Wilson Won't Open Talks With 'Illegal' Smith Regime

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Harold Wilson said today his Labor government cannot negotiate with rebellious Rhodesia.

He said Britain is discussing with other countries the application of broad sanctions against Rhodesia.

He told a hushed House of Commons that Rhodesian Prime Minister Ian Smith's breakaway government has set up a police state and cannot be treated with that central Africa colony's future.

"We cannot negotiate with an illegal regime which has introduced in Rhodesia police state methods reminiscent not only to the spirit of the 1961 Rhodesian constitution and to the standards always laid down by the House when we have granted independence to dependent British territories, but reminiscent also to all civilized standards," Wilson said.

Wilson also made clear that Britain was striving for wide international sanctions in a continuing bid to bring Smith's white minority regime to heel.

Even if constitutional rule were restored in Rhodesia, Wilson said, Smith's regime could not be trusted with the task of granting eventual rule to the African majority.

Smith's government committed to preserving white rule, declared Britain Nov. 11 and cleared itself independent.

14 Have TB On Gemini Pickup Ship

ABOARD USS WASP IN ATLANTIC (AP) — Four crew members suspected of having tuberculosis were flown to hospital Thursday from the carrier Gemini 6 and 7.

Doctors determined previously that 10 others among the 2,800 men on board definitely had contracted the disease.

The Wasp's senior medical officer, pointing to the size of the crew, said the outbreak hardly could be considered an epidemic.

At the Manned Spacecraft Center outside Houston, Dr. Charles A. Berry, flight surgeon for the Gemini 7 pilots, said he did not feel there was any risk for the astronauts if they are picked up by the Wasp as planned.

A space center spokesman reported the four men taken off the carrier were flown to Bermuda and then returned to the naval hospital at St. Albans, N.Y.

The first tuberculosis case was confirmed last July. Doctors diagnosed the latest case Nov. 22. The patient was flown to the naval hospital at Chelsea, Mass.

National aeronautics and space administration representatives on the Wasp said the Navy was taking all precautions to change plans for recovery of the ship and the crew.

Sheinwold on Bridge

THOUGHTFUL PARTNER IS BEYOND ALL PRICE

BY ALFRED SHEINWOLD

An obedient partner is a pearl of great price, but a thoughtful partner is priceless. The distinction is made clear in a hand described in a recent issue of the Bridge World by Brooks Hughes, of Ann Arbor.

Opening lead—Eight of hearts. East took the first trick with the ace of hearts and returned the ten of hearts to show that his side entry was in the higher side suit (diamonds). East would have returned a low heart if his entry had been in the lower side suit (clubs).

Hughes read the signal correctly and obediently returned a diamond. This gave South his contract.

South took the ace of diamonds, ruffed a diamond, got to dummy twice with trumps to ruff two more diamonds, and then got back to dummy with the king of hearts to discard a club on the last diamond.

As Hughes points out, he should have thought instead of obeying orders. If he had two diamonds, he would lose a diamond and a club no matter what West returned. If South had only one diamond, West could gain nothing by leading a diamond.

West should return a trump at the third trick. This would take an entry out of the dummy before South could start the diamonds, and South would eventually have to give up two club tricks.

Daily Question

Partner opens with one diamond, and the next player passes. You hold: Spades, 1-4-3-2; Hearts, 8; Diamonds, Q-8-7-3; Clubs, A-J-7-2.

What do you say?

Answer: Bid two diamonds. If partner cannot make another bid, game is too unlikely to be worth thinking about. Some experts believe in responding in any four-card major, but very few would recommend a response of four cards headed by the seven.

U.S. to Return Teaney to Owner

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Institutes of Health closed today the case of "Teaney," the white and black setter which has had the agency in a minor uproar since Thanksgiving.

NIH officials planned to turn over the dog to G. R. Lloyd of Bolton, Pa., who contends the 4-year-old setter was stolen from him last August.

The Humane Society of the United States said the incident is important because of bills pending in Congress to tighten restrictions on dog and cat sales. The society contends more than half the dogs and cats used for research purposes have been stolen from their owners.

An NIH spokesman said conclusive proof of Lloyd's ownership has never been submitted and probably never could be. But officials said there is evidence to indicate the dog, or one just like it, belonged to Lloyd. NIH did not use the dog in any research project.

Only Ambush Worse Troops' 2d Worst Enemy: Politicians in War Zones

BAGNONG, South Viet Nam (AP) — Need to walking into a Viet Cong ambush, about the most unsettling thing an American unit can encounter in the field these days is a covey of congressmen taking a look at the war.

This means a four-day visit of major American military installations, with several briefing sessions before a huge and complicated map marked with such mysterious terms as "Zone C" and "Zone D."

With congress out of session, a record number of American politicians have been getting fitted out for fatigues and climbing aboard helicopters to make the combat scene.

In two months at least 40 congressmen and 11 governors, plus assorted mayors, judges, commissioners and other potentialities have departed among the screaming jets and whirling helicopters at Saigon's airport.

All the politicians, according to one top military spokesman, are most interested in seeing the same thing: constituents.

After that, they want to visit the 1st Cavalry, Airborne, Division, with its more than 600 helicopters buzzing in and out of An Khe Valley; they want to land on the deck of a carrier out in the South China Sea; they want to go to a command post in the jungle; they want to see a Viet Cong prisoner; they want to see a Viet Cong prisoner; they want to see a Viet Cong prisoner.

Others augment the basic field uniform with ruffled adornments. Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., went about in a bush hat with the brim curled up in the gobs-hell Australian style. Gov. Otto Kerner of Illinois affected a baseball-style fatigue hat.

At the highest levels, both embassy and military, officials say they are glad to have the people's representatives come see the war.

