WASHINGTON (AP) — The New Haven Railroad's completion of a new freight line will be used under cross-examination today at an Interstate Commerce Commission hearing.

State insurance officials had said they hoped the receivership could begin as soon as possible, so that the claims of policyholders can be paid.

U.S. Scientist Is Missing In Amsterdam

AMSTERDAM, THE Netherlands (AP) — Prof. Richard H. Feynman, a leading U.S. physicist, is missing since Saturday from a hotel where he was staying.

Prof. Feynman arrived here Friday night on route to Tehran, Iran, with other scientists.

Prof. Feynman, a member of the American Physical Society, was on his way to attend a conference in Tehran.

Viet War Picture

The Future The Buildup The Present

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. forces probably will use intensive "roving strikes" by helicopter-borne troops against Communist North Vietnamese troops.

Barring a major change in national policy, it is considered highly unlikely that the United States will send troops into Laos to form a fence to cut off the movement of North Vietnamese troops into the country.

President Johnson told newsmen only Monday, "We are going to supply whatever men we need."

This picture emerged from interviews with top sources familiar with the planning in the growing war in Viet Nam.

There is a body of opinion in the military which favors the idea of sending U.S. troops into Laos and thus to try to sever the infiltration lines to which the growing number of North Vietnamese regulars are believed to be moving south.

As one source put it, "It's better to put a bucket under the faucet than to try to mop up the floor."

Within the present policy sources said, the United States is basically fighting a strategic defensive in its efforts to save Vietnam from being completely overrun by the Communists.

The best way to do this, experts said, is to take the tactical offensive — to find the Communists and cut them to pieces.

In mid-November, 60 months later, 160,000 members of the American armed services were in Viet Nam.

Tens of thousands of American fighting men were locked in combat with the Communists.

Officials cite the recent bloody battle in the Ia Drang Valley as an example of the type of combat that can be expected in the future.

The number of American troops running tight, troops dead, as of Nov. 20, stood at 1,000.

The infantrymen captured one enemy trooper who identified himself as a North Vietnamese.

The pace of the air attacks on North Viet Nam today will be stepped up.

A two-seat F4C Phantom jet was hit by ground fire Saturday, apparently killing both crewmen. One ejected but his parachute failed and the other was killed.

The skirmish on the rubber plantation occurred as a 1st Division unit, based in the area, searched for three missing American bodies. They ran into a large Viet Cong group also apparently searching for its dead.

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18 Men, and Now There Are Three

MIEN HOA, Viet Nam — There were 18 good men to start with. Then 17, then 16, then 15.

One by one, they died.

There were a must and a half out of B Company (1st Battalion, the 373rd) left as security while the main force searched the hills for the enemy.

Fifteen good men. Then 14, then 13, then 12.

"I think they are friends," said Spec 4 Jerry Langston of Paducah, Ky. when the group first heard the noise in the thicket.

"Hey, out there," he bellowed, "who the hell's side you on?"



And the helmet was on his head when the hole was made.

Tide In Viet Nam

The reply was bitter and blunt—a bullet. Jerry Langston smashed to the ground.

It blew a two-inch hole in his helmet but, somehow, drew no blood. "Lord," he said to himself, "I'm still alive!" And then there was no more time for congratulations.

From behind every tree, out of every bush, pajama-clad Viet Cong began to peer the area with shot.

A dozen good men now. Then 11, then 10, then nine.

This was the Cong's kind of fight. A smaller band of Americans was cut off from its parent group, out in a jungle clearing with only elephant grass and mounds of animal waste for protection.

The enemy blew scores of eerie bugles, which echoed as brightly as hundreds. They advanced slowly, fired wildly and punctured every inch of soil or skin unfortunate enough to be exposed.

"We ain't got a chance,"

Langston thought, "we're all dead."

These good men now. Then eight, then seven.

"My rifle," somebody shrieked. "It's jammed."

"Throw that man a weapon," a sergeant shouted.

"Please, somebody, anybody—get me a rifle!"

The air was thick with gunfire and the area littered with dead from both sides. A VC had moved too close and was detected from waist up by a grenade launcher. A GI was whumping on the ground, smoke streaming from a neck wound where a white-hot tracer bullet had lodged.

