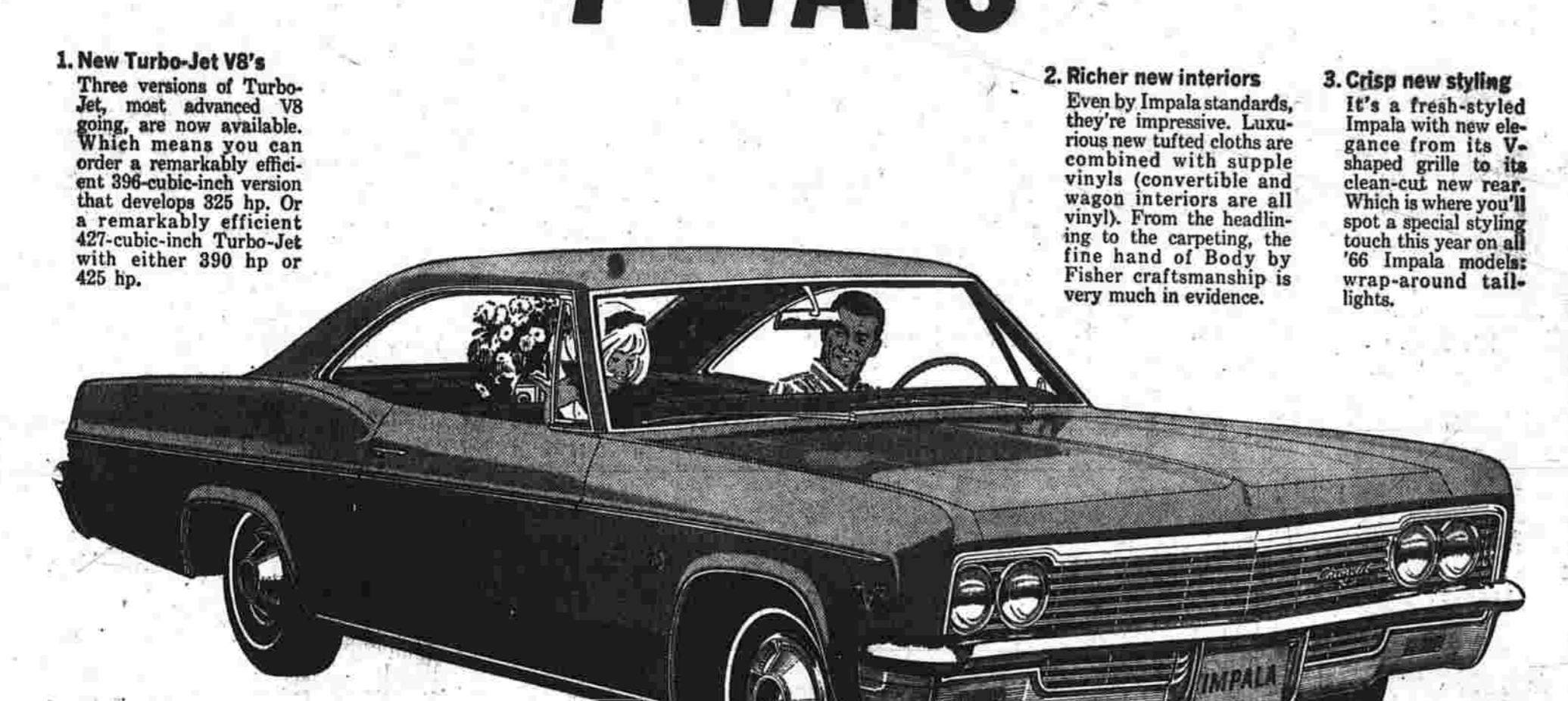

## TV Citizenship Test Shows Your Rights

A good deal of soul-searching may be in store when viewers take "The National Citizenship Test" Tuesday night at 10 on CBS.

What we're trying to do," said CBS News Executive Director Av Westin, "is to provoke audience thought about basic attitudes toward American laws, government and man's responsibility to his fellow man."

Like "The National Driver's Test", broadcast twice last year, Tuesday's program will test viewers with a variety of questions and illustrations.

Introducing the questions will be dramatizations, film animations, and actual newsfilm. Some of the sequences concerning people involved in robbery, search, arrest, jail, prison and other situations were filmed using actors.

On the broadcast, Mike Wallace will give viewers the test sample results as well as results of tests given on the air to three specially selected groups: Members of Congress and their wives in Washington; Democratic and Republican party workers in Philadelphia; and high school students in St. Louis. Harry Reasoner will ask the questions.

"The viewers will not only be giving their instant reactions to specific questions," Westin said, "but we hope they will find themselves thinking about their lives while they check their knowledge about our American heritage, their rights

and the rights of others."

