# Widow's Bouquet Leads Memorials

WASHINGTON (AP)—In the drizzle-damp chill of a gray day of remembrance, a bouquet of small white lilies was placed today at the base of the eternal flame that flickers over the grave of John F. Kennedy.

The token from Jacqueline Kennedy, young widow of the slain president, was delivered by her mother, Mrs. Hugh D. Auchincloss, to the burial site on a hillside in Arlington National Cemetery.

Mrs. Kennedy remained in seclusion in her Fifth Avenue apartment today on the second anniversary of her husband's assassination.

A spokesman for Mrs. Kennedy said she might receive visits from Mrs. Stephen Smith and Mrs. Peter Lawford, sisters of the late president, who are in New York. The spokesman said the president's widow would not leave her home.

A requiem Mass was celebrated today at St. Ignatius of Loyola, Mrs. Kennedy's parish church. She attended a similar Mass last year but a church spokesman said he did not know whether she was present today.

Other Americans across the land observed the second anniversary of the young president's slaying in ways of their own.

No formal service was planned at the graveside, but the inclement weather was no bar to the individual visitors, thousands of whom walked up the long pathway Sunday.

Other members of the Kennedy family were expected during the day, to kneel at the white picket fence surrounding the burial spot.

Mrs. Auchincloss came at 7:30 a.m., before the cemetery gates were opened to the public. She knelt for a few moments and placed sprigs of lilies at the headstones for the two infant

# McDonnell To Work At Cape

WASHINGTON (AP)—Striking McDonnell Aircraft Corp. machinists agreed today to go back to work at Cape Kennedy so as not to delay a Dec. 4 space shot, federal officials said.

The agreement, however, does not affect the strike of some 17,000 machinists against the company at St. Louis, Mo. The company is the prime contractor for Gemini space activities at the Cape, and producer of Phantom jet fighters used in Viet Nam.

The AFL-CIO International Association of Machinists agreed to the request of Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz and Chief Federal Mediator William E. Simkin to pull down picket lines at Cape Kennedy and go back to work there.

Union vice president Eugene Glover said the machinists at Cape Kennedy will be advised to the decision immediately and "I assume that they will return" to work.

Glover and Robert Krone, McDonnell vice president, pledged meanwhile to continue round-the-clock negotiations to reach a final settlement in the dispute involving wages and working conditions.

Simkin said picketing at Cape Kennedy so far had not obstructed the scheduled Dec. 4 launching of Gemini 7 with astronauts Frank Borman and James Lovell.

In asking the machinists to return to work at the Cape, Wirtz and Simkin said there would be a serious question about proceeding with the space shot unless the men do so. The federal officials had asked the union to reply to their requests by 2 p.m. today, but received the agreement almost immediately.

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# U.S. Tourist Faces Trial At Murnansk

MURMANSK, Soviet Union (AP)—A young American tourist went on trial in a Soviet court today and testified that he had "no illegal intentions" when he entered the country without a visa.

Newcomb Mott, 27, of Sheffield, Mass., smiled and said "Hi" when he saw his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Mott of Sheffield, in court. He glanced at them occasionally during the three-hour session.

Mr. and Mrs. Mott arrived in the snow-covered port of Murnansk Saturday. Soviet officials denied their request to see their son before he appeared in court, saying that under Soviet law they could not interview him until after the trial.

Young Mott told the Murnansk District Court that he wanted to ask Soviet border guards for permission to enter a tourist enclave on the Norwegian arctic frontier. His testimony indicated he got lost.

The penalty for illegally entering the Soviet Union is one to three years in prison. Mott has been under arrest since Sept. 4. The trial is expected to last two or three days. It is being held in a small room almost filled by 25 spectators.

Mott's Soviet lawyer, Boris Zolotukhin, said four or five witnesses would be called. Zolotukhin was assigned to the case by the Moscow Bar Association when the U.S. Embassy asked for a lawyer.

Mott told his lawyer he wandered into the Soviet enclave of Borzhigebek while lost in the Norwegian woods looking for the border control point.

"I did not ask any officials if I would be allowed in because I wanted to see for myself," Mott told the court.

Mott said that on Sept. 4 he planned to fly back to northern Finland but had about nine hours to spare before the late afternoon plane.

# FBI Joins Probe of 4 Blasts

CHARLOTTE, N. C. (AP)—The homes of four Negro civil rights leaders, including the state president of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, were rocked by explosions early today, but no one was injured.

