Brink's Vault Hit

Cannon Used In Robbery

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (AP)—A .20 mm cannon was used to blast open a foot-thick vault inside the Brink Co.'s branch office here and an estimated \$400,000 in cash, checks and securities were reported missing.

The loss was discovered today by Frank Steser, the office manager, when he reported to work. He said only about one-fourth of the loot was negotiable. Seventy-five per cent of the loot was in checks.

He said no one was in the office between 4 p.m. Saturday and 8 a.m. today. Police detectives and FBI agents sealed off the bank area in the northern section of the city. Authorities refused to disclose more than scant details of the crime.

One spokesman said, however, that a tripod used to mount a light cannon and "quite a few" shell casings, along with a gas torch were found near the vault.

Detectives reported that the vault had been lined with mattresses, apparently to muffle the sound of the firing.

A check of the office's burglar alarm system today showed it had been silenced. Police declined to say how this had been done.

The vault is in a one-story, brick-and-concrete building, with an adjoining garage. Police theorized that the burglars drove a truck — carrying the cannon — into the garage and then wheeled the weapon into the office.

A regulation American-made .20mm cannon is about 77 inches long and normally is mounted on attack aircraft. Police said the method was similar to that used in an unsuccessful attempt at a Brink's office in the city of Quebec in March.

Steser said a key may have been used to open the office door, or the lock may have been picked.

He told police there was no sign of a forced entry. A second door, located a few feet inside the front door, also was opened.

The vault, reinforced by cement and steel, is located at the rear of the building. Deputy Police Chief Samuel Nappi said the crime had an "international flavor." He refused to elaborate beyond earlier conjecture, comparing the crime to the attempted one in Canada.

"They came prepared. They were going to get into the vault one way or another," Nappi said. Police said face-masks were found at the scene. They theorized that the masks were used to protect the burglars from the dust raised by the cannon shots.

Nappi said the burglars cut into the steel with a gas torch after blasting through the cement with the cannon.

An arms expert from Griffiths Air Force Base in Rome, N.Y., was called in to examine the estimated 30 shell casings found in and around the vault.

OSLO, Norway (AP) — The Nobel Peace Prize has been awarded to the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund, the Nobel Committee announced today.

The award was made by the five-member committee of the Norwegian Storting — Parliament. The prize consists of a gold medal and a cash award of \$51,788.

Since the prize was first awarded in 1901 it has been given to 32 persons and eight institutions.

UNICEF was founded by unanimous decision of the United Nations General Assembly on Dec. 11, 1946.

Originally UNICEF was formed to help child victims of war in Europe and Asia. On Dec. 1, 1960, the U.N. General Assembly decided UNICEF should concentrate on aiding children in underdeveloped countries.

Probe Set In Shooting Of Reservist

HADDAM (AP)—An investigation is under way to discover who was responsible for the fatal machine-gunning of a young Marine reservist during midnight maneuvers at Cockaponsett State Forest.

Rocket System's Failure Cancels Gemini Mission

Telemetry Signals Lost After Takeoff

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Launching of the Gemini 6 astronauts on man's first attempt to catch and join an orbiting satellite was postponed indefinitely today when their Agena spacecraft target was lost in space.

Flight Director Christopher C. Kraft Jr. scrubbed the launching of Walter M. Schirra Jr. and Thomas P. Stafford when it was determined that the Agena apparently crashed into the Atlantic shortly after launch at 10 a.m. EST by an Atlas booster.

When a tracking station in Australia reported "no joy, no joy" in futile attempts to find the Agena, Kraft called the mission off at 10:54 a.m.

At the time, the countdown on the astronauts' Titan 2 rocket was progressing on schedule toward an 11:41 a.m. launching.

The failure meant that Schirra and Stafford probably will have to wait until next year for another try at the rendezvous and docking mission, completion of which is critical to this nation's plans to land men on the moon.

As the astronauts watched from their own spacecraft on another launch pad 8,000 feet away, an Atlas blasted the Agena aloft precisely on time at 10 a.m., after a perfect countdown.

"The flight couldn't be finer," the mission control center reported happily as the Atlas leaped away, bathing its pad in a brilliant torrent of flame, and seemed to perform beautifully in its upward thrust.

But spirits fell suddenly six minutes, 20 seconds after the launch, when the Agena should have separated and its own engine sprung to life to drill the spacecraft into a circular orbit.

"A dramatic loss of telemetry" was reported by mission control and the spokesman said "the situation is not a happy one."

Then, 22 minutes following the blastoff, spokesman Paul Haney said that the Agena was traveling 5,500 miles an hour below its projected speed and may have impacted in the Atlantic.

