

Union Pond Draining, Town to Inspect Bed

Today was "D Day" at Union Pond, with the start of a 3-day operation to drain its water into the Hockanum River, in order to measure its waste accumulation and to determine what to do with it.

At 11 this morning, the dam's sluice gates were opened and the campaign started. The first sluice since 1960 that drainage of the pond was undertaken.

Public Works Director Walter Fues said that the water will drop about two inches an hour and, providing no substantial rain falls, the water level will be low enough in three days to permit inspection of the bed.

The flow from Lydall Brook into Union Pond, he said, is too insignificant to materially affect the draining operation. The 2-inches-per-minute-drop, which takes into consideration the one million gallons of water per day which enters the pond from the Hockanum River, upstream.

When the inert accumulation on the bed is visible, Fues will determine which one of three proposed methods is best for its removal: (1) breaking it up with heavy equipment; (2) dredging the entire bed; (3) washing it away with water.

Whatever method is followed, the sediment will be sent downstream into the Hockanum River, perhaps with the aid of air compressors.

Today's action comes on the heels of a 500-signature petition, submitted last week to the board of directors, and asking the town to take action on the 2-inches-per-minute-drop, which takes into consideration the one million gallons of water per day which enters the pond from the Hockanum River, upstream.

The petition, circulated among residents of the North End, was started by Chester S. Parvizi of 77 North St. It was a repeat of similar petitions submitted almost yearly.

Roman Curia Faces Revamping by Pope

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul VI is reported ready to issue new regulations designed to bring new and younger men into the top levels of the Roman Curia.

The Curia, the central administrative body of the Roman Catholic Church, is dominated by conservative officials, most of them Italian. Progressives at the Vatican Ecumenical Council have been urging major reforms to internationalize the organization and end the entrenchment of the old men at the top.

Vatican sources said the Pope would issue a two-part document which would:

- Make 70 the mandatory retirement age for all high positions in the Curia, including cardinals and papal nuncios of archbishops.
- Provide for automatic suspension from their jobs of all cardinals who head Curia departments upon the death of a Pope. The new Pope could then replace or retain each man.
- It was not known if the retirement rule would apply to those now in control of the 12 congregations, three tribunals and six special offices that make up the Curia. Of 26 cardinals in ranking Curia posts, 22 are over 70.
- They include the militant leader of the conservative faction in the Ecumenical Council, Alfredo Ottaviani, head of the Holy Office, who will be 73 next week; Amleto Cicognani, the 62-year-old secretary of state, and Eugenio Tisserant, 61, the prefect of the Ceremonial Congregation and the dean of the College of Cardinals.
- One of the church's leading progressives, Augustin Cardinal Bea, 54. But he heads the Vatican's Christian Unity Secretariat, and his office is not classed as part of the Curia. The Pope is expected to issue

Survey Reports No Organized Effort To Avoid Draft Calls

NEW YORK (AP) — Draft officials across the nation say they have detected no signs of an organized effort to avoid the draft.

An Associated Press survey shows the draft proceeding normally following a weekend of anti-Viet Nam demonstrations and discourses of a movement to help youths escape military service.

As far as detentions and rejections are concerned, the Maine spokesman said: "If anything, our acceptance rate is going up; it was a little higher last month than it has been."

The draft boards also were asked if they had many detentions or rejections for unusual reasons. Such an unusual reason would be anything unusual, recurring at many boards could indicate an organized movement.

Without exception the boards answered "no."

