enough in peacetime to feed much of Southeast Asia. The delta occupies one-fourth of Viet Nam's land area and is the home to two-thirds of its population.

Here indeed is the inscrutable East of the tourist posters. Flooded rice paddies mirror the merciless noonday sun. Teeming grasshopper villages sit on the banks of swift-running estuaries. Thunderheads pile up the afternoon monsoon in a vast brooding sky. Water buffaloes pull ancient plows. Sampans and junka in an endless proliferation swim the muddy canals. Dense mangrove swamps swarm with insects and snakes. Women in coolie hats carry enormous loads at each end of a shoulder pole.

Then there is the other side of the delta never shown in the tourist brochures: sandbagged outposts silhouetted in the glare of flames slowly parachuting to earth in a night attack, schools and churches ringed with concertinas of barbed wire, the bodies of the dead wrapped up in rubber ponchos and stacked along a bridge after a Viet Cong raid.

South Viet Nam is roughly shaped like a sea serpent and almost the size of the State of Washington or Missouri in land mass. It is a country of painful contrasts and glaring contradictions.

Since the Viet Cong began blowing up the bridges and am-

bushing the convoys, many of the roads don't go any place. The railroad that used to go from Saigon in the south to Hanoi in the north ends in a tangle of ripped-up track a few miles out each city.

Still, no matter how unfriendly the terrain as far as Viet Cong infiltrators go, rickety tourist buses traverse what's left of the dusty roads, jammed beyond belief with passengers, loaded with all sorts of bags, boxes and trunks including bicycles strapped to the roof.

And always, as the bus rumbles along, someone is climbing out the window onto the roof to get at a piece of luggage.

The residents of Saigon, still a gay city despite the war, love to go for a drive on Sunday.

Today the road only goes to Bien Hoa, 14 miles to the east. That doesn't stop the Sunday drivers. All of Saigon, it seems, drives back and forth along the road to Bien Hoa every Sunday, creating a massive traffic jam that includes 20 police squad cars the 12 government vehicles the Vietnamese police to catch speeders in the days when there was any place to speed to.

An agronomist looking at a map of Viet Nam would have a quiet different view of the country than the Sunday driver or the big-game hunter — or, for that matter, the military home to two-thirds of its population.

He could follow the rice paddies of the delta north beyond Saigon to well-ordered rubber and coffee plantations, and going steadily north continue in grasshopper villages sit on the banks of swift-running estuaries. 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An ethnologist would find a distinct French influence still lingering in the larger cities, a small but prosperous population of Chinese merchants and a few Indians engaged in banking and book selling, an impoverished and neglected minority of 800,000 primitive Montagnard tribes and, of course, the 18 million Vietnamese, who in anything but the traditional form-fitting ao-dai to Hong Kong slit dresses

Chief features of the royal arms are a lion and a unicorn. "I recently noticed that the face of the carved wooden lion was looted," said Wyld-Dore-Smith, "and on close inspection discovered that only two of the original wire whiskers were left on one side of the lion's face — and none on the other side."

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### South Windsor Mahr Predicts More Industry, Asks GOP Vote

Industry in South Windsor may well double in the next two years, according to a prediction from Frederick P. Mahr, a Republican town commissioner campaigning for re-election. He asked voters to continue the present GOP town government, attributing the community's recent industrial expansion in part to the actions of the town council.

"With the planning and program for the upgrading of Rt. 6 with industrial sewers to accommodate old and new industry, it is more than possible that industry in town will more than double in the next two years," Mahr noted that increasing industrial expansion is the answer to the problem of maintaining a reasonable tax rate and "stabilized control of finance" in a town with "a few growing pains."

Mahr, president of a trucking concern with routes throughout Southern New England, observed that "South Windsor is fast becoming the transportation center of Connecticut." Citing the upsurge of motor freight transportation companies that have located in town in the past two years, he said, "South Windsor is rapidly coming into its own high-level place among the best towns in New England."

Mahr attributes much of the growth in town to the actions of the town council. He called for the re-election of a Republican led council so that the town "will continue to benefit from the untiring, conscientious guidance of Mayor John Egan."

He said that, in the two years Mayor Egan has been in office, no member of the council has ever criticized him. "Today we are beginning to enjoy the fruits of this council's efforts. From here on we can see the start of a new and rewarding era, if the Republican majority is returned to office."

