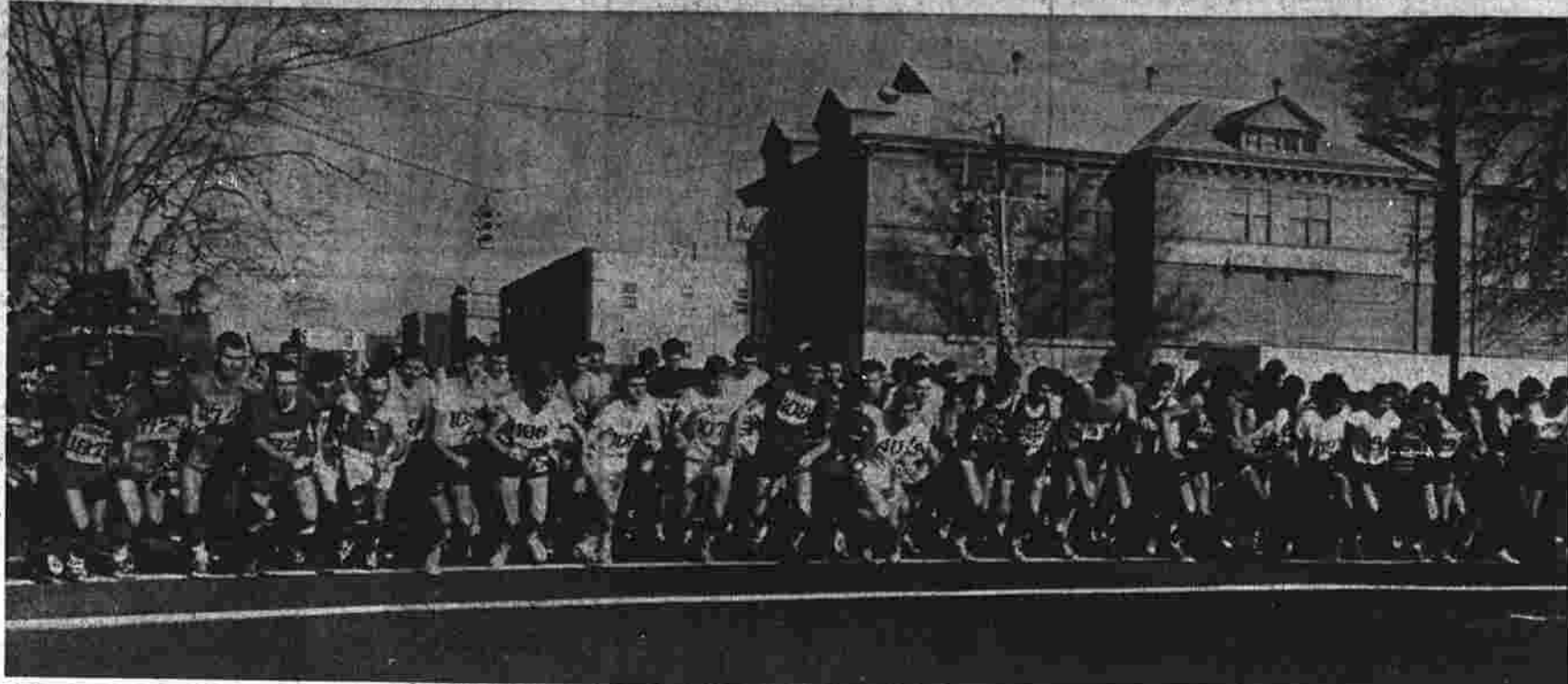

CHICAGO (AP)—Thanksgiving holiday traffic deaths increased slowly today—a day of dismal, dangerous driving weather in many sections of the country. The toll reached 194 on the second full day of the tally period that began at 6 p.m. Wednesday and will end at midnight Sunday. Motor vehicle fatalities around midmorning were exceeding the average of about 110 a day recorded during the first nine months of this year.

