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Parties to Air Election Issues

Manchester Democrats will hold a town committee meeting on Dec. 6 at 8 p.m. in the Municipal Building to take a preliminary stand on the two constitutional questions to be voted upon at the Dec. 14 state election.

The Republican Town Committee will announce its position Friday night, following a public forum at the Hillside High School.

Both committee chairmen, Ted Cummings for the Democrats and Francis DellaPera for the Republicans, have said that an all-out effort will be made, in cooperation with the League of Women Voters, to get out the vote on election day.

Tentative plans call for the designation of "housewife committees" who will telephone from their homes, in the hope of getting as many of Manchester's 23,000 voters as possible to cast their ballots.

Local cooperation may stop at "getting out the vote," for the two political parties and the League may not agree among themselves on recommendations.

Although the state central committee of both parties have endorsed passage of both questions—the constitutional change package and the eminent domain proposal—the local committees may take a stand of their own. Both are expected to endorse the package question, with no indication at present on what their stand will be on the eminent domain issue.

The League has come out with a strong endorsement of question 1, a constitutional change, but has taken no position on the second, eminent domain. It claims it is that it has had no time to study the question.

Addict Facilities Lacking in State

WALLINGFORD (AP) — The Connecticut Council on Crime and Delinquency says the state has a known population of 6,800 narcotics addicts, but only eight beds to institutionalize them.

This was among the findings made by six study committees for the CCDD which launched a probe last April into the state's problems in prevention, control and treatment of crime.

The committee reports were being presented today at a meeting in Wallingford. A summary of the findings will be issued as a progress report and sent to some 3,000 public officials and leading citizens throughout the state, said Harold L. Patton, a National Council on Crime and Delinquency consultant who is administering the Connecticut council.

The reports on the state's "gaps and weaknesses" in the field of crime and delinquency conclude that there is a serious lack of facilities for disturbed children and adults, minor offenders, alcoholics, narcotics addicts, and sex offenders.

"They are not available on a sufficiently large scale in Connecticut,"

minor offenders is stressed.

"Crime in America," the summary report says, "resembles an iceberg, with major crimes representing the relatively small, visible portion and minor or misdemeanor crimes representing the iceberg's vast and dangerous submerged areas."

Clare President Kennedy's assassin, Lee Harvey Oswald, said the century's classic example of the eight of 10 felonious offenders who first committed minor crimes, the report says:

"If the Lee Harvey Oswalds are to be screened and referred for treatment before they become involved in serious crime, clinical, diagnostic and rehabilitative services must be available."

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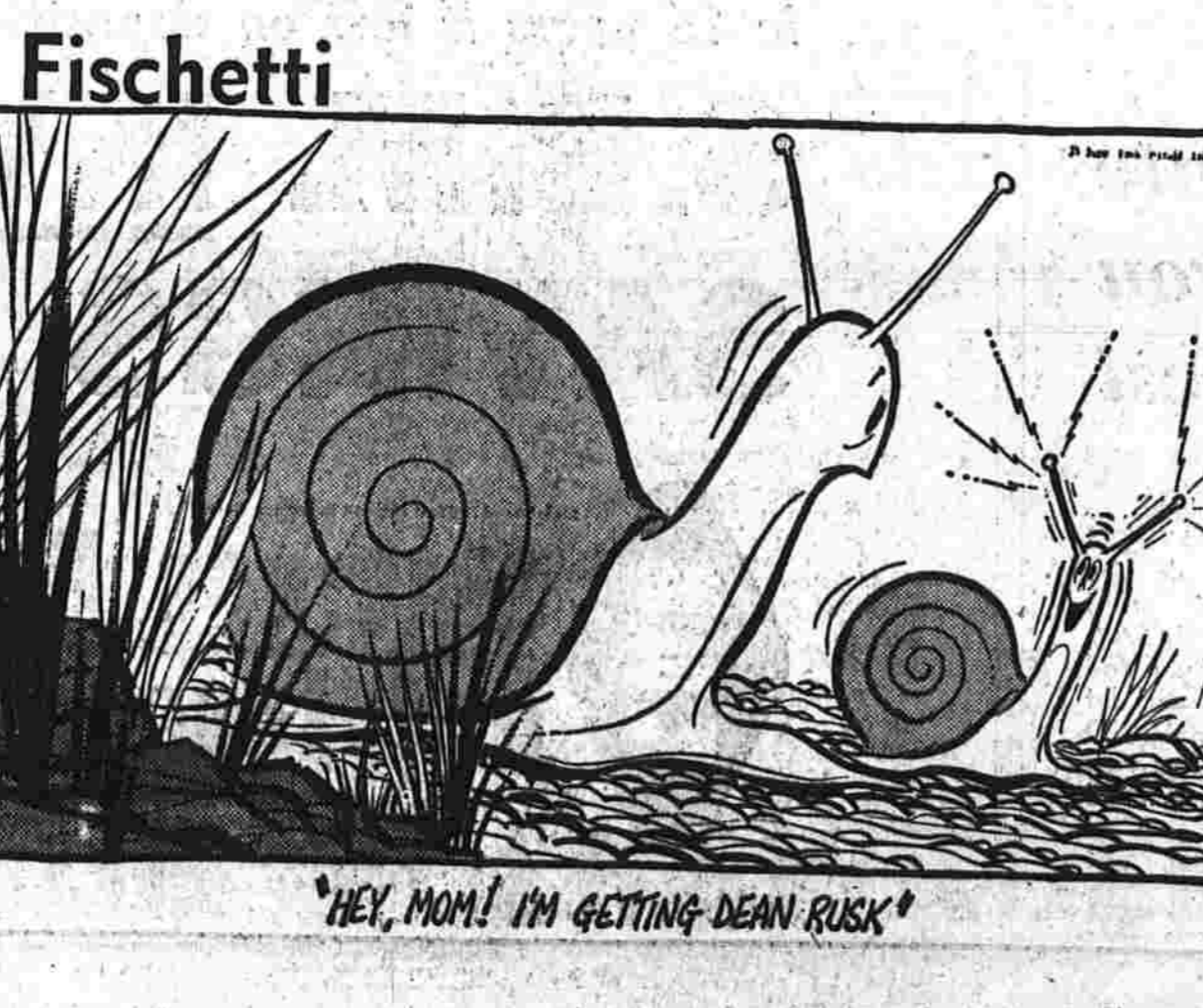