The questions were prepared by CBS News in cooperation with the Educational Testing Service of Princeton, N.J.; who created and supervised achievements tests and college and graduate school entrance examinations.

After the questions were written, they were approved by a board of advisors consisting of Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, Senate Minority Leader Everett M. Dirksen, U.S. Constitution expert Prof. Paul A. Freund of Harvard University and Prof. Henry F. Graff, of Columbia University, an authority in American history.

Also aiding in forming the questions were the International Association of Chiefs of Police and the National District Attorneys Association.

Test questions will be asked right up to broadcast time to insure the timeliness of the attitudes toward key headline questions.

The answers to two of the questions will vary with locality. Local stations will supply the correct answer for each area.

The Citizenship Test is being endorsed by many civic organizations, including the National Council of Boy Scouts and the League of Women Voters.

On the day following the telecast, Bantam Books will issue a 128 page paperback containing all the questions and

## Bill Cosby, Offbeat Spy

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — One of the apparent hits of the new television season is an offbeat adventure series, "I Spy," which features a pair of on-the-beat stars, Robert Culp and Bill Cosby.

They combine well, Culp with his crisp but sensitive style, Cosby with a wise humor. Both are sturdily athletic, which comes in handy when required to race across scenery on Hong Kong and Japan locations.

Aside from the fact that "I Spy" seems to possess quality in a season grimly lacking in it, the notable feature of the series is that one of the costars is a Negro.

Bill Cosby views this fact with unconcern. He was skeptical when producer Sheldon Leonard suggested it a year ago. "When

it happens, I'll believe it," he said.

Cosby has an agile face and a frame that attests to his career as an all-around athlete at Temple University. He was a Philadelphia boy who attended on an athletic scholarship and might have become a gym teacher except for his ready wit. He exercised it as a bartender, then got a job in a Greenwich Village night spot for \$60 a week in 1962.

He continued playing saloons until the following year, when Allan Sherman put him on a "Tonight" show. Then his price and his fame began ascending.

## How a Heel Becomes a Hero

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — How do you make a television hero out of a real-life criminal?

ABC and 20th Century-Fox have fashioned a half-hour Western on the life and bad times of Jesse James. Although the real nature of Jesse has been dimmed by a parade of movies romanticizing his deeds, the plan fact is that he heisted many a bank and train in a highly unlawful manner.

Yet every Monday night "The Legend of Jesse James" shows

Jesse and Frank as misguided Missouri boys who are out to do good by robbing banks. The formula seems to work, since the series has been lodging in the lower reaches of the top 40 shows in audience ratings, and anything in the upper 40 is considered safe.

Jesse is played by Christopher Jones, 24, a graduate of an orphanage, the U.S. Army and the New York stage. He is a strong-minded chap of the Actor's Studio School — he married the head man's daughter, Susan Strasberg — and he has his own ideas about how the role should be played.

"There are enough incidents in the real history of Jesse James to supply stories for two or three years," he pointed out. "Why don't they use that material instead of trying to make

him a Robin Hood all the time?"

But what about J. Edgar Hoover and all the others who feel that crime shouldn't pay, even on half-hour television Westerns?

"Well, you could open with a shot of Jesse being shot by Bob Ford," Jones reasoned. "That would show that it did Jesse no good in the end. As for the moral attitudes, they could be expressed by Frank James."

### 'Dismembering' Movies on TV

Does a movie maker have the right to prevent his work from being cut and interspersed with commercials on television? George Stevens thinks so.

This week he took on NBC, Paramount, sponsors, ad agencies, et al, to prevent his classic "A Place in the Sun" from being "disjointed and dismembered" on television. The movie is scheduled for "Saturday Night at the Movies" this season, but Stevens hopes to prevent it.

Stevens called a news conference to announce his suit. He told of watching "Stalag 17" on NBC last Saturday and he enumerated in detail the 42 commercials during the show. "Each was a story in itself," said the director.

"A Place in the Sun" was designed like a symphony," he declared, adding that it couldn't possibly be appreciated with 42 interruptions.

What are his chances? Otto Preminger sued to prevent showing of "Anatomy of a Murder" on three ABC stations. A New York Supreme Court justice refused to stop the showings but said a trial could determine whether the film could be cut on television.

### Award Received By Hugh Downs

Hugh Downs, host of "Today" and "Concentration," was awarded the Ohio Association of Broadcasters first Achievement Award.

The award cited Downs for "over 25 years of outstanding service to broadcasting and for continued devotion and dedication to his native Ohio."

Downs, who was born in Akron, began his broadcasting career in 1939 in Lima, Ohio.
