Runoff Necessary

Rebuffed DeGaulle Maintains Silence

PARIS (AP) — President Charles de Gaulle maintained silence today after French voters handed a stinging rebuff to his bid for first-round victory in the presidential election.

With a record turnout of 84.9 per cent of the voters, De Gaulle polled only 43.96 per cent of the vote in the first round of voting Sunday. This forced him into a run-off Dec. 19 with left-winger Francois Mitterrand, the No. 2 man in the six-man race.

Some Gaullist officials had predicted before the election that if De Gaulle did not get the massive endorsement he wanted, he would refuse to run in the second round. Other officials differed.

"The general is a fighter," said one supporter, "and he will not abandon the combat now."

A second-round victory was considered in the bag for De Gaulle if he runs. Although his image was bruised by the outcome Sunday, it is not likely that he will change his attitudes and ways.

In department after department where he had shown strength in other electoral tests, De Gaulle polled less than 50 per cent of the votes.

His pride must have suffered additionally from the knowledge that election of the president by direct vote was the result of a constitutional change he had inaugurated.

Only once before, in 1848, did French voters have a direct say about who would be elected president.

These were the results from nearly 24 million valid ballots in metropolitan France:

Charles de Gaulle 10,504,007 for 43.96 per cent.

Francois Mitterrand 7,655,042 for 32.04 per cent.

Jean Lecanuet 3,770,771 for 15.78 per cent.

Jean-Louis Tixier-Vignancour 1,269,095 for 5.31 per cent.

Pierre Marcellin 414,066 for 1.73 per cent.

Marcel Barbu 278,420 for 1.16 per cent.

Still to be recorded were returns from about 446,000 voters in overseas territories.

The record vote was probably caused by two important factors: It was the first time in more than a century that Frenchmen took part directly in choosing a president. And it was the first presidential campaign where the candidates entered millions of homes via television.

Interest was kept high at the unusual sight and sound of men castigating De Gaulle and his policies.

Mitterrand, 49, got his support from the Communists, the Socialists and some radicals, and his total was not surprising.

However, the man who kept De Gaulle from winning a majority was a new face on the national scene: Jean Lecanuet, a 45-year-old Catholic centrist senator. He hit the European unity theme hard, and his good looks didn't hurt him with women voters.

The charm of one candidate, however, did not tell the whole story of the startling rebuke handed De Gaulle.

Many resent his opposition to political unification of Europe.

School Bus Overtakes, 39 Injured

BETHEL (AP)—A school bus hit a tree, bounced across Plumtrees Avenue and overturned today. Thirty eight pupils and the woman driver were treated for injuries.

The driver, Mrs. Anna Johnson, 40, of Bethel, and three of the more seriously injured youngsters were admitted to Danbury Hospital. The three pupils were reported in good condition. The others were released after treatment.

Some 62 pupils — the majority from Bethel's junior and senior high schools and some from the local elementary school, were aboard the bus.

Police said that the vehicle, after it crossed the road, hit a utility pole, mounted an embankment and flipped upside-down.

Plumtrees Elementary School, a short distance from the crash scene, was converted into a receiving station for about 20 youngsters until the extent of their injuries could be determined.

Gemini 7 Flight Going Smoothly

MANNED SPACE CENTER, Houston, Tex. (AP)—The first "space striptease" by a U.S. astronaut was performed successfully today and James A. Lovell Jr. rode comfortably through space in his long john underwear.

"Jim's all out of his suit and comfortable," command pilot Frank Borman reported to the Cape Kennedy, Fla., tracking station during the 29th orbit of the 14-day Gemini 7 endurance mission.

The experiment, treated humorously by the astronauts in their conversation with ground stations, was important because it was a step toward the time when spacemen on long flights will be able to perform their

duties in a shirtleeve environment rather than in the cumbersome space suits.

As the Gemini 7 spacecraft sped smoothly along in the third day of its two-week marathon, preparations moved ahead at a rapid rate for the attempt by two manned craft to carry out the world's first rendezvous in space.

Paul Haney, the voice of mission control at Houston, reported paid crews were running 14 to 16 hours ahead of schedule in the race to launch astronauts Walter M. Schirra Jr. and Thomas P. Stafford in the Gemini 6 spaceship from Cape Kennedy, Fla.

Freight Only R.R. Called Unprofitable

WASHINGTON (AP)—A New Haven Railroad official testified today that even if the line were modernized as an independent freight-only carrier it still would be an unprofitable operation.

The assessment was by James M. Finch, assistant vice president for planning and research. He was a witness at an Interstate Commerce Commission hearing on the road's petition to discontinue all interstate passenger service.