Chief of Police John S. Ford said the homes of Kelly Alexander, state president of the NAACP and of his brother, Fred Alexander, were the most seriously damaged.

Blasts also occurred at the home of Dr. Reginald Hawkins, a dentist and militant civil rights leader, and the home of Julius Chambers, a young attorney who had handled many suits in behalf of Negro groups.

Ford, who arrived in the area 30 minutes after the blasts, said that in his opinion "it was a well-organized group."

"I'll guarantee you it was people who knew what they were doing. Whoever it was knew the sections and how to get in and get out quickly."

In Raleigh, Gov. Dan Moore offered Charlotte officials the "full resources of our state investigative and law enforcement agencies."

Mayor Stan Broderick of Charlotte said: "These bombings are most unfortunate and uncalled for. Our whole city is shocked. We have worked hard to promote peaceful and constructive race relations in which the leadership of our city has joined and which has been supported by the community at large. We will do everything possible to get to the bottom of this matter."

The Federal Bureau of Investigation joined the investigation of the blasts, which occurred at the four homes on Charlotte's west side about 2:30 a.m.

NEW YORK (AP)—Princess Margaret, sneezing in a chill rain, resumed her New York tour today with visits to Fifth Avenue department stores, a culture center, Wall Street and City Hall.

The princess, who took most of Sunday to rest from an exhausting Saturday night in Manhattan, sneezed several times as she went in and out of the fashionable stores. Rain dripped down the bare head of her husband, Lord Snowdon.

The princess still appeared a little fatigued but she smiled brightly at sales girls, some who stood on counters to see her. She wore a brown and black tweed coat over a beige chiffon dress with smocked neckline, waist and cuffs.

At Bergdorf Goodman, store president Andrew Goodman greeted Margaret and remarked that it was "British weather."

"Yes, it would have been better with California weather," the princess replied. Goodman said later Margaret told him she was "just exhausted" when she canceled a trip to Connecticut Sunday.

## TURKEY OPINION

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court celebrated Thanksgiving ahead of time today with a 6,000-word opinion in a frozen stuffed turkey case. The issue: Is it legal for New York to require, as it does, that a frozen stuffed turkey carry a label showing separately the weights of the fowl and the fillers of stuffing. The 6-3 decision: The issue, which involves federal-state relations, must be decided by the federal circuit court in New York. Therefore that court will conduct further proceedings.

# Dominicans Squash Tiny Rightist Revolt

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP)—The armed forces smashed a small rightist rebellion early today in the heart of the Dominican Republic without firing a shot.

Commodore Francisco J. Rivera Caminero, armed forces secretary, said 47 persons had been arrested. He said no members of the military were involved.

The small band of conspirators captured a radio station at Tamboril, a small community south of Santiago, the nation's second largest city. The town is about 70 miles north of Santo Domingo.

They held it for about two hours, then gave up without a fight, a government source said. While in the radio station, the rebels played a tape recording proclaiming themselves the "democratic revolutionary government."

The broadcast identified the movement's leader as Alcibiades Espinoza, a member of the conservative National Civic

Union. It proclaimed him president.

Whether Espinoza actually was involved could not be determined. He could not be reached at his home in Santo Domingo.

The rebels also tried to cut the road to Santiago. They made no attempt to enter Santiago, whose normal complement of army and air force units was reinforced Saturday by Rangers of the U.S. 82nd Airborne Division.

Word of the conspiracy began to spread about two weeks ago. President Hector Garcia-Godoy revealed the plotters' plans Friday.

Small patrols of the 82nd Airborne were sent into two interior cities upon recommendation of Garcia-Godoy, government sources said.

The patrols occupied strategic positions near military installations in Santiago and Barahona. The latter is a southeastern city about 70 miles from Santo Domingo. No incidents were reported at Barahona.

# Hundreds Seek Kidnaped Girl, Male Abductor

BASTROP, La. (AP)—Hundreds of officers combed three states today for some trace of a 9-year-old freckle-faced girl and her abductor, described as a man about 20.

Nancy Georgette Keller was kidnaped late Sunday from the yard of her parents, Dr. and Mrs. Douglas Keller, a playmate, Connie Spear, 7, said a young man drove up, tried to coax Nancy into his car, and when he failed, picked her up bodily, threw her in the car, and sped away.