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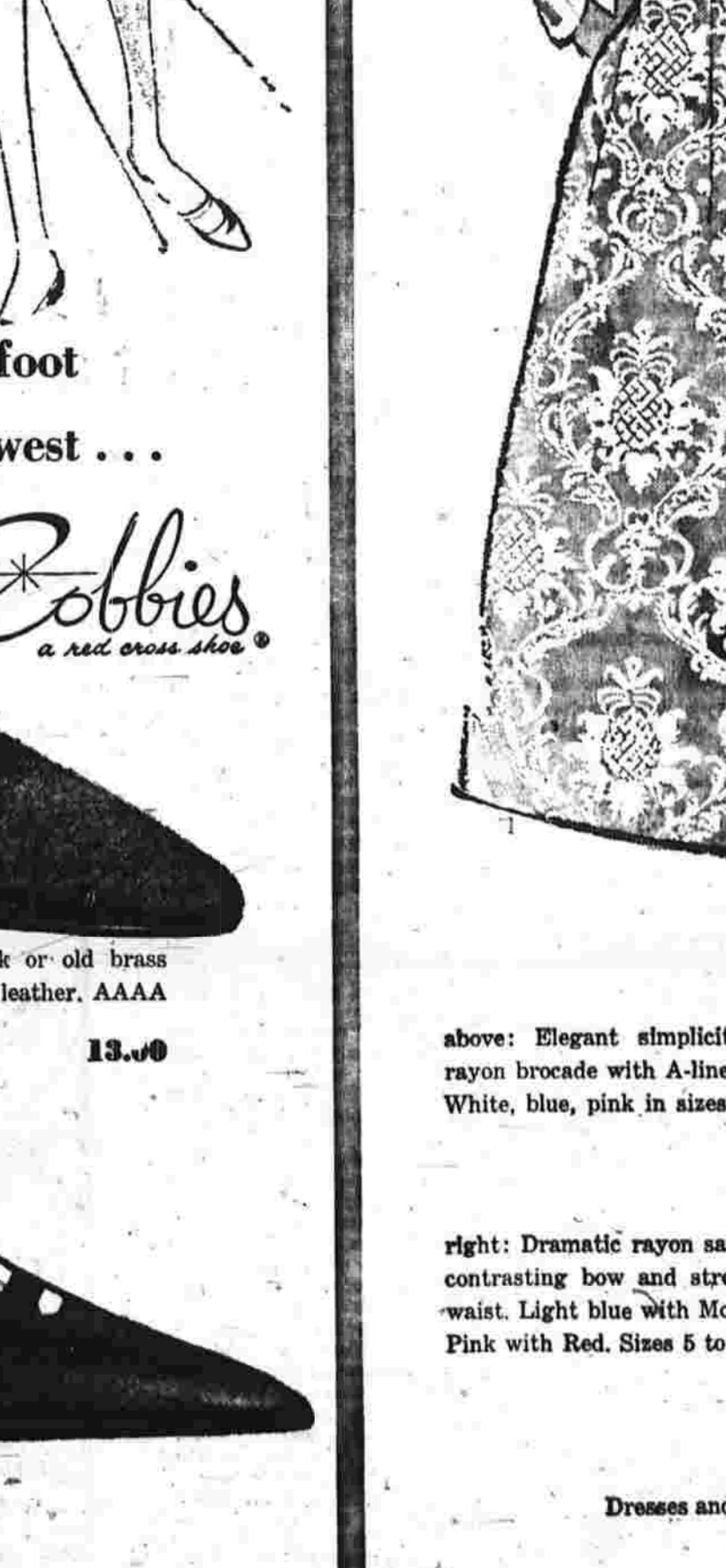

Two Rabid Bats Found in State

Two cases of rabies in bats have been reported since August in Connecticut, and the bats of a bat should be considered as potentially dangerous, says the State Department of Health.

The two cases were in Killington and Stamford. The Killington bat was taken in for examination after it had been found flying frantically. The Stamford bat was found on a driveway.

A great effort should be made to capture a biting bat so that it may be examined. Bats with rabies usually can be detected through their unusual behavior. Bats flying by night, bumping into objects, falling from trees, and especially those attacking animals or humans should be viewed with caution, warns the department.

"This does not mean that indiscriminate slaughter of bats should be undertaken," says the department. The bat is usually harmless and an extremely valuable creature. They play an important part in insect con-

Lynchburg, Va. (AP) — Virginia, solidly Democratic at the state level since the 1890s, names a governor next month in an election that contains the upstart ingredient of a fierce third party movement.

And the Republicans, besought by former President Dwight D. Eisenhower and other national party leaders to go all out in the interest of lifting party morale across the nation — as well as local victory — are actively working at their uphill task.

In this they may get unintended aid from the new Virginia Conservative party. Its campaign appears aimed at the strongly conservative-separatist elements of both major parties.

