U.S. Laborers Reap Harvests

1965 'Grapes of Wrath' Come from Big Farmers

WASHINGTON (AP)—This was the year "The Grapes of Wrath" revisited American agriculture. Unlike John Steinbeck's 1939 novel about the tragic plight of the U.S. migrant worker, most of the 1965 wrath descended on the head of Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz, who was carrying out a policy laid down by Congress. Also in contrast with 1939, the welcome mat was out in 1965 for American migrant harvesters. This year, when Wirtz forced big farm interests to slash their imports of foreign farm laborers from 20,000 to 27,000, the American workers never had it so good. And his future looks even better as growers woo him with better wages, housing and working conditions to replace the flood of Mexicans, British West Indians and other foreigners who used to pour in to harvest the nation's crops. The wrath came from big agricultural interests and their spokesmen in Congress, whose protests could be heard all the way from the tomato fields to the White House. "Tremendous" crop losses due to labor shortages were reported by Ruth Wedgeworth, wrenched his program to switch from foreign to domestic workers. "Disaster," cried Sen. George Murphy, R-Calif., chief spokesman in Washington for California's farm interests. The Labor Department denied any crop losses due to labor shortages. "We got the crops in with fewer workers than ever be-

fore," said a department spokesman. And prices actually declined despite higher labor costs, he added. Steinbeck's fictional 1939 farm migrant charged from state to state in a rattlesnake jumpy, barely earning enough to feed his carload of hungry children. But in 1965, U.S. workers averaged about \$2.26 per hour in the fields, and in some cases as high as \$3.50 where piece rates are paid. Mexican braceros last year averaged only \$1.37. Many growers argued that Americans would not stoop to the backbreaking labor of harvesting such crops as lettuce, tomatoes, strawberries, potatoes—and the grapes of Steinbeck's novel title. But Wirtz, pushing an all-out drive to recruit U.S. farm workers, was equally adamant in his argument that Americans would do the work if they are paid enough. Although Wirtz authorized some foreign workers in emergency situations this year, he generally held fast against pressure to reopen the gates wide to foreign laborers. In one such case, Wirtz authorized several thousand foreign workers to prevent a proposed agri-disaster that might have almost \$11 million more than 1964 crop although 27,000 fewer acres were planted," a Labor Department report said. Although labor costs went up from \$9 to \$15 a ton for tomatoes, retail prices increased no more than a penny a can, it said. Many farmers turned to mechanical equipment, but even so a September price check showed retail prices down for

grapes, apples, oranges, peaches, celery and peppers compared with last year. There were increases for strawberries, onions, asparagus and mushrooms, the Labor Department said. The Council of California Growers, reporting multimillion-dollar losses in tomatoes, blamed Wirtz even though he finally authorized bringing in some of the nation's biggest farm employers to discuss their labor problems. "In perhaps the underestimation of the year," Wirtz said. "Our experience this year in the rapidly changing farm labor situation has shown a need for better communication between the nation's farm employers and the Department of Labor." But, the Labor Department said any delay in the arrival of the Mexicans was due to the time it took the growers to work out a deal with the Mexican government. While trouble spots remain, particularly in Florida, sugar cane, Wirtz believes he has proved his point that American crops can be harvested largely by American workers at decent wages. The Labor Department has made clear it will try to eliminate the use of foreign labor altogether if it can. While Wirtz has borne the brunt of the attack from farm interests, Congress started it all last Dec. 31 by allowing the Mexican labor import law to expire after 14 years. All foreign workers now must keep it pointed at the sun. WASHINGTON (AP)—The space agency has shut down one of its most widely traveled satellites—the sun-seeking OGO-2, which made 4,100 orbits around the earth. Equipped to gather data about the sun, the OGO-2 relayed 2.2 million bits of information back to earth on each orbit. who who is now Vice President of the United States found himself with some public time, and used it to go back to a theme with which he used to be identified when he was much younger and perhaps more adventurous in some of his public attitudes. Vice President Hubert Humphrey, addressing the White House Conference on International Cooperation, presented once more one of the convictions of his past—the conviction that the United Nations should be created for itself a permanent peace force, so that it could respond to armed violence instantly. The Vice President is about as high an American office as has yet shown itself in advocacy of the transformation of the United Nations into something of a limited world government, with jurisdiction and equipment and the power and authority to enforce a world law against aggression.

