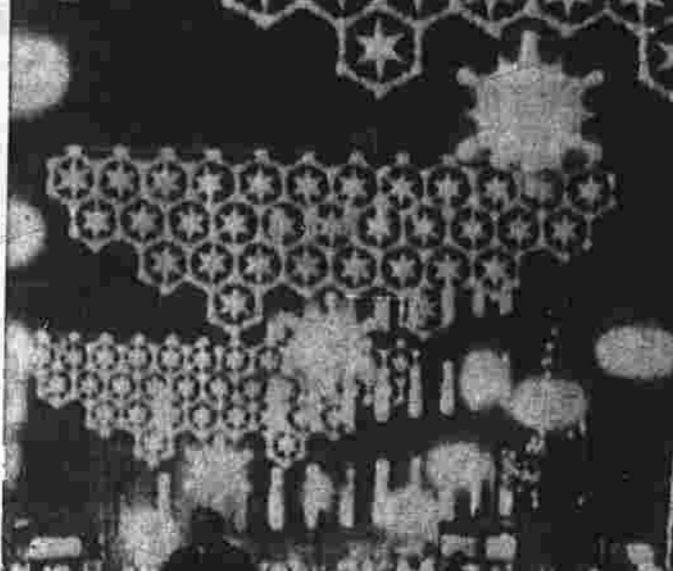

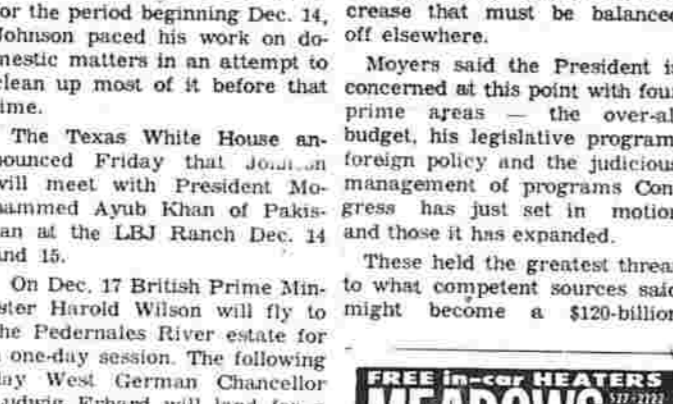

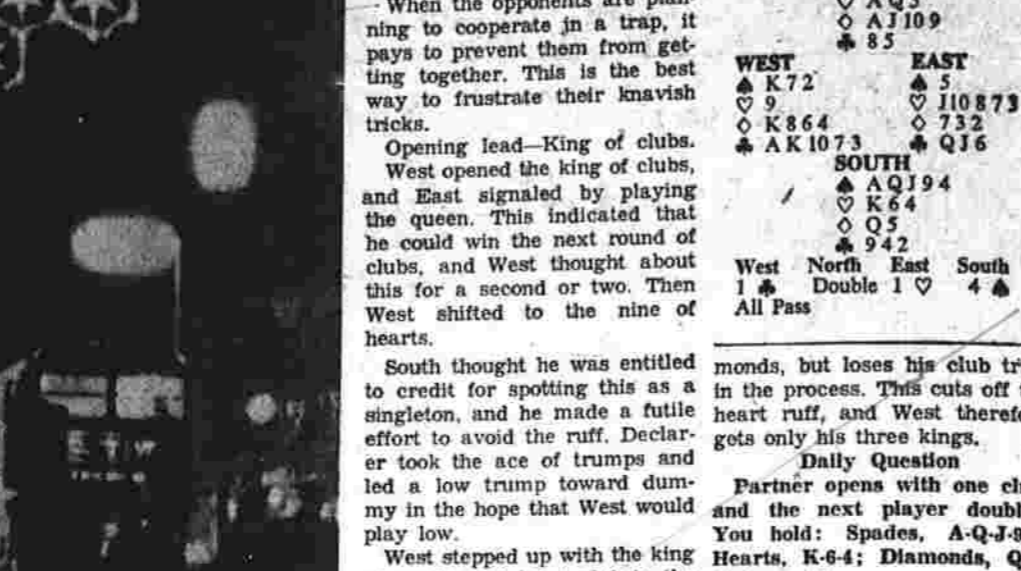

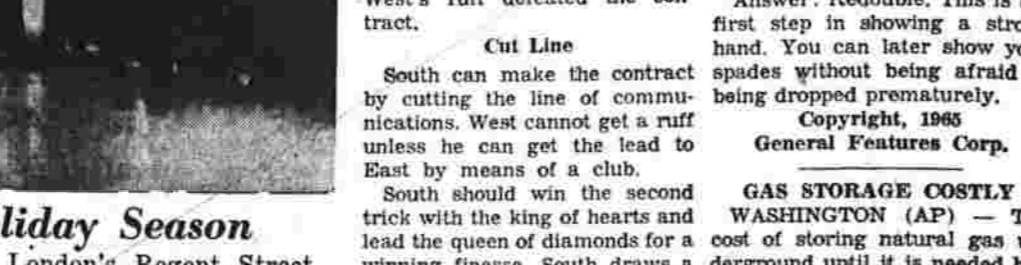

Hunger Strike Begins

Exiled Cuban Sent To Danbury Prison

HARTFORD (AP)—A Cuban exile leader, arrested in Hartford Thursday, was transferred from Hartford State Jail to the Federal Correctional Institution at Danbury after he threatened a hunger strike Friday.

State Jail Administrator Harold E. Hegstrom indicated that Dr. Orlando Bosch Avila would be fed intravenously at the federal institution if he continues to reject food.

Bosch is charged with conspiring to extort \$20,000 from fellow refugees in Florida. It is expected that Bosch will be returned to Miami Monday.

When Bosch was arrested in Orlando, Fla., in June on charges of conspiring to export arms illegally, he went on a brief hunger strike before being released on recognizance bonds. No trial date was set then.

He was arrested Thursday by FBI agents at a rally sponsored by the Hartford Committee Pro Cuba Liberation, where he was to be the main speaker.

Marcelino Garcia Jimenez, a second leader of a group of militant Cuban exiles, was arrested Thursday in Miami on similar charges.

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Cuban exile revolutionary chieftain Orlando Bosch's arrest this week on extortion charges was not his first brush with U.S. authorities.

At one time, customs agents maintained a day and night watch on the aggressive anti-Castro leader to keep him from mounting raids against Cuba.

Dr. Bosch still faces trial in connection with possession of bombs that he said were to have been dropped over Cuba. He was arrested in Orlando, Fla., in July and charged by U.S. authorities with conspiring to export war munitions illegally. Bosch was released on a recognizance bond after staging a hunger strike.

Dr. Bosch, a dapper 39-year-old physician with a small, dark mustache and horn-rimmed glasses, fought on Castro's side in Cuba during the revolution that overthrew dictator Fulgencio Batista.

