Not Villainy, Just Equality

It is not the fault, it is not the vil lainy, it is not even a resurgent militarism of West Germany that its leadership now begins to speak more emphatically of its right to have something to do with nuclear weapons.

At the moment, what Chancellor Ludwig Erhard is saying in his formal speeches is that West Germany wants no nuclear weapons for itself, or under its own exclusive control, but that, at the same time. West Germany cannot very well serve as one member of an alliance in which some powers have nuclear weapons and control of nuclear weapons and others do not.

In other words, West Germany wants a share in the control of nuclear weapons not for that control in itself, bu for what it symbolizes-for that equality of prestige and pride and power among its allies which nuclear sharing would represent.

West Germany may have no positive desire for the nuclear weapon. But it has a very strong desire to have anything anybody else is privileged to have Who can blame West Germany? It is the dynamics of being a great power. It has been so strong in France that France has gone ahead to make its own nuclear weapons, this defying

Conceivably, if history were to repeat itself, which is an occasional habit of history, the world may some day point back to this moment, when West Germany is first beginning to edge its way toward the bomb, and say this was the moment some new and mad last effort at world conquest really be-

But the Germany which might be labeled the villain then is certainly not the villain now. It is merely the creature mysteries of its ways. of circumstance and historic situation. and what it does it does within that context almost with no choice. The area of no choice, which seems to mean no choice but to begin the same terrible old story over again, does not cover West Germany alone. Both the United States and Russia are its inhabitants, prisoners of their own power, unable to renounce their own terrible capabilities, slow to devote themselves to the difficult business of trying to create a new area and atmos-

Nobody, in the history of Congress, has ever mailed so much so often to so many, which means that even in his retirement this consistent Virginian will be achieving one more economy.

Overwhelmed With Welfare

A funny thing happened to the Government when it asked elderly Americans to sign up for the new Federal medical insurance program: 700,000 replied that they wanted no part of it. Some of those who rejected the voluntary program, which supplements Medicare's compulsory hospital-care system, may have been motivated by conviction that they could handle their own doctor bills, whether the Government thinks so or not. No matter how useless a military base or a veterans' hospital may be, some politician is sure to have powerful interest in its survival.
