Unofficial Count Shows Marcos Leads in Islands

MANILA (AP) — The vote of Sen. Ferdinand Marcos reached a near-commanding proportion today as counting in the Philippine presidential election passed the halfway mark.

Official totals, however, were lagging far behind the unofficial figures, and there was no sign President Diosdado Macapagal, seeking a second term, was ready to concede.

With more than 4.5 million votes counted, Marcos' lead over Macapagal was 434,780.

The Philippines' New Service's unofficial tabulation gave Marcos 2,333,081, Macapagal 1,898,248 and third party candidates Raul Manglapac 564,877.

Macros, 48, the Nacionalista party candidate, also appeared to be carrying his vice-presidential running mate, Sen. Fernando Lopez, with him.

Lopez had 1,213,654 votes to 2,088,894 for Liberal Sen. Gerardo Roxas. In the early counting position several times.

Almost 48 hours after the polls closed Tuesday, the official election commission totals were running more than 2 million votes behind the unofficial count.

Unofficial estimates said 8.5 million persons voted. The official figure has not been announced.

Many areas — particularly the province of Mindanao, where Macapagal was hopeful of large majorities — have not been heard from officially. There were fears of election irregularities.

Provincial and municipal officials said they were expected to remain two or three days.

'Togetherness' Heart Surgery Is Successful

CHICAGO (AP) — A Wisconsin couple, married for 37 years, had heart surgery together and are reported in "very good condition" today.

Mrs. and Mrs. Alvin Druyer of Prairie du Chien, Wis., underwent open-heart surgery Wednesday by Dr. M. R. Masal. The operation, called a cardiopexy, was to unblock arteries leading to the heart.

Dr. Masal said the Druyers probably will be up and walking today and will be back at work in two or three weeks.

Mrs. Inez Druyer, 60, was tabbed for the operation after accompanying her husband, Alvin, 61, to Chicago for a physical examination two weeks ago.

Tests disclosed that she had a heart condition, similar to the one her husband had for seven years, only worse.

Hospital officials said the couple decided to have their surgery the same day to eliminate concern for each other that might possibly cause damage to their hearts.

Druyer is president of Travel Mat, Inc., a national paper mill.

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Controversial Book Claims Jesus Planned Crucifixion

LONDON (AP) — A controversial new book claiming that Jesus planned his own crucifixion in a disturbing way, has caused a sensation in Britain.

The book, titled "The Passion Play" by the Rev. Hugh J. Schonfeld, a Jewish scholar living in London, is a modern translation of the New Testament and some of his own commentaries on biblical history.

Published here by Hutchinson, the book will appear in the United States in the next few weeks.

Schonfeld, 64, says he subscribes to no religious creed himself though he believes in God as pure spirit. He insists he has written his book not to create a sensation but in an honest search for truth. His claims, he says, are the result of more than 40 years of objective research.

Writing of the events of the Passion Week, Schonfeld says: "A conspiracy had to be organized of which the victim himself was the principal instigator. It was a nightmarish conception and undertaking, the outcome of the frightening logic of a sick mind or a genius. And it worked out."

According to Schonfeld, Jesus knew the church had to be founded on fulfillment of prophecies, so he planned that fulfillment in the minutest detail.

He timed the plan for his apparent death so that he would be crucified on Friday, knowing that because of the Jewish Sabbath he would be taken down from the cross within a few hours.

Neither was there any fraud on the part of Jesus himself, Schonfeld says.

"He had schemed in faith for his physical recovery, and what he expected was frustrated by circumstances beyond his control," Schonfeld writes.

Perhaps the best and most convincing testimony that the stepped-up American war in Vietnam has achieved its most elemental objective comes not from any of our own military authorities or correspondents, but from the correspondents and military experts of France.

They have, in recent days, been voting a new judgment on our effort in Vietnam. It is to the effect that "America can no longer lose."

There was a possibility, last winter, that we could lose, that there would be nothing left of the country for us to use as a base for our own operations.

And even after we had begun throwing increased military force and manpower into the battle, there were French experts on the war who still thought that we were merely adding to our own weight while we were standing in a military morass similar to the one the French experienced 11 years ago at Dienbienphu.

That expectation has now been abandoned. The French experts think we have power enough and patience enough to push ourselves against any spectacular disaster. They believe we are safe from the danger of being defeated.

They do not say, these French experts, that we are about to win in Vietnam—merely that we are not going to lose. With the possibility of our losing ruled out, they now expect the war to prove a long one—a grim test of wills between the two sides.

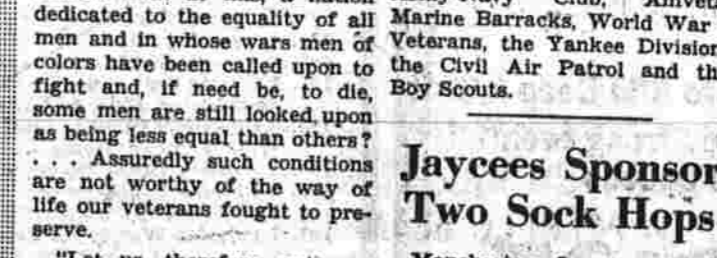

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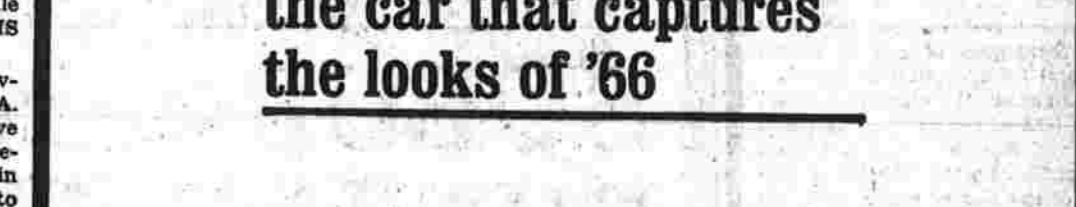

Bolton Plan Board Will Approve Fiano's New Development

According to Robert Murock, U & R representative who was not present at the meeting last night, but who came to the commission with the proposal originally, the interior road would not be developed for some time, if at all. But the commission had requested a proposed layout of the whole piece of property.

The preliminary plan will be sent to the zoning board for inspection of lot layout. The planning commission requested a preliminary drainage design. The building line along School Rd. has been set back 50 feet from the road, with an eye toward future widening of the road.

- 4 cups sifted flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup shortening (part butter)
- 1 package dry yeast
- 1/4 cup warm water
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 whole egg
- 2 egg yolks
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Roll half of dough into oblongs 8 by 12 inches each on board sprinkled with granulated sugar. Fold ends toward center; sprinkle dough with sugar and roll again to original size. Repeat this procedure three times. Roll dough one quarter-inch thick and cut into one- by four-inch strips. Twist sugared strips like crullers and place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in 375-degree oven for 15 to 20 minutes, until done. Remove from sheet immediately.

This recipe makes about three dozen trifles.

AFL Moves Draft Date To Nov. 20

NEW YORK (AP) — Seeking to solve what it calls baby-sitting problems, the American Football League has set Nov. 20 for its college draft and once again has incurred the wrath of college officials.

As a result of the AFL move Wednesday, the National Football League has been forced to change its mind and follow the younger league in holding an early draft.

The AFL action, announced by Commissioner Joe Pos, ignited the college-pro controversy all over again. The dispute erupted last year over alleged secret drafts, player-hungry signings and double signings.

Following that extended battle, both pro leagues told the National Collegiate Athletic Association they would refrain from signing players before the start of the college season. The NFL also asked that the NFL be held no earlier than Nov. 27, the date of the Saturday of college football.