He split with Castro, and came into exile in 1960. Here, he continued as head of a revolutionary organization he had founded in Cuba, the Revolutionary Recovery Insurrectional Movement. He was an outspoken critic of the now dissolved Cuban Revolutionary Council, which mounted the ill-fated Bay of Pigs invasion in 1961.

Dr. Bosch lives in Miami with his wife, Myrian, also a physician, and their five children. The oldest was born in exile.

Hearings Slated On Money Issues

The board of directors will hold public hearings and consider two appropriations at its Dec. 7 meeting.

1. A \$21,540 transfer to the board of education budget, considered only a routine bookkeeping item. The sum has already been received from the Federal Economic Opportunity Department as an "In-Service Neighborhood Youth Corps" grant for 48 Manchester and East Catholic high school students.

2. A \$10,000 addition to the town's counsel's budget, to be financed from an expected increase in revenue from miscellaneous sources. The added appropriation is to replenish the \$20,000 claim-settlement account, which is almost depleted.

Town Counsel Irving Aronson said that two large settlements, settled during the last fiscal year, but approved by the board of directors early in this fiscal year, have taken a large chunk out of the 1965-66 allocated sum. He said that he foresees the prospect of more settlements in the next few months than is usual, because the courts have been moving their cases more rapidly than in the past.

Police say that when they arrived, the cars in the lot began blowing their horns. All soon quieted down, except for one. The driver, Gary A. Jones, who is stationed in Norfolk, Virginia, and his companion, Barry McSweeney of 18 Auburn Rd., were taken to police headquarters.

Jones was arrested and charged with unnecessary blowing of his horn and is scheduled to appear in court Dec. 12. McSweeney was released in the custody of his parents.