Morehouse Parish Chief Deputy Sheriff W. H. Freeland said a three-state alert was out in Louisiana, Mississippi and Arkansas. Roadblocks were up in the north Louisiana area.

No demand for ransom had been received. Officers were

# Nine Held in Narcotic Raid

# New Scandal in Darien

DARIEN, Conn. (AP)—Nine young persons, including Michael J. Smith, a key figure in a teen-age drinking scandal that shook this fashionable city a year ago, are free on bond today on narcotics charges.

Smith, 20, and eight friends were arrested Sunday in a pre-dawn police raid on Smith's apartment. Eight were charged with violating the state narcotics act, and freed on bonds of \$3,000 to \$5,000.

The other, a 15-year-old girl, whose name was withheld, was released in custody of her parents and will be referred to juvenile authorities.

Police said a "quantity of a substance believed to be marijuana" was found in the apartment shared by Smith and Jack White, 18.

Thirteen months ago, four socially prominent Darien couples and several other adults were arrested on charges of serving liquor to minors at private parties.

During Smith's trial, Circuit Judge Rodney S. Eielson ordered the arrests of the adults involved in the parties.

A psychiatrist and his wife, Dr. and Mrs. George Hughes, appealed to the State Supreme Court their \$500 fines on the

charges. The court declined to review their cases.

The others convicted did not appeal. Charges against 5 of the 13, including two caterers and a bartender, eventually were dropped.

Acting Police Chief Hugh McManis declined to say how Sunday's raid took place, except to say that the officers had search warrants, and that the raid was "a planned affair."

Among those arrested was Glenn Carter, 20, of neighboring New Canaan. Carter had testified as a prosecution witness in Smith's trial last year.

Carter said that he and some friends were visiting Smith and White. He said none of the six boys or three girls present had marijuana on his person, as far as he knew.

Darien police said they had sent material seized at the apartment to the state laboratory for testing to determine whether it contains marijuana.

Besides Smith, White and Carter, others at the apartment were Thomas Albert, 19, and William Weir, 20, Darien; Allen G. Lanier, 19, New York City; and Marilyn Zodds, 18, and Judy Melt, 19, Darien, police said.

# Saigon Forces Beat Back Two Attacks by Viet Cong

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—South Vietnamese forces beat back two heavy Communist assaults on the central coast today with help from bombarding U.S. Navy ships offshore and air strikes later.

U.S. and South Vietnamese officers said at least 300 of about 1,500 attackers were killed.

The South Vietnamese—defending a fort in Thach Tru village, 20 miles south of Quang Ngai and 80 miles northeast of Saigon—were outnumbered 3 to 1.

Two U.S. Army advisers were killed in an assault on an outpost on a hill about a half-mile west of the fort.

"I got the s.o.b.'s that shot them," said Staff Sgt. Henry McNeal of Pittsburgh, Pa. He and a fourth U.S. adviser were unhurt.

In launching their attack, the Communists took advantage of poor weather conditions that grounded U.S. and South Vietnamese support planes.

Attack planes silenced six Viet Cong mortar positions that were firing on the hill.

U.S. and South Vietnamese officers on the scene said at least 200 Viet Cong were killed. Associated Press correspondent George Esper said he counted more than 100 bodies.

Officials said government casualties were light, but Esper said their casualties appeared to be moderate. Many of the rangers were killed inside the fort in close-in fighting. At one spot about 20 bodies of government soldiers were stacked side by side.

The rangers were divided into three companies, one inside the fort, one on the hill outpost and one north of the village of Thach Tru.

The Viet Cong assaulted the fort six times during an eight-hour period. They were beaten off by small arms, automatic weapons and hand grenades.

Government troops also captured nearly 100 enemy weapons, many of them late model types including recoilless rifles, light machine guns and Chinese-type assault rifles.

About 1,000 Viet Cong hit a Vietnamese regimental and artillery command post 40 miles northwest of Saigon. A few of the attackers penetrated the post's defense perimeter but were thrown back. The Vietnamese claimed they killed 100 of the attackers.

There was no report of government casualties in either action. U.S. troops suffered light

Rise in Desertions Causes Embarrassment in Saigon

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Desertions from South Viet Nam's armed forces have climbed steadily.

The problem is acutely embarrassing to Vietnamese military commanders, who are reluctant to make the figures public.

Other sources say there were 87,000 deserters during the first 10 months of 1964 and 72,000 in 1965. In October, these sources say, the desertion rate was 17.5 per 1,000 compared with 11.5 per 1,000 for October, 1964.

