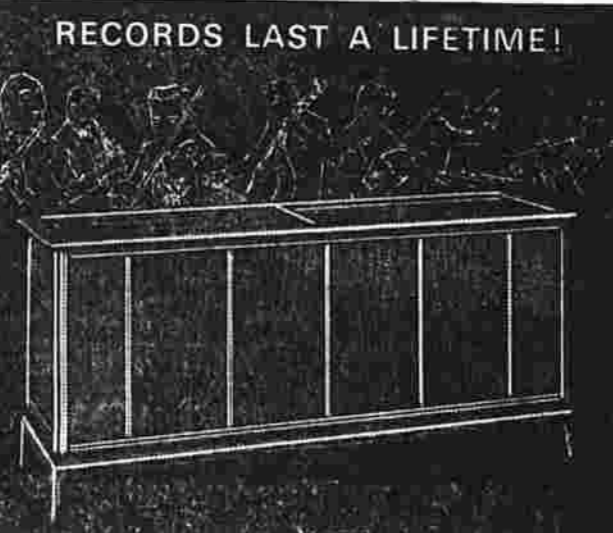

ME Will Pursue Issue Of Unsigned Contracts

The Manchester Education Association yesterday reiterated its resolve to pursue the matter of the approximately 240 unsigned salary agreements as the prime objective in its current contract negotiations with the Board of Education, despite the board's refusal to treat the subject as a negotiable item.

In a unanimous motion, members of the MEA executive committee and building representatives voted to remind the personnel policy committee that the number one item to be negotiated is the solution of the 240 unsigned salary agreements.

In the words of Robin Barstow, MEA representative, the "key to the whole negotiation."

Concern was also expressed at yesterday's meeting over the relatively slight turnout of teachers at the negotiation meetings, which are open not only to all teachers in the school system but also to the public at large. Stressing the need for personal attendance by the teachers at the sessions, Barstow indicated that the support of the Manchester teachers in the contract warfare might not be enough and that "ultimately we will need the support of the community as a whole."

He then called for MEA members to bring their cases to the people as well as to the school board and fellow teachers.

Barstow pointed out that the attendance at yesterday's meeting, although well advertised, wasn't exactly overwhelming. The turnout, he said, was "shocking."

The meeting was actually called to review the current progress of the contract discussions with the school board, in this presided over by the co-chairman of the negotiating team, Miss Martha White and Robert Guggan. Members of the rival Manchester Federation of Teachers were also present, including MFPT President Robert Valier.

Robert Wolfert, MEA president, introduced his opinion that "the board is going off of its way to pick apart MEA proposals. As proof, I refer to discussion Monday night concerning proposed article 17 relating to protection of teachers. Board members objected to the wording of this article—wording almost identical to that which has been board policy for years."

Wolfert also defended the team's strategy in offering the board a set of "salary goals," although he admitted that he had heard there was "some concern that the MEA didn't go in with a more reasonable salary proposal."

He said the team's action was "the right plan."

Wolfert stated that any proposal such as one suggested Monday night, that salary increases be held to below a total of \$300,000 would be completely unacceptable to the staff.

Current MEA membership was placed at about 940, down from the year's high of 115.

President has experienced some subsequent anguish over the decision he took last February. It may even mean that the retirement of Mr. Bundy means a dropping off in the supposedly great behind the scenes influence Mr. Acheson has had on the formulation of our policy in Vietnam. But these are questions mainly, it would seem, for future historians. The power of the major policy decision last February left no room for turning around. We remain on the Acheson-Bundy course even though it is now possible that their hands have been removed from the wheel.

The Day The Odds Were Fixed

In a stand, conservative Britain, which under such labels and under a traditional primness manages to permit itself vices and dissipation as free-wheeling Americans approach only by stealth, both at the track and off the track betting is legal and therefore a legitimate enterprise, a respectable business, in fact.

But a high judicial decision, the other day, put an element of the sporting cock in it. A high court judge ruled that it was just a battle of wits, no more unusual or illegitimate than any effort to conduct a smart operation in the stock markets, when, back on a June day in 1964, an amateur marmoset concocted and operated a clever scheme for "taking" the bookies that day.

