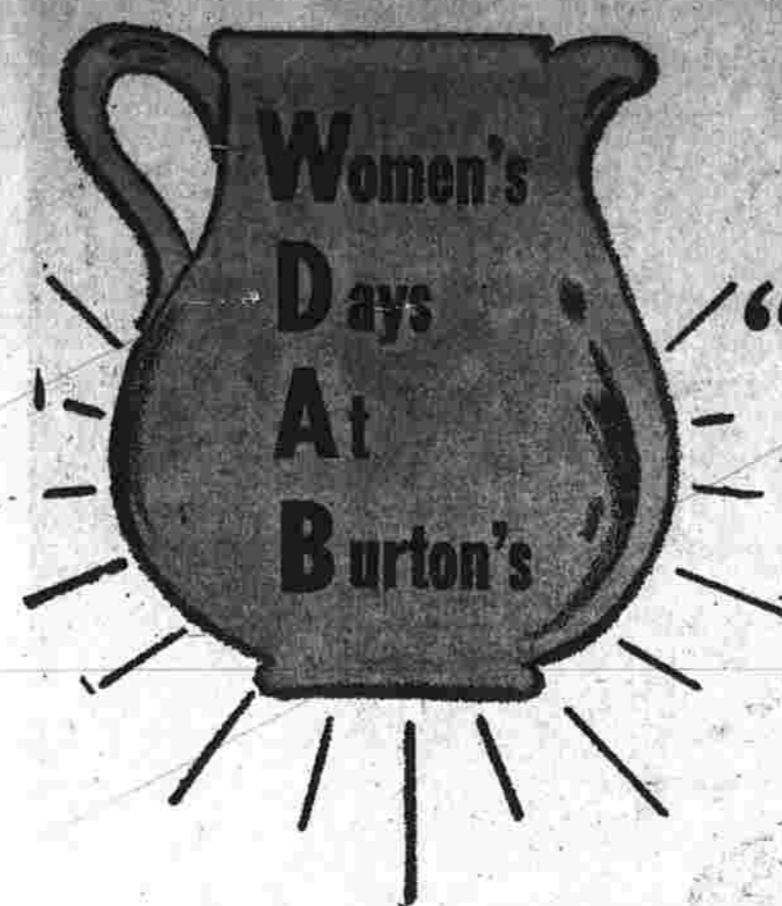

Manicure on a Hawk's Beak

In its restrictive environment, a captive bird is forced to make several adjustments from its natural life of hunting for food and safety. Some of these adjustments, such as accepting a change in diet and relinquishing a perpetual vigilance, lead to its immediate vulnerability.

One relatively trivial adjustment, however, the bird cannot easily make. This is the matter of its ever-growing bill and talon nails which, in freedom, are continually being honed during the daily course of activities.

Most museums, then, which have certain live specimens of birds or other creatures with horny growths, are compelled to give them periodic manicures, operations which can last up to a half an hour and which demand great expertise.

As an example of this operation, Sam

Sweet, a senior at Manchester High School, and Jerry Mersereau of West Hartford, a licensed barber and ornithologist, recently cut and filed the bill and talons of this broadwing hawk at the Lutz Junior Museum.