Last week, an attorney for Manufacturers Hanover Trust Co., New York, a major New Haven bondholder, sought to delay a presentation of Finch's study pending completion of another independent investigation which he said might show a better freight potential for the road.

ICC Commissioner William H. Tucker ruled Finch's testimony could be offered but that cross examination on it would be deferred until Jan. 31. Finch was excused from the stand after his statement was placed in the record.

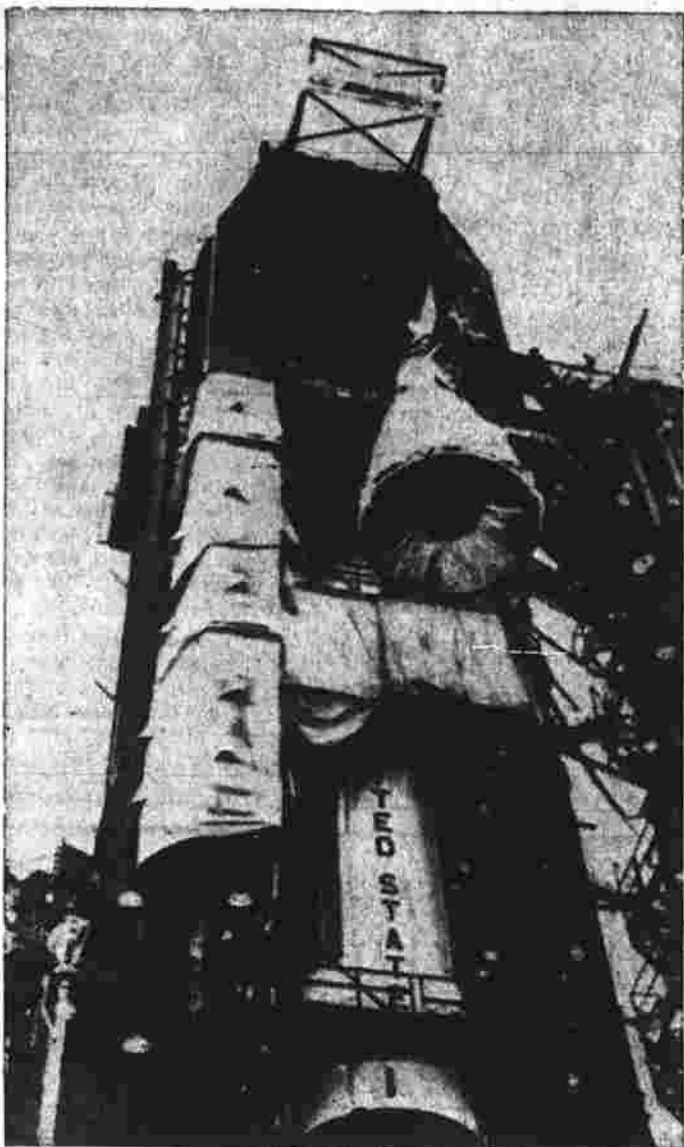

First Hour Exchanges Set Record

WASHINGTON (AP)—Overriding the President's economic policy, the Federal Reserve Board increased rates to their highest level in 35 years today and the Stock Market reacted by plunging.

A total of 3.94 million shares changed hands during the first hour of the New York Stock Exchange was open, the largest total for an opening hour since the exchange began listing hourly transaction figures in 1933.

Some blue chip stocks fell 2 or more points. At the end of

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP)—President Johnson called Chairman William McChesney Martin of the Federal Reserve Board to the LBJ Ranch today to discuss the economic outlook and the board's move — deplored by Johnson — to increase interest rates. Martin and three other top government experts on economic affairs arrived at the ranch from Washington about 11 a.m.

The first half hour, the Dow Jones Industrial average was down 14.9 to 831.12.

Boosting of the interest rates brought an immediate rebuke from the President.

The board announced its decision Sunday night, saying higher rates will help prevent inflation and aid in overcoming the persistent U.S. balance of payments deficit.

It ordered:

An increase in the discount rate from 4 to 4.5 per cent, its highest level since 1950. This is the interest the 12 regional Federal Reserve banks charge on loans made to member commercial banks. Any upward movement generally spreads throughout the entire credit structure — applying to consumers who buy houses, cars and other goods on the installment plan.

An increase in the maximum interest banks may pay on specified time deposits of more than 30 days from 4.5 to 5.5 per cent, its highest level ever. This might tend to attract money from other areas — the stock market, savings and loan associations, for example — into the banks.

The board left unchanged the 4 per cent interest ceiling on regular savings accounts.

