# Negro Leaders Ponder Crawfordville Actions

CRAWFORDVILLE, Ga. (AP)—Negro leaders and state school officials planned today their next move involving the civil rights movement in this small, east Georgia community.

Negro leaders were scheduled to meet with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. today. But he was reported in New York. The possibility of continuing racial demonstrations apparently still exists in spite of a three-judge federal court ruling Thursday to halt school segregation in Tallapoosa County and a statement by King that "there will not be any more demonstrations."

Leadership Conference, said today that "there will not be any more demonstrations."

State troopers are remaining on duty in Crawfordville in scenes of intense demonstrations for civil rights for several weeks, and Ku Klux Klan spokesman say they plan a rally at the Tallapoosa County Courthouse Saturday.

About 200 Negroes observed the federal court ruling Thursday night when it was explained that he was hopeful objectives could be reached without further demonstrations.

Under the three-judge federal ruling at Augusta, Ga., Thursday, Tallapoosa County's school system was ordered into receivership and out of school desegregation. Dr. Claude Purcell, the state school superintendent, will have until Oct. 25 to work out transfer arrangements for 27 Negro pupils who had applied to attend the county's white school.

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"It is taking putting our feet in the road and marching to Atlanta, we are going to do that," he said.

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He said the civil rights drive will continue until other objectives are reached, including Negro representation in local government.

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# Roosevelt Pleads For More Effort To Stop Hunger

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—James Roosevelt made his debut before the United Nations today with a plea for greater efforts to banish hunger and spread economic development among the world's needy nations.

In his first speech as U.S. representative in the General Assembly's 17-nation Economic Committee, the late president's son said the United States will continue to play a key role in solving these underdeveloped lands.

"The United States is heavily committed to this proposition," he said in a prepared text. "World food production will have to triple in the next 20 years to provide every human being with an adequate level of nutrition," Roosevelt declared.

He recalled that the Economic and Social Council had endorsed a world food program with a target of \$75 million in commodities and up to 40 per cent of the needed cash and services, he said.

"The United States is prepared to contribute up to 20 per cent of the required commodities and up to 40 per cent of the needed cash and services," he said.

# Deaf Good As Drivers, Says Officer

CHICAGO (AP)—Policeman John J. O'Connell is a local deaf sign language instructor, but he never says a word in the driver improvement class he teaches Friday nights.

All his students are deaf. O'Connell has been teaching the deaf since 1961, communicating in sign language. "They're excellent drivers," he says.

The major problem of the deaf in driving, O'Connell said in an interview Thursday, is in receiving warnings in the daytime from emergency vehicles such as fire engines, police cars and ambulances.

Since they cannot hear the siren, the deaf sometimes are not aware of the approach of the emergency vehicles. At night flashing lights serve as warnings.

O'Connell said he teaches his students to stop automatically in the daytime when they see another car stopped for no apparent reason. This is a precaution in case an emergency vehicle is approaching.

The only thing extra required by law of deaf drivers is that they have a side mirror on the driver's side.

O'Connell, 37, learned sign language as a youngster from a deaf friend.

O'Connell, who joined the police force in 1948, teaches about three classes of deaf students a year.

In addition to sign language, O'Connell uses movies, slides, photographs and other visual aids. He also teaches drivers with normal hearing and lectures on traffic safety.

So far, he has taught about 400 people.

"And I've never heard of one of my students having a serious accident," he said.

# General Salutes 'Dolly' Troupers

SALGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—"Hello, Dolly," the first Broadway musical ever to be performed in a South Viet Nam town today with a series of on-stage salutes from a four-star general.

Dressed in combat fatigues, Gen. William C. Westmoreland, commander of U.S. troops in Viet Nam, gave separate mapy salutes to the "dangery, slingers supporting the military boys in the pit, male lead Roger Smith and you, Dolly, Miss Martin."

Mary Martin, the star of the show, gasped audibly at the unexpected curtain speech by the general and could only say, through tears, "God bless you all."

The general's visit to the 72-member company was a surprise. He had attended the show only Thursday with Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge and Premier Nguyen Cao Ky.

Westmoreland thanked the troupe for its contribution to the morale of U.S. forces in Viet Nam and assured them that the troops they played to in Bien Hoa, Nha Trang, Tan Son Nhut and Saigon "are the pride of the military, all of them proud to be here, although to be sure what you have seen in only 20 per cent of the total American force here."

The David Merrick production leaves Viet Nam Saturday to play for American troops on Okinawa, then goes to Korea for another round of military performances.

# Beame Bidding For Reformers

NEW YORK (AP)—Abraham D. Beame, the Democratic candidate for mayor, made a new bid Thursday night for support from the reform wing of his party.

Beame issued a policy statement in which he pledged to work for direct election of district leaders and other programs backed by reform leaders, many of whom opposed his nomination.