Having such a proposition find its way into the words of a Vice President diminishes hardly at all the distance still left to go. Some time or other, as the proposition grows more urgent, great and powerful nations, their own are going to have to face up to the ultimate decision, which will be whether they are ever going to be willing to allow a limited world government to have more military power than any individual nation or combination of nations. But the question will have to be asked some day, and answered, and if it is not, in time, answered, yes then that means this world is succeeding from its own evolutionary processes and deliberately choosing a complete rebirth of barbarism and anarchy and chaos.

But there, the other day, was the Vice President breaking the surface of our usual refusal even to look at the crucial and ultimate question of times, and showing himself, briefly and still hesitantly, on the side of the angels. In that moment he too may have been speaking the words of a quiet desperation how far off such a formula may be, but who knows, also, that it represents the one sensible hope they have.

Sometimes we think, and hope, that underneath the bearded surface state of our refusal there is a continuing activity and movement of rational thought which is carrying the mind and consciousness of civilization forward in the quietest of ways. The evolution they to continued life on this earth would have to be. And when, now and then, somebody like a Truman or a Humphrey breaks through the surface with a wifeful, timid signal in that right direction, we think there is a muted, under-the-surface, quiet chorus of approval which might, some day, decide to break the surface, and roar itself forward in a consensus which would sound even that master of words and phrases, and other civilized luxuries and conveniences designed to make travel seem a pleasure rather than a hardship. They would even be carried without normal train-stay away and tug around curves. The trains are described by United Aircraft, an industry whose management is not given to claims and descriptions it can't back up, "stronger, lighter, faster, quieter, smoother, more reliable than conventional trains and cheaper to run."

NEW YORK, Dec. 1—Great changes are taking place in the American labor movement. First, Phil Carey of the Electrical Workers was voted out. Then I. W. Abel came along to replace David McDonald as head of the Steelworkers. Now there are men all over ready to replace Jimmy Hoffa as head of the Teamsters, even Walter Reuther has opponents and this week in New York a new union, the beginning of what could become powerful opposition to Peter T. Schoonman, general president of the Steamfitters.

On Saturday, members of Steamfitters' Local 681 elect five delegates to attend the State Steamfitters Convention in Albany next year. Experts say that one of the five who will be elected is Harry Day. The delegates' position is quite important and could lead to many things. Day's ambition is to get right to the general president's office in Washington.

Harry Day has both the time and the desire to run for office because he has not worked on a job as a steamfitter for so long now that it is doubtful whether he can get up in the morning anymore. When his big, jutting, stilling heating and air-conditioning pipes on the new Ravenswood powerhouses ran out a few months ago, Harry Day, the grandstand at Aqueduct race track and has not been on a job since.

"What reason could the guy have to run for office when he doesn't even go to work on a job as a steamfitter?" opponent Edward Goode demanded at a recent meeting.

"I need the job," Harry Day answered. "Anybody who knows Harry laughed when they heard this. WASHINGTON—Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York, angling hard for a third term, has privately proposed a special, high-level political office to reduce friction between Albany and Mayor-elect John V. Lindsay in New York City. Lindsay's spectacular election as Mayor marks the first time in modern political history that New York's Governor and New York City's Mayor have both been Republicans. What worries Rockefeller, and properly so, is the possibility of a cold war of politics between Albany and Manhattan that might seriously damage the Republican party—and Rockefeller's own prospects for a third term.

One prospect for the job was Robert Price, Lindsay's campaign manager and closest political intimate. But Price now has been appointed one of Lindsay's Deputy Mayors. Besides, Price secretly has encouraged speculation lately that Javits might in the end agree to run against Rockefeller for the Republican nomination for Governor.