The administration is powerless to alter the actions. Although board members are appointed by the President, they compose an independent agency, subordinate to no one.

More Closings

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara today ordered 149 more bases closed, consolidated or substantially reduced. McNamara told a news conference the action, calculated to save \$410 million a year, "will be completed without decreasing military effectiveness or limiting our current and future activities in Southeast Asia." Coupled with 705 previous base closings and cutdowns, ordered since March 1961, the new moves will bring total savings to \$1.5 billion a year, McNamara said. The affected bases are located in 39 states, the District of Columbia and 10 foreign countries.

INTEGRATION ORDERED

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court today ordered immediate integration of public schools in Fort Smith, Ark. The court, in a 5-4 memorandum opinion, took the action without even hearing arguments. "Petitioners" are entitled to an immediate relief, the majority said in an unsigned opinion. "We have emphasized that delays in desegregating public school systems are no longer tolerable."

McConnell Sees Possible Overnight Viet Surrender

DETROIT (AP) — Gen. John P. McConnell, Air Force chief of staff, said today the United States has the military capability of destroying North Viet Nam and forcing its surrender "virtually overnight."

But American policy is to keep the Viet Nam war at the lowest possible level of intensity for humanitarian and political reasons, he said.

In an address prepared for the Detroit Economic Club, McConnell said the strikes by South Vietnamese and American aircraft against targets in North Viet Nam have a dual purpose.

"First," he said, "they are designed to assist our aerial interdiction effort in impeding the flow of supplies and reinforcements to the Viet Cong from the North because that is where the supplies are coming from."

"Second, our only hope of stopping these supplies is to discourage the North Vietnamese from supporting the Viet Cong by making such support too costly to them. This strategy, which is best described as 'strategic persuasion,' gives the President a highly flexible tool in inducing North Viet Nam eventually to accept his offer of unconditional discussions.

"It is true that we could achieve this objective, virtually overnight, by destroying North Viet Nam and forcing its surrender. We certainly have the military capability to do so.

"But President Johnson has emphasized that it is our national policy to keep this conflict as well as for political reasons.

"As both our commander in chief and head of our government, he has the final decision on the exact level and scope of our bombing effort in North Viet Nam, and that decisions must be guided not only by military considerations and recommendations but by many other and possibly more compelling factors."

Work Completed

Council Ratifies Problem Schema

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican Ecumenical Council gave a decisive vote of approval today to its final schema, on modern world problems.

Pope Paul VI promptly accepted the document although an unusually large number of prelates voted against its blanket condemnation of nuclear warfare.

The fiercely contested schema emerged from the voting with

the largest bloc of opposition votes of any of the council's decrees — 251. Council spokesmen said 2,111 prelates voted for it.

Spokesmen said the chapter on war and peace containing the condemnation of nuclear warfare had been opposed by 483 council fathers in earlier voting by sections. The chapter got 1,710 favorable votes, well above the required two-thirds majority but relatively low as council votes have gone.

Many American prelates opposed the ban-the-bomb tone in the section.

Council spokesmen said Archbishop Enrico Felici, the council secretary-general, immediately phoned Pope Paul to inform him of the votes.

The American prelates had hoped to obtain enough votes to get the Pope to shelve the nuclear warfare section even if it were approved. But Archbishop Felici announced after the phone call that Pope Paul had approved the entire document.

Council spokesmen said another key section of the document, urging further birth control studies and suggesting Roman Catholicism's ban on contraception may not be final, was approved by a vote of 2,047 to 155 in the section vote.

The vote in St. Peter's Basilica completed the work of the three-year-old council. The schema and three others will be proclaimed at a public session in St. Peter's Basilica Tuesday and the council will come to a ceremonial end Wednesday.

While the size of the dissenting vote was impressive, it was far short of the 700 that would have been needed to block the section.

Holy Office In Vatican Is Revised

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul VI today ordered a broad revision of the Vatican's Holy Office and said Roman Catholics brought before it must have the right of defense.

The Pope's action, launching a long-promised reorganization of the Vatican Curia, or central Church administration, brought the biggest changes to the Holy Office since it emerged from the Inquisition in 1542.

It had been the foremost of the congregations, or agencies, at the Vatican and had the title of "Supreme Sacred Congregation of the Holy Office."

Pope Paul today brought it down to the same level with the other congregations, deleting the word "supreme" and giving it a new title:

"The Sacred Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith."

The dropping of the name "Holy Office" — dating from the 14th century Protestant Reformation — was viewed as a Christian unity gesture toward Protestants.