Conservative ticket strength is conceded to be strongest in south-central agricultural Virginia, normally a bastion of the state Democratic organization through the years. It is there that the party will take a deeper cut from the Democratic side.

Democrats who nominated an unopposed state ticket without the friction of a primary scrap are displaying a unity not seen in years. They are campaigning harder than usual but are showing no signs of any real apprehension.

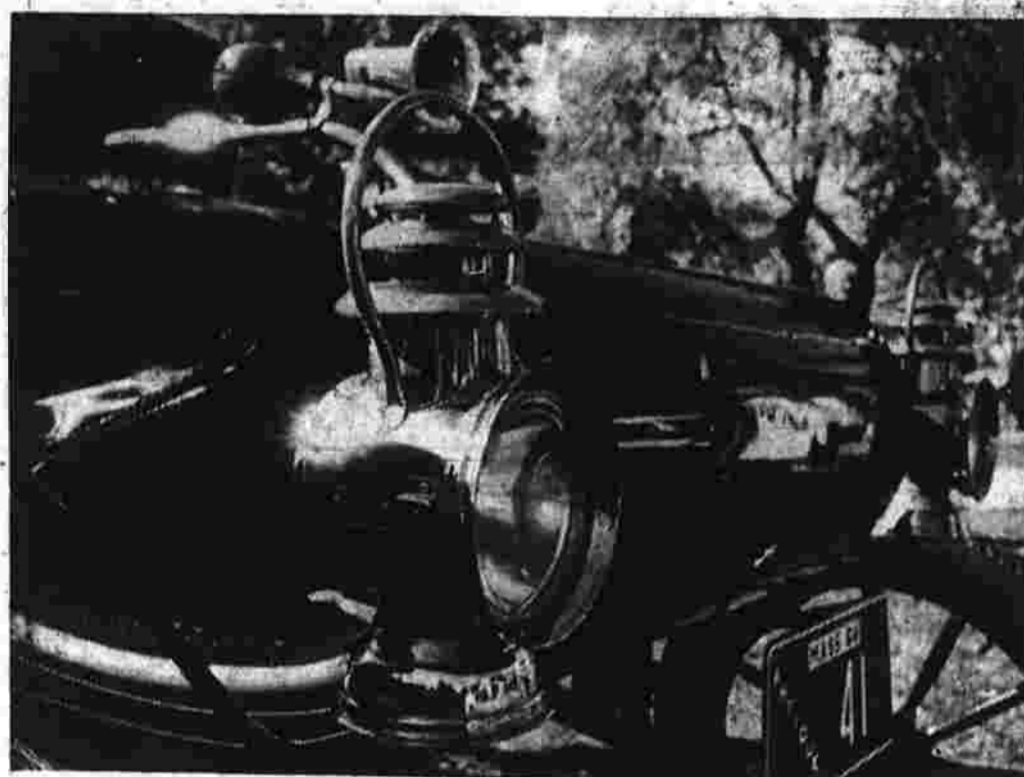

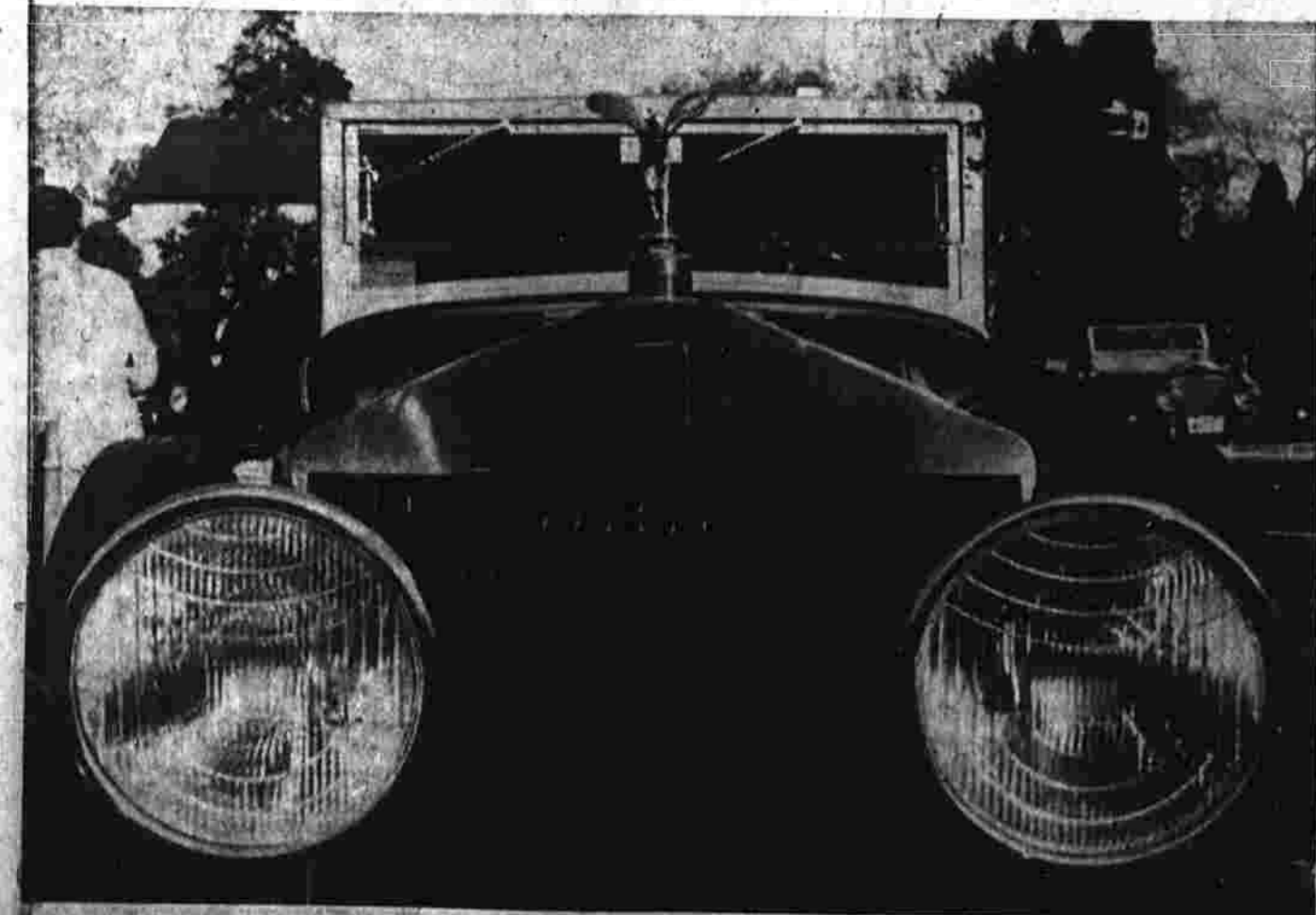

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School Board, MEA Hit Quick Impasse

The Manchester Education Association bumped against a granite wall of resistance to its initial proposals last night when the nine-member MEA negotiating team sat down with the Board of Education for the first of a series of discussions springing from the election victory in the Oct. 7 teacher referendum.

Schafer summed up the board's feelings by stating that not only did the matter seem not negotiable but that even if it were, there was no possibility of obtaining the necessary funds to support a salary increase. He said the board makes at least a gesture in appealing to the Board of Directors for more money, he emphasized that such a move would be empty of meaning.

After a suggestion that a legal opinion be sought to resolve the impasse, Schafer pleaded that such a move might set a precedent and throw the door open to legal interpretation or arbitration on every item met during the negotiations.

"If we disagree like this at the outset, I can foresee nothing but terrible differences ahead," Wolffert said toward the close of the discussion.

After the meeting had proceeded in an air of optimism and cordiality during the opening few moments, Robert Geagan, a co-chairman of the negotiating team, introduced the request for closed sessions, defending this proposal by stating the advantages to be gained by allowing all parties complete freedom of expression.

Geagan contended that, although the public had a right to know what is going on, he felt that in closed sessions there is more give-and-take, more people express their opinions without being afraid of their words flying back into their faces at a later date.