With Price ineligible for the role of peacemaker and confidential agent between the Rockefeller and Lindsay camps, Rockefeller is looking elsewhere—but not even Rockefeller's most intimate political allies are saying where. What is known is that Rockefeller wants the widest possible participation in his plan. His target date for setting up the new office is sometime before the new year.

The leaves only the question of whether Lindsay will go along with the Rockefeller idea does not create serious problems for him. With a Democratic City Council President and a Democratic City Comptroller in New York City, Lindsay feels he cannot identify himself closely with Rockefeller's Republican administration.

In short, Lindsay might find it politically expedient to keep at arm's length away from Rockefeller. He then would have the escape hatch of blaming Albany and the divided legislature (Republican Senate, Democratic Assembly) for any failures he may have as Mayor of New York. He could blame the state for not providing financial aid to the city, and for policies that would hamper his city administration.

Despite these questions about Lindsay, however, the odds are a great deal better than they were that Rockefeller will get his consent-plus Javits's consent—for his all-secret proposal. The reason: If a high-level intermediary is not available to grease the ways between Albany and Manhattan, events may escalate and bring Lindsay and Rockefeller to open political warfare. Given the high odds today that Rockefeller cannot be displaced as a third-term candidate under any conditions, a Lindsay-Rockefeller struggle could have grave repercussions on the whole Republican party in next year's election. Whatever their differences, both the Governor and the Mayor want to prevent that.

Subramanian said because of the shortage of foreign exchange, India cannot buy food abroad but he hopes "stable" arrangements can be made for wheat imports. This was a veiled reference to Washington's refusal to sign a long-term wheat agreement.