Today, Dec. 9, is the first anniversary of "Ethics in International Relations Today," an address delivered by former Secretary of State Dean Acheson at Amherst College. The tone and import of the address are judged by the following excerpt: "So, act, moral in one relationship, may become quite the reverse in another."

Moreover, the vocabulary of morals and ethics is inadequate to discuss or set foreign policies of states. We are told that what is ethical is characterized by what is excellent in conduct and that excellence may be judged by what is right and proper, as against what is wrong, by existing standards.

When the time came for the race the mastermind had sent his operatives lined up in front of all the betting windows. They proved to be slow and clumsy at the windows. But they always eventually made up their minds to bet on the two dogs in the race which were generally considered to be completely out of the running.

The winning dogs came in paying \$875 to 1—and the mastermind's operatives had 79 winning tickets. Together with winning tickets held by innocent members of the betting public, fixed the amount the bookies stand to lose on the single race at about \$28 million dollars. They refused to pay and went to court contending that the odds had been illegally rigged. The decision has gone against them. They will appeal. But so far, the operations of the master mind have been ruled legal.

A Businesslike Sport

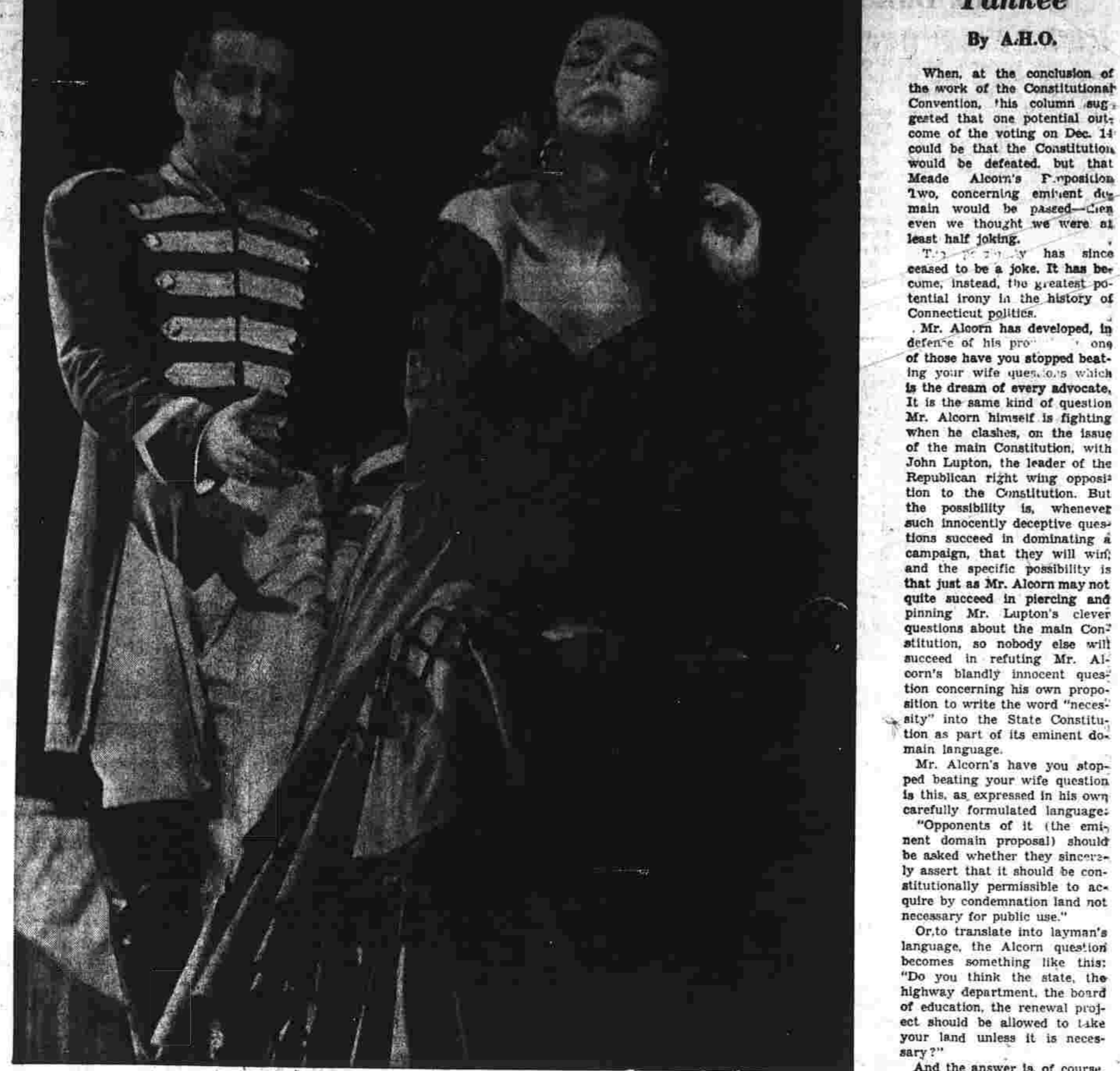
By arguing that major league baseball is much more a sport than a business, its officials up to now have fended off the full might of the Federal antitrust laws. The baseball men may be in trouble, however, if they don't stop fishing up such far-out reasons to bolster their case.