The Gemini launch crew went ahead with their own countdown, hopeful that tracking stations around the world would find the lost target vehicle.

Part of the most complicated two-rocket countdown ever attempted, still was right on the button when Kraft called for the scrub.

The normally reliable Agena has launched successfully more than 140 U.S. payloads into space, including the Ranger moonshots and the Mariner flights to Mars and Venus. It also has been a workhorse for the nation's military space program, primarily launching reconnaissance shots from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif.

However, for the Gemini 6 mission, the Agena was equipped with several new systems, including engines capable of multiple restart, telemetry links, tracking beacons and the addition of the docking collar into which the Gemini was to be (See Page Twelve)

FBI Men Serving Abroad Not Spies - White House

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP)—White House press secretary Bill D. Moyers denied today that FBI agents abroad were collecting intelligence data.

He said such a report published in New York City "is not true, and is irresponsible in my opinion because it is not true."

Moyers' comment came at the White House Texas news center, near the ranch where President Johnson went to recuperate from his recent operation.

The FBI reportedly has agents serving in various foreign countries as embassy legal attaches.

Reports that FBI agents were serving abroad first came up earlier this year during the Dominican Republic troubles.

It is generally known that the FBI has men at U.S. embassies as legal attaches in such places as London, Rome, Mexico City, Buenos Aires and Tokyo.

The New York Herald Tribune said today that normally the field of foreign intelligence gathering is the jealously guarded domain of the Central Intelligence Agency. It added that sources here confirm that Johnson has directed the FBI into at least eight key Latin American cities where it had not operated since the end of World War II.

One of the FBI's prime responsibilities is maintenance of the internal security of the United States. In line with that, it is generally known that it has men abroad on liaison work with U.S. federal agencies and police agencies within those countries, such as Scotland Yard in England.

The function of the FBI men abroad is primarily liaison. As far as it is known, it is not unusual for the FBI to work in foreign countries in its liaison capacity and also to work at times with the CIA in order to get a job done.

When the matter of FBI agents abroad came up last May, the Washington Post said that Johnson had ordered FBI agents into the Dominican Republic to investigate the extent and nature of Communist influence in the revolt there.

Cong Losses Heavy In Siege on Camp

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — The defenders of Plei Phu Yen, where an operation to sent out combat patrols today while the Viet Cong controls a used to rain mortar shells and machine-gun fire into the besieged camp for the seventh day.

Vietnamese army sources estimated that 153 Communist guerrillas had been killed by air strikes around the special forces camp 210 miles northeast of Saigon and another 100 had been slain in ground action.

A U.S. officer who went out on patrol from Plei Me said he counted 100 Viet Cong bodies. He said one column consisting of a government regiment with a spearhead of armor had advanced to within about four miles of the camp by tonight.

After beating off an ambush and killing an estimated 250 guerrillas at Plei Ya Dran, a village on the way, Government casualties were reported light.

One informed U.S. source in Pleiku said the major fighting appeared to be over, even though the Viet Cong maintained their positions around the camp.

A U.S. medical helicopter braved the ring of enemy machine guns around the post to bring out a wounded American and four wounded Vietnamese. U.S. spokesmen said casualties continued light among the garrison of 300 Montagnard tribesmen and 19 to 23 U.S. advisers. (See Page Nineteen)

Godoy Asks Troops To Move on Rebels

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — Troops and tanks of the Inter-American Peace Force moved into the rebel sector of Santo Domingo today to help restore peace to the issue city.

Provisional President Hector Garcia-Godoy asked for the patrols because of the grave situation in the city, an official peace force announcement said.

Violence stemming from continuing bad relations between rebels and the military chiefs has resulted in at least nine deaths in the past week.

It was the first time the peace force, made up mostly of U.S. and Brazilian troops, had entered the rebel zone on an operation of this kind.

Other units fanned out through the rest of the city. Garcia-Godoy requested the patrols after unidentified gunmen assassinated Aquiles Leyva Matos, administrator of a sugar mill and a member of the Dominican Revolutionary party.

The predawn operation involved a sizable portion of the inter-American force. Three shots rang out during the first phase of the operation but no casualties were reported.

There were angry mutterings from civilians in the downtown sector, Luis Lambert Pegasus, a ranking official of ex-President Juan Bosch's Dominican Revolutionary party, told a reporter.

"I had thought the Americans were coming into clean up the Dominican troops, but now it appears that the remedy is worse than the cure."

Ambitious HARYOU-ACT Victim of a Running Feud

NEW YORK (AP)—The nation's most ambitious local anti-poverty program — HARYOU-ACT — is troubled.

