

UN Opens Debate On Seating Peking

Big Vote In Favor Expected

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The U.N. General Assembly begins debate on the annual proposal to admit Communist China. The debate was expected to end with the Chinese Reds still on the outside, despite the biggest vote in their favor so far.

Speakers listed for the first round of debate include Hui Sambath of Cambodia and Haim Budo of Albania, both supporters of Peking, and, on the opposite side, Liu Chieh of Nationalist China and Arthur J. Goldberg of the United States.

Diplomats agree that the Chinese Communists will fail to get the two-thirds majority needed to seat them. They also agree that they will get the largest vote they have received since the issue first arose in 1950. The vote in 1963 was 41 in favor, 37 opposed and 12 abstentions.

Goldberg gave British television viewers an argument against bringing in Communist China in a recorded BBC interview Sunday night. He said that "it does not qualify for membership" because "it is not peace-loving" and it "repudiates the charter" of the United Nations.

"The recent declarations of Red China," he declared, "make this session a stronger case for the exclusion of Red China perhaps than ever before."

Hui Sambath advocated seating Communist China when he spoke Oct. 1 in the assembly's general debate. He said his absence deprived the United Nations of universality, denied 700 million Chinese a voice, and prevented a solution of world problems.

He contended the United Nations could not mediate the war in Viet Nam, because "the exclusion of China and the two Viet Nams prevents our organization from playing any positive role in this question."

Pearson Favored In Canadian Vote

TORONTO (AP)—Friend and foe alike speculate that John Diefenbaker is making his last stand as a national political leader in Canada's election today.

Most of his opponents and many followers of Diefenbaker's Conservative party concede him only the slimmest chance to win and displace Lester B. Pearson as prime minister. Eight newspaper or broadcast groups predict Pearson will win; some supported Diefenbaker, but none foresees him as the winner. Their forecasts average a total of 137 seats for Pearson's Liberal party, 10 more than it has now and a majority in the 245-member House of Commons.

Diefenbaker has made a vigorous campaign and has said nothing publicly about retiring as party leader if he loses, but an associate says this is probable. He is 70 and already has lost one election to the Liberals, in 1963.

Before that election his Cabinet was disrupted by resignations, amid charges of anti-Americanism, and there was a move in the party to displace Diefenbaker as leader. The party has closed ranks again, but few Conservative stalwarts are likely to want Diefenbaker to remain as party chief after another defeat.

The leader of the party winning the most seats in the House of Commons becomes prime minister. Diefenbaker held the job from 1957 until he lost to Pearson in 1963.

Pearson, with only 127 seats in the last Parliament, had to depend on support from minor parties to pass vital legislation. He called today's election in an effort to get a Liberal majority. He has predicted a net gain of 35 seats to give him that majority.

The Conservatives, or Tories, had 92 seats in the last House. Three smaller parties divided 40, and the remaining 6 were

vacant or held by independents. Pearson, 68, entered the government under Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King and later

State News Quick Action OK's Road Landscaping

HARTFORD (AP)—Connecticut has taken swift action on a project under President Johnson's new \$60-million highway beautification program.

Plans for landscaping 8.5 miles of Interstate 85 in Groton and Stonington were approved at 8:44 a.m. today by State Highway Commissioner Howard S. Ives.

At the same time, Division Engineer Leo Grossman of the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads authorized Connecticut to advertise for bids for the project, estimated to cost \$180,000.

A state highway department spokesman said he believed the Groton-Stonington project is "the first to be carried out under President Johnson's program."

It expects to apply next for federal funds to landscape more of I-85 on both ends of the first project, then the Glastonbury expressway (Route 2) in East Hartford from Pitkin Street down and, after that, Route 8 in Torrington.

Cites Emergency

NEW HAVEN (AP)—The increase in Connecticut bank robberies within the past three years has created "a situation of extraordinary emergency," Chief U.S. District Judge William H. Timbers said today.