Klan Trial May Hear FBI 'Spy'

was shutting demonstrators from Montgomery to Selma for the civil rights march last night when she was killed.

The Klansmen on trial are Col. Leroy Wilkins Jr., 32, of Fairfield, Ala., and Eugene Thomas, 42, and William Grville Eaton, 41, both of Bessemer, Ala. They are defended by former Mayor Art Hanes of Birmingham.

The federal indictment — which carries a maximum of 10 years in prison and a fine of \$5,000 — does not mention the name of Mrs. Luzzo, wife of Anthony Luzzo, a "Klanster" Union official.

A preview of Rowe's probable testimony came when FBI agent Neil Shanahan of Birmingham told his conversation with the informant only hours after Mrs. Luzzo's death.

The Klansmen sat impassively as Shanahan told of the FBI and Rowe beginning the night's activity when "Gene" Thomas suggested they skin some heads.

Bundy's Departure to End White House Staff Shuffle

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP) — The expected departure of George Bundy as President Johnson's top aide on foreign policy would complete a major revamping of the White House staff.

Bundy, the brilliant but often irascible presidential assistant for national security affairs, has been offered the presidency of the Ford Foundation at about \$70,000 a year — more than double his \$35,500 White House salary.

The best guessing here and in Washington is that the former Harvard University dean, brought to the White House in 1961 by President John F. Kennedy, will take the job.

Bundy's job as a presidential assistant has been downgraded under Johnson. And it now seems apparent that the assignment as secretary of state, which he apparently would relinquish, is firmly in the grasp of Dean Rusk.

Should Bundy resign — and there has been no evidence that Johnson is resisting such a move — it would mark the end of a subtle, two-year-long reorganization of the White House staff along Johnsonian lines.

Kennedy, much like Dwight D. Eisenhower before him, thought of staff aides as specialists. Johnson, more the free-wheeling, likes to tag particular aides to particular chores without consulting organizational charts.

Instead of viewing the office of the president as a rather formal piece of machinery, Johnson gradually has personalized it into his own kind of machine. As one observer phrased it, "he runs the presidency like a teamster drives horses."

Thus Bill D. Moyers, current press secretary, has been chief of staff for preparing legislation and, wearing still another hat, has assumed many of the administrative functions once presided by Walter Jenkins, who resigned at President Johnson's request in October 1964 after a morals scrape with the law.

There has been much speculation that Moyers would succeed Bundy should Bundy leave. However, because the Bundy job as it existed under Kennedy has been changed so drastically that it gradually, there is reason to believe any Moyers move into that area would mean he would have another hat on his youthful head.

Johnson apparently has made no final decisions about Bundy's status or a possible replacement. Some sources inside the White House believe that if Bundy does leave, his assignment would go to one of his deputies, perhaps with Moyers exercising general supervision as he does over much else that goes on in the presidential office.

From Bundy's own viewpoint things are much different than under Kennedy when he ran a "little State Department" in the White House basement.