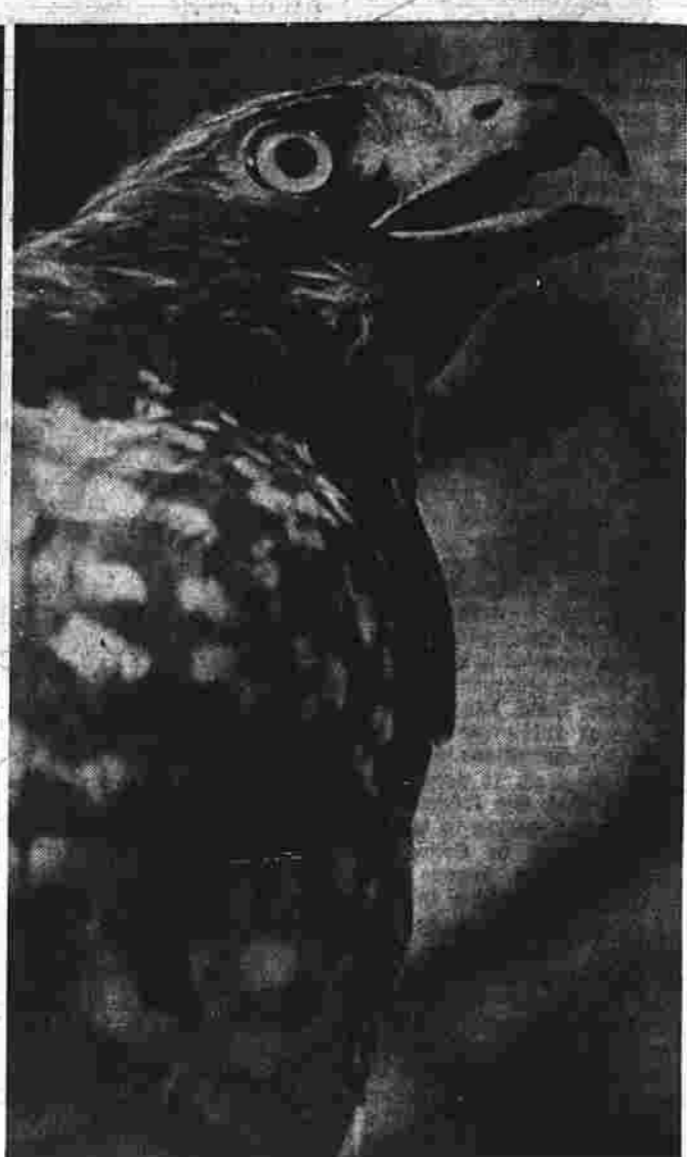
The operation starts (lower left with Sweet, having pulled the bird out of its cage with a heavy falconer's glove, holding the hawk by its legs while Mersereau prepares to shroud its head in a falconer's hood. This first step is vital since it pacifies the bird and simplifies the task of working on it.

In the next picture, the first cutting operation is shown. This is accomplished by means of an ordinary wire clipper. Notice that the free hand firmly clamps the hawk's hooded head. The tuft of feathers on top of the hood are mainly ornamental.

The next step consists of filing the bill down to a reasonably smooth point. The photos top left and second from lower left illustrate this operation. Mersereau (left) files the bill and also the cutting. In the final picture, the hawk is shown, shroud removed and bill trimmed to a fighting edge, with a glint in its eye as sharp as those of the hawk's talons across the mountain ridges and river valleys of eastern United States where they abound during the summer months.

This particular manicuring took Sweet and Mersereau about 15 minutes; they then went to work on the museum's three owls and a second hawk. Sweet, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Sweet of 42 N. School St., plans to concentrate on the study of birds during his college years.

Vernon Work-Training Program For Retarded Is Endorsed

A project being sponsored by the Manchester State Training School, designed to present a realistic work-training program for the mentally retarded, has been given the support of the board of education.

The board has been presented a report on the project by Anthony Magliocco, supervisor of the Talcottville School for the mentally retarded, and Kenneth Little, head of the work-study program at the high school.

Three local children will participate in the program, which is being financed by the federal government. The project will provide the basic employment needs of 300 youths and young adults with mental limitations, including special education, rehabilitation, and employment.

The basic aim is to prepare trainees to become self-supporting, self-starting citizens, capable of managing their own affairs, while making their own contributions to the stability and growth of their communities.

Stamford Teens' Radio Network Quick To Help

STAMFORD (AP)—Within 40 minutes after the massive U.S. Eastern power failure hit Stamford Tuesday night, a group of teenagers, using portable radio transmitters, was on the air, relaying emergency messages to police, fire departments and individual distress calls.

An hour after the youngsters swung into action—playing on their shortwave radio units and walkie-talkies, they had:

—Relayed to the fire department an alarm from a residence where power was powerless to summon firemen because his telephone was dead.

—Relayed by radio and walkie-talkies to the telephone company that a telephone was inoperative because of a power outage.

—Reported a purse snatching by a teen-ager who had been operating his radio for several weeks. They take turns monitoring their radios during certain hours of each day.

Martial Law Seen Lifted In Jakarta

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—President Sukarno today was reported to have lifted martial law for Jakarta and its suburbs which he sanctioned Nov. 2 a month after the army had proclaimed it.

The official news agency Antara said Sukarno was announced by the army's chief, Maj. Gen. Suharto, after a limited session of the supreme operations command held Tuesday night in the presidential palace.

However the curfew for Jakarta and environs was reduced by only one hour and now runs from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m.

Sukarno's decision was announced a day after a huge anti-Communist rally demanding proclamation of martial law throughout all Indonesia.