### LBJ Signs Culture Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Surrounded by scholars, artists, actors and legislators, President Johnson today signed a multimillion-dollar measure to promote culture in America.

The bill sets up national foundations of the arts and humanities and authorizes grants and endowments to encourage work in a broad span of artistic and cultural activities.

For the first time, the government is offering financial aid and interests in these fields, making available about \$20 million a year for the next three years.

With matching funds from private agencies and individuals, sponsors estimate that as much as \$60 million a year may be generated to support a wide variety of projects from folk songs, opera and drama to philology and archeology.

Nonprofit community drama and music groups are expected to be the chief beneficiaries of grants by the arts foundation. In the field of humanities, grants would go to institutions and individuals for training, fellowships, research and publication of scholarly works.

About 250 guests were invited for the formal signing ceremony. Many of them are expected to attend a performance tonight by the Harkeas Ballet, previously scheduled by the White House to dedicate a new, specially designed portable stage in the East Room. It was donated by the Rehearsal Harkeas Foundation of New York.

The portable stage for the East Room was designed by New York's Jo Mielziner to fit into the room's gold and white decor and to be quickly and easily assembled.

It features the most modern theater architecture and lighting and is constructed to give the illusion that it is an integral part of the huge ballroom.

Viet Cong Fighters Are Veterans at 17

HAIGONG, South Viet Nam (AP) — The faces of the dead Viet Cong often seem young — very young. Uninitiated observers in the Mekong Delta area might be tempted to draw sweeping conclusions: The Viet Cong are running low on manpower — have been hurt there severely. They are using more women for totting rifles and hurling grenades. But people familiar with the background know better than to draw conclusions. Yes, the Viet Cong have been hurt. But a Viet Cong guerrilla often carries a rifle at 14 or 15. By 17 he is a seasoned fighter. It works his way up — from courier to spy to guerrilla fighter, to company commander and then, perhaps, into a crack fighting battalion. Pictures found in battle areas — photos that are evidently cherished mementos of fallen young Viet Cong fighters — seem to tell a story. But the real meaning is never clear. One sees new uniforms — now more and more standardized with black shirts and khaki trousers. But this does not ne-