Launched into a political storm in mid-1964 with a projected three-year budget of \$118 million, the program that serves 13,800 Negro youngsters on the crowded streets of Harlem has since been accused of everything from fiscal mismanagement to fomenting racial unrest.

Its three founding fathers have either resigned or been fired in a running feud which revolves around the name of flamboyant Harlem Congressman Adam Clayton Powell, Jr. Powell consistently has denied any involvement.

At the outset a battle over control of the purse strings threatened to swamp HARYOU-ACT before it got off the ground.

Now the federal government is withholding nearly \$1 million in public funds and the agency's board of directors has announced a major top-level shake-up in the wake of a city accusation that more than three-quarters of a million dollars cannot be accounted for.

Yet some of its programs have worked well enough for the federal government to appoint a summer crash program through the end of the year, citing "what it has done for the youth of Harlem."

Federal antipoverty program director Sargent Shriver says HARYOU-ACT programs help make the difference between a peaceful Harlem and a riot-ridden Los Angeles in 1965.

HARYOU-ACT's executive director, Livingston L. Wingate, said last week that a group of Harlem youths has threatened to make "Watts look like a tea party" unless the Negro situation in Harlem is improved.

He said on a CBS radio program Tuesday night that there is more than one organization ready to rebel.

There are two men who embody the bubbling controversy that swirls around HARYOU-ACT. One is Wingate, tall, thick-spoken Negro attorney who was once an top aide to Powell.

Wingate was born in Timonville, S.C., lived an impoverished boyhood in Harlem, worked his way through college and has drawn from his friends the comment that "with Wingate, HARYOU-ACT is a religion."

The other is Kenneth Bancroft Clark, a distinguished Negro sociologist and professor at the City College of New York who theorizes that public school segregation hurts both whites and Negroes. He was cited by the U.S. Supreme Court in its 1954 school desegregation decision.

Clark was one of the HARYOU-ACT's three founding fathers, and is responsible for most of a monumental, six-page research report that set forth the basic theories under which HARYOU-ACT is to operate.

When HARYOU-ACT was born in July, 1964, after more than two years of preparation, a half-million people, 14 per cent of them Negroes, were jammed tightly into the dilapidated and decaying six square miles that make up central Harlem.

More than 30,000 Harlem men were jobless. Those who looked for work got sharp competition from the 48 per cent of Harlem women who work. Yet the 48 social agencies already operating in Harlem hadn't been able to cope with the situation.

The problem, Clark felt, was that nobody was approaching it from the right direction.

HARYOU-ACT came into being with President Johnson's backing as the combination of two groups, which had been created two years earlier with grants from the President's Committee on Juvenile Delinquency.

One was HARYOU—Harlem Youth Opportunities Unlimited—which did the research for Clark's report. The other was ACT — Associates Community Teams — which spent \$600,000 creating a miniature domestic Peace Corps in Harlem.

HARYOU-ACT has put together a complex set of programs including job placement, day camps, a youth group, a cadet corps, adult education, after-school study centers, Project Headstart offices and a part-time operating community action institute, with a narcotics institute just getting started.

By its own estimate it is reaching 15,480 youngsters aged 4 to 21, and has spent \$1 million so far this year.

A-Ban Talks At U.N. Set Next Week

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—U.S. officials expect the Soviet and American disarmament negotiators to open talks here next week on a treaty to prevent the spread of nuclear weapons to nations that don't have them.

