## The Sequels Are Really Only Serials

NEW YORK (AP) — Television always has liked the words "specials," "spectaculars" and "instant news shows."

This season two more phrases have come along — "sequel drama" and "continuing drama." These are just other ways of saying that the show is a serial. The word serial has an unfortunate connection with soap opera. Nobody, for some reason, wants his show tagged as soap — not even when the program is "Feyton Place."

Right now there are quite a few "sequel dramas" on night time television, including NBC's "Dr. Kildare" which is now involved in so many plots and subplots it could easily use the whole season to untangle some of the situations.

Dedicated Dr. Jim, who looks even more antiseptic and handsome in color than in black and white, has a number of student doctors under his wing right now. Tuesday night it was evident that one, a young woman, is revolted by the more unpleasant aspects of illness and is also being discriminated against because she is a woman in medicine. Another student has wife troubles that are giving him the shakes. Still another is a beatnik sort all mixed up in protests against the bomb, punishment and Viet Nam. Then there is a sorehead who is furious about hospital politics.

As if that wasn't enough, Dr. Gillespie seems a little hurt that Dr. Kildare is trying to solve their problems with no help from his senior.

With all this exposition in progress, there wasn't much time for drama in the half-hour. Presumably that will come in other installments.

Across the channel, ABC's "Combat" is still in France after more than three years of fighting an enemy called "krauts." It is a workmanlike if noisy war series. Tuesday night Sergeant Saunders and his unshaven, dirty-faced men were pinned down by enemy snipers in a shattered building, but their real interest was a replacement who appeared to have self-inflicted wounds but told an unconvincing story about an encounter with a Nazi.

But "combat" at least carries a complete, self-contained story each week and we didn't have to wait a week to find out that the suspected coward was really a good guy. That, in this season of sequel dramas, is a big plus.

NBC will examine urban and suburban deterioration, air and water pollution and highway jamming on "America's Beautiful," tomorrow 6:30-7:30 p.m.