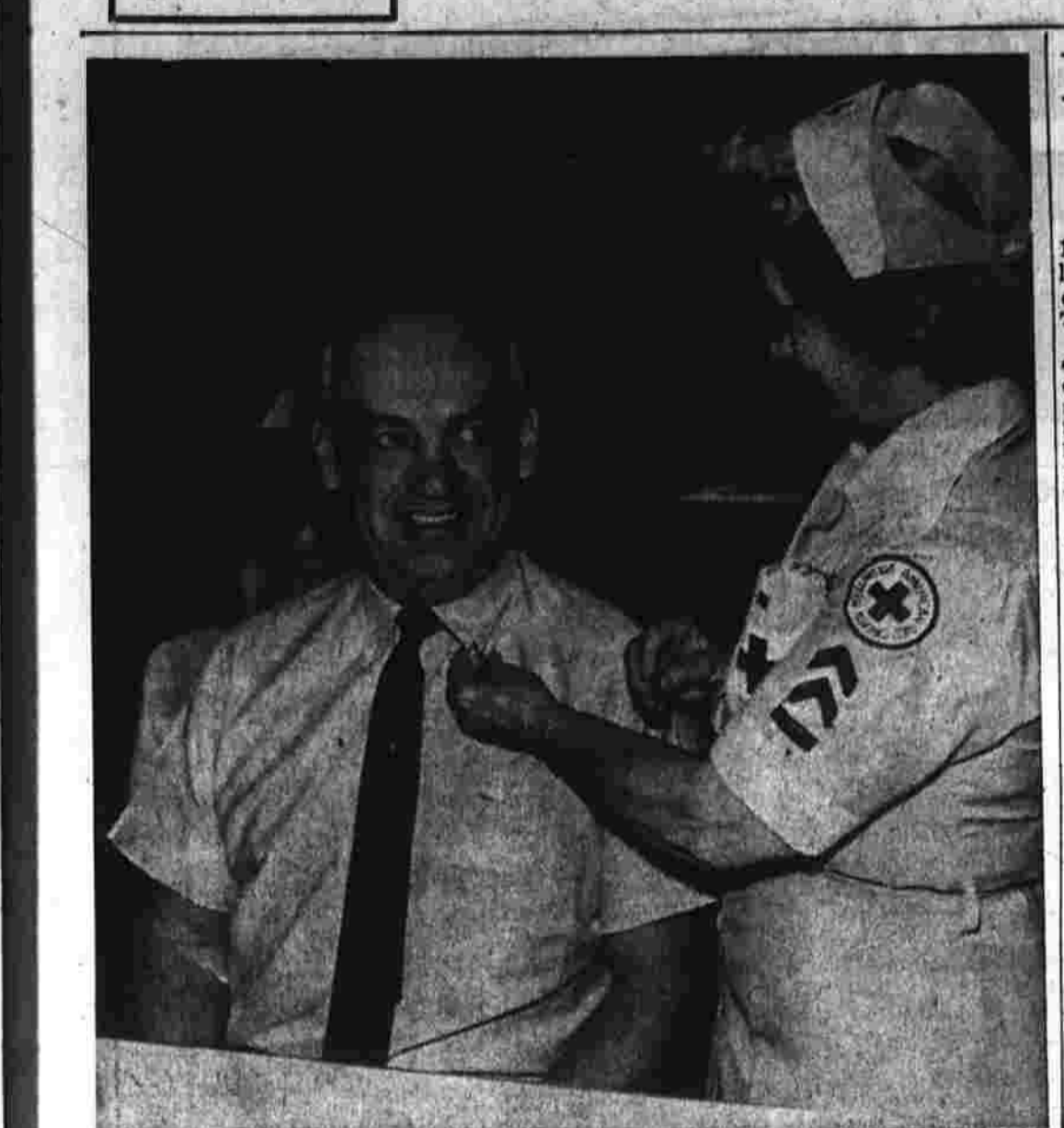

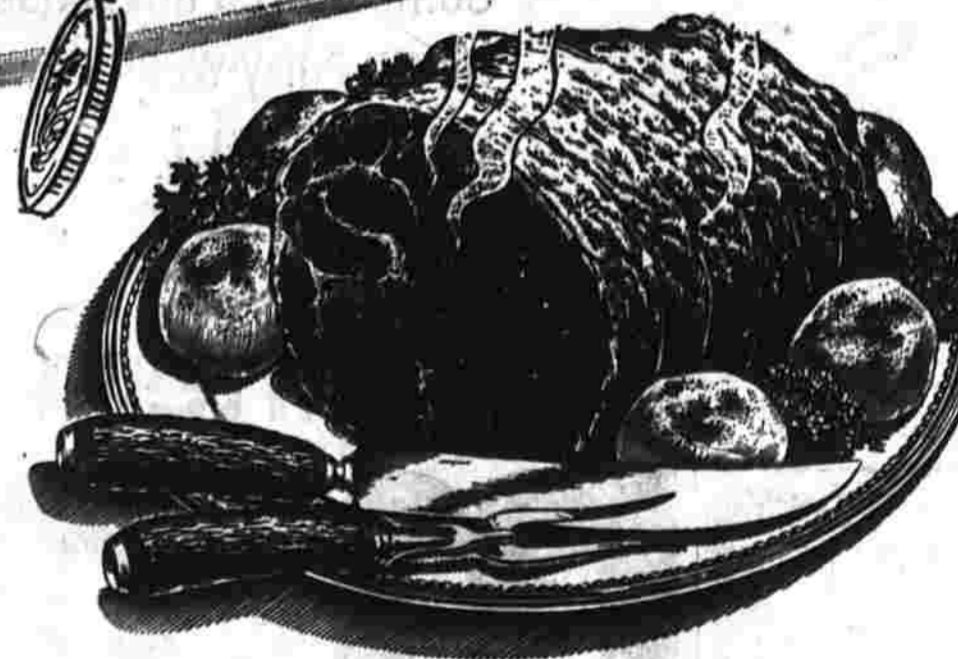

# 4,500 See Reagan At Elm City Rally

NEW HAVEN (AP)—Ronald Reagan was introduced by Ralph Connor of New Canaan as the actor and his conservative political ideas at a rally Tuesday night that was boycotted by many top Connecticut Republican leaders.

