First Hartford Seeks \$335,000 In Bristol Suit The First Hartford Realty Corp. of Manchester has filed a \$335,000 suit against the Bristol Central Realty Co. selected developer for that city's delayed downtown urban redevelopment area.

In the writ, filed Friday in Bristol, First Hartford alleges that it has not been paid for services rendered in its capacity of exclusive leasing agent for Bristol Central in the construction of a new shopping center in the heart of the redeveloped downtown area.

Bristol Central Realty Co. is owned by the Wadsworth and May Construction Co. of Hartford.

First Hartford claims that it should have been paid at the rate of \$1,200 per month for services rendered as "consultant, coordinator, expediter and planner in connection with construction, design, leasing and planning" of the proposed shopping area, under a July 1, 1963 contract.

It claims that it is owed \$21,000 for those services, plus \$298,152 in lease commissions, and is also claiming \$25,000 in damages.

ESCAPES BOAT FIRE NEW HAVEN (AP)—Robert Duchsos 20-foot cabin cruiser caught fire, burned to the waterline and sank Sunday, but Duchsos escaped unharmed.

Duchsos was about three miles out from New Haven in Long Island Sound. He was rescued by the U.S. Coast Guard cutter, the USCGC Sparrowhawk, which was in a nearby outboard boat.

The U.S. 1st Infantry Division rounded up 115 suspects during an operation 25 miles north of Saigon. A spokesman said five of the suspects were identified as Viet Cong and one was killed when he tried to escape.

The Viet Cong inflicted heavy casualties in an ambush of a small government squad in a northern coastal province. Government troops reported they killed 11 guerrillas in a raid in the Mekong Delta, 65 miles south of Saigon.

There were indications that the delta and its rich rice fields may be the Viet Cong's new No. 1 target.

The Communist guerrillas have been attacking more frequently in the delta during the past few weeks and have been operating in battalion strength. A battalion may range from 500 to 1,000 men.

The guerrillas staged mortar attacks on 10 South Vietnamese military posts and watchtowers during the past few days but made no attempt to advance on them. Government casualties were reported light in the attacks in Quang Thien and Phong Dinh provinces, 75 to 125 miles south of Saigon.

Supporting most cities within 111 miles of the coast are two U.S. Army divisions, but there is no large U.S. force west of Saigon.

Viet Air Strikes Cost Another Jet

SATCON, South Vietnam (AP)—The loss of another U.S. bomber over North Vietnam was reported today and two crewmen were presumed captured.

The plane, an F4C Phantom, was shot down Monday over a bridge 40 miles west of Vinh, a U.S. military spokesman said. It was the sixth American plane reported lost in North Vietnam in three days and the 11th since the United States began bombing North Vietnam last February.

Radio Hanoi claimed that North Vietnamese gunners brought down five U.S. planes Monday and Sunday.

Fourteen other planes from the carrier Midway pushed off on Monday and Sunday. Two planes from the carrier Independence attacked a marine railway installation about 60 miles north of the frontier between North and South Vietnam. Pilots said they damaged three buildings and sank a barge.

U.S. bombers from Guam blasted a Viet Cong target in the Ho Bo woods 30 miles northwest of Saigon.

The Vietnamese army said its troops killed six Viet Cong, wounded 13 and captured 10 in operations in the northern coastal province.

Troops of the U.S. 1st Infantry Division rounded up 115 suspects during an operation 25 miles north of Saigon. A spokesman said five of the suspects were identified as Viet Cong and one was killed when he tried to escape.