Martial law is still in effect in central Java where fighting against Communists continues. One of the last decisions taken under Jakarta's martial law was the temporary banning of the Communist Party of Indonesia.

Gourmet Pet Food No Limited Market

NEW YORK (AP) — Chicken croquette, mixed grill, a meat-well dinner for Rover. You're making gourmet dog food now for particular pets.

Pet food was a \$264.6-million market in the United States last year, according to a new report by the National Pet Food Manufacturers Association. Predictions are that it will run more than a billion dollars by 1975.

Sales of pet food are growing despite a drop in the number of dogs and cats.

The dog population has declined from 24.1 million in 1961 to 22.9 million in 1965, according to a market research report.

But manufacturers are selling more dog and cat food. Sales in the first six months of 1965 were up 10 per cent from 1964.

Trade sources say that is because more of the pets are owned by city and suburban families, which traditionally have been heavier buyers of commercially prepared pet foods.

Eye appeal and convenience are the order of the day. Pet foods are being made to look like human ones. Advertisements show juicy red steaks or meatloaf touched with parsley.

There is what is billed as a gourmet cat food, compounded of liver, kidney, chicken, meat and fish to appeal to the most fastidious Siamese.

It is far removed from the day when great-grandmothers filled the farm dog's dish with table scraps.

The big pet food companies are going all out to keep pets from feeding on the family's leftovers or sharing its meals.

In the past decade, the big selling has been packaged dry foods, pellets excreted by air or steam. Manufacturers say they are cheaper than canned food, neater and offer a more uniform product.

Then one manufacturer came up with a gravy made by adding water. Others followed with their own chunky sauces.

Now there also are soft moist pet foods which come in various forms — hamburger patties or meatballs. Some are individually wrapped in meal-sized packages that don't need to be stored in the refrigerator.

The pet food manufacturers say the new dog and cat owners want small packages that don't require refrigeration or anything to be added before serving.

One brand even comes packaged with individual plastic trays, eliminating the need of a dish.

Winter Halts Iraqi, Kurd Operations

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Winter weather in northern Iraq has forced a halt in the war between Kurdish guerrillas and the Iraqi army, a Kurdish source reports.

The informant, a representative of the Kurdish movement passing through Beirut, refused to permit use of his name.

He said that weather had curtailed Iraqi air force operations against the Kurds and heavy rains had immobilized the army's tanks. There has been no major clash for the past two weeks and he said he expected the fighting to remain on a small scale for the rest of the winter.

He claimed Iraqi President Abdel Salam Aref attempted to negotiate an end to the war about two months ago, but was up when the Kurds refused to cease fighting during the talks.

Aref denied in a newspaper interview last month there had been any contact between Baghdad and the Kurds.

The source claimed the Kurds, who are fighting under Soviet-trained Mukhabarat Mustafa Barzani for autonomy within the Iraqi state, now have the upper hand in the conflict.

He denied Iraqi newspaper reports that Israeli-made arms had been captured from the Kurds or that any Kurdish fighters had surrendered to the Iraqi army under terms of an amnesty which expired last Monday.

Residents Happy to Move For Dickey-Lincoln Dam

DICKEY, Maine (AP)—"It's a good thing... I'll be glad to go to New England. With these words, residents of Dickey for 27 years, worked on this end-of-the-line hamlet view on the coming of the mammoth Dickey-Lincoln School project, which will force many of them from their homes on the edge of the Allagash wilderness. Their reaction followed congressional approval of preliminary surveys for the \$27 million project.

Many of those who may have to move don't plan on going far. "I could move if I have to, but I would like to live just as close to the dam as I could," said Leonard Kelly, father of 11. And the pastor of the Allagash Church, the Rev. Philip Huxley, said that although his church might be razed, the project "is going to be great for New Eng-

landers who contended it would destroy the Allagash region. But the project given congressional approval represents a compromise plan which Clinton B. Townsend, president of the National Resources Council of Maine, said "will preserve the Allagash from being flooded out."

Winter comes early in this remote section of northern Maine. Engineers will be limited to aerial surveys until spring. Ground parties would run the risk of being trapped by sudden snow storms if they strayed too far from wilderness trails.

The proposed project is to bear the names of Dickey—which is a hamlet with 30 or so families—and Lincoln School, which isn't a school any more. The abandoned building, a short distance downstream from Dickey on the St. John River, now is used for potato storage. It was closed because so many people moved away from the area. The preliminary plans call for a two-mile long dam at the ham-

let of Dickey, with five smaller earthen dams and a re-regulation dam at the Lincoln School site.