Reagan captivated a crowd of 4,500 at the New Haven arena. The crowd gave him a standing ovation as he walked into the arena Tuesday night behind a rifle and drum corps and mounted the speakers platform. After the cheering subsided, Reagan grinned and said, "I haven't even announced yet, and you make me feel like I've already been elected."

Reagan poured out a stream of statistics aimed at obtaining such federal programs as the war on poverty, urban renewal, rent subsidies, crop controls, their traditional principles just to win votes.

The crowd has been constructed as a slap at the GOP leadership in Connecticut, which ousted the Democrats during the 1962 legislative session.

# South Windsor Parties Advance Nominees For Various Town Offices

Voters at the town election Monday will be faced with choices for a number of other officers besides town council and board of education. Candidates have been nominated for town treasurer, the man who will manage the town's cash on hand; planning and zoning commission; and town selectman, whose primary duties include supervising the town clerk. The biographies have been supplied by the candidates' respective town committees.

### Democrats

John E. Cather is seeking his third term as treasurer. He is married, has two children, and lives at 36 Graham Rd. He has lived in town for 43 years. Cather attended Hillyer College and has taken extension courses at the University of Connecticut and the International Accountants Society. He is a licensed public accountant.

He is manager of the Recording and Historical Co. and was formerly secretary-treasurer of the Ecol Manufacturing Corp. He has been treasurer of the Democratic Town Committee and civil defense director.

Cather also served as a commissioner of the Greater Hartford Bridge Authority. He has been a member and chairman of the town industrial development commission of the board of finance.

Paul E. Kupchunas, a candidate for election to the planning and zoning commission, lives on Blington Rd. He is married and has a daughter. He is a veteran member of the town commission, being the senior member for several years. Kupchunas is a farmer and a state legislator.

Charles E. Innes, incumbent town clerk, was elected to the post in 1946. He is married and has four children. He is a former assistant chief of the town volunteer fire department, on which he served for 15 years, and has been voted a life member of the organization.

He is completing courses in the Connecticut Municipal Training Program, sponsored by the University of Connecticut.

Innes was also nominated for town clerk by the Republican party at its July 13 caucus. Backgrounds for Democratic candidates for selectman are: Everett J. Delaney, incumbent, lives on Colony Rd. and is married. An employer of Ford and Whitney Aircraft for 22 years, he is past assistant director of civil defense for the town, a member of the school building committee, was probation officer for two years and domestic relations officer of the town. He is a member of the Capitol Region Planning Agency and the Democratic Town Committee.

Herman Goldstein, 123 Pines Knob Dr., is married and has two daughters. He is a graduate of the University of Connecticut and spent two years in Germany with the Army. He is a medical service representative for the Pfizer Laboratories.

### Republicans

Richard G. Rothwell, candidate for re-election as town treasurer, is a vice president of the Connecticut Bank and Trust Co., treasurer of the East Hartford Chamber of Commerce and a director of the South Windsor Public Health Nursing Association. Rothwell is also a member of the Republican Town Committee. He is a graduate of Stony Brook School of Banking at Rutgers University. He and his wife have one child and live at 600 Blington Rd.

Thomas J. Moran Jr., candidate for re-election to the planning and zoning commission, has lived in town for 16 years and is married to the former Jane Newberry of South Windsor. They have two children and live at 17 Norman Dr. He is employed as an internal security investigator at the United Aircraft Corp. in East Hartford.

OSIP board of selectman candidates are: Royal E. Cowles, candidate for re-election to the South Windsor Young Republican Club, and a state chairman for the Lodge for President Committee in 1964. He has been active in the Red Cross, Little League and Farmham Estates Childrens Committee.

Cowles is justice of the peace and a member of the personnel manager of the Standard Knapp Division, Emhart Corp., in North Windsor. During the past year, Cowles was appointed to the salary study committee for town employees and worked on the new wage plan recently adopted by the town.

Richard J. White, candidate for re-election to a third term, is a former justice of the peace. He is a veteran of the Navy during World War II. He is the New England sales manager for the Brubaker Tool Co. He and his wife live at 380 Avery St. and have one child.