Kennedy, distrustful of the State Department bureaucracy, used Bundy's shop as a buffer — and as a source of viewpoints that he felt, might not otherwise come to his attention.

Johnson has displayed no such distrust of the Cabinet departments. Indeed, he has expressed a preference for dealing directly with top Cabinet officers, feeling each should be the paramount expert in his assigned field.

Unlike Kennedy, he does not pick up the phone and call desk officers at State or Defense. He calls Rusk or Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara.

Northeast Crime Rate Rises 6%

WASHINGTON (AP) — New England crime statistics for the first nine months of 1965 show a sharp increase in murder and kidnapping in Boston.

Figures issued today by J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, show the general crime trend in the Northeastern states up 6 per cent, second only to 11 per cent in the Western States.

Nationally, the crime index for the period was up 8 per cent over the same period in 1964.

The F.B.I. report gave the following information on New England cities of more than 100,000 population: with 1964 figures rounded off:

Boston—Murder and non-negligent manslaughter, up from 3,441 to 3,577; larceny \$50 and over, up from 1,171 to 1,918; auto theft, up from 1,141 to 9,220.

Waterbury, Conn.—murder and non-negligent manslaughter, down from 3 to 0; forcible rape, down from 4 to 1; robbery, up from 20 to 21; aggravated assault, up from 46 to 47; burglary, breaking or entering, down from 822 to 481; larceny \$50 and over, down from 316 to 271; auto theft, down from 507 to 307.

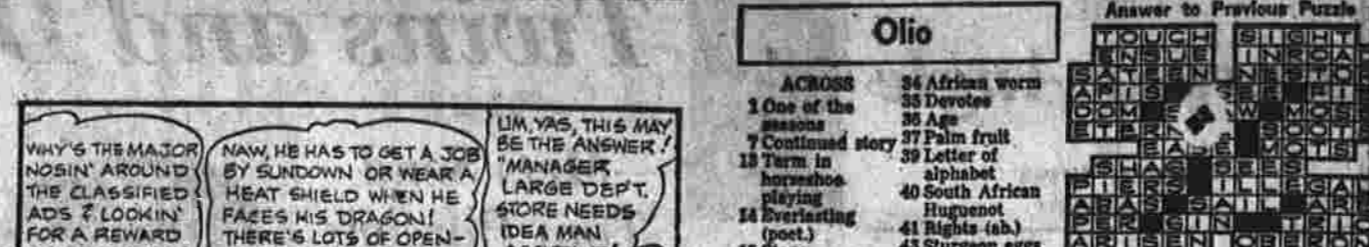
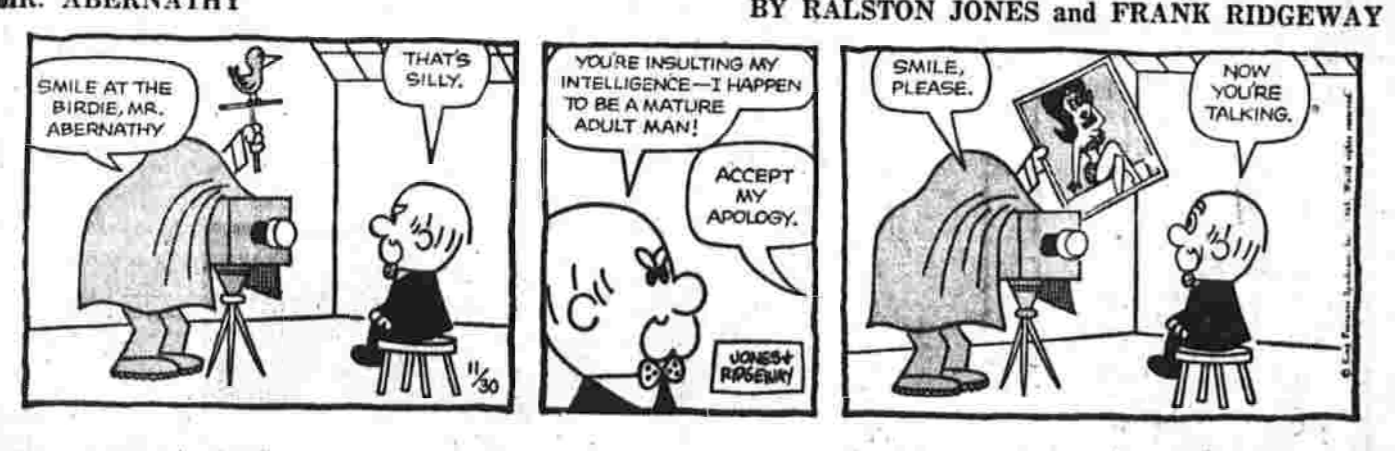