The dam would create a reservoir covering about 88,000 acres of wilderness, spreading down into parts of neighboring Canada.

Army Engineers have laid down a prospectus that construction could be completed by 1972 with generation of power to begin in 1974 after storage of sufficient water.

The generators would produce 784,000 kilowatts, as well as provide flood control and a new recreational area.

The project would be an adjunct to the long discussed Passamaquoddy tidal power project and could cost \$1 billion.

It was the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt who initiated studies of the possibility of harnessing the Quoddy tides to generate power. He spent \$7 million in executive funds to study the project. But congress-

'66 Cars to Cost More? Depends on Who's Adding

NEW YORK (AP)—Will the dealers as anywhere from \$50 to \$100 model car really be cheaper than the 1965 or earlier? It depends on who is doing the figuring—the auto maker, the dealer, the tax collector, or the customer.

That's because the 1966 base prices include built-in safety items that were optional in 1965. Because the federal tax is lower than a year ago and going still lower Jan. 1, because some models have other changes with the cost doubles included but not specified.

On top of all that, deciding if the new models are bargains depends on whether you're listening to the makers or the union. Management says it's a production cost are rising because of higher wage scales. The union says they are falling because of increased mechanization.

Also, some customers and congressmen are wondering out loud whether the recent profits in the auto industry wouldn't be better off spent on research and development and new safety devices that will leave the companies well off.

The customer, as always, will have to take into account what the dealer will allow him on his used-in-old model. For the car buyer that's as much as part of the real cost of a new car as is the suggested list price. The models carried some of these as customer also is faced with a safety device's price hasn't gone up as much as on some of the other items which formerly he did or didn't want to buy. BOSTON (AP)— Many New Englanders, who normally keep candles handy in the event of gas or electric outages, were surprised by the surge in demand for candles during the power outage.

Worcester, Mass. (AP)— Gas and electric outages in Worcester County, Mass., were caused by a power line failure which knocked out a number of lines.

Cocktail lounges and restaurants supplemented battery-powered lights with candles, but the men were treated and released early in the morning.

Colonial Board Aims To Reduce Effluent

The Colonial Board Co. has set for itself an anti-pollution goal which should reduce by two-thirds the amount of troublesome effluent it dumps into Lyall Brook.

Robert Fuller, Colonial president, said today that the firm is striving to reduce to 250,000 gallons a day the average amount of fluid it discharges. The daily average now is 750,000, and the amount varies from 1,000,000 to 800,000.

In making the announcement, Fuller said his firm is determined to solve the problem of pollution in Lyall Brook, which has been described as a ditch in the current state of affairs.

Fuller made it clear he felt that the problem of pollution has been leveled at Colonial Board, and he said that over the past 18 years the company has invested large sums in equipment designed to reclaim more of the water process for reuse and thus discharge less of it.

In recent years, he said, the firm has lost as much ground as it has gained, because of the drought conditions which leave Lyall Brook dry except for the water process for reuse and thus discharge less of it.

With the effluent flowing at 10-15 degrees, he said, the vegetable fibers in it will rot and cause a demand more oxygen and air filters in the company's clarifier.

In any event, increasing the proportion of the water which can be reused will reduce the amount which has to be dumped out, and the company stands to gain doubly from that.

No School, Banks, Mail Vets Day Service At 11 Tomorrow

Tomorrow, Veterans Day, will be a day off for all employees of town, state and federal offices and services. Locally, the day will be observed by an 11 a.m. program at Manchester Memorial Hospital, preceded by a parade at 10:30 from Manchester High School.

Chas. W. Obachowski, chairman of Manchester's Human Relations Commission, will deliver the principal address and Mayor Francis J. Mahoney will represent the town and its residents at the brief ceremony.

Manchester Memorial Hospital is dedicated on Nov. 11, 1920 as a permanent memorial to the town's World War I veterans, and has been the site for the annual observance ever since.

The date of Nov. 11 was formerly named Armistice Day, to commemorate the day in 1918 when World War I officially ended. It is now designated Veterans Day, in honor of veterans of all U.S.-involved wars.

Tomorrow, all public and private schools will be closed as will be the town's three libraries. State welfare and unemployment services will be suspended, all state and federal courts will be closed and there will be no mail deliveries nor any post office window services. The hours of the main post office will be open to 11 a.m.