He visited four reform democratic clubs on Manhattan's west side and read his policy statement at each one.

Today, Beame received the editorial endorsement of three newspapers owned by S.I. Press—The Long Island Press, Long Island Star-Journal and Staten Island Advance.

Beame's Republican-Liberal opponent, Rep. John V. Lindsay, charged that conditions in the city's hospitals were an "unmitigated disgrace," and that city housing was entangled in an "administrative jungle."

Lindsay charged that Beame, as city comptroller, was largely to blame for the "deteriorating and degrading condition" of the hospitals because, Lindsay said Beame had failed to give them sufficient funds.

The third mayoral candidate, Conservative Party nominee William F. Buckley Jr., Thursday proposed a new kind of single city tax on businesses.

Events In World

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP)—South-east Asia Treaty Organization held a semi-annual two-day conference today with schedules for a determined effort to quell Communist subversion in the troubled region.

The military leaders, in a joint communique, said they reviewed Communist threats for to the treaty area and expressed determination to maintain and increase the effectiveness of SEATO as an agency in counter-terror subversion.

Informed sources said the communique was approved unanimously by the military chiefs of the United States, Britain, New Zealand, the Philippines, Thailand and Australia, and by observers from France and Pakistan.

Pakistan said neither its military chief could attend the conference because of a possible conflict with India. France sent an observer in line with President Charles de Gaulle's policy of avoiding any semblance of approval of U.S. policy in Viet Nam.

As the time and world of empire over,
and it is inexorably time for a new kind
of history?

Or is America destined to be the latest
approach to a world empire in a
repetition of all the history that has
been lived to date?

The balance of effort and energy is
all wrong, and makes the odds against
the crusaders higher than they should
need to be in a country of such
wealth and resources. It has become
ridiculous to claim, in such a country,
that we can't afford to be ugly. But
the regrettable disposition of energy
and effort continues; while the reformers
gain a victory here and there, the
thoughtless, the automatized routine
is creating new and greater ugliness
elsewhere. But evidently there is going
to be a higher public consciousness of what
we are letting ourselves do to ourselves,
and eventually some commercial
interests which now think they
can't afford to go to the trouble and
pains of avoiding ugliness are going
to realize that they themselves have been
figuring the thing all wrong. That will
be the effect that the Conservative
Party, the traditional guardian of the
concepts of empire, is now heading
toward a position in which it will favor
having Britain and its military
commitment "cut of Suez."

This, if it happens, will not only
mark one more retreatment on the
part of a British nation that has grown
perhaps both tired and intelligent. It
will also leave the United States with an
increased burden and responsibility, if it
continues to take upon itself the
responsibility of seeing, by its own
military presence, that nobody else
moves into the vacuum such British
withdrawal might create.

Such a move would leave us as the
last Western military presence in Asia,
as the last Western power assuming
the role of trying to keep peace and order
in territories not really its own.

This kind of opportunity repeats itself,
in one way or another, almost
every other time some old empire has
gone to the ghost. The post-war trend began
soon after World War II, when Britain
suddenly decided it did not want to be
responsible for Greece and Cyprus
after years of influence and protection to
us. The invitation is sometimes issued
by circumstance rather than by diplomacy,
as in Southeast Asia, where we filtered
our way in after the French had begun
their departure. The invitation, or
temptation, has developed in Africa,
in the wake of departing European
powers, but there, for a time at least,
we declined the immediate succession to
empire.

Again and again the situation
presents itself to the United States,
with our own question as to whether
or not we want to try to be the world's
latest empire, but with the kind of
approach which says:

"There is now this vacuum in the
power politics situation. Do you want
to have a vacuum, until it empties
draws in or submits to somebody
unworthy to fill it, or will you move
in yourself and protect the situation
for peace and civilization?"

But however the question is asked,
the answer in the affirmative falls into
the pattern of empire—winning, self-
sacrificing empire, as all empires have
always really seen themselves, but
empire nonetheless. And the affirmative
never really has to be an open, formal
yes. It can consist merely of an act,
a movement, which constitutes the beginning
of a commitment.

To answer in the negative, on the
other hand, to say no to empire,
requires a much more arduous and
conspicuous effort and decision. There
is only one real way for a nation as
powerful and vaguely well-intentioned as
we are to avoid following the path of
empire. That is to set up, and use, an
alternative. It is to see the troublesome
collective form of action instead of the
unilateral, to complicate responsibility
by dividing it, and to help make some
international power and law greater
than our own. If a nation in our position
would not have empire, it must deny it
by concerted, meaningful policies which
hold up the alternatives. To make it

### Church Supports Maryland Court

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP) — A vote of the Roman Catholic Church in Maryland agreed today with the State Court of Appeals ruling that a belief in God should not be a jury duty requirement.