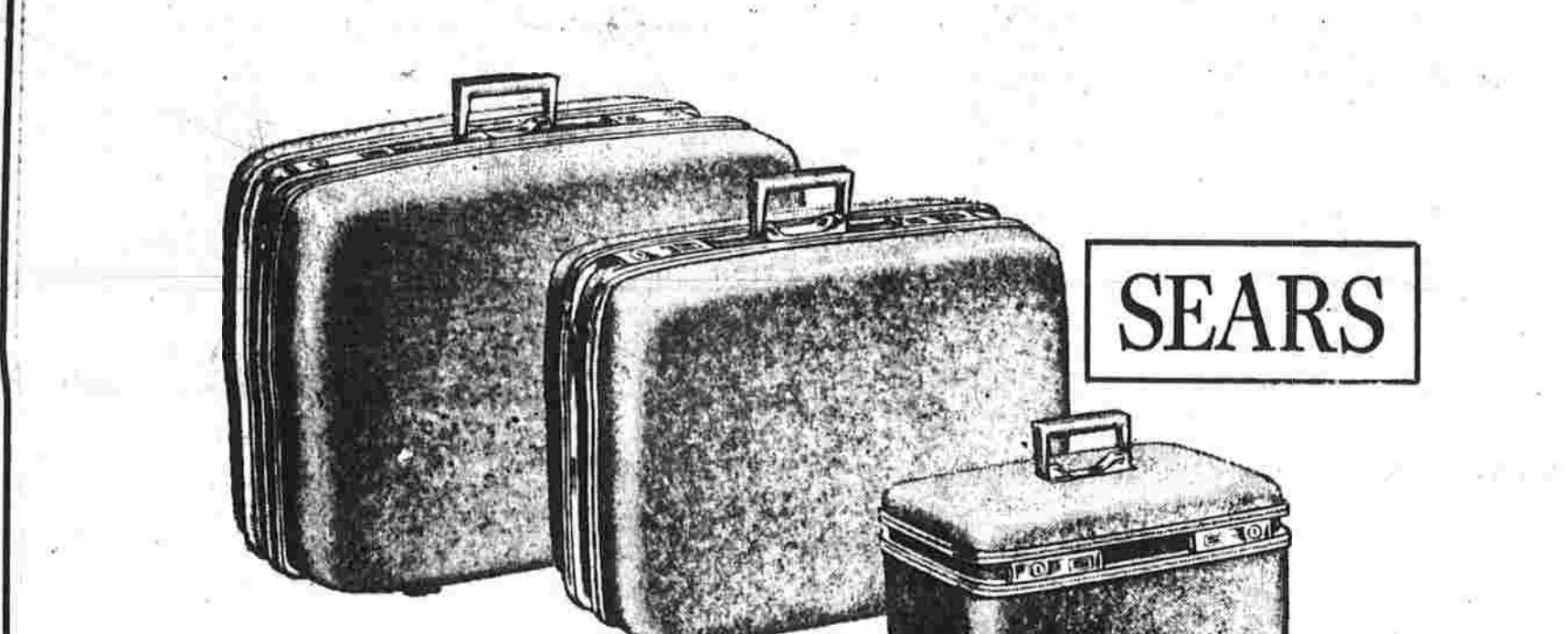

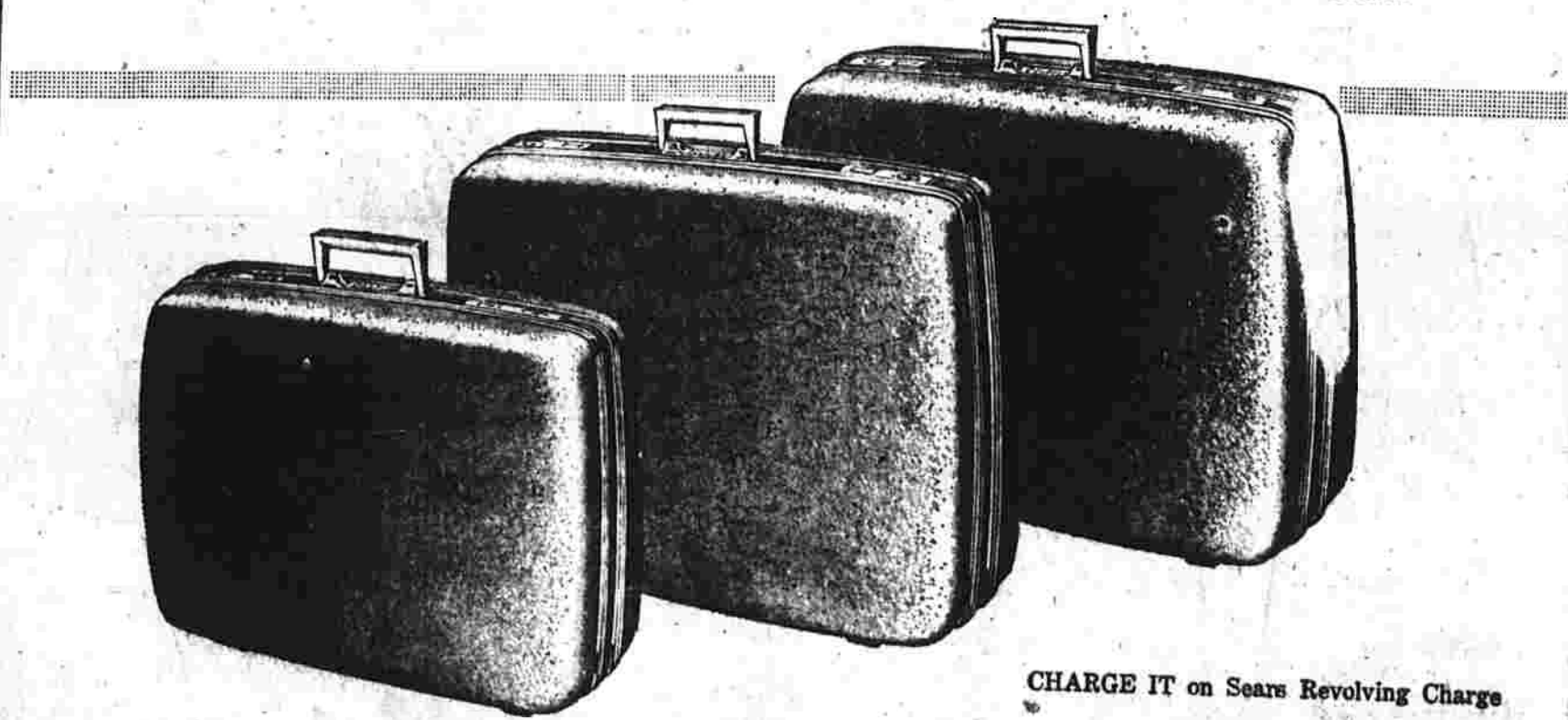

# GM Eases Grip On Bus Market

WASHINGTON (AP) — General Motors Corp. has agreed to loosen its control in the manufacture and sale of buses.

The Justice Department says the company now handles 86 per cent of the nation's intercity and transit buses.

The company government agreement reached Tuesday ended an antitrust hassle which began in mid-1964 when the government accused GM of conspiring with four bus operating companies to monopolize the bus market.

The case had been kept from trial for 1½ years because of legal maneuvers. It was scheduled to open later this month.

The settlement was filed in U. S. District Court in Detroit, but announced in Washington by Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach.

Among the provisions: GM will allow other manufacturers to use all of its current bus patents without royalty payments.

On patents developed in the next five years, GM will charge no royalties during the first five years of their use.

All bus patents developed by GM in the next 10 years will be made available to competitors.

The agreement also gives the federal government authority to seek divestiture of some GM bus properties under certain conditions.

Those would include a substantial expansion of the bus market during the next 10 years or the disappearance of a major competitor and the failure of a successor to appear.

The other stipulations: General Motors will sell its buses to all comers without discrimination; open its financing facilities to bus buyers even though they may be purchasing a competitor's product; and make available its engines, transmissions and parts to other bus manufacturers.

The antitrust suit had charged General Motors with conspiring with the Hertz Corp. of New York; Greyhound Corp. and National City Lines Inc. of Chicago; and Public Service Coordinated Transport Co. of Newark, N.J.

Included in the allegations was one that said GM agreed to sell buses to Greyhound at lower prices than to other customers, and that GM would not sell to Greyhound competitors without special consent.