The town highway department and the water and sewer departments will be shut down, but there will be the usual garbage and refuse pickup. Veterans Day is not included in the town's yearly holidays granted to the town's garbage and refuse contractor.

The office of the privately owned Manchester Water Co. will be closed all day.

The town's three rec centers, East Side, West Side and the Community Y, will be closed during the day, but will be open from 8 to 10 p.m. for all scheduled activities.

For Big Fun Try Losing Contact Lens

CHICAGO (AP) — They've done a lot to develop contact lenses, I understand, but one bad feature remains: lenses get lost easily and often.

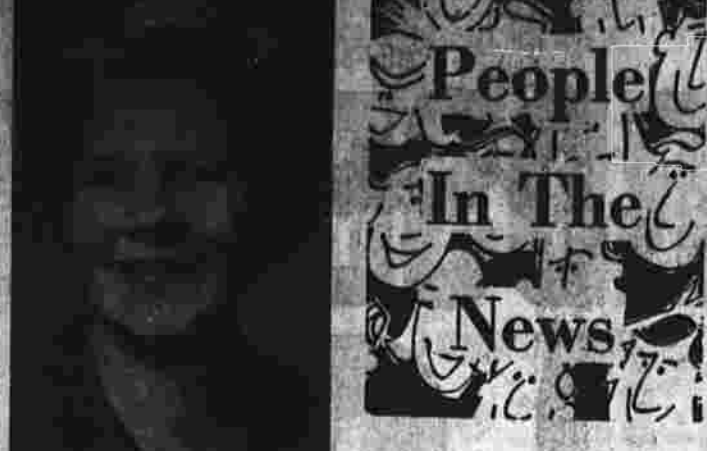

Military Kept Intact

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department claims it has not lost any of its military communications in the northeastern United States despite the power failure Tuesday night when paralysis gripped civilian systems.

Emergency generating systems at big strategic Air, Army and Navy installations in the area were kept going throughout the critical hours of power failure Tuesday night when paralysis gripped civilian systems.

The Pentagon has its own system of investigators and technicians skilled in power and communications systems. There was no interruption on the "hot line" connecting Washington and Moscow — the Tele-type link over which President Johnson and Soviet leaders would communicate in dire emergency. This cable circuit is routed from Washington through London, Copenhagen, Stockholm and Helsinki.

No Early Worry At Subway Failure

NEW YORK (AP) — Minor delays are commonplace during rush hour on the vast New York City subway system.

So, when the lights went out Tuesday night, subway officials at first considered it just another annoyance.

"There wasn't any real worry or concern," said one man who was jammed shoulder to shoulder with hundreds of other passengers deep under Upper Manhattan's Broadway.

"First the train lights went out," the man said. "Every thing went out for a second. Then the emergency battery lights went on, and we just stood there. People were just talking much except among friends."

Power Blackout Is Compared to London's Blitz

Media Flicker, But Keep Going

NEW YORK (AP) — In one self, flowing without interruption, the nation's communications links were not broken Tuesday night. Advertising losses from all media ran into the millions.

Throughout the Northeast of the nation — where more than one out of 10 Americans live — television tubes loaded with children's programs and late news and music went on.

The New York Daily News and the New York Herald Tribune abandoned tentative plans to put out abbreviated editions.

Commuters Sit It Out on the Steps of Grand Central Terminal

NEW YORK (AP) — With traffic signals dead in the power blackout, New York City commuters were stranded in a variety of traffic "cops."

There were unformed police officers showing badges on their coats and a variety of civilian types in suits or sweaters.

On Sixth Avenue in the 30s, just north of the huge department store like Macy's and Gimble, a Frenchman was in a flowing brown cassock directed traffic with hand signals.

Not Uniform

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Sophisticated Grid Key to Black Night

NEW YORK (AP) — The teeming, densely populated North side of the United States was plunged into darkness and confusion by failure in an electric power system considered the most sophisticated in the world.

This system is the epitome of sophisticated technology. It operates almost automatically, because its parts were so united, they dropped all together, like a tree felled by an ax.

Ironically, the interlocking power grid designed to assure a supply of electricity in an emergency helped spread the blackout Tuesday night over a huge area, including all of New York City.

Bottles, Rocks Rattle Cruiser In Springfield

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) — A police cruiser was pelted with rocks and bottles during the power blackout last night as it crept into the North End to check reports of looting.

