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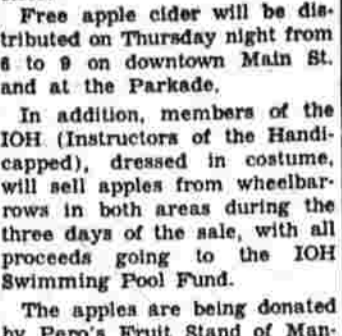
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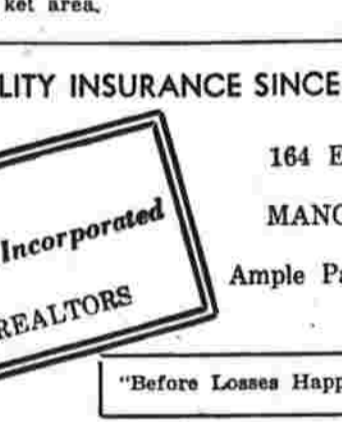

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Coventry Loyzim Sums Up Charges; Officials Profer Answers

Stephen Loyzim, the leader of the opposition to the formation of the Coventry Police Department, in a final pre-referendum statement, has angled out the real and only issues to be considered by the voters in considering his petition to rescind an ordinance creating the department as these:

"The illegal cancellation by the board of selection of the contract with the commissioner of state police for the resident state trooper, involving violation of the town ordinance which established the resident state trooper program as the official police organization in Coventry, regulations for the administration and operation of the department approved by the board of selection on Aug. 20, 1953 and approved by the board of finance on Aug. 20, 1953, and violations of Sections 7-12, 7-18, 7-27 and 7-34 of the General Statutes of the state."

Loyzim further contends that "each and every action, from the cancellation of the resident state trooper contract through the Aug. 25 special town meeting and the subsequent re-appointment of the chief of police to honor ordinances, regulations and laws."

Officials Answer

In response to Loyzim's specific charges, town officials offer the following replies:

"The contract with the Commissioner of State Police for the resident state trooper, which Loyzim refers, was an agreement between the commission of state police and the town of Coventry (in this case, the board of selection) entered into pursuant to Section 29-5 of the General Statutes of the State of Connecticut, Revision of 1953, and that such agreement was not a contract entered into as such by the legislative body of the town," according to an opinion of Coventry's town counsel.

The counsel, Atty. Gen. Robert J. Quinn, pointed out, however, that the appropriation covering the cost of such resident state policeman "was, of course, approved by the legislative body."

A written opinion of the counsel states that, under "Section 7-12 of the General Statutes the selection of the town has the duty to superintend the concerns of the town."

"In view also of the point that, 'in the opinion of the unanimous finding of the board of selection, that the quality of police work would and should be improved, it is my opinion that the board of selection had the right and duty to enter into the contract with the commissioner of state police, whereby it was mutually agreed that the services of the so-called resident state police officer would be terminated as of August 15, 1954.'"

"The term 'so-called resident state police officer' is used because the trooper did not live in town.

"The town counsel's further opinion states also that upon the termination of the services of the resident state police officer, the board of selection has the right to augment additional or substituted police protection for the town within existing appropriations for police services."

Coventry Electorate Votes Tomorrow To Resolve Police Challenge

Coventry voters will go to the polls tomorrow for the second time this month. This time they will be faced with only two questions, however, instead of a full slate of officials up for election.

The questions have been posed in a petition circulated by Stephen Loyzim, a former town representative, who has challenged the validity of the formation of a town police department and the appointment of an acting police chief. Loyzim's state police sergeant Ludwig Koldziej.

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'The Group' Lives Up to Film Code

NEW YORK (AP) — Mary McCarty's best-selling novel, "The Group," treated the sex lives of eight Vassar graduates with startling explicitness. Most readers believed it could never be made into a movie.

The film has just been completed here in Manhattan. The man who accomplished the seemingly impossible is Sidney Buchman, an urbane writer-producer who toiled in the Hollywood studios, though not lately.

Buchman wrote or produced such films as "Here Comes Mr. Jordan," "The Johnson Story" and "A Song to Remember," then fell into eclipse during the investigative upheaval of the early 1950s. He has lived abroad in recent years and made a return to film-making with the estimable "The Mark."

"The Group," which was directed by Sidney Lumet, appears to have survived the scrutiny of the film industry's production code. Buchman's script was amended largely in the use of certain words, he reported, otherwise the censors went along with him.