The rising desertion rate results partly from new government efforts to expand the army. About 40 per cent of the deserters are drafted after training and before they are assigned to units.

Desertions in the Vietnamese armed forces have always been high. Some critics say the government has not made enough effort to give the troops regular pay and allowances and also has been too lenient in the enforcement of penalties for desertion.

War-weary Vietnamese soldiers, many of whom have been fighting for 20 years, often look for home for a few weeks and then return to their units.

They may show up in such numbers as the Regional Forces or the Popular Forces, or the home guard is known.

The desertion rate is highest in an effort to boost the strength and effectiveness of the armed forces, the government recently effected a 25 per cent across-the-board pay increase.

These measures were widely hailed as steps in the right direction, but so far they have not stemmed the tide of desertions.

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. (AP) — The commander of America's training program for Viet Nam soldiers, Major General John J. Tolson III, commander of the Army aviation center at Ft. Rucker, Ala., told the Tennessee Valley chapter of the Association of the U. S. Army that combat helicopter flying is not as dangerous as it might appear.

He said that from December 1961 through August 1965, helicopters were hit by ground fire only once in every 247 combat flights; they were shot down only once in every 8,124 flights and were lost and not recovered at the rate of one in every 15,341 flights. He did not list the casualty rate of the crew.

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A 38-year-old man described as an "adult problem child" with a record of mental illness under official scrutiny in connection with the fiery sinking of the Yarmouth Castle was returned to Nassau.

The disclosure came in the wake of a Coast Guard inquiry into the disaster Nov. 13 when the Yarmouth Castle went down in the Caribbean Sea.

### Columbia New Ambulance Requested For Inter-County Service

Columbia, part of with four other towns of the inter-county ambulance, has been informed the association which runs the service wants to buy another ambulance.

The vehicle, maintained at the Colchester State Police Troop, is available for any resident in an emergency, or, by application, for transportation within the area to a hospital or other institution within 50 miles. The person requesting the ambulance must provide a nurse or attendant at no cost to the association. Drivers are provided from a group on call by the troop.

A new ambulance would raise the per person assessment from 15 to 20 cents, according to the new plan.

Last year, a total of 192 calls were made for the entire service area, although local calls totaled only eight. The total cost (at 15 cents per person) was \$776 for the year.

Other towns are East Haddam, Hebron, Salem and Haddam Neck.

**Dog Laws**  
Walter Kokoska, dog warden, has announced that he wishes to remind residents of certain laws concerning the ownership of dogs.

Kokoska says, most important, is the law governing roaming dogs. It states, says Kokoska, that dog owners must not allow dogs to roam except on the person's own land, and that the dog must not chase after automobiles. When the owner takes the dog off his property he must have the dog under control at all times.

The former vice president's birthday presents began arriving as he talked to his son and a few visitors beneath the giant oak trees encircling the modest white house where Garner now lives.

Tully brought a new light tan hat and a billfold. The Uvalde mayor sent a tie. Another old friend brought a pair of warm socks.

Garner had to be reminded to go inside when Chuck began to fall.

"These oak trees and me are partners," the bushy-haired Garner told visitors. "I have been sitting under this one old tree since I was maybe 70 years, and I bet it will last another 70 if I can last that long. That's all I've got to do, now, is sit here under those old trees."

He reached out a hand and stroked his twinkling eyes to see each newcomer.

"You are as welcome here as these old oak trees," he said.

Chuck Back, as he was known during much of his 46 years as a public official, bowed out of politics in 1940 when he caught a train to Texas and never returned to Washington.

He began his political career with election as Uvalde County Judge when Grover Cleveland was president. He served two terms in the Texas Legislature and was elected to Congress in 1902. He served in the U.S.

"Taking a winter vacation has become a form of social imperialism. The fellow who goes on one feels vastly superior to the rest of us psychoback prisoners who, because of family reasons, can only get away during the mobbed months of June, July and August, the vacation season for most resorts."

### U.S. Sets Guidelines On Sex Bias on Job

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government detailed today some of its ideas about the employment of women. The basic theme: women can't be denied a job solely because they are women.

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission set forth seven major guidelines to show employers how it will enforce the ban on sex discrimination which was included in the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

Commission interpretations are subject to court challenge, and currently apply only to employers of 100 or more workers. The employe limit drops to 75 next July 2, 80 on the same date in 1967 and finally to 25 on July 2, 1968.