Thieves smashed glass in the door of G. E. Hochberg jewelry store and stole watches and wedding bands valued at \$800.

In other acts of vandalism, hoodlums smashed a 30 by 16-foot window of the Railroad Freight & Salvage Corp., and broke 10 by 15-foot windows in the Ideal Mart and the Auburn Market. All three places are within two blocks of each other.

Convicts at Walpole Riot During Failure

WALPOLE, Mass. (AP) — "But by then they were in no mood to stop and hurried epithets you couldn't print," he said in a press conference later.

He said the uprising appeared to be spontaneous. He attributed its start to a panic brought on when "a bunch of fellows who don't get along together" finally enabled prison guards wearing gas masks to herd the men back to their cells.

John A. Gavin, state commissioner of corrections, described the incident as a "major disturbance." It could not be called a riot, he said, "because, miraculously, no one was hurt."

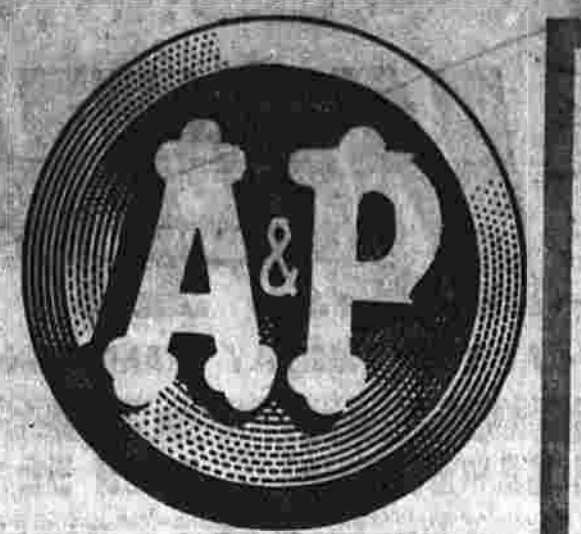
If you look around your own office, you'll probably find some of the following secretarial types familiar:

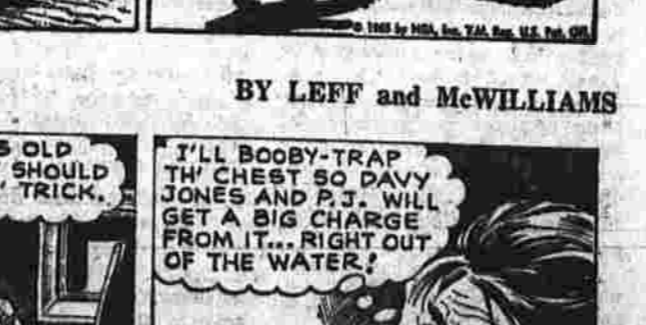

Rhodesians Secede; Retaliation Is Swift

State News
Farm Group Vote Rejects Constitution

White Democratic and Republican floor leaders of the constitutional convention have urged for the creation of bipartisan committees to work for the approval of the proposed constitution. The Connecticut Farm Bureau Association adopted a resolution against it.

Delegates to the farm association's convention yesterday voted 58 for a resolution urging rejection of the constitution. The bureau says it represents 5,400 farmers.

Britain Bans All Exports, Fires Smith

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (AP)—Prime Minister Ian Smith declared Rhodesia independent today, the first in a declaration against Britain since the American Colonies broke away in 1776.

Britain retaliated swiftly, in effect outlawing Rhodesia. Prime Minister Harold Wilson declared in the House of Commons that Smith and his ministers have no dealings with the Rhodesian regime.

Wilson expelled Rhodesia from the sterling area, banned exports, including British purchases of Rhodesia's 500,000 annual tobacco crop, ended all British aid and suspended British preferences.

Britain embargoed the shipment of all arms to this central African country, and asked for an urgent meeting of the U.N. Security Council.

Britain's allies, including the United States, and Commonwealth members are expected to join in ignoring the declaration and in imposing economic sanctions. From outside the Commonwealth, Sweden became the first to announce it will not recognize the Rhodesian government.

While Smith still was speaking on the radio, British Gov. Sir Humphrey Gibbs announced that Smith and his ministers had been dismissed on orders of Queen Elizabeth II for "an unconstitutional act of independence."

With his proclamation of independence, however, Smith had ceased to recognize the powers of the British government and London has said it will not use force.