"We are not out to create a work of pornography," Buchman said. "It seemed to me that the book presented problems of the 1950s that remain vital and perplexing today."

"One of the major issues is the ever-present one that higher education is no help in preparing for the complexities of life. Let the Vassarites become offended, it should be admitted that the film will not specify the school from which the girls graduate."

Buchman charted his course for "The Group" early. "I knew it had to be made in the East," he said. "This was essentially an Eastern subject, and it had to be shot in the area where it took place."

With the approval of United Artists, Buchman made another command decision; no names.

"There were two very practical reasons for this," he explained. "At one time we discussed the idea of using perhaps three female stars. But this would have added \$750,000 to the budget."

Using stars also would have brought an imbalance to the script. The story would necessarily have been focused on the three names.

Buchman and Lumet interviewed 400 girls, heard 150 auditions, viewed 100 hours of television serials. Their final choices will be billed alphabetically: Candy Bergen, Joan Hackett, Elizabeth Hartman, Shirley Knight, Joanna Peltet, Mary Robin Reid, Jessica Walter, Kathleen Widows. Only Miss Knight has had much exposure in films.

The producer is proud of the way his group performed and predicts the members "will be heard from in the future. As for himself, he plans to spend the fall putting the \$2.7 billion film together, then return to his home in Cannes and resume his writing."

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American Panorama Arid Southwest to Seek Columbia River's Water

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — The Pacific Northwest has a wealth of water—water that is coveted by arid states of the Southwest.

The Columbia River alone pours 6.8 billion gallons per hour into the Pacific Ocean.

To residents of the Southwest, where water is becoming more and more precious, water flowing into the sea is cruelly wasteful.

This water, they assert, belongs not to the Northwest but to the nation. They want some of it piped to the Southwest.

"It makes as much sense to ask for some of your sunshine," reply Northwesters. They argue that it makes better logic to grow the crops here and ship them south instead of spending millions to divert the water southward.

So the question ultimately becomes: Should the water go to the people, or the people go to the water?

The position of Oregon and Washington officials is that enough water must remain in the Northwest to take care of all local needs for all time. This requires careful study—a study which began last week at least five years.

In the meantime, asks the Northwest, what about the millions of gallons flowing into the Pacific each year from streams in Northern California?

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Mental Illness Frequently Not Known, Treated

CHICAGO (AP)—The number of suicides every year in the United States indicates that mental illness is frequently not diagnosed and often is improperly treated when diagnosed, a Massachusetts doctor says.

Dr. Edwin Dunlop, director of research at Fuller Memorial Sanitarium, Attleboro, Mass., said Tuesday: "It has been shown that 70 per cent of those committing suicide were under a physician's care for various illnesses prior to their deaths."

Dr. Dunlop estimated that some 40,000 suicides occur each year.

He said a meeting of the Academy of Psychosomatic Medicine, that millions of mildly depressed persons never ask for help because they fail to recognize the nature of their illness.

Many of the depressed are treated by the family doctor without hospitalization through judicious use of modern drugs, he said, but Dunlop observed: "No matter how effective a medication might promise to be, it will perform no better than the confidence and optimism which the physician imparts."

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Sex Troubles Overstressed, Hiding Others, Expert Says

CHICAGO (AP)—Because it is fashionable to talk about sex problems, says a Northwestern University psychiatrist, many psychoanalysts ignore the more fundamental problems of their patients.

"Very often, patients hide deeper problems by emphasizing sexual problems," says Dr. Jules H. Masserman. "They're easier to talk about—in this day and age it's quite fashionable."

Masserman, co-chairman of the psychiatry department at Northwestern University School of Medicine, spoke at the annual meeting of the Academy of Psychosomatic Medicine. He elaborated on his speech in an interview.

"Problems such as impotence, frigidity, homosexuality and nymphomania are often perceived by the patient as quantitative problems," he said. "The more frequently these are mentioned, the more fundamental problems of their patients."

When the patient's primary problems are solved, said Masserman, the sexual problems tend to disappear.

Masserman blamed the over-emphasis on sexual problems in psychiatric treatment on two factors:

—Overreaction to Victorian prudery. "For a long time sexual problems were swept under the rug," he said. "In reacting against this, we overreacted."