STAY OUT OF NOVELTY WITH DOUTIFUL HANDS By ALBERT SHEINWOLD. Most bridge players have one simple answer to all bidding problems: "When you don't know what to bid, take a look at notrump." Actually, the right time to bid notrump is when you know exactly what you are doing. Opening lead—Nine of clubs. Today's hand was played in Paris, but it seems to have been bid and played the same way in New York or Cape Town. South bid two notrump because he didn't know what to do, and this led to a severe penalty. South should have passed over two clubs; if North could take no further action South would not miss a game by passing. At most, South might have bid two spades, but two notrump was a bad overbid. North had the right idea when he rebid the spades, but he should have bid four hearts over three notrump. Four hearts might be a magnificent contract if South had four hearts to the queen of spades. West's double indicated that three notrump was a dangerous contract.

Snow, Fog, Cold Freezing Italy

ROME (AP)—For the third day an unseasonably heavy snows and dense fogs held Italy in a watery grip. Fresh snow fell from the Alps into the north down to the lower Apennine reaches on the edge of the Po Valley more than six feet in some sections. Heavy snows blanketed Sondrio east of Lake Garda, and covered Bergamo and Brescia on the edge of the Po Valley. A blizzard struck Gossaga further to the south. North Italy was a scene of chill desolation. A thick fog pressed down on the flat farmland of the Po Valley. Canals in north Italy's extensive irrigation system froze over. As far down as Florence, solid road conditions forced auto traffic to a crawl. Hundreds of accidents and delays were reported. Two men were killed when the automobile skidded off the road near Bologna. Many cities registered their coldest November temperatures to date.

South Windsor Sidewalk Committee Paves Way for Town-Wide Study

A committee of town officials and citizens charged with finding roads where sidewalks should be constructed to protect children walking to school has met to organize for the job ahead of it. The recently appointed committee assigned the following duties at its meeting this week: Superintendent of Schools Charles Warner Jr. to review policies that affect children walking to school and report on pertinent sections. William O'Neil, town engineer, is to prepare estimated costs for constructing sidewalks in new subdivisions, on existing roads and on old roads with poor drainage and other problems. The subcommittee assignments were made as follows: O'Neil, Carol Dwyer, Joseph John, economic feasibility; John Warner, Harry Anderson, present and future sidewalks; and Bidwell, property lines. William Ryan, Frank Keenan and Edward Parisek, safety and traffic; Warner, Francis Netter, Richard Brown, cost of buses. Warner says the administration will prefer to use fewer buses with a resulting saving to the town. The current budget for bus service is about \$100,000. Warner said that he has plotted every intersection in town and has notes of the mileage between them. He said that there is no board of education policy setting different maximum walking distances for different grade pupils. The study will also include the possibility of creating the committee and the board of education's policy on transportation. A walking distance of one mile was selected as a starting point for the study. All members received a town map; 5,000 radius circle around each school will serve as a basis for considering sidewalk locations. Joseph J. Carino, chairman of the committee, said that the committee's new regulations require approval by the town board of the street in most new subdivisions. Prospector Maintains Mine Waiting for 2nd Gold Boom

GOLDFIELD, Nev. (AP)—Among determined Irishmen, gold-digger Martin Duffy is perhaps the most persistent in panning for gold and putting around his own equipment in the ground. Duffy, 72, has been working his old Florence Mine for 28 years—hoping for the day the price of gold goes up, making mining pay again. Duffy has his mine in top condition, even though it hasn't produced any ore since 1938. He said the Florence produced 28 million in gold in his heyday. "And there's a Helluva lot more where that came from," he told Los Angeles Times reporter Charles Hillinger. I've been waiting a long time for the price to go up. Duffy's mine is in the semi-gold town of Goldfield, a mining camp that boomed hurriedly from 1904 to 1915. Today it is the withering shell of Esmeralda County, 180 miles north of Las Vegas. "Why do I spend every day up there, keeping the mine in top condition, yet not producing any ore since '38?" asks the former state senator, somewhat rhetorically. "Hell, it's my life. It's the memories. I knew all the old timers. I grew up with them, worked beside them. They taught me all I know. Now they're gone."

U.S. Sees Little Danger From Reds in New Guyana

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP)—The United States does not likely will support the admission of British Guyana to the Organization of American States after the colony becomes independent, U.S. diplomats say. They voice doubt that independence for the territory on South America's northeast coast will increase the risk of a Communist takeover there. Britain announced it will grant independence next May to Guyana—as the newest nation in the Americas will be called—under a new constitution and his top Latin-American specialists were attending the inter-American foreign ministers conference here. The hemisphere foreign policy leaders are discussing ways to strengthen and update the inter-American system and the conference president Brazilian Foreign Minister Vasco Lottus de Cunha has invited Canada, Jamaica and Trinidad-Tobago to join. The OAS has 20 members—the United States and all independent Latin-American states except Cuba. The U.S. diplomats said Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson has indicated Canada intends to join the OAS some time. Dec. 18. The postponement was requested by the electrical public service companies operating in and Trinidad-Tobago, Jamaica and Connecticut, the PUC said.