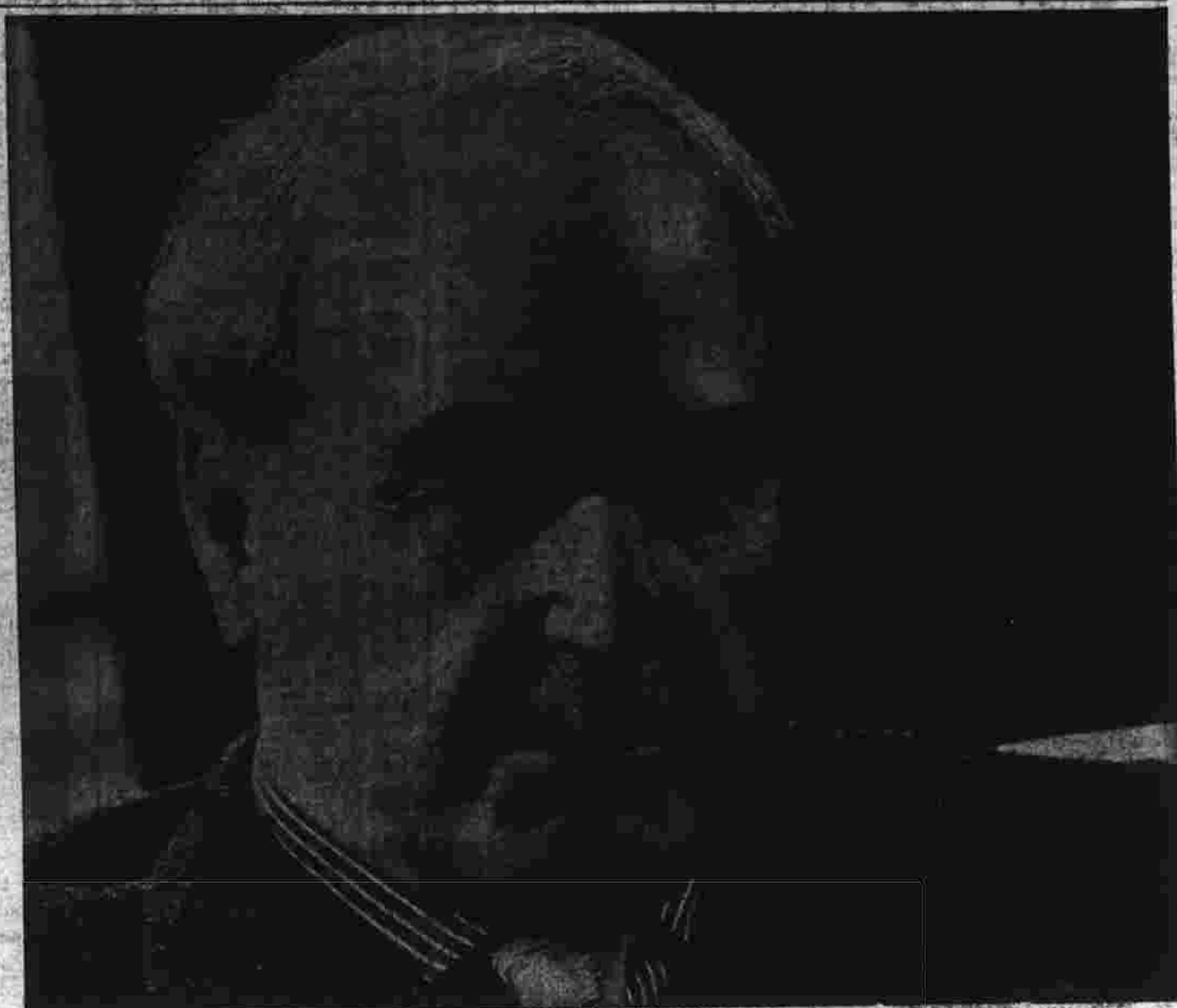

Subsequently, it was disclosed that five weeks before on the eve of her marriage, her fiancé had been killed in an auto crash. Naturally she blames herself. A kindly uncle and his wife want her to leave home for a change of scenery and job in New York before she has a nervous breakdown. But there is her younger sister, Jan, to wor-

ry about. Jan is described as a neurotic parasite.

But let us not be too harsh with Jan — another silver blonde. She carries psychic scars from a fire that also took the lives of the girls' parents. Anyway, she is determined that older sister Katy will not escape to the big city.

A short time later, we were taken to "Paradise Bay," a California ocean community, and introduced to the owner of its radio station, his wife and their two teen-age children. A young friend of the children has just been found dead on a nearby beach under mysterious circumstances. And besides, the radio man's loving wife seems to be getting involved with the owner of the local newspaper, an old flame.

"The Nurses," popped up on ABC in soap opera form in the early afternoon, and you'd hardly recognize the old nighttime CBS show. Head nurse Liz Thorpe no longer is played by Shirli Conway but by Mary Fickett. She is no longer a widow woman but a spinster who looks wistful every time marriage is mentioned.

Student nurse Gail Lucas also is played by another actress, but the old hospital atmosphere is about the same. The story got off to a roaring start with an 18 year-old girl dying after an illegal operation.

After school hours came ABC's "Never too Young," a soap opera aimed squarely at the young audience. It was dedicated to rock music and the proposition that nervous parents are squares while the important things in life are the beach and going steady with the grooviest guy who hangs out there.

## The Pope's Visit on TV

The three major networks have suspended virtually all regular programming Monday to cover the visit of Pope Paul VI to New York City. The pontiff will arrive at about 9:30 a.m. and depart for Rome at about 11 p.m. The networks, on a pool basis, are deploying about 70 cameras for coverage of the motorcade from the airport to St. Patrick's Cathedral. Most commercials are being dropped for the day.

CBS—8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and 8:30 to 10 p.m. The network will have the Most Rev. Fulton J. Sheen, auxiliary bishop of New York and a noted speaker and writer, as a special narrator.

NBC—9 a.m. to 6 p.m. and 7:30 to 11 p.m. The Rev. Robert A. O'Donnell, C.S.P., an authority on the Vatican, will be NBC's special commentator.

Related program will include: On ABC—"Pilgrimage for Peace" on "ABC Scope" tonight from 10:30-11 p.m. The reasons behind the visit will be examined with interviews with Vatican officials.

On NBC—"Sunday," tomorrow from 6-6:30 p.m. will explore Pope Paul's influence on the church.

On CBS—"Pope Paul VI: New Journey, Ancient Mission," tomorrow from 10-11 p.m. Participating in a discussion of the visit's significance will be Joseph Cardinal Ritter of St. Louis, Lawrence Cardinal Shehan of Baltimore and James Cardinal McIntyre of Los Angeles.

The average television couple comprise a chirpy chickie-head and his patient, approved wife. They have been married since heaven knows when, and their only concerns are children, bills and how to entertain the boss for dinner.

But in "The Farmer's Daughter," Inger Stevens, is a sagacious Swede, and William Windom plays a Minnesota congressman. And after two years as his housekeeper, she becomes his wife.

"I hope we will be able to show that a married couple can be sophisticated — yes, and even sexy," said Inger. "After all, he found her attractive and appealing enough to marry her. Why should we try to hide their love just because they're married?"

She admitted the hazards involved. One of them is network censorship. A script portrayed the honeymoon congressman escorting his bride to a hotel room with twin beds. His comment: "But I asked for a double bed!"

"The use of the word 'bed' was absolutely forbidden," Inger reported. "It looked as if the show would have to be aban-

doned. But he was allowed to substitute 'accommodations' with only a glance at the bed. If the audience wants to read something into the glance, it may."

Instead of adopting housewifely trappings, Inger is becoming more glamorous. "Katie wears more sophisticated clothes now," she said, "and her hair is shorter and more stylish. I think that's only natural. It shows that he has an effect on her."

Katie will also be losing her accent this season. "I lost mine after six months in this country," Inger reasoned, "so why shouldn't Katie? She has matured in every way."

But can television marriage do the same? It seems doubtful in a season featuring a husband who takes directions from the disembodied voice of "My Mother, the Car."

## Daley A To Ste School C

CHICAGO (AP)—Richard J. Daley, mayor of Chicago, said today that the Chicago public schools involving \$30 million in federal funds. The dispute when the U.S. Office of Education ordered that federal funds be withheld from Chicago public schools until they complied with the Civil Rights Act.

The council, led by Daley, appealed the U.S. commission on integration, in July federal funds to the Chicago Board of Education.