He sentenced John H. Wilson, 36 of New York City, to the maximum penalty of 25 years plus a \$10,000 fine for the \$35,000 holdup of the Whalley Avenue Branch of the General Bank and Trust Co. New Haven, July 20.

John Claiborne, 41, of New Haven was sentenced to 15 years for his part in the holdup.

"The frequency and brazenness with which banks are being robbed in this state, including one last Thursday within the shadow of this court house, has created a situation of extraordinary emergency, even more

Gemini 7 May Go On December 2

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—The launching of the Gemini 7 astronauts may be advanced to as early as Dec. 2, if preparations continue to run smoothly, sources at the space center say.

The present target date for the start of the 14-day flight by astronauts Frank Borman and James A. Lovell Jr. is Dec. 8. It is the scheduled first leg of the ambitious double Gemini shot.

The sources reported checkouts of the Titan 2 rocket and Gemini 7 have progressed so well that "any date between Dec. 2 and Dec. 8 might become our target, with the possible exception of Dec. 5, which is a Sunday."

Launchings are avoided on Sunday because of the great amount of overtime pay involved.

Gemini 6 astronauts Walter M. Schirra Jr. and Thomas P. Stafford will be launched nine days after Gemini 7. The two spacecraft are supposed to maneuver close together and fly in formation.

Wife, 15 Children Welcome Father Home from Hospital

He returned Sunday to 16 children and his wife, Joan, 33, who is expecting another child in December.

Randolph, 39, an ex-Marine and a driver for Brink's, Inc., said his huge clan had been "just like a million bucks." Seven of the children in the nine-room Hinsdale home are orphans of Randolph's sister, Jean Adrian, and her husband.

Buses Roll As 26 Day Strike Ends

HARTFORD (AP)—Connecticut Co. buses rolled again today for the first time since Columbus Day.

The company's bus drivers and mechanics returned to work after a 26-day strike, first in the history of the firm, that affected 75,000 daily passengers in Hartford, New Haven and Stamford.

The 788 members of the Amalgamated Transit Union, AFL-CIO, apparently got what they wanted in the new 3-year contract which they ratified Saturday night.

The pact includes a supplementary cost-of-living pay increase—the most controversial element in the labor-management dispute—plus general wage increases totaling 30 cents an hour during the life of the contract.

The company estimated that the contract improvements will cost it \$1.1 million during the next three years.

"I wish to thank the Connecticut Co. officials and the union representatives," Gov. John Dempsey said after negotiations wound up successfully Saturday afternoon, "for the responsible manner in which they conducted their negotiations during almost continuous day and night sessions which started Thursday."

El. Clayton Gengra, owner of the company, stressed a new

Illness Halts Red Trial

WASHINGTON (AP)—Illness of a defense attorney today caused a 24-hour delay in the trial of the Communist party on criminal charges.

The party is on trial in U.S. District Court on 22 charges of failing to register with the Justice Department as an agent of Moscow. The trial began last week.

It was scheduled to resume today, but Joseph Forer told Judge William B. Jones that John J. Aht, another attorney for the party, was ill in New York, suffering from a virus infection and fever.

Forer asked a delay until Tuesday. When the government prosecutor raised no objection the judge granted the request.

If Aht is unable to be present Tuesday, Forer said, he will carry on the defense without him.

U.S. Troops Batter Cong On Ground

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. planes blasted another missile site in North Viet Nam today, the seventh raid on the Soviet-built air defense system in four days. But the series of attacks, which destroyed two sites and damaged five others, took a toll of five U.S. planes and two helicopters, with six American airmen listed as missing in enemy territory.

On the ground in South Viet Nam, troops of the U.S. 173rd Airborne Division shattered a well-fortified jungle position north of Saigon. U.S. officials said they counted 110 enemy bodies and were still counting. The Viet Cong force is believed to have abandoned the position.

The latest attack on a missile site was 60 miles east of Hanoi, and the pilots reported four missiles and four launchers at the site were heavily damaged.