—Misinterpretation of terms used by the late Sigmund Freud. "At first Freud thought all neuroses were due to sexual repression," he said. "Later he realized other personal factors are involved. But in referring to them collectively, he continued to use the term 'libido.'"

In assuming that "libido" referred only to sexual drive, said Masserman, many psychiatric students misread Freud and got the idea that sexuality is the sole driving force behind human behavior.

Bug-Shaped Lab Set for Launch

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — An insect-shaped, instrument-crammed satellite is set for launching from the West Coast test range Thursday to study what scientists call ionospheric phenomena. Named the Orbiting Geophysical Observatory — OGO-C — the 1,100-pound satellite is the first major National Aeronautics and Space Administration spacecraft to be launched from the West Coast. It will be boosted into orbit by a thrust-augmented Thor-Agena D rocket. It is the second in a series of seven such projects. The first OGO was launched more than a year ago from Cape Kennedy, Fla., and although it successfully performed some of its experiments, scientists termed it a failure. The OGO-C was designed to perform in a solar orbit that would bring it within 207 miles from the earth at its lowest point and as far as 575 miles above the earth at its apogee or highest point. A series of 20 experiments, including global mapping of the geomagnetic field and measurements of the neutral, ion and electron composition of the atmosphere, are among the satellite's primary missions. The observatory itself is about six-feet long, three-feet wide and three-feet deep. Attached to its rectangular body are 12 appendages, including booms and solar panels, that make the affair look like a gigantic insect with a head, tail, legs and wings. With its booms and panels extended, the OGO-C is 49-feet long and nearly 20-feet wide. Scientists call the OGO-C one of the most advanced unmanned satellites yet developed.

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — The annual football clash has begun. It may lack the color and spectacle of the annual homecoming game, but it has every bit as much emotion, drama and tension.

This football battle is fought not on a gridiron but in a living room littered with the miscellany of life and, at its peak, the Sunday newspapers.

The struggle is over not a rectangular chunk of sod but a rectangular slice of glass. And, like any football game, the national struggle between husbands planted firmly before television sets and wives seeking to dislodge them for household chores is a contest of strategy, strength and determination.

The coin toss comes in mid-August, when "preseason" professional games start. A wife husband starts his training early.

"Why don't you go shopping next Saturday?" you ask. "What's on your mind?" the wife replies.

"Oh, nothing special. But it occurs to me there's a football game I might watch if you wanted to buy new dining room furniture."

"Football?" she asks, while figuring out how much of the \$100 worth of new furniture in a house already is small for what's there. "Why the World Series isn't even over yet."

It is no use trying to explain that, as, indeed, the World Series isn't over. In fact, it won't even start until football season is half over and the baseball season will have started—before the series is over, too.

Sports seasons are hard enough for a fan to follow, let alone a wife.

A mild general to Saturday afternoon shopping trips. Sunday drives to the country and weekends of pulling up storm windows, painting, and moving lawn is incapable of shifting to the distinctions of NCAA, AFL and NFL.

"Why are all football players named Brown?" a wife may ask.

"If you get away with that, you may be able to flip quickly to the Bills and Patriots and make it appear it's all the same game."

With good luck and a fast-of-temo, you'll never get to that garage.