Britain opposed continuing rule of Rhodesia by the 520,000 white-minority population, which stood for a plan that would assure ultimate rule by the 3.5 million blacks.

Members of the British Commonwealth, violently opposed to Smith's regime, also stood for a plan that would assure ultimate rule by the 3.5 million blacks.

In this prolonged negotiations, Britain had insisted on the ultimate withdrawal of its troops from Rhodesia. It had planned to send 20,000 troops to Smith's appointed last-minute ap-

HARTFORD (AP)—Hartford voters will elect a "human renewal" program to match its urban renewal program, Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz said Wednesday night.

As a start, he suggested drawing up a roster of everyone in Hartford between 14 and 24 years of age who can't find work.

Wirtz told the Greater Hartford Forum that "there are still about 6,800 unemployed people in the Hartford area — approximately 2,000 of them under 21."

Millions Join March To Back Viet Policy

NEW YORK (AP)—Iowa, the war in Viet Nam was brought close to home today, with Donald D. Haskins, 22, a wide-eyed special gift for the American forces. Other activities include a flag raising ceremony and a speech by Sen. John Sparkman, D-Miss.

Dave Watson, commander of the VFW post in Muskegon, Mich., said the hope behind the parade is that it "will remind some of the public that we are not in Viet Nam, we are in Viet Nam."

Many Cong Killed in Viet Ambush

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—A Viet Cong force ambushed a South Vietnamese unit on a main highway east of Saigon today, but 120 of the Communists were killed by a combined ground and air action, a U.S. spokesman reported.

The spokesman said American and Vietnamese planes hammered the attacking Viet Cong and killed 100 of them. He had no information on government casualties or other details of the action 5 miles west of Ba.

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Veteran Democrat Sen. Harry Byrd, 79, Reveals Retirement

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Sen. Harry F. Byrd, a strong voice for economy in Washington for the past 30 years and head of Virginia's dominant Democratic state organization, announced his retirement today.

Gov. Albertis B. Harrison Jr. made the disclosure at a news conference in Richmond today. Harrison said he planned to name an interim successor until the next general election in November 1968.

Harrison gave no intimation of anyone he had in mind to succeed the 78-year-old Democratic chief, but speculation was that the senator's son, Harry F. Byrd Jr., or Rep. William M. Tucker might be on the list.

Conceptually, the appointment could be made strictly as an interim affair with the understanding that the man named would not run in the November election. This was the case when Sen. Carter Glass died and Rep. Thomas Burch of Martinsville was named.

A. Willis Robertson was nominated and elected subsequently.

Harrison disclosed that a letter from Byrd announcing his resignation was delivered to him at the executive mansion at 10 p.m. Wednesday.

Byrd said in the letter that the figures of the last Congress had borne heavily on him and that he found himself tiring easily.

"In looking toward the forthcoming session that starts in January and after consultations with my physicians concerning the pain I have been suffering as a result of arthritis, I have reluctantly reached the conclusion that I must give up the heavy responsibilities entrusted to me by the people of Virginia," Byrd's letter said.

"I hereby submit my resignation as a member of the United States Senate to become effective upon receipt of this letter."

Two Army Men With Top Secrets Reported Missing

HEIDELBERG, Germany (AP)—The U.S. Army reported today that a nuclear technician based in Germany disappeared on a trip to the United States after delivering classified material to an Army depot in New York state.

The man was identified as Chief Warrant Officer Ernest D. Harris Jr. His hometown was not immediately available nor was the site of the depot to which he delivered the material.

The widely circulated newspaper Bild Zeitung said Harris was fully informed on the location and plans for all U.S. nuclear weapons stored in Germany. It said he also had knowledge of nuclear tactics to be used in case of emergency.

Sgt. Zeigler said American security agents around the world had been alerted to look for the missing man.

The Army said Harris left Germany Aug. 26 and went on leave after delivering the classified material to the depot.

Ike 'Satisfactory' After 2nd Attack

FT. GORDON, Ga. (AP)—Eisenhower has a record of coronary disease — his major ailment — he said today after a second attack of heart pains, but his doctors defined the phrase as meaning "coronary thrombosis and myocardial infarction" which means heart muscle damage.

Cap. Wallace Hitchcock, public information officer here, who read the doctors' statement to newsmen, was asked if the occurrence of pains means further hospitalization.

Hitchcock replied that doctors said the stay in hospital holding out no hope of progress to a full-blown heart attack.