Washington's chief disciple of Mr. Acheson, and perhaps, some think, of the principles and readings of the Acheson speech at Amherst, McGeorge Bundy is this day resigning as special assistant to the President for National Security Affairs, and leaving the White House to become president of the Ford Foundation.

Mr. Bundy's crucial role in his White House post seems to have been the apparently decisive and clinching advice he called back from Vietnam last winter, leading to the Johnson administration decision to enter the long valley of no choice by embarking on the punitive bombing of North Vietnam. This classic example of a policy in which the end justifies the means has, in actuality, become a dismal demonstration of the fact that blind alleys means can make the attainment of ends so difficult and costly and tragic it runs more chance of destroying its goals than of reaching them.

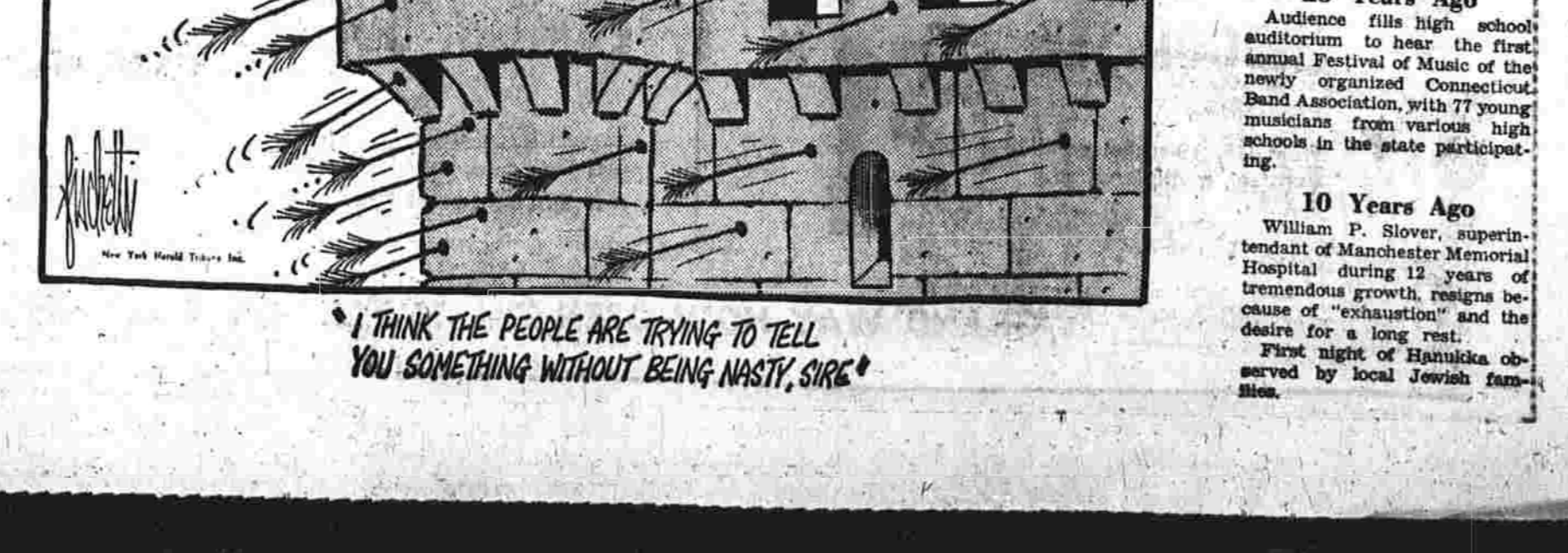

WASHINGTON — The top argument inside Administration circles against another "pause" in U.S. bombing of North Vietnam is fear that Ho Chi Minh would interpret it as a "fringe" response to the U.S. peace bloc, most recently mobilized in the Nov. 27 Washington March. 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President Deluged With Viet Letters

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP) — President Johnson, deluged since February with more than 100,000 letters on Viet Nam poli-

cy, reads a sampling of 10 to 15 a day and answers some personally.

He sees more uncollected mail on this subject than any other, and gives it more attention.

Even during his recuperative stay at his ranch, he has read here, packets of letters have been forwarded to him regularly by the White House.

In sampling Viet Nam mail, aides said today, Johnson insists on seeing critical as well as laudatory letters. And he has indicated in the past he takes a particular interest in mail from servicemen stationed in Viet Nam and their relatives back home.

When a letter especially impresses the president, he drafts a personal reply. However, he does not write to all who send him letters. He has indicated that he will write to a select group of them, including those who are particularly helpful in his work.

White House sources said no regular effort is made to check up on how many letters support or oppose presidential policies. They said such checks are made only periodically — covering an isolated week, for example.

The validity of using presidential mail as an accurate barometer of public sentiment is questioned by many White House officials.

They report that, while anti-war demonstrations were being held at the White House by staff members, if Johnson got too deeply involved in that job, it would take most of his time.

A professional staff of about 25 Civil Service employees opens, reads and analyzes all presidential mail. This is a growing job. Since 1961, there has been a 400 per cent increase in the volume of mail addressed to a president or his wife, aides said.

