





Distinguishing Among Wars It is timely and interesting that, the wake of Pope Paul's pilgrimage to the United Nations in the cause of peace, debate in the Vatican Council should be concerning itself with the contention of a small group of bishops that the church must and should con-

demn all war, without distinction between wars or weapons. The nine bishops involved came from Britain, France, Canada, Algeria, Spain, Austria and Hungary, and the argument they made was that the church should abandon its traditional teaching about the morality of just or defensive wars and proclaim a straightforward condemnation of total war, with no distinction with regard to the

means employed. Such proposals can be debated, but will not be carried. They have the opposition of the American bishops, who reflect the position of their own nation directly enough to contend that nuclear weapons, in which we excel, should be regarded as defensive weapons, because we say we possess them merely as a deterrent to others who might be aggressors if we couldn't threaten them with nuclear reprisals.

But, even while one concedes that even the church is still far away from a condemnation of all war-but perhaps not as far away as it was before the Pope's journey—it also has to be stated that it is approval of "defensive" wars and classification of such things as nuclear bombs as "defensive" weapons which provides the door through which all war survives as a legitimate

It has been the rare nation in history which has ever admitted or told its people that it was waging an aggressive war. Even Hitler, in 1939, was taking defensive measures to resist the aggression of the Poles-that was the story he told his own people and the world. In these uncivilized civilized times, everybody who goes to war does so purely for purposes of defense. And tt is never really the question of who started a war which determines who is the aggressor. Whichever side loses is proclaimed and convicted, by the winner, of having been the aggressor.

Similarly, it is an academic point whether nuclear weapons are classified as offensive or defensive weapons. How they are technically and legally classified will have almost nothing to do with how they are used.

Even though any toleration of war by church or by international law constitutes the opening through which war of all kinds will continue to make its entry into human affairs, the day for a blanket renunciation of war as an institution has not quite arrived.

And it never will arrive in its full meaning, because there is, so far as anybody can see, always going to have to be some force available to enforce any law against war. The final change is going to have to be one of semantics, with war itself declared illegal and beyond the pale by everybody, church and international law alike, but with the United Nations capable of taking police action against anybody who tries to violate the law against war.

One thing is certain. The world can no more afford to wait for the millenium to come into the affairs of men before it dares decree no more war of any kind than the village or town can afford to wait for human perfection before it adopts and means a law against burglary or murder. The process is standard everywhere except in the world. You establish a body of law. You deny to individuals the right to take the law into your own hands. You set up enforcement of the law as it is written. You hope, thereafter, to keep violence and burglary and murder under reasonable control.

This day will come more quickly to the world the more quickly the world drops the moral and legal pretense that murder can under some circumstances be justified.

Taste Of Freedom Whatever the Kremlin rationale for its announced sweeping changes in the Soviet economic setup, it is clear that they represent a fuller departure from "pure" Marxism than any previous nodifications of the system. It is obvious that many of the steps are in emulation of the Western economic methods, with profit given a far larger role in Russian production than before.

To conclude from these facts that the

changes pressge an end to Communism

would be a fallacy. What they do prove is that theoretically ideal systems of any kind must yield, in the application, to the realities of human motivation aspiration, and capacities.

There is a growing awareness within Communist nations that rigidly controlled economies fall to produce the material wealth they were supposed to. The economic realities of today in the Communist world no more resemble what Karl Marx envisioned than de the economic realities of the United States resemble what Adam Smith en-

Economic myths are as vital as any other kind, however, as forces which bind groups of human beings together in some kind of unity, and thus they survive and accommodate themselves to experience. The effect of the new Soviet moves, the emphasis on profit, on decentralization, on managerial freedom will be to improve the economy and in the process to strengthen the Communist myth.

The value of the changes is not that they expose a fallacy although many will find comfort in that thought, but that they may be symptomatic of a general relocation, an appetizing tasts of freedom.

dict seemed immune to any new tides of feeling, and still went for some slight degree of Sunday peace in Manchester by a decisive margin. The maintenance of any tiny scrap of tradition seems pleasant and reassuring these days, even though standards and values obviously do keep changing. We regret Bristol's narrow margin departure from the ranks of those who think that enough public drinking can be done in six days a week.

Pope Paul's Mission For Reace Pope Paul VI, a man of peace, has again carried his message and appeal for peace to the world. The forum used was a significant choice. He spoke before the United Nations, the world's

chief hope for a durable peace. He was seen and heard by tens of millions of persons who seek peace as ardently as does the Pope. The Pope's dramatic appearance before the world body, his sincere request that men and nations live with love and a true sense of equity and values in their hearts should win support for his crusade for a better world.

The product of an errand of such magnitude as that made by Pope Paul can only be accurately evaluated by history. The sincerity of the ples, the intent interest with which all delegates and others listened, the spontaneity of the applause, combine to presage that the 8,000 mile trip, crowded into line more than a day, will not be without some encouraging results.