Pope Paul issued his new sta-

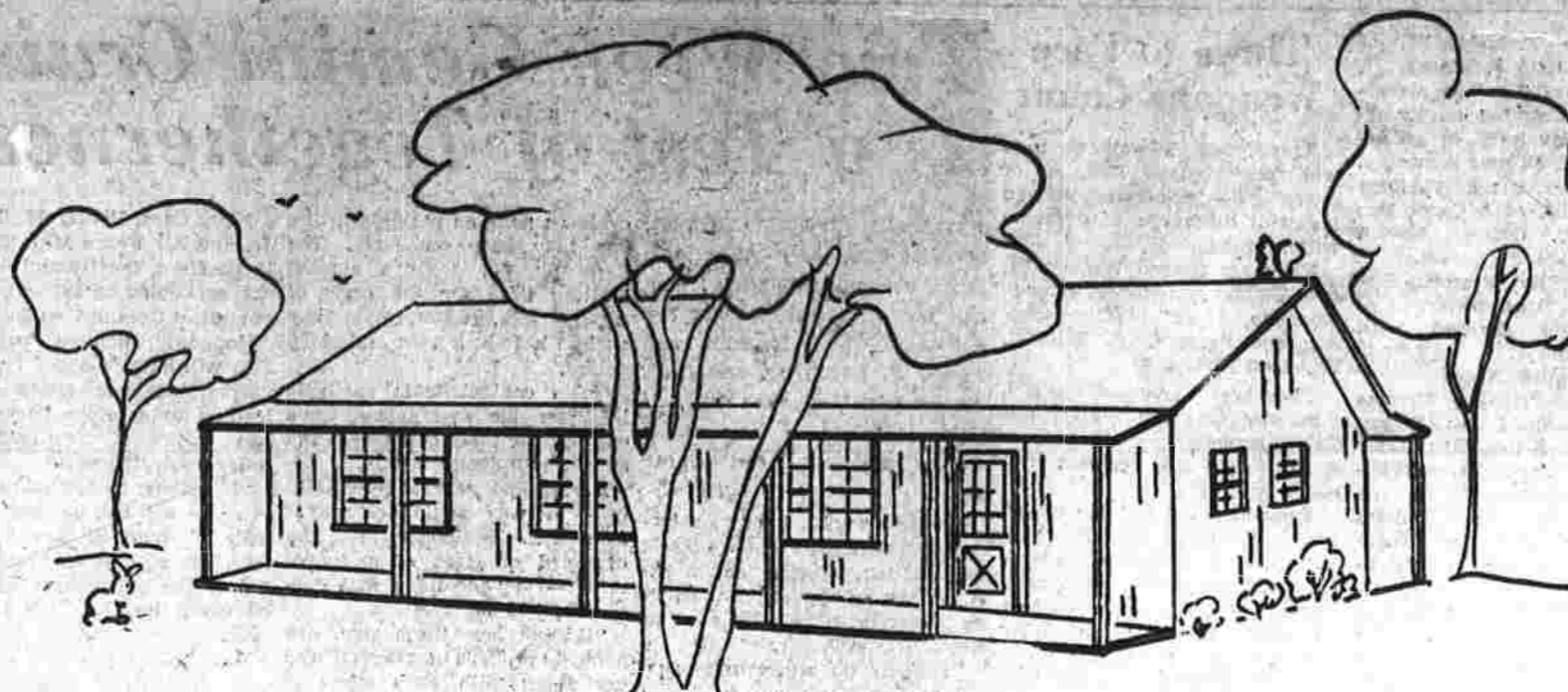

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Vernon Elinger to Ask Board To Create Fiscal Post

The Board of Representatives will be asked tonight to consider taking steps to separate the post of director of administration from that of purchasing agent and finance officer.

In a letter to Mayor Thomas McCusker, Jay Elinger, director of administration, asks the separation of duties and points out that, as a result of the combination of jobs, he administers the budget, determines the availability of funds for each department, and determines when the materials and services have been received and the bills eligible for payment.

Elinger says the end product of the process is that he authorizes the payment and actually signs each check that is processed. Treasurer Robert Fleming continues on the basis of his certification.

"I think it is important for you and the members of the board to realize that this is considered to be acceptable and desirable practice," Elinger writes to the Mayor. He says it violates the traditional concepts of checks and balances in Municipal Finance.

The director further says there is more than enough work for him as director and more than enough for a full-time purchasing and procurement agent.

A statutory revision commission is working on the town charter and will soon propose changes to the board.

The board of representatives will also be asked by Mr. Elinger to waive bids for Christmas lighting of the town. Negotiations have been made by the Rockville Area Chamber of Commerce and the recreation commission to install the Christmas lights without putting the job out to bid.