Bowles Has Toughest Job, Building Up U.S. in India

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Democratic member of the U.S. House of Representatives Chester Bowles is trying to sweep back a tide of anti-American feeling...

He has been governor, Connecticut, 1948-51; Congressman, and undersecretary of state, and twice ambassador to India.

Last Tuesday there was a bitter attack on the United States by Indian officials. Bowles was in the United States and he was pointing out that India's starving masses must get U.S. aid.

Frank Anthony, leader of U.S. mixed quarter-million citizens of mixed British-Indian parentage and formerly a member of the United States Congress, also told Parliament that the United States was morally responsible for destruction of lives and material by arming Pakistan.

Shastri, in his talk to Parliament, was outspoken in his praise of the Soviet Union. He said he hoped India's bonds of friendship with the Soviet Union were strengthened.

There was no significant defection of the United States from its position. Bowles has had to contend primarily with two hot problems.

Anger aroused by past American military aid to neighboring Pakistan, whose troops went into action against India in American-made tanks and planes.

Indifference that has spread into the government's highest levels over reports that U.S. economic aid and the "food for peace" program, if increased, are being used by Washington to pressure India into a Kashmir settlement which India wouldn't accept.

Bowles has a great fund of good will in India and is known throughout the nation better than any other diplomat. Top members of the government consider him a good friend of India.

Bowles has drawn deeply on this good will in recent weeks in countless public and private meetings during which he has explained the American case.

Now the ambassador confronts another problem. He apparently feels there is misunderstanding back home over India's mood and the danger that indicate handling of the present tense situation could drive 400 million Indians into Moscow's arms.

Soviet designs in India long have been of intense interest to Bowles, and warnings against Moscow run through his collection of speeches.

He consequently has been fighting on two fronts in recent months: He has been warning away Indian opinion—and at the same time trying to influence thinking in Washington.

In a few months to Rep. Clarence D. Long of Maryland, Bowles doesn't disguise his feeling that India is extremely important in democracy's struggle with communism...

Negroes File Suit To Get on Juries

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — A three-judge federal court opens a hearing today on a suit aimed at getting more Negroes on the jury rolls in the state of Alabama. The suit, filed by the Citizens for the Right to Vote, charges that the state has discriminated against Negroes in the selection of jurors.

The suit was filed six days after an Episcopal seminary student, Jonathan Daniels of Keesee, N.H., was killed by a shotgun blast in Haynesville, the Lowndes County seat.

The 30-year-old Daniels was the second civil rights worker killed in Lowndes County this year. In March, Mrs. Viola Gregg Luiza, a white Detroit housewife, was shot to death as she drove along Highway 80 near Lowndesboro.

An all-white circuit court jury acquitted Thomas L. Coleman, a Haynesville highway engineer and part-time special deputy sheriff, of a manslaughter charge stemming from the death of Daniels. There were no white jurors on the panel from which the jury was chosen for the trial in Haynesville, although they have been on juries in times past.

A month later, Ku Klux Klanman Colley Leroy Wilkins Jr., a Fairfield, Ala., mechanic, went on trial in the same court-room for the second time in the slaying of Mrs. Luiza. He also was acquitted by an all-white jury.

New Research Discloses Kissin' May Cause More Tooth Decay

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Scientists have discovered that tooth decay is a highly contagious disease, not a defect you inherit from your parents, says a University of Miami researcher.

That means if you have a good, sound set of choppers but marry somebody with a mouth full of cavities, you are imperiling your ivory smile.

"This is not going to stop kissing," said the researcher, Dr. Doran D. Zinner, in a bit of understatement.

"But it does mean we have made a good step forward in stopping tooth decay," he said.

"For many years we thought of tooth decay as hereditary," Zinner said in an interview.

"But now we know that if an individual does not have a certain type of bacteria in his mouth, he will not get cavities."