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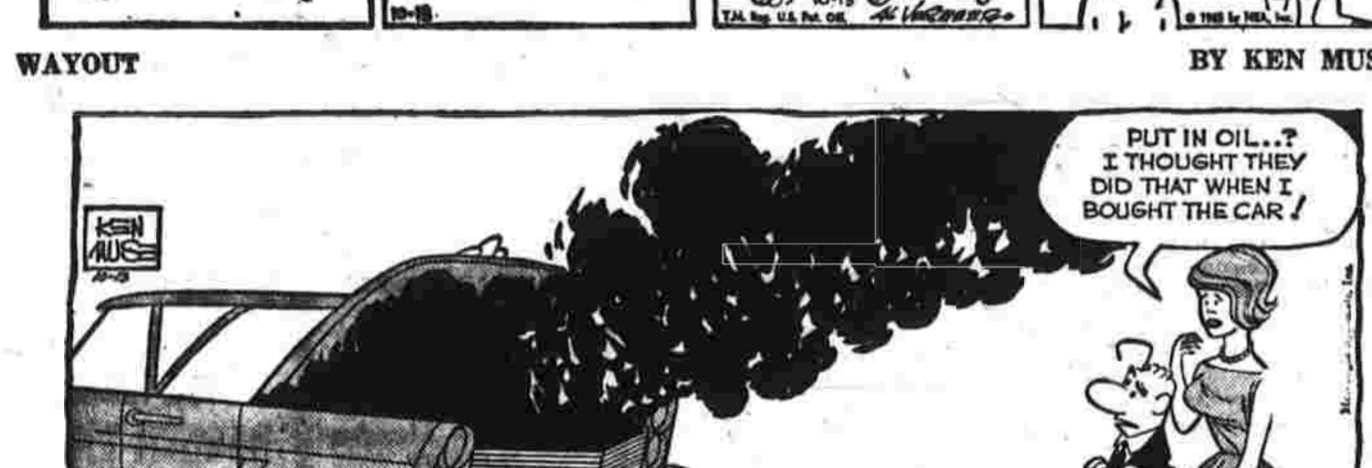
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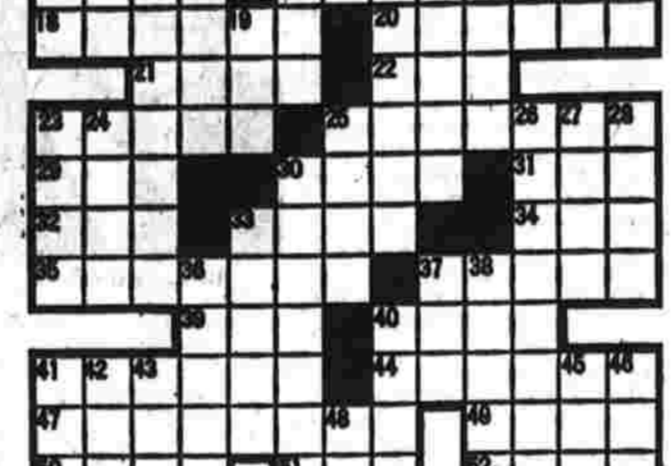

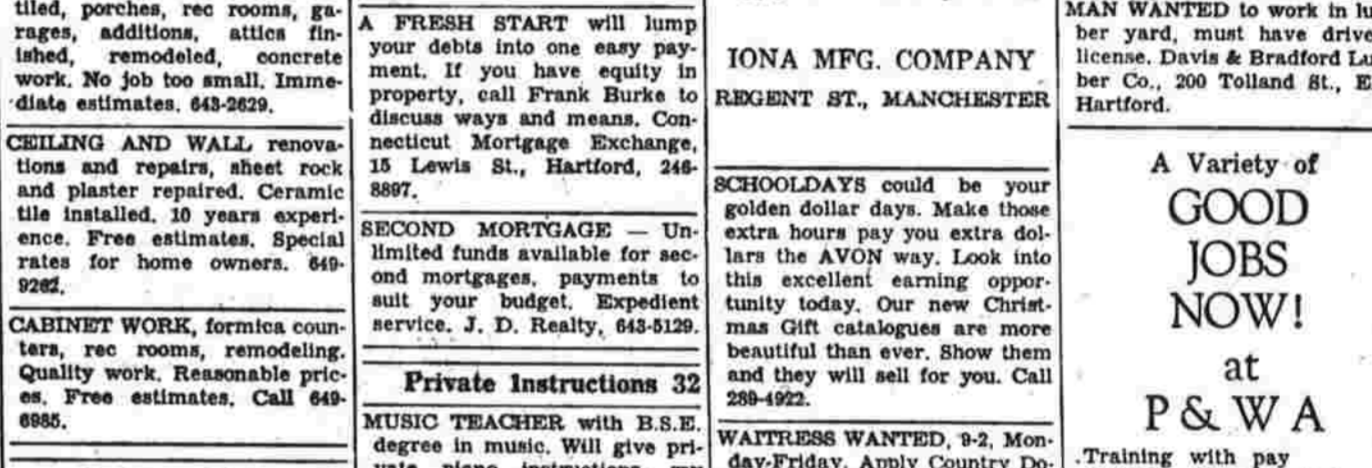

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Hard Fight Rages In Mekong Delta

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—Heavy fighting broke out in the Mekong river delta during the night, and thousands of U.S. combat troops completed giant sweeps north of Saigon and in the central highlands, a U.S. military spokesman reported today.