Elinger points out that, while the chamber may not have been aware of the town's purchasing procedures, he felt the recreation commission was, under the purchase system, the purchasing agent.

Also to be discussed at tonight's meeting is a bill from Robert J. Fie and Co., auditors. The bill for \$7,000 is for a special audit undertaken on request of the State Tax Department after a shortage of \$1,621.19 was found in the books of the tax collector of the now defunct city of Rockville.

Town Counsel Robert Baum had written to the state legislator inquiring whether there is provision in the bond, formerly in force, to pay for all or any part of the audit; he was informed that the bond issue would not cover the cost of the audit.

Police report the men said they thought they were in a gun battle.

The three are summoned to appear in Circuit Court in Manchester.

Don't Deck Halls with Gypsy Moth

Don't deck the halls with gypsy moths, the U.S. Department of Agriculture warned today in its annual reminder to slippers of Christmas trees and other holiday greens.

Christmas greenery in areas under federal quarantine for gypsy moth must be inspected and certified free of gypsy moth eggs before it can be shipped out.

This year, for the first time, parts of New Jersey have been added to the area under regulation. The quarantines also apply to Connecticut, Rhode Island, and Massachusetts, most of New Hampshire and Vermont, and parts of Maine and New York.

Gypsy moth caterpillars each year devour foliage in infested areas and are capable of defoliating entire forests. One or two successive defoliations of a hardwood tree can kill it.

The season for shipping Christmas greens comes right after the egg-laying season for gypsy moths. The fuzzy, half-copper egg clusters adhere to logs and other branches as well as to live trees and shrubs. Once past the quarantine barrier, they could start new gypsy moth infestations anywhere that forest, fruit, and shade trees grow.

Dealers will have little or no delay in getting trees and other greens inspected and certified at loading points. Federal and state plant pest inspectors in the quarantine areas will supply, on request, details about quarantine regulations and inspection schedules at loading points. These inspectors can be contacted by telephone or through post offices, agents of common carriers, county agricultural agents, or foresters.