Board member Leonard Seader immediately rejoined, stating that he, in his conscience, couldn't attend any closed session of negotiations, whether in formal meeting of the board or informal. Seader said that he seconded Wolffert's feelings, explaining that the board was a closed group of officials, not a private organization, and the matter of secret sessions couldn't even be a point for discussion.

Following similar expressions of opposition from other board members, the MEA representatives received a hint by Wolffert to admit the press as the sole spectator to the discussions. This alternative, however, was thought by Schafer to have no sound legal ground.

Both Schafer and School Superintendent Curtis mentioned the possibility of going into a closed "executive session" at certain crucial points of the negotiations if the conditions warranted such a move. The method of procedure, Curtis said, was perfectly legal.

Speaking for the MEA view point besides the negotiating team were the organization's president Robert Wolffert and CBA representative Robin Barlow. Wolffert explained that one reason for the closed sessions was the matter of open sessions was the "newness" of the "forthcoming business."

The next point dealt harshly with by the board was the suggestion by the MEA co-chairmen Geagan and Martha White that press releases or communications by individuals to the press be determined jointly by the board and the MEA. This would presumably hold for any forthcoming executive sessions.

Schafer echoed the board's sentiment at large by stating that the teachers group would "just have to trust the public atmosphere" and added that "you certainly wouldn't expect an elected official not to make a comment at every opportunity" referring to the suggestion that a board member refrain from commenting on any aspect of the negotiations without prior clearance from both parties.

The final roadblock run into by the MEA team lay in the subject of some 230 unassigned teacher salary contracts which the board adamantly insisted should be only those related to the coming budget, not the previous one.

Hidden Fire Erupts At Disposal Area

A fire that is reported to be 10 to 15 years old broke out three times yesterday and this morning at the town disposal area.

Ernest Turek, the superintendent of the highway department, said the fire first broke out above ground yesterday afternoon at the far west end of the disposal area. The west end is now being used to dispose of trees and stumps.

The first blaze was smothered before the dump closed yesterday afternoon. Turek said, however, that it is never really out. Embers smolder underground all the time. He says it has been smoldering for nearly 15 years.

At 8:15 that night another fire had broken out at the same place on the surface. Turek said dump trucks and bulldozers were used until 1 a.m. to smother the blaze in the westerly end of the dump.

When workers arrived at 7 a.m. this morning they found a third blaze had broken out slightly south of the two previous ones. The ground at the disposal area was still smoking.

All morning dump trucks brought gravel to the edge of the fire. Late in the morning a bulldozer started to "plow" the mounds of gravel onto the fire. Turek said this isn't the largest outbreak. Also, he said, the fire started near the Rockman River at the west end of the dump.

Turek explained the possible reason the fire broke out. When the ground is damp at this time of year the fire smoldering under the ground gives off steam. The steam expands and makes large "puff-holes." The holes allow fresh air to get to the fire and it breaks out.

Most town dumps allow such fires to burn themselves out.

New Coliseum May Be Built For New Haven

NEW HAVEN (AP) — Plans for a new coliseum that will hopefully lure some of the convention trade away from Hartford were announced today by Mayor Richard Lee.
 The 9,000-seat coliseum will "attract numerous shows, sporting events, conventions and exhibitions for which New Haven now has no adequate space," Lee said.
 As for the old New Haven Arena, it will be purchased by the city for \$600,000 with the aid of federal money and torn down, the mayor said.
 The coliseum is to be built on a 220,000-square-foot site already owned by the city just off the Oak Street connector. The site is near the interchange of the Connecticut Turnpike with the new Interstate Route 81 and is "ideally located," Lee said.
 The coliseum is to be designed by Kevin Roche, chief designer for Eero Saarinen & Associates. It will be near the Gothic-designed Knights of Columbus skyscraper on South Church St.
 The New Haven arena is old and inadequate and we have long known that many shows, conventions and other attractions have bypassed the area because of its limited capacity and lack of facilities," Lee said.
 The mayor said that an ordinance creating a New Haven Coliseum Authority will be submitted to the board of aldermen before the end of the year.
 This authority will have the power to build, operate, maintain and publicly finance the coliseum.