You can eat all the candy cake and soda pop you want if you don't have the bacteria, Zinner said, and your teeth won't decay.

Of course, if you do have the bacteria, every time you eat something with sugar in it, you are giving the bacteria food, allowing them to destroy your teeth.

The bacteria are transmitted by direct contact, said Zinner, a part of the crystal surface of

Cheating Common, H.S. Survey Shows

NEW YORK (AP) — Cheating is common among U.S. high school students, caught between conflicting pressures for better grades and safer college entrance examinations.

A survey indicates the problem is becoming worse in some areas, including New York City, where there is a scramble for the limited openings in Ivy League schools.

The New York Times said it had found a definite increase in cheating, most of it by "those near the top of their classes" competing for colleges.

Reports from other areas also indicate cheating is common among students near the top of their class.

"The college-bound are somewhat more intelligent and devise better methods of cheating," said Dr. William P. Hoffman, director of the Cleveland secondary schools.

Dr. Hoffman said he has recommended a proctor system and the separation of students during tests. Schools in the Cleveland suburbs of Shaker Heights and Lakewood said they were abolishing the honor system. An official said this "takes the pressure off the student."

An increase in cheating has been noted by Brother Andrew, principal of Trinity Roman Catholic High School near Harrisburg, Pa.

"We found the temptation for cheating particularly prevalent among the better classes," he said. "If, for instance, you have an advanced math course with a couple of whizzes in it, it is very difficult for them to say no when asked by friends to supply answers."

In Portland, Ore., a school vice principal described cheating as "one of those constants." He said it was getting harder to cheat, however, because of broadened test techniques.

The Federal Aviation Agency said the Beechcraft Bonanza left Montpelier earlier in the day on a flight to Connecticut.

The plane landed at Hartford, Conn., at about 7 p.m., FAA said, and took on two tons of fuel for the flight back to Montpelier.

The four dead family members were on their way home after a Thanksgiving dinner at the home of the elder LaFontaine's daughter, Mrs. Mary Friedman in Hartford, Conn.

Federal Aviation Agency officials said the plane left Hartford shortly after 6 p.m.

The committee is seeking \$1.2 million in three years to match a grant of the Ford Foundation to the Nieman Foundation.

The additional funds will enable the foundation to award more fellowships to outstanding journalists for a year of study at Harvard. They also will make possible expansion of the Nieman Library of Contemporary Journalism development of the quarterly Nieman Reports, a journal for journalists, and establishment of an annual Nieman Institute for editors, publishers and reporters over the age of 40.

U.S. Stockpiles Become Economic Lever for LBJ

NEW YORK (AP) — The government has now altered the scope of its 10-billion national stockpile of key commodities so that it will serve as an economic balance wheel as well as a military weapon.

That balancing was not possible in the various laws that began accumulation of supplies of 77 strategic commodities in 1950. The stated purpose of the stockpiles was to guarantee strategic materials for national defense needs.

President Johnson's administration has put the full weight of the stockpiles behind the administration's economic guideposts for the booming peacetime economy.

During the past two weeks a government announcement that it would release 200,000 tons of aluminum and copper from the stockpiles served to force major producers of both metals to recede in price increases.

With much less fanfare, the government has been selling tin, lead and zinc this year. The sales have served to keep prices of those metals, which are in tight supply internationally, from soaring.

Repeatedly, the government has contended that certain price rises lead to inflation. It has established guideposts defining any price or wage increase in excess of 2.2 per cent as inflationary.

"The aluminum boost was less than 2.2 per cent; the copper increase was more," Treasury Secretary Henry H. Fowler said last week of the government "will blow the whistle impartially" on economic changes exceeding the limits.

The national stockpile represents a formidable whetstone. As of June 30, 1966, the Office of Emergency Planning figured the stockpile's market value at \$3,151,847,100. Of that total, about \$4.4 billion is classified as in excess of defense and space needs.

How can the release of stockpiled material help down price rises?

Price structures usually reflect the interworking of supply and demand. As demand advances close to or past available supply, prices go up. If an excess supply develops, prices go down.

The government went into stockpiling on the eve of World War II when Congress appropriated \$70 billion to purchase tin, rubber, quartz, crystal and chrome.

A 1946 law created the national stockpile, biggest of the three that now exist. It has nearly 16 billion worth of materials stored in warehouses, General Services Administration depots and the like.