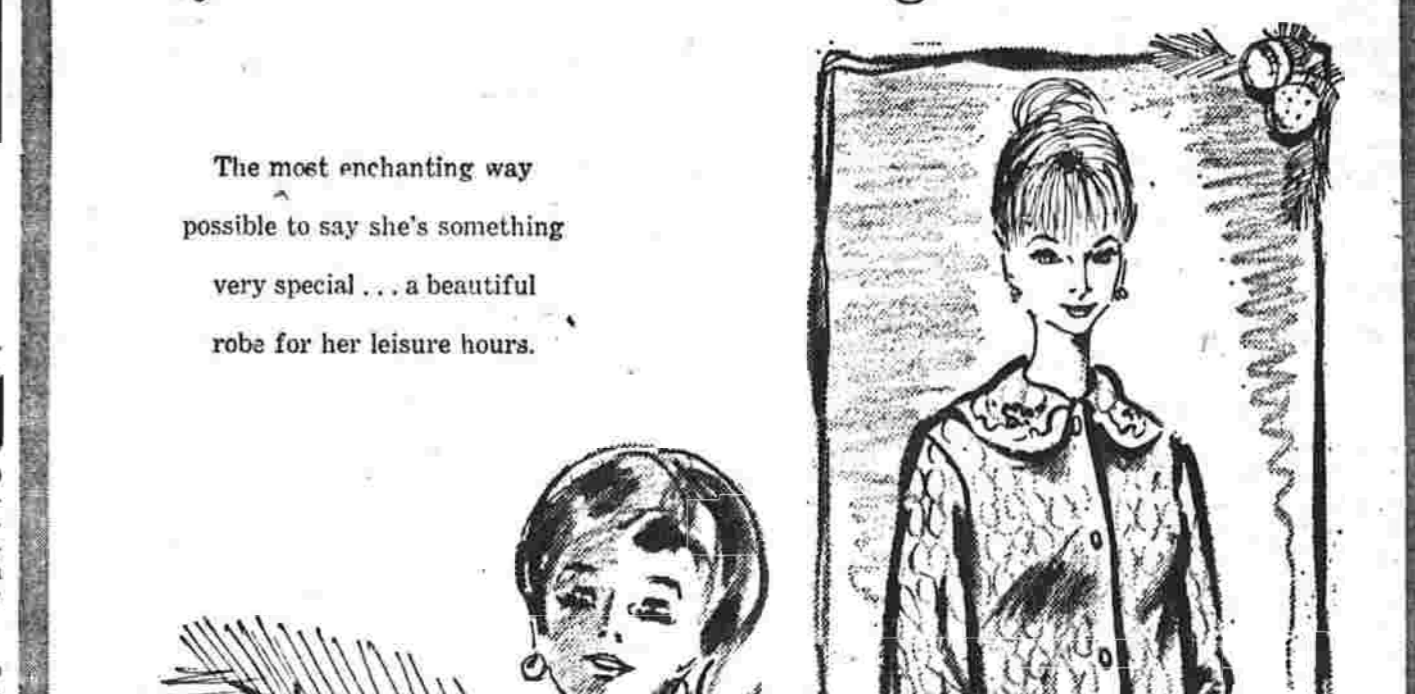

Many Praise Two Fliers' Skill in Landing

Pilot Died in Evacuation Effort

NORTH BALEM, N.Y. (AP) — Eastern Airlines pilot Charles J. White apparently sacrificed his life while helping to evacuate passengers after crash-landing his propeller-driven plane following a collision Saturday with a Trans World Airlines jet.

Three other persons lost their lives and 50 were injured. The two planes carried 312 persons.

Survivors and investigators praised the flying skill of White and the TWA pilot, Capt. Thomas H. Carroll, who guided his craft — minus a 20-foot section of wing — to a safe landing at Kennedy International Airport.

Federal investigators are probing the cause of the crash. The body of Capt. White, 42, a World War II bomber pilot, was found Sunday midway down the runway and charred cabin of his four-engine Constellation.

Standing beside the wreckage, Oscar Zwickler, regional director of the Federal Aviation Agency, said: "I can say it is a miracle that people walked away. He was fighting it all the way down."

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Wilson Repeats Stand Against Rhodesia War

LONDON (AP) — British Prime Minister Harold Wilson today repeated his determination to end the Rhodesian rebellion without bloodshed and re-buffed the Organization of African States.

"The responsibility is ours," Wilson said in an interview with the London Daily Mirror, "and whatever the cost we shall not be pressured into starting a war which we believe to be wrong."

"We have made it clear time and time again that we shall not invade Rhodesia, or get into a military clash on or over Rhodesia with forces controlled by the illegal regime" of Prime Minister Ian Smith.

The OAU warned on Friday that 32 members would break off diplomatic relations with London if Britain did not crush Smith's white minority government by Dec. 15.

Meeting in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, the OAU also agreed in principle to declare war on Rhodesia if Britain failed to meet the OAU deadline.

Britain's Rhodesia policy has avoided direct military threats and emphasized economic and diplomatic sanctions instead. Last week British tightened economic pressure. Rhodesia and stationed Royal Air Force planes in neighboring Zambia to beef up Zambia's air defense.

British officials say the OAU threat, while serious, is weakened by the fact that none of the commonwealth members stand to lose their trading preferences if they break diplomatic relations with Rhodesia by controlling large amounts of economic aid to the African nations.

Wilson told the Mirror's political editor, John Bayan, that his previous mention of a possible "limited operation" against Rhodesia did not mean an armed clash.