In general, the commission said its interpretations won't conflict with state laws intended to protect women against exploitation and hazard.

But it said many state laws now are outdated, and legislatures should take a fresh look at them.

The commission said it won't accept such discrimination excuses as men do a better job than women, that women quit their jobs sooner, that coworkers, clients or customers prefer men that operate facilities would have to be provided for women.

The guidelines include several previously stated. Among them are ones affecting married women and job advertising.

The commission said married females can't be banned unless there is a similar embargo on married males. It did say there might be some exceptions, but made no effort to pin-point them.

With reference to advertising, the commission said no sex preference should be included unless it is absolutely essential. A woman is absolutely essential if, without her, the business would be unable to operate.

It suggested that classified ads could be labeled "Jobs of Interest — Male," or "Jobs of Interest — Female." But the ad itself then must state that all comers are welcome.

Other guidelines:

There can be no use of separate promotion or seniority systems based on sex.

### Nixon Raps LBJ's Action In Metal Price Disputes

NEW YORK (AP) — Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon says the dispute on aluminum and copper prices make it appear that President Johnson was "decided to declare war on industry."

"To accuse the President of heavy-handed use of presidential power" in the metals act, Nixon said, "is to accuse him of making the statements Sunday on the Columbia Broadcasting System 'Free the Metals' television program."

Both aluminum and copper producers recently requested price increases after the government announced it would release for the market some of its stockpiled supplies.

Nixon said, "It is a devaluing effect on the confidence of the business community."

"President Johnson has an obligation to spell out what his policy will be in the future," Nixon said.

Nixon was asked about a statement by former Sen. Barry Goldwater that Nixon would be president or vice president if he won the 1968 presidential election.

"I would not say that," Nixon said. "I would say that I would do a good job as mayor."

After the program, Nixon told reporters he would support Goldwater if he were elected in 1968.

Nixon said the "jury is still out" on Reagan, and he expects to see him in the primary. He said Rockefeller has "been a good governor, and will be a better governor than any Democrat I see on the scene."

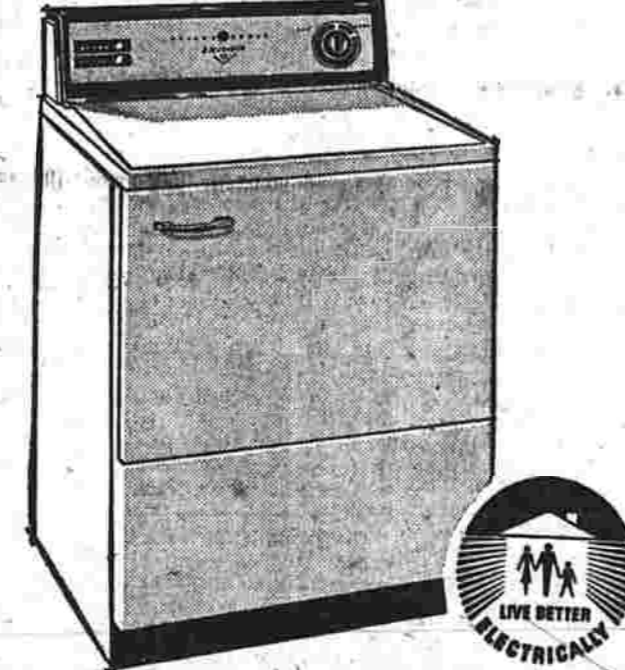

### Powell Appointment Issue Goes to Attorney General

The case of Theodore Powell's appointment as chief executive of community colleges and an officer of the State Board for Regional Community Colleges has been brought to the office of the state's attorney general.

Max Lepofsky, board member who initially accused the present controversy over the appointment, has asked Atty. Gen. Harold Mulvey to render an opinion on the appointment which carries with it the title right to allocate close to two million dollars for the three community colleges.

"Your opinion," he concluded, "will facilitate the orderly operation of the board and will set guide lines so that the business of the board may go forward without question as to the legality of some of the procedures being recommended at the present time."

Powell's salary and title were first questioned by the Commission on Higher Education which asked the community college board to rescind the appointment along with a general salary scale for college faculty and administrators. Lepofsky then stepped into the picture with the claim that the appointment was actually illegal and violated accepted practices for hiring executive officers of public boards.

The board later suspended its appointment of Powell pending further study and designated him as its executive agent at his former state salary of \$12,000. The board stipulated that if the issue were resolved in his favor his new salary would be retroactive to July 30.