"I can't see anything," a trooper screamed. "My eyes."

"Somebody help that man," but there was no help, no medic, no comfort, no hope.

Seven good men now. Then six, then five.

Three noncoms had taken

over the phone in 15 minutes each after the former had died. One got it in the arm and again in the stomach. The second in the foot, hip and chest. The third in a dozen places.

And still the VC advanced. Herding the dwindling Americans into a small, tight knot of chattering weapons and opening fire.

Langston took over the radio when the last sergeant died. He heard his running willie but could not find the headset, a sergeant shouted.

Five good men now. Then four, then three.

Sheinwold on Bridge

DON'T BE STUBBORN ABOUT YOUR LOSERS

By ALBERT SHEINWOLD

You can usually judge how to play a tennis contest by counting your losers, but don't be stubborn. You can sometimes profit by giving the opponents a trick that doesn't seem to be theirs.

Opening lead—King of clubs. West opened the king of clubs, and South yelped over the fact that he had only one club loser. How happy bridge players can be over the wrong thing!

South rattled the second round of clubs, drew trumps and opened dummy with a spade to lead a diamond. The defenders promptly too their three diamond tricks, and South was down one.

"Never mind," South reassured his partner. "It was a good contract. We were just unlucky."

Not Unhappy

Luck had nothing to do with it. Let's see the contract. If West leads a diamond, South should get to dummy with the ace of spades to ruff a third club. He catches the king of spades and ruffs a spade in dummy. Declarer then leads dummy's last club and discards a low diamond, allowing West to get an "unruffed" club trick. South has lost two club tricks instead of only one, but his contract is safe because West cannot make a side return. If West leads a diamond, South makes a trick with the king; and if West leads anything, dummy ruffs and South discards another diamond.

Daily Question

Partner opens with one heart, and the next player bids three clubs. You hold: Spades, A-3; Hearts, A-8-7; Diamonds, A-3; Clubs, 10-9-8-5.

What do you say?

Answer: Pass. You haven't

HONG KONG (AP) — U.S. Sen. Mike Mansfield and four other senators are in seclusion in Hong Kong drafting a report to President Johnson on the prospects of peace in Viet Nam. The senators have talked about Viet Nam with leaders in Poland, the Soviet Union, Romania, Ceylon and Cambodia.

MEXICO CITY (AP) — A former aide to Leon Trotsky claims that Cuban revolutionary Fidel Castro liquidated his minister of industries, Ernesto Guevara, because Guevara advocated adherence to Peking.

Felipe Alvarez claimed the order to kill Guevara came directly from Moscow. Trotsky was killed by a Soviet-sponsored assassin in Mexico in 1940.

Guevara dropped from view early this year and Castro has maintained he has left Cuba to help revolutionaries elsewhere.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Police used tear gas Monday to subdue an 80-year-old pensioner who went on a shooting spree when he didn't receive his government check.

You Should Know...

Miss Sylvia Clafin

An elementary school teacher who has delighted children for many years with her original stories, poems, songs and operettas is Miss Sylvia Clafin of 300 Henry St.

Accustomed to writing poetry for children, Miss Clafin decided during her first year of teaching in 1927 to have her own presents to her pupils. She planned to compose her own words for the show but to incorporate them into popular songs. She soon learned that a simple admission fee for the operetta was required by copyright laws to receive permission from the composers to use their melodies. Instead of stopping the project, Miss Clafin decided to attempt writing music although she had never done it before. She found, to her surprise, that it came to her very easily when she was inspired.

Although her only formal musical training was in theory and harmony for a short time with Hollis Dunn of Worcester, Mass., Miss Clafin has been the recipient of many honors resulting from her compositions. Many of her works have also appeared in such magazines as "The American Childhood," "Children's Activities," "The Instructor" and "Sack and Hill."

Among them have been the dedication of the Bowers School in 1944 to her, a Grade 5 teacher at the school and letters from the White House and the Peace Corps in 1962.

The Washington letters were sent to Miss Martha White, supervisor of the elementary music department, as a result of a taped message in song and words which was sent there in the spring of 1961 by the 1961 Manchester Youth Choir. Miss White directed the singing of the message which included a "Children's Prayer for Peace," an original composition by Miss Clafin.