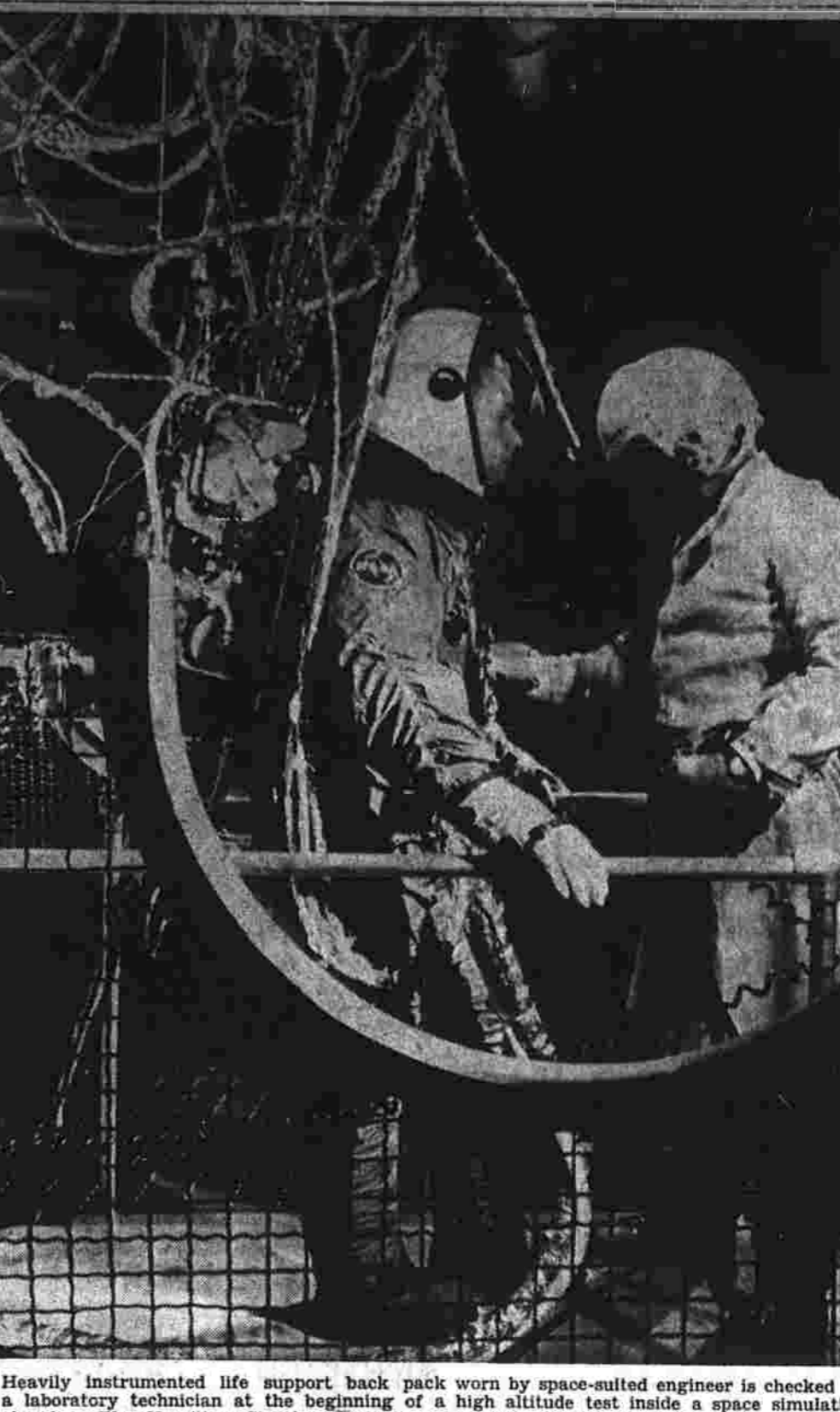

Foster Grandparent Plan MAHRC Plan Seeks Senior Citizen Aid

A program under which some senior citizens could be hired to assist retarded persons has been outlined by the Manchester Association for the Help of Retarded Children (MAHRC) and submitted to the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The plan was drawn up in tentative form by Norman Fendell, president of the MAHRC and a teacher of retardates. The program, if it is approved, would be financed with federal funds by the Office of Economic Opportunity and operated by the MAHRC in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The Foster Grandparent Plan has been described by President Johnson as an effort to tap the resources of the elderly to help others less fortunate and to enable elderly people to find the dignity and usefulness of work done about a third of their normal wages.

In his proposal, Fendell envisions the possibility of having ten senior citizens assigned to the nursery and twelve to the sheltered workshop and rehabilitation center the MAHRC operates at Bunce Center. They would work for two-hour sessions five days a week and receive \$1.25 an hour.

The MAHRC, which is presently for room at Bunce Center with both programs in operation, has asked the town to provide it with about 8,000 feet of space in some quarters, preferably close to Main St., to continue and expand the workshop and rehabilitation center.

The board of directors will discuss the request tomorrow. Fendell, in a letter urging the directors to provide space, suggested the possibility of using some of the room in the former Temple Beth Shalom which the town is now renovating for use chiefly by the senior citizens. He has discussed that prospect briefly with members of the Senior Citizens Club, principally to assure them that the MAHRC does not want the space if it will inconvenience them.

Some of the members he spoke to Fendell said offered their assistance to the MAHRC in its sheltered workshop program, and he feels there is a possibility of accepting their help informally even if his program is not accepted. The Foster Grandparent Plan, which is located where the workshop is located, is now enrolled in the workshop at Bunce Center where