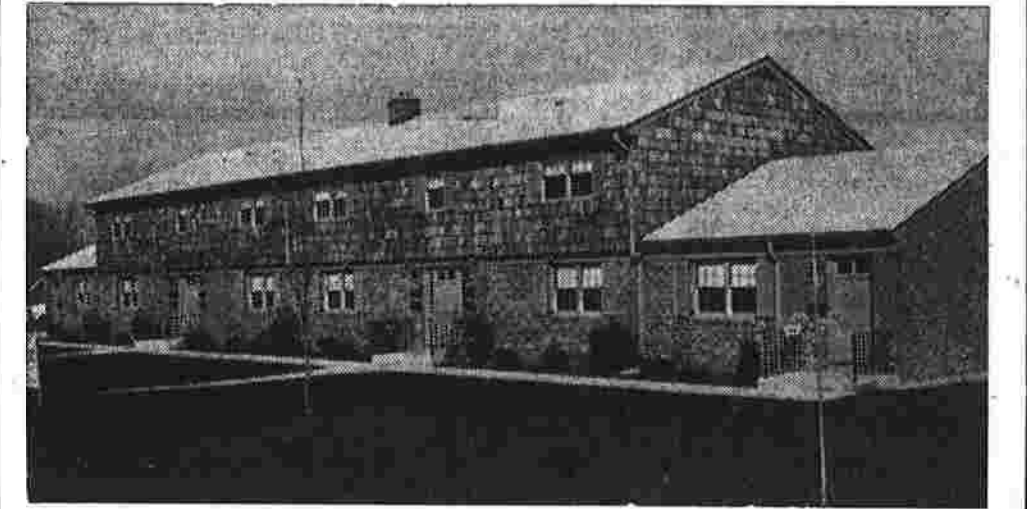

NEW YORK (AP) — Two of the major television networks are turning out self-testing programs in which viewers may participate by answering questions and then compare their scores with those chalked up in a survey by the network.

CBS had one Tuesday night—a national citizenship test — and NBC has a test on honesty coming along later.

This reporter, however, has developed a test that shows whether the viewer is watching the programs that assorted advertising agencies believe he should be watching.

It's easy to score yourself. For instance, a program laced with commercials showing a man shaving, or counting how many times he used one razor blade or winning a gorgeous girl because he switched to a certain brand of hair oil obviously is designed for male viewing.

It's a woman's show when the commercial demonstrates how to give yourself a permanent wave while riding on water skis, or how to get rid of dishpan hands, and gray hair, or how to clean sinks and floors fast, or get a whiter wash.

Youth Concert Will Compare Music and Atoms

"Musical Atoms — A Study of Intervals" will be Leonard Bernstein's subject when he conducts and narrates the ninth-season premiere broadcast of the New York Philharmonic Young People's Concerts, Monday evening at 7:30 on CBS.

In discussing his topic, Bernstein will draw an analogy between the structure of atoms and music. In the same way as one needs at least two particles to create an atom, two musical notes are required before you can begin to have an "atom of music." The two-note relationship is called an "interval." Horizontal intervals are represented by notes struck one after another (melody) and vertical intervals are found in notes struck simultaneously (harmony), both of which take many forms and are used by a composer to establish the mood and meaning of his work.

To illustrate his program, taped in Philharmonic Hall in New York's Lincoln Center, Bernstein features the first movement of the Symphony No. 4 by Brahms, and the fourth movement from the Symphony No. 4 by Vaughan Williams.

Crane finally found his destiny when Bing Crosby productions offered him the lead in "Hogan's Heroes."

"That's me!" he exclaimed. Indeed, Crane's characterization of the con-artist war prisoner who runs the camp from the other side of the stockade is a principal factor of the CBS series' success.

"Actually, Hogan is an extension of what I used to do on radio," Crane explained. "Say I'd be talking to Eddie Fisher. After a warm-up I'd say, 'Now Eddie, tell us exactly what did happen in Rome' then I'd zing into a record."

"Now I put my arm around the commandant's shoulder and say, 'I understand you're coming up for a promotion,' then I change the subject." Crane continued the radio show for a month after "Hogan's Heroes" began shooting. Then the dialogue started disappearing from his memory, and he realized that radio would have to go. It was no small sacrifice; he had been earning \$70,000 a year on KNX.