In return, the government must said, Greyhound agreed to buy at least 75 per cent of its buses from GM.

The complaint said the GM-Greyhound pact lasted from 1962 to 1963 and that "in this time GM and Greyhound each became the largest and strongest competitor in its field."

In Detroit, General Motors Board Chairman Frederic G.

Donner said the lawsuit related primarily to events which had occurred many years before the filing of the suit in 1964.

BERLIN (AP) — West Berlin's eight daily newspapers called on the city's people today to send special Christmas messages to American families who have lost sons in the Viet Nam war.

The papers said West Berliners should send the bereaved Americans models of the city's Freedom Bell to express West Berlin's sympathy with the United States.

The papers also called for donations to buy medical supplies for the people of South Viet Nam.

Law Eased LONDON (AP) — A bill to ease Britain's abortion law cleared the House of Lords Tuesday night and was sent to the House of Commons. The vote was 67 to 8.

The bill would legalize abortion when the expectant mother's physical or mental health is endangered, if there is danger of the baby being badly deformed, if pregnancy is the result of criminal rape, or if social conditions make it unfeasible for the mother to assume responsibility for the child.

Lord Bilson, a Labor peer who introduced the bill, said there are at least 100,000 illegal abortions in Britain every year.

Good Forecast LONDON (AP) — A private economic study forecast predicted that Britain's foreign trade balance will be in the black by the end of next year for the first time since 1962.

The National Institute of Economic and Social Research, an independent nonprofit group, said in its quarterly economic review that the nation's foreign trade would end 1966 "just on the wrong side" of a favorable balance.

It noted that a sharp rise in exports during the third quarter of 1965 brought the deficit down to \$128 million.

The institute told the government it may not be as easy as expected to repay by 1970 the \$2.5 billion borrowed last year to shore up the British pound. Britain had a record trade deficit of nearly \$2 billion last year.