The "Catholic Review" said in an editorial: "In view of civic rights which we claim for ourselves as Americans, we do not see why an accused man must be tried only by those who are willing to swear to a belief in God, nor do we see why jurors must be limited to those who do so."

"Indeed, the question may be raised, by what right would a state make such a theological inquiry in the first place?"

The court ruled Monday in the case of a Bookletist who was charged with slaying his wife, upholding his contention that persons of his faith were excluded from juries which indicted and convicted him.

The lawyer who represented Bookletist in the Supreme Court, public school teacher, said the decision is a "victory for the concept of God in our society." He is Francis H. Birch, now state attorney commissioner.

The Maryland constitution has made belief in God a requirement for jury duty.

Judge Julius J. Hoffman, in dismissing the suit, held that men barmaids will never replace barmaids.

The ordinance prevents women tavern employees from mingling with male customers or soliciting drinks.

John P. Crowley, attorney for the barmaids, said his clients were not complaining about the ordinance. But he said it was the antithesis of the ordinance.

MINNEAPOLIS — ST. PAUL (AP) — Sandy Koufax figured to dominate the World Series before it started, and it turned out just that way.

The 25-year-old ace of the Los Angeles Dodgers, who is called the best pitcher in baseball, won Thursday's clincher 2-0 with a brilliant three-hit effort. The left-hander struck out 10 Minnesota Twins.

Although he lost his first start in the second Series game, Koufax allowed only one earned run in 2 1/2 innings in three starts. His final shutout total of 29 was only two short of the Series record of 31 set by Bob Gibson of the St. Louis Cardinals last year.

All of his pitching was in the opener and also came back with two days rest to whip Claude Osteen in the sixth game, rates high on the Twins' offense.

In the final game, it was Koufax pitching with three shutouts and the ability of Los Angeles' supposedly weak hitters to all but match the Twins in home run power that won the balance of the Dodgers' triumph for the National League which has won eight of the 12 Series and three in a row. The Dodgers go into the record books along with 1951 New York Giants, 1955 Brooklyn Dodgers and 1956 and 1958 New York Yankees as the only clubs to bounce back and win after losing the first two.

The starting difference between the games played at Metropolitan Stadium in Los Angeles was reflected by the results. Not until the final day did they have to play the last of the ninth inning.

Murray Wilks and Ron Fairly, each with 11 hits, were the big producers for the winners, but Koufax overtook Lou Johnson, the second-leading 25-year-old outfielder.

Johnson, called up from Spokane in May after Tommy Donaghy suffered a broken ankle May 1, had earned six in the first three innings and then led the Dodgers to victory.

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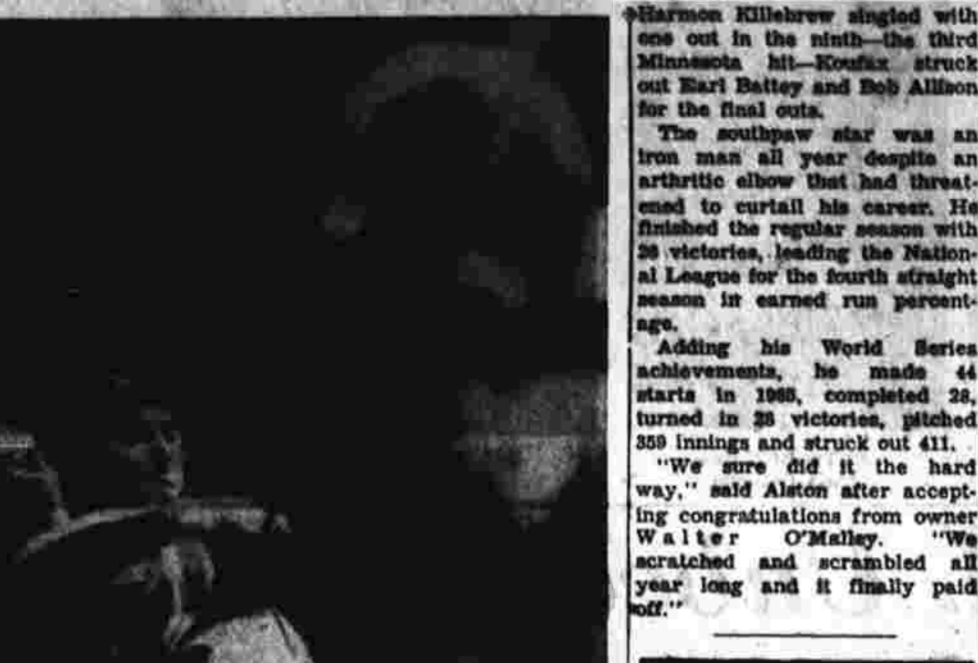