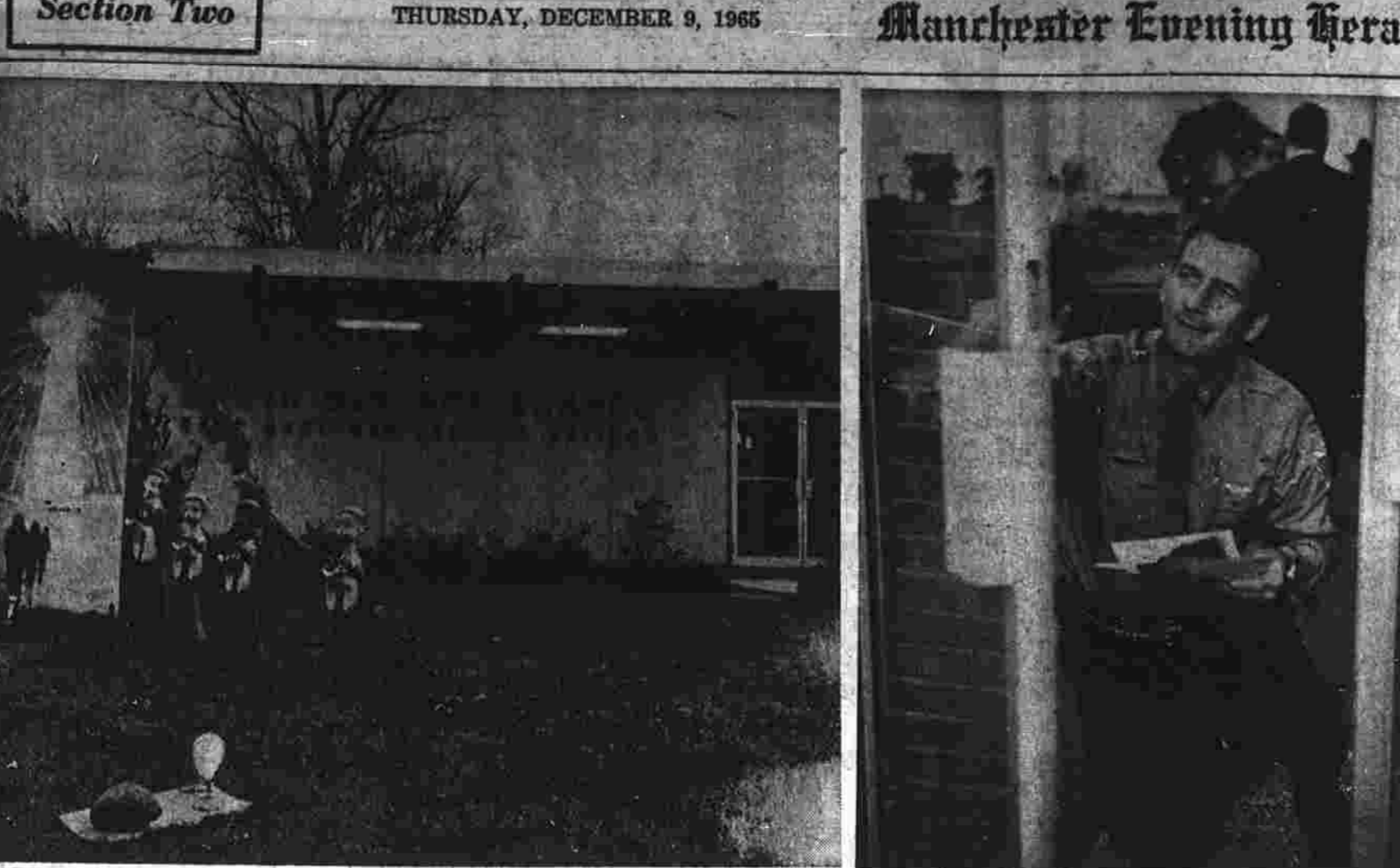

Cherry Delights
 1/2 pound butter or margarine
 1/2 teaspoon sugar

 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 1/4 teaspoon lemon extract
 1 1/2 cups flour
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 Crushed nuts (walnuts or pecans)
 maraschino cherries, halved
 Cream shortening thoroughly; sugar gradually creaming well; add yolk of egg, mix well; add lemon and vanilla flavorings and mix well.
 With mixing spoon add flour, baking powder and salt, a little at a time, and mix until dough can be handled but is soft and smooth. A little additional flour may be needed.

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Army Can't Provide Standby Services

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Army says it classified Joe Namath, the New York Jets' \$400,000 bonus quarterback, 4-F because it can't provide standby medical service for his football team.

"It may seem illogical that an individual who is physically active in civilian athletics should be found unfit for military service," noted a fact-sheet quickly circulated to congressmen.

But it isn't.

"When playing professional football, it must be presumed that Mr. Namath does not wish the counsel and preparation of doctors and trainers. He is closely watched and professional assistance is close at hand at every game and practice session."

"In the military service, these conditions would not necessarily be present. In Viet Nam, for example, the life and safety of his comrades could depend on Namath performing his duties under extremely adverse conditions."

The Army circulated the report on Namath's classification by a New York draft board in an apparent attempt to head off every congressional protest. It is labeled for "anticipated public reaction."

Namath was examined by a team of Army doctors, including orthopedic specialists. The former Alabama quarterback injured his right knee before his last New York Day Orange Bowl football game and is operated on for removal of a torn cartilage.

These doctors reported that "there was no question that the knee condition made Mr. Namath unfit for military service."

"Because of Namath's prominence, the case was reviewed by the surgeon general."