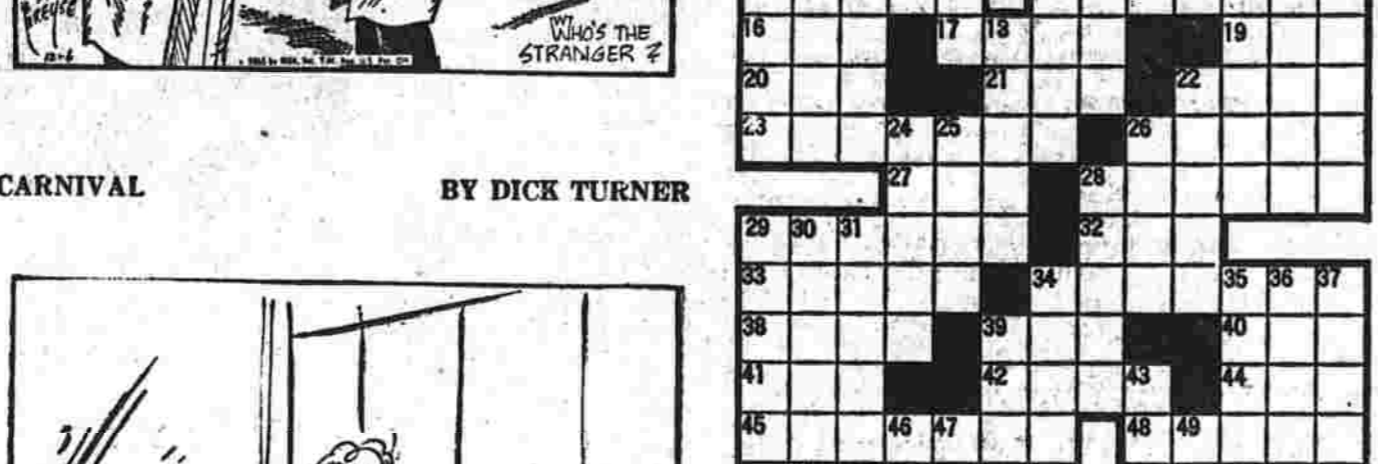

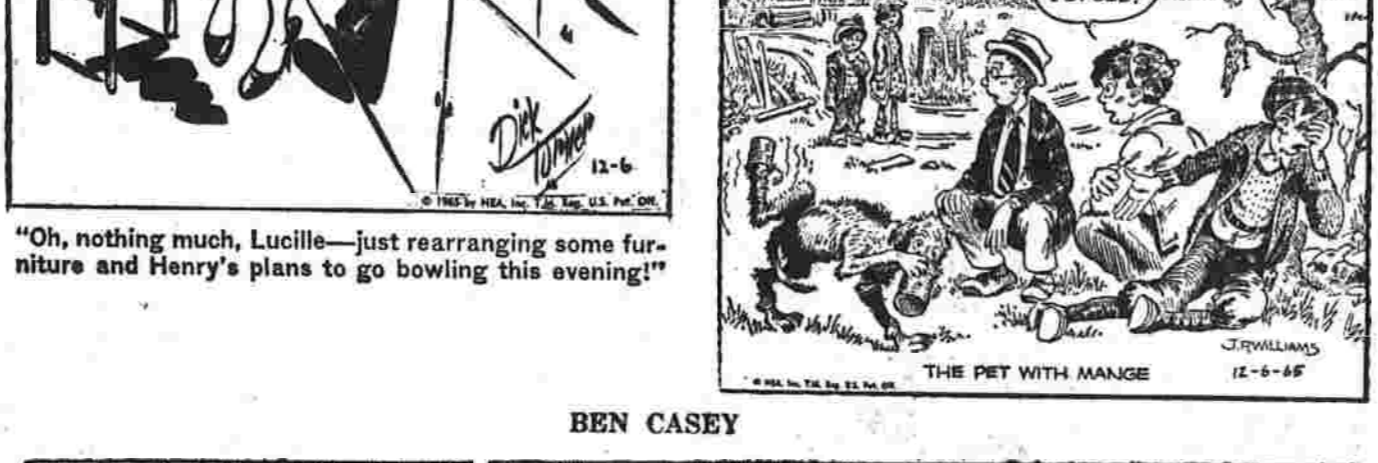

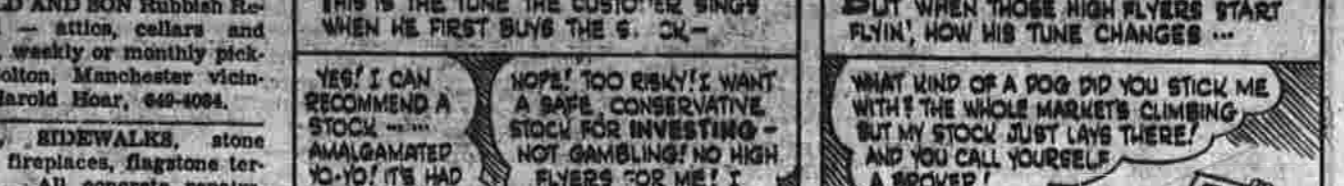