One reply to the tape message was from President John F. Kennedy, special assistant to the White House office, who wrote on behalf of President John F. Kennedy, "President Kennedy wants you and those on whose behalf you write to know how pleased he is to learn that you are praying for a just and lasting peace in the world."

Donovan V. McClure of the Peace Corps Public Information Office, wrote, "Both the composition and the recording were most enjoyable and inspirational."

Many of Miss Clafin's compositions are based on a theme that is beneficial to the elementary student. For example, one of her first compositions was a musical comedy entitled "Princess in Populonia." The play's theme revolves around the importance of good health. The Bowers School PTA plans to present this musical comedy again at its March meeting.

A Christmas tradition at Bowers School is the annual presentation of Miss Clafin's operetta, "The Christmas Quest." It has been presented for 16 years, including the year that the U.S. Supreme Court outlawed prayer in the public schools. However, the play has been staged for the two years since the 1963 ruling.

Miss Clafin has also written several musical stories for radio presentation. Among these have been "Chester the Curious Camel," which was broadcast in 1948 on Uncle Ben's Story

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Four, 4,820 Die On Highway In October

CHICAGO (AP)—Traffic accidents killed 4,820 persons in October, the highest toll for any month this year, the National Safety Council said today.

The October figure is a 4 per cent increase over the 4,630 deaths in October 1965, the safety council said, and puts the national total for the first 10 months this year at 47,760—a 3 per cent increase over the 46,000 killed during a comparable period in 1965.

The safety council added, however, that travel is running 4 per cent above 1965 and reached an estimated 736 billion miles for the first 10 months this year, a 3 per cent increase over the same period last year.

TPC Okays Change To Allow Theater

The Town Planning Commission (TPC) last night approved a zone change for property to the south of the Shopping Parkade and postponed action on two other requests, one for a special permit for the erection of apartments on Charter Oak St., the other for a zone change for property off Spence St.

The approval was granted to the Farmlands Exchange Corp. for a change to Business Zone III of an eight-acre parcel off Charter Oak St. in Residence Zone A.

The applicant, in March, was granted a special exception by the Zoning Board of Appeals to construct 78 units in five buildings on the same site. A building permit for that purpose has already been issued by the Town Building Department.

Atty. John Shea, who represented the applicants, told the TPC that a change in the tax-

ing lines for the relocated Rt. 6, plus the acquisition of the Paul Douglas property to the east, has added sufficient land to amend the constructed plans in favor of building 96 apartments, instead of the 78 originally planned. There was no opposition to this request.

The second request was from Louis and Wesley Burns, for a change to Business Zone III of a 1,000 by 600 foot parcel off Spence St., and extending southwest to Bidwell St. The parcel is now in Residence Zone AA and Rural Residence Zone II borders the taking line of the proposed relocated Rt. 6.

Atty. Charles Crockett, who represented the applicants, testified that they have been approached by several potential buyers, who have hinted that they would use the property for business purposes, such as a shopping center or department store.

Alexander Jarvis, who attended last night's hearing, said that if the zone change is approved, he too will request a zone change also to Business Zone III for a parcel which he owns to the east of the Burns property, in the same zone.

The Burns request for a zone change was opposed by three Hartford Rd. residents, whose properties are in Residence Zone AA, adjoining the Burns property. They are Raymond Ames, William Hill and George Cole.

The TPC postponed action on one other request for a zone change, one that had been heard on Nov. 8.

The request was from the 8th District, for a change to Industrial Zone for approximately 16 acres off Hilliard St. and now in Residence Zone A.

The delay was made to permit the TPC and 8th District officials to study a possible reduction to five or six acres for the change, and to explore the possibility of improving an access road which leads to the property.

A newsmen on board, Hank O'Connell of the National Broadcasting Co., reported that planes sitting on the hangar deck over the fire area in the after part of the ship were quickly moved forward. On the deck, pilots rushed to their planes to take off if the fire spread.

Water Storage Rises in Month

Water storage in the town's four reservoirs rose approximately 14.4 million gallons during last month and, on Dec. 1, measured approximately 28.4 million gallons higher than on the corresponding day last year, according to a report issued by Lawrence Wittkofski, superintendent of the town water department.