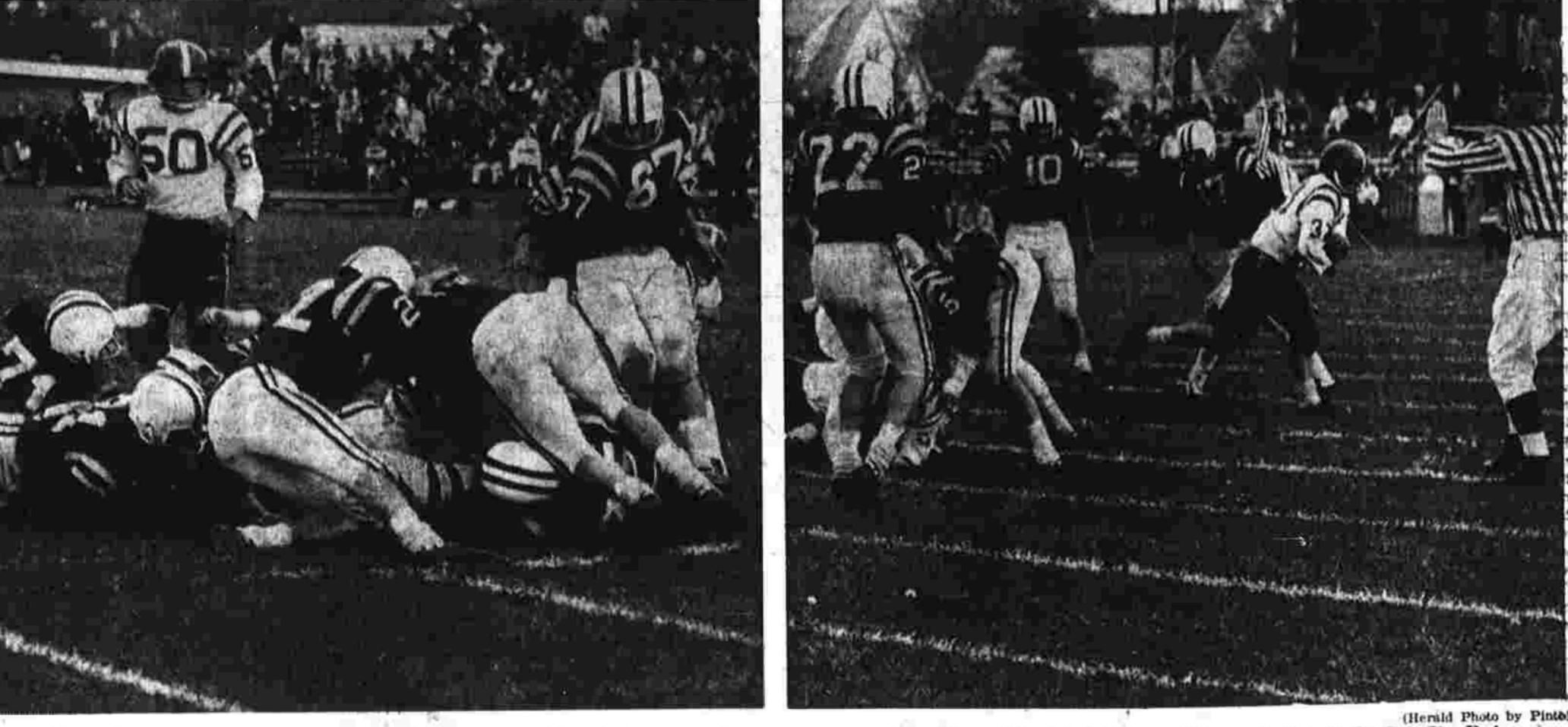

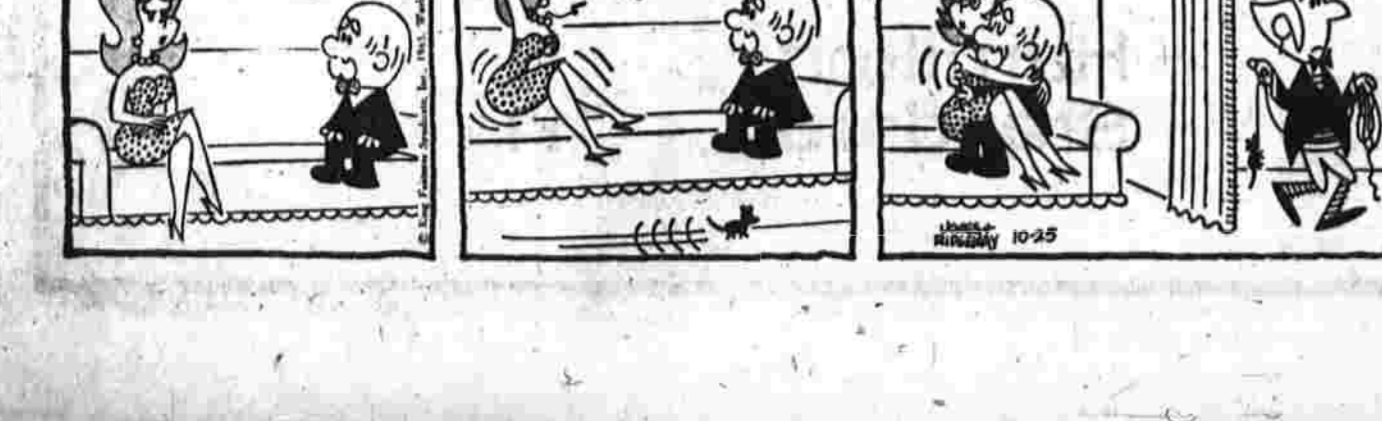