Mulvey, who received the Lepofsky communication only this morning, was not able to comment on the subject.

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Preservative Allows Blood To Keep Longer

BOSTON (AP)—A new preservative that will enable whole blood to be stored a week beyond the present 21-day legal limit is expected to be available for general use early next year. Officials at Children's Hospital Medical Center said today studies there have demonstrated the preservative's effectiveness. The officials disclosed that the National Institutes of Health has licensed the preservative for commercial manufacture, and said national distribution was only NIH approval to sell it. Dr. Sherwin V. Kery, assistant director of the transfusion service at the hospital, said this last clearance is expected in January after a commercial manufacturer has accumulated a backlog of the product and reports have been made to the NIH on a final set of studies. Dr. John Gibson, senior associate in medicine at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, devised the chemistry of the preservative. It is called Citrate-Phosphate-Dextrose (CPD). Dr. Kery said the legal limit on the time whole blood may be used is based on the "survival rate" of the vital red blood cells—at least 70 per cent of them given in a transfusion must still be circulating in a patient 24 hours later. Before CPD, out of every 100 pints an average of 11 were not used within the 21 days. Since CPD, however, an average of only two out of every 100 pints cannot be used within the 28 days.

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### Dallas Sets Aside Assassination Sites

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — The 200th anniversary of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy was commemorated today in Dallas by the setting aside of sites where the president was shot, by the placing of flowers and objects at the Dallas Trade Mart, where Kennedy was headed when he was shot. The inscription on the memorial is taken from William Shakespeare's "Julius Caesar": "The flowers that spring from the blood that stains the pavement are the flowers of peace."

The visitors come from all over America and from many foreign countries. As the flowers they leave behind, the city has them taken away to be preserved in a cold-storage vault. The flower wreaths number in the hundreds now. The stored collection includes many flags, plastic crosses and Bibles.

A large wooden chest contains the newspaper, postcards, and paper scraps on which visitors wrote about the feelings they experienced at the assassination site.

On the back of a Japanese fan, a Tokyo visitor wrote: "I loved you, I admire you forever. I will not be able to forget you. Your image will not die."

Two Michigan families signed a note that read: "We came a long way from Michigan to pay tribute to our late president Kennedy. May he rest in peace."

On a brown paper sack: "The flowers here will be no more than a memory of the anniversary of the assassination. But his memory will never be forgotten as long as good, kind men live on this earth."

Within six months Dallas city park director, L. B. Houston, hopes to unveil the marker memorial, consisting of three bronze panels set in native red granite, and containing a description of the tragedy using words and maps from the Warren Commission report.

The marker will be paid for from park department funds. It will be about 200 feet from the spot where the president was shot. Visitors will be able to glance up at the orange-brick Texas School Book Depository building from which Lee Harvey Oswald fired his rifle.

The plans north of the assassination site will be known as the Kennedy Memorial Plaza. It will contain a modest and dignified memorial in keeping with Mrs. Kennedy's wishes.

County buildings now on the site will be razed. Offices and the plaza should be completed by late 1968.

### Road Signs May Talk To Drivers

WASHINGTON (AP) — One of these days, highway signs may talk to drivers, instead of just advising them via the printed word.

Findings are due next year from studies at Georgia Tech on the use of "talking" messages presented by radio. The Ford-Pilco people have developed a way to advise them.

These new wrinkles were discussed in an interview by Burton Stevens, a psychologist with the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads.

"No one is sure what those messages should contain, nor even sure whether it is a good idea," Stevens said. "One question is how many times to present the message, how far ahead of an intersection for example."

There are transmission problems. Messages are sent from a transmitter by the side of the road, and picked up by the passing driver with special receiving equipment inside the car or truck. They could come in on a beam to which the car radio could be set. Conceivably the messages could be broadcast loudly from the roadside. But what if the radio was not turned on? Or the car windows were closed? Or the driver couldn't hear what was being broadcast?

It may come as a surprise to some that the Bureau of Public Roads has psychologists working from the behavioral sciences for almost six years, working with a great variety of problems created by drivers, vehicles and highways.

"For one thing, we're studying the limitations and capabilities of the driver," Stevens said. "People differ in their ability to read. Some drivers may be naturally, even in their ability to read. "We hope to develop a system that can be used efficiently by a variety of people with a wide variety of conditions," Stevens said.