"The Defense Production Act of 1950 sought to encourage new mining and manufacturing facilities to meet Korean war needs. The government agreed to buy excess production."

The last of the excess production contracts expired two years ago, but the stockpile still holds some \$600 million worth of material.

The so-called supplemental stockpile consists of 11.9 billion worth of minerals and metals obtained in foreign barter for agricultural surpluses. An offshoot of that is the small Commodity Credit Corp. stockpile.

All of the stockpiles are under the supervision of the Office of Emergency Planning. Quotas for each material now are based on projected U.S. needs for a three-year war.

Much of the present surplus was accumulated prior to 1958 when projected needs were based on a five-year war.

Stockpiled items range from feathers to industrial diamonds. However, 13 items account for three-fourths of the inventory. Jewel bearings now are the only items being added to the stockpile.

Without fanfare, some 11.2 billion in surplus stockpile material has been sold in the past three years.



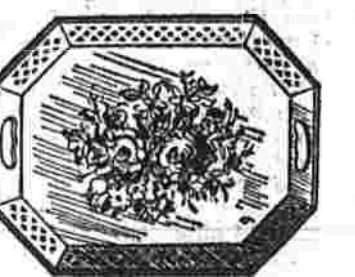

Millions of Young People Face Draft All over World

LONDON (AP) — From Moscow to Jerusalem to Saigon, young men face the same problem that provokes discussion in the United States — the military draft.

Conscription is more the rule than the exception in a deeply divided world, a survey shows. Britain, Canada, India and Pakistan are among the few big countries that rely solely on voluntary enlistments. Quelling India and Pakistan lack officers or equipment to handle the hundreds of thousands who would enlist if they could.

Israel, surrounded by hostile Arab countries, drafts both men and women. In Mexico, training is on a Sunday-only basis.

The United States draws from men in the 18-46 age group, with selective service to furnish 58,400 men this month. That's the highest call since the end of the Korean War and some states expect to start inducting children married men to fill their December quotas. Washington plans to strengthen the military force by 340,000 men for a total of about three million.

How does the U.S. conscription policy compare with those of other countries? Tougher than some, more lenient than others, the following survey of representative countries indicates:

SOVIET UNION — Strict universal military training calls for induction of all youths 17 and 18 who have completed secondary school. When they reach 19, they're drafted even if they have not finished secondary school, but college students are exempt. Draftees must serve two to five years, depending on the branch to which they are assigned.

Draftees' pay is \$3.30 per month. Leaves are granted only for emergencies or outstanding service.

College students receive military training while in school and are enrolled in the officers reserve.

BRITAIN — With neither universal military training nor a conscription system, Britain All Egyptian youths are subject to its last drafters in 1960. Since then the regular army has reach 18, and youth groups pro-

been below strength. It is now 15,000 under the goal of 251,000 men. Britain's Territorial Army is the reserve force, composed entirely of volunteers, mostly former servicemen.

FRANCE — South Vietnam military service under a draft law that covers all men 18-35. The women's army corps is voluntary.

In India and Pakistan, food, uniforms and housing made military service such a privilege there is no need for conscription. India could raise an army of millions if it had the equipment and training cadres; Pakistan's applicants for service exceed the number that can be accepted.

Nepal has such a surplus of professional warriors it provides both British and Indian armies with thousands of Gurkhas.

Japan's Self-Defense Force of 245,000 men is voluntary and conscription is virtually outmoded since the national constitution bars war as an instrument of national policy.

Red China has a bottomless pool of manpower to draw upon. Its selected standing military force is estimated at 2.5 million men and available standby militia is estimated at 20 to 30 million men and women. The militia usually is poorly armed and except for training purposes, is used for internal security.

Under Mao Tse-tung's military theories "all the people are soldiers."

DOWN UNDER — Australia and New Zealand are gradually boosting their military training programs. Australia, with troops fighting guerrillas in Southeast Asia, will draft 4,200 men for two years of military service this year. The 1968 target is double that figure.

Some 3,000 New Zealanders are inducted per year, out of an estimated 12,000 who are eligible, to maintain the force at 10,000 men.

MIDWEST — Tiny Israel has served when they graduate. Some college students, such as engineers, are called into the quiet military training for men among her military and sister business associates and a sister here. The other half went to a foundation she had set up.