Since July, U.S. planes have destroyed five missile installations and damaged eight others, military officials reported.

The Communists bagged their greatest number of U.S. aircraft of the weekend during U.S. attacks on missile sites near Thanh Hoa. There, a missile downed one U.S. Air Force F105 jet Friday, while conventional groundfire blasted down two propeller-driven A1 Skyraiders and two rescue helicopters Saturday.

One Navy jet was knocked down in an attack on a missile site 35 miles east of Hanoi Saturday and another was lost Sunday 30 miles south of Hanoi during another attack on a missile site.

Rescue helicopters picked up 5 of the 11 airmen whose craft went down in Red territory.

In the south, paratroopers of the 173rd Airborne met what was described as a main force of Viet Cong dressed in gray fatigue-like uniforms never seen before in South Viet Nam. The action was in Zone D, the Communist iron triangle 25 miles north of Saigon.

Brig. Gen. Ellis Williamson, the brigade commander, reported the paratroopers counted 110 Viet Cong dead and "they're hot through counting."

U.S. casualties in the fight 15 miles north of Bien Hoa were described as moderate. For security reasons, American casualties are not given in numbers.

The paratroopers came upon the Viet Cong force while on a search and sweep operation that started several days ago. They found what U.S. officers described as a well-fortified jungle position.

"The enemy remained in position and kept firing," Williamson said. "We have had a real close-at-hand, jungle-type fight. There is no question but that this was a main force outfit."

He said the Communists were equipped with Rucksack-type packs and wore steel helmets. Usually the Viet Cong are dressed in black pajamas and do not wear steel helmets.

"The enemy made every effort to strip all of the bodies of everything, including identification, and all usable equipment," Williamson said.

Another sharp ground action was reported 135 miles east of Saigon.