Normalcy Returning Cause of Blackout Still in the Dark

NEW YORK (AP)—The nation's population Northeast struggled today to return to normalcy after a day's grace to New York's heavily taxed transit operations. The stock exchange remains open.

The closed facilities also will require far less power.

Cause of the historic blackout remains as dark as the blackout itself, but state and federal agencies are making intensive investigations.

James A. Lundy, chairman of the New York Public Service Commission, said he was confident the reason for the failure will be uncovered. It apparently originated in Upstate New York.

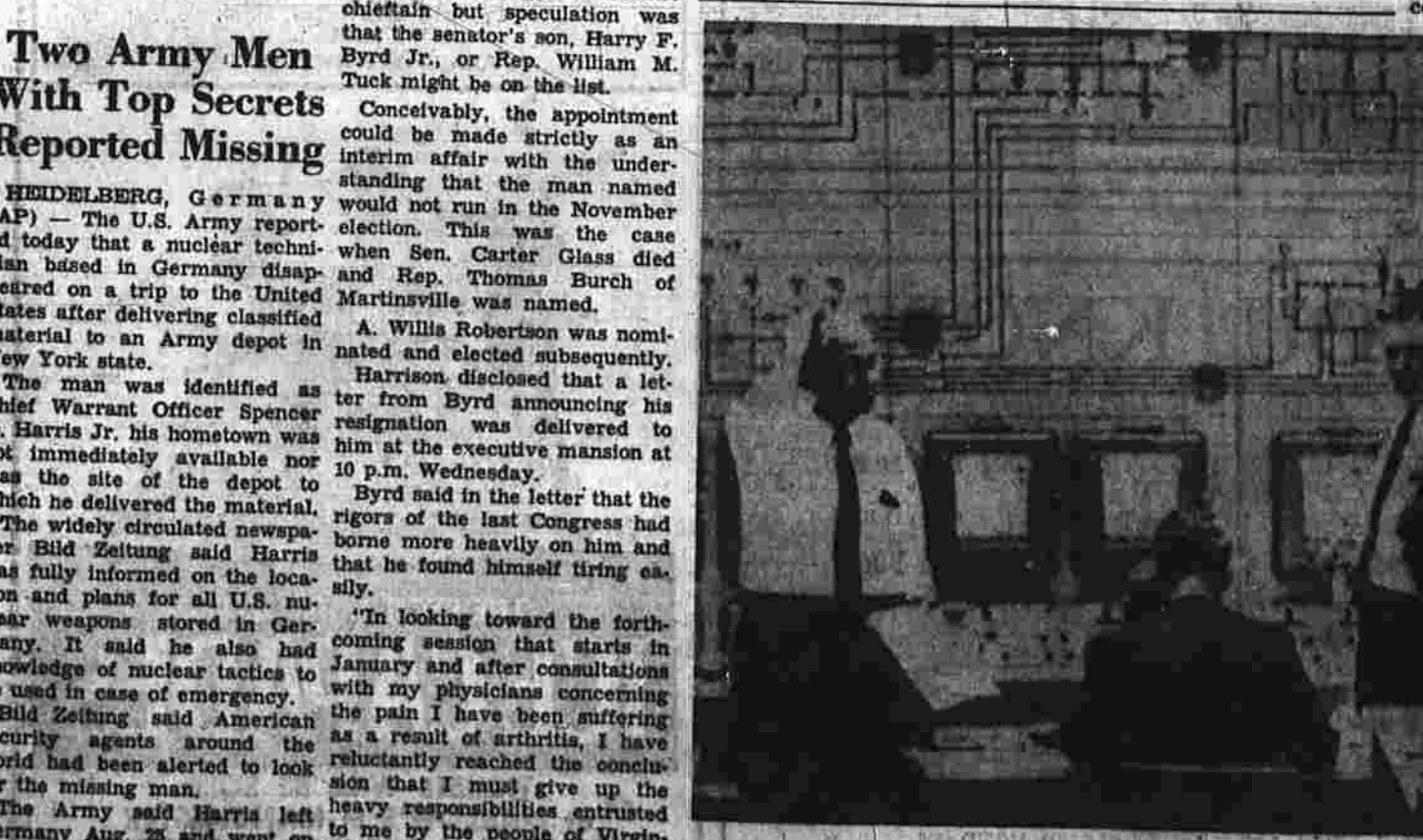