QUAKERTOWN, Pa. (AP) — A fire wrecked a wooden house three miles west of this southern Pennsylvania community Tuesday night killing six children.

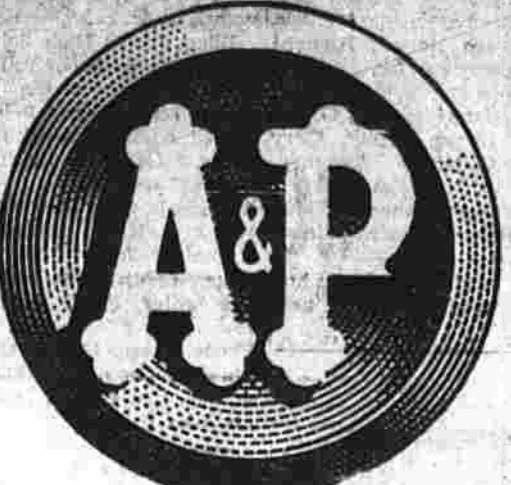
A seventh child was hospitalized with burns. The fire broke out when fire wrecked the home of Chester Allen Jr. in the sub-freezing cold.

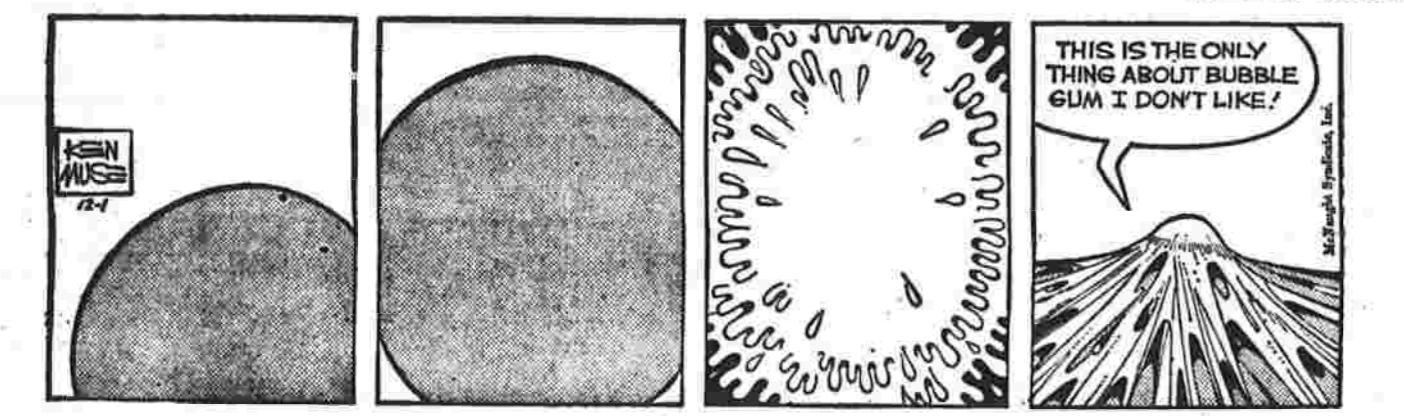

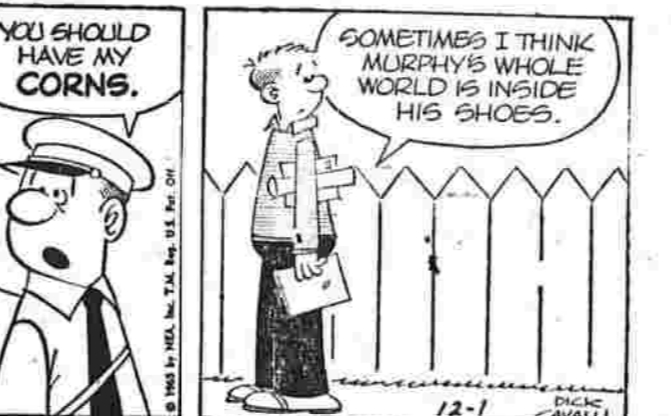