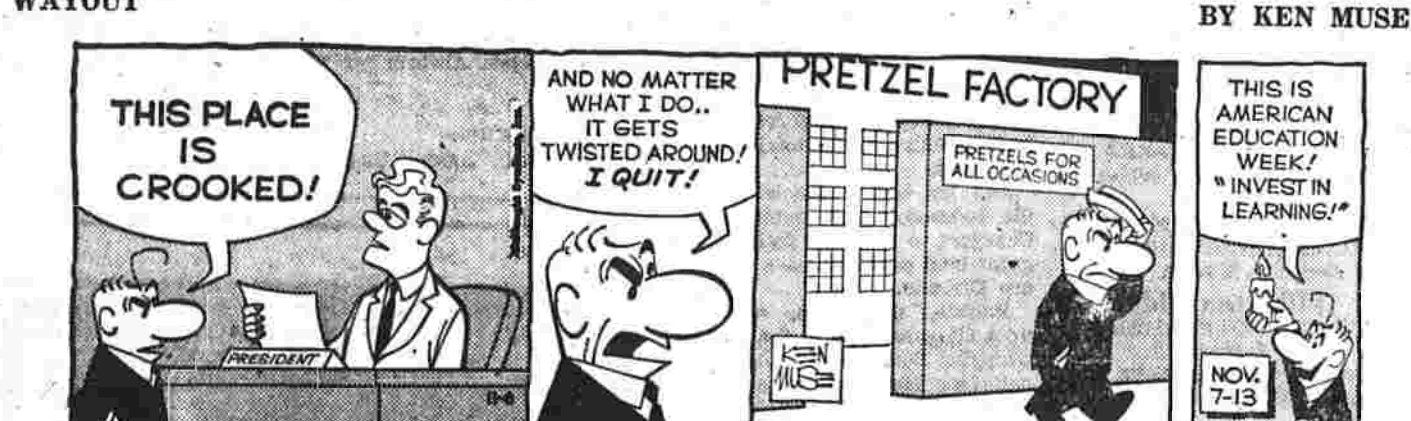

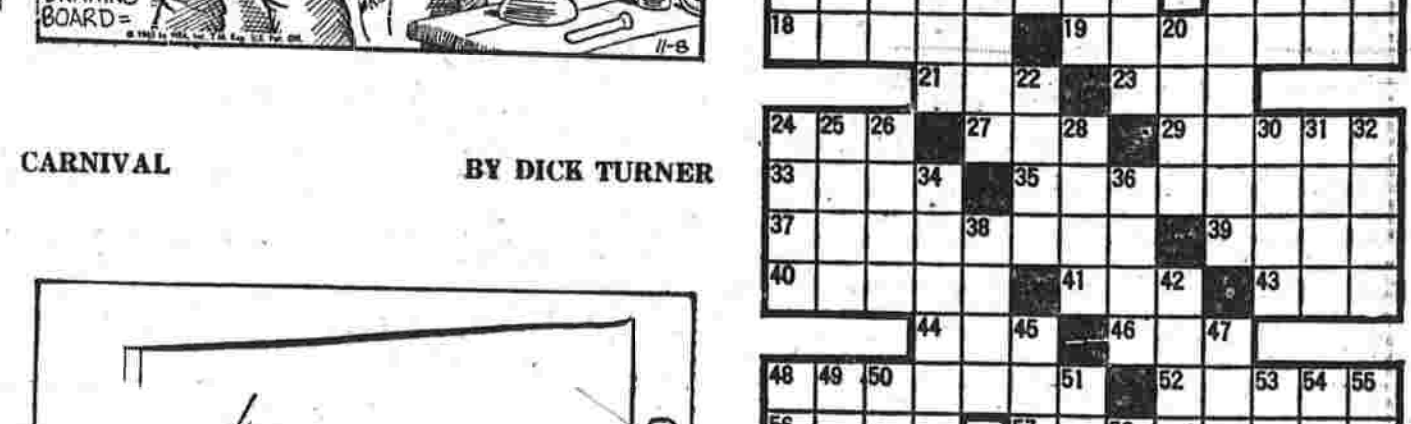

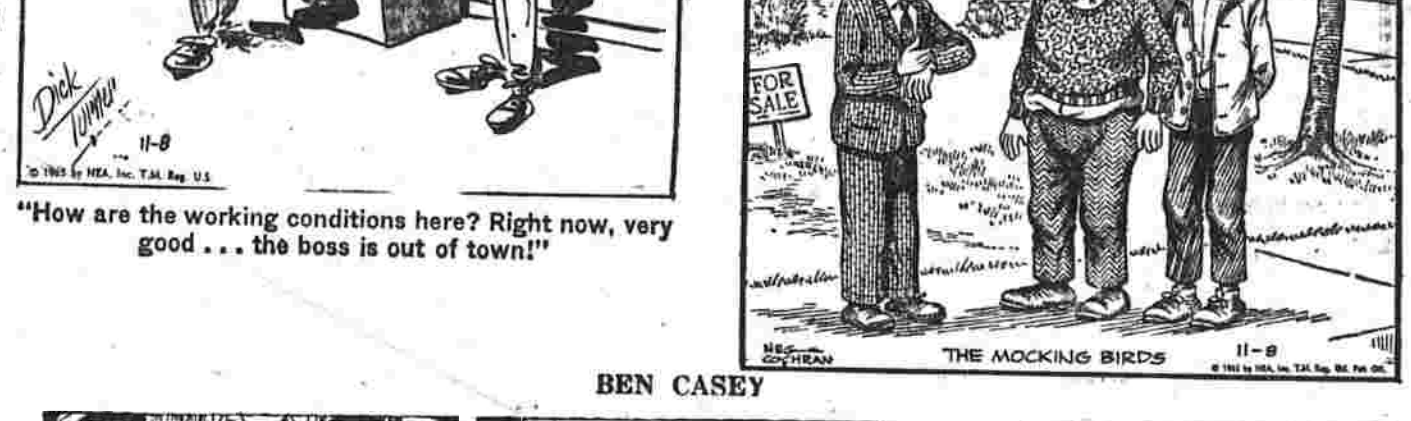