### Area Weather

WINDSOR, LOCKS (AP)—A broad band of southerly winds covering much of the Eastern United States will bring a respite of seasonably warm air to Connecticut today and Thursday, the U.S. Weather Bureau said. Patchy cloudiness accompanying the warm air will occasionally block out the sun, especially this morning, the bureau said, but on Thursday with only partly cloudy skies temperatures will rise well into the 70s.

A developing storm over Wyoming this morning is expected to move eastward, then northeast through the central portion of the country, producing rain or showers over Southern New England Thursday night or Friday.

Five-day forecast: Connecticut Thursday through Monday are expected to average near normal. Little day to day variations except a little cooler about Saturday.

Precipitation may total up to 1/2 inch, occurring on Friday and possibly again the beginning of next week.

Normal high and low temperatures for Hartford are 70 and 46, and for New Haven, 69 and 46.

### Police Insurance

HARTFORD (AP)—The Police Commissioners' Association of Connecticut is launching a program to provide \$5,000 death payments to the families of policemen killed while on duty.

The association unsuccessfully supported a bill in the legislature this year which would have made such insurance coverage mandatory for all municipalities.

The policies will be written by the Home Insurance Co. and the premiums will be about \$11 per man, Matthews said.

## Aim in Manchester

"I'm used to a bigger turnout. When I coached in college, we had 80 or 100 students out for football and in prep school, we had between 60 and 70 boys playing football. I want to find out why we don't have boys playing sports here in Manchester. It's not promised. Speaking about his varsity football, Wiggin expressed much pleasure with the hard work, especially by the seniors. That has marked practice sessions and the Concord game Saturday. "I want to find out why we don't have boys playing sports here in Manchester. It's not promised."

## System Wrong

"My aim," the new head of the physical education department in the Manchester school system said, "is to build up the spirit and give some meaning to the atmosphere. We don't have any ninth grade football in Manchester. This is wrong. This system must be corrected. Boys can play soccer but can't play football in the ninth grade. I'm hammering for it, the former Maine Maritime Academy coach told his audience. "There isn't any question that ninth grade football, introduced in the Manchester school system, would be a big boost to varsity football in the years ahead."

## Eye Openers

Facts and figures don't lie and Wiggin, who was presented to the group by Ray Rogers, Manchester High principal, had a few that were eye openers. "In our three upper classes, sophomore, junior and senior, we have 1,100 boys at Manchester High," Wiggin said. "Of this number, 74 signed up for intramurals, 42 for football, 20 for cross country and 50 for soccer. This is only 156 out of 1,100 which means that only 14 percent of the eligible boys are playing sports. Where are the other 82 per cent?"

Wiggin added, too, that of the 42 with the football squad, that included personnel that will make up the Jayvee team, which matched the varsity by opening with a win Monday afternoon against Concord High. "Some boys at Manchester High are missing the boat by not playing ball," he felt.

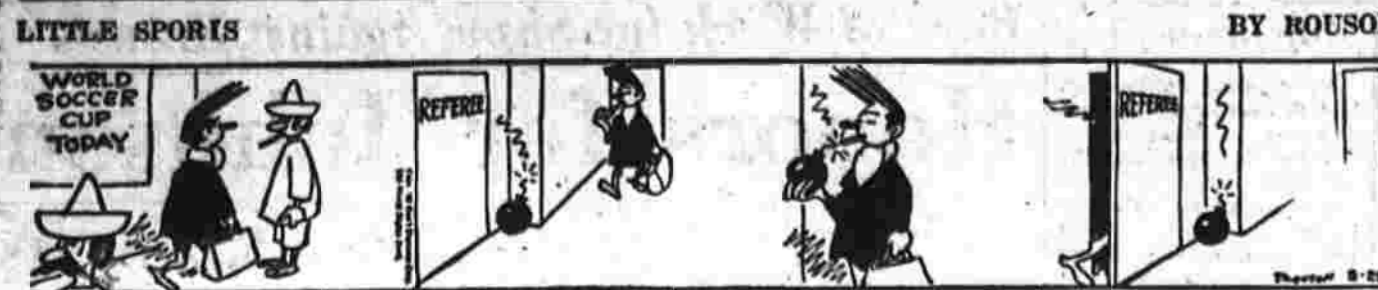
