"The Great Love Affair," a light - hearted pictorial essay on the automobile in contemporary America, will be broadcast by CBS Tuesday from 10 - 11 p.m.

Harry Reasoner will be the narrator

Timed to the introduction of Detroit's new 1966 models and America's first anticipated ninemillion car production year, "The Great Love Affair" will examine the unique relationship between the average American and his automobile. The broadcast roams the U.S. to explore the pervasiveness of the auto in American life. CBS cameras have filmed a half - dozen examples of various drive - in businesses and institutions, as well as other offbeat automobile phenomena including custom auto shows, drag - strip racing and the newest fad of "slot " car" racing pariors.

In chronicling the love affair, broadcast examines Detroit's hard - sell, the auto showroom dickering over new and used car prices, the business of servicing autos and the boom in accessories, and the less remantic aspects of breakdowns, repossessions and dumping of autos. NEW YORK (AP)-The New Haven Railroad says it will file with the Interstate Commerce Commission a request for permission to abandon all interstate passenger service, effective March 1, 1966.

The petition is a formality to eliminate the bankrupt New Haven's last legal obligation to continue passenger service.

The railroad has temporary operating agreements with states or public agencies that assure commuter service until next summer, Similar agreements for long-haul passenger service are under consideration.

Under a proposed merger, the New Haven's freight system, but not passenger service, would be taken over by the Pennsylvania and New York Central railroads.