The total storage, however, is still about 208.4 million gallons below full capacity, and far below the measurements of two years ago.

Wittkofski reported that Porter, Howard, Roaring Brook and Globe Hollow Reservoirs measured 27.7 million gallons on Dec. 1, against a capacity of about 479 million gallons.

Local rainfall, during the month of November measured the monthly average of 3.70 inches.



Approve Question One Democrats Opposed To Question Two

The Democratic Town Committee, by the narrow margin of a tie-breaking vote, went on record last night in opposition to constitutional proposal 2, the eminent domain question.

The vote was 14 to 13, with Democratic Chairman Ted Cummings casting the deciding vote.

In his opinion, he said, "It would be an intolerable burden for the town to prove why one is more favorable than another. Proposed court action would serve as blackmail, and would increase the cost of both questions."

Barry, speaking for endorsement of the eminent domain proposal, said, "We are quick to back liberty and freedom for citizens and yet we talk of denying them their property rights. To me, this is not a political issue but a question of law."

A property owner lawyer can only appeal the assessed payment for his property, but he cannot sue for property rights. Under the proposed change he would be protected against the arbitrary actions of state agencies.

Mortuary challenged a statement by Henry Zicker, who said, "We can't equate property rights with civil rights."

He cautioned the committee, "Let us not, as a local political committee, stick our necks out on this issue."

"Why," he asked, should we try to encourage the thinking of the electorate? We should merely encourage them to vote and must not try to influence them. It is up to our political leaders, including the governor, who has not yet made up his mind, to take a stand—certainly not us."

Cavagnaro disagreed and said, "A political party has a right to lead its property. Under and to lead its party members."

Mahoney spoke of the great victory the town has developed in the Highland Park area to the construction of a Wollay St. ramp from the relocated Rt. 6, and said, "It would not be proper for us to try to influence those people."

Almost every one of the 27 committee members who were present spoke out for approval of the eminent domain proposal and, following the 1966 to recommend a "no" vote. They settled down to a discussion of plans for getting out the vote.

12 Regional Colleges Suggested for State

A plan for a state system of 12 regional community colleges that could cost up to \$50 million within the next decade and as much as \$80 million by 1990 was discussed yesterday by the State Board for Regional Community Colleges.

The scheme, prepared by Paul Orvis, retired executive dean of the New York state community college system who was hired by the board specifically for a study of the state's higher education needs, was presented to the board on Dec. 6.

The board also said that a \$4,000 per pupil cost on capital construction could be assumed but that this figure need not dictate every situation since many schools might be fitted into existing structures and use existing facilities. In fact, Orvis said, it might be practical for any new school to maintain itself in temporary quarters at first to allow costs.

"In this way," he said, "the campus is planned to fit the college and its needs rather than the college being shaped to fit into an already completed physical plant."

Orvis recommended that all 12 colleges be operating by 1971.

Still Long-Shot Chance For Launching Sunday

WASHINGTON (AP) — Astronauts Frank Borman and James A. Lovell Jr. drove the Gemini 7 space ship on today toward a two-week endurance record, while a long-shot chance remained that the rendezvous with Gemini 6 could be attempted a day early. At Cape Kennedy, Fla., a crucial ground rehearsal for the Gemini 6 launch was started shortly after noon, following replacement of a troublesome computer. It took five hours less time to install the new computer than the crew had calculated, and a space agency spokesman said there remained an outside chance Gemini 6 could be launched Sunday, a day earlier than originally planned. If additional troubles develop, Gemini 6 could be launched as late as Friday, Dec. 17, for the chase down and fly-in formation with Gemini 7. The 37-year-old Gemini 7 pilot, Air Force Lt. Col. Borman and Navy Cmdr. Lovell, neared the 15-million mark in their flight and were reported still in healthy moods despite the four days of cramped isolation in space. Their spacecraft continued to work like a charm. They entered their 69th orbit at 11:11 a.m. EST. When the space ship was flying over Houston during the 69th orbit, flight director Christopher C. Kraft Jr. asked Borman and Lovell: "How are you making out after four days in space?"