Three Harried Women Aid Lives of Delegates to U.N.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Seated behind a long table in the U.N.'s bustling Great Hall, three women of good memories and a command of a dozen languages make life a little simpler for delegates of 117 nations.

From 9:30 a.m. each weekday until the last debate ends, sometimes past midnight, the three take in a ceaseless flow of phone calls from capitals around the world. By microphone they page the delegates in Spanish to Swahili.

U.N. headquarters lacks space to provide separate quarters for each member. The big spoked wheels of the United Nations are in the building.

Russian-born Nina Tessier, Maria Gles of Poland and Monique Dent, a native of France, are listed as delegates' aides. Their vague title fits their role of answering service, social secretary, and house mother. Calls come in at the rate of one every seven seconds during the midday peak. Relaying all the news is only part of the job. New delegates often ask where to find a good restaurant. A diplomat who has lost a button usually walks over to Mrs. Tessier holding out a swollen finger.

"Nina, I have a splinter," she complained.

"Then you should go to the clinic and have it removed," she replied.

"No, Nina, I want you to take it out."

Disinfecting a needle with cologne, Mrs. Tessier tweaked out the splinter, applied a bandage and dispatched the ambassador with a maternal pat.

"Sometimes I feel like a mother hen with a lot of chicks," she says.

Mrs. Tessier, a sweet brunette who was born a Georgian princess and is now a Canadian citizen, has served as an aide for 17 years. Her husband, Thomas, is training officer for U.N. air guards.

"Delegates appreciate these little favors we do, and they often respond," she observes.

Marines Train Their Men For Possible Brainwashing

BRIDGEPORT, Calif. (AP) — They are constantly reminded of the American Marines.

"You're nothing but a tool being used by superiors who are warmongers sitting back in warm offices. You are nothing but a tool," said Mrs. Tessier.

Outing in on the public address system, Mrs. Tessier asked for a member of the first-aid mission. She kept repeating the call until a delegate was located.

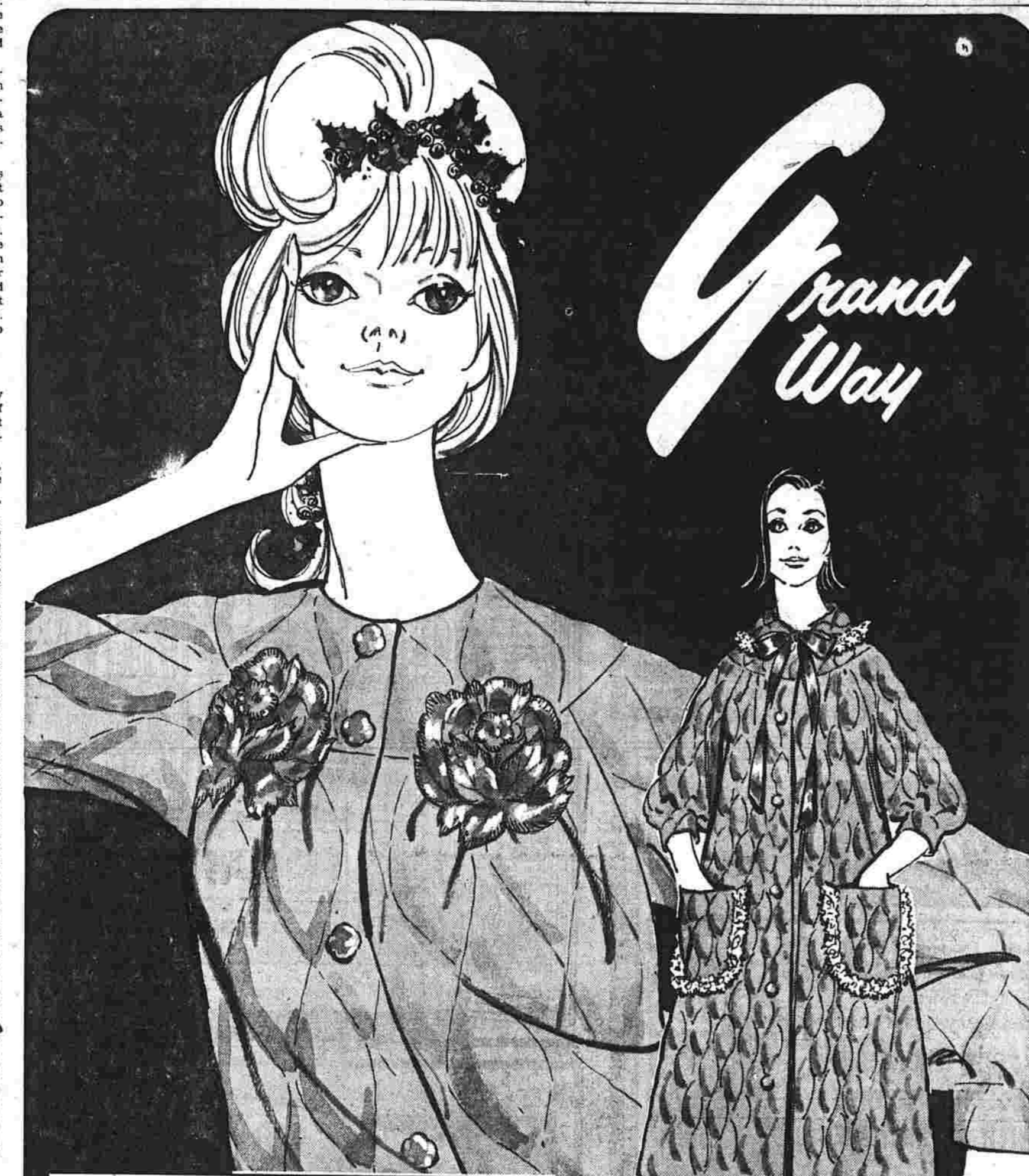

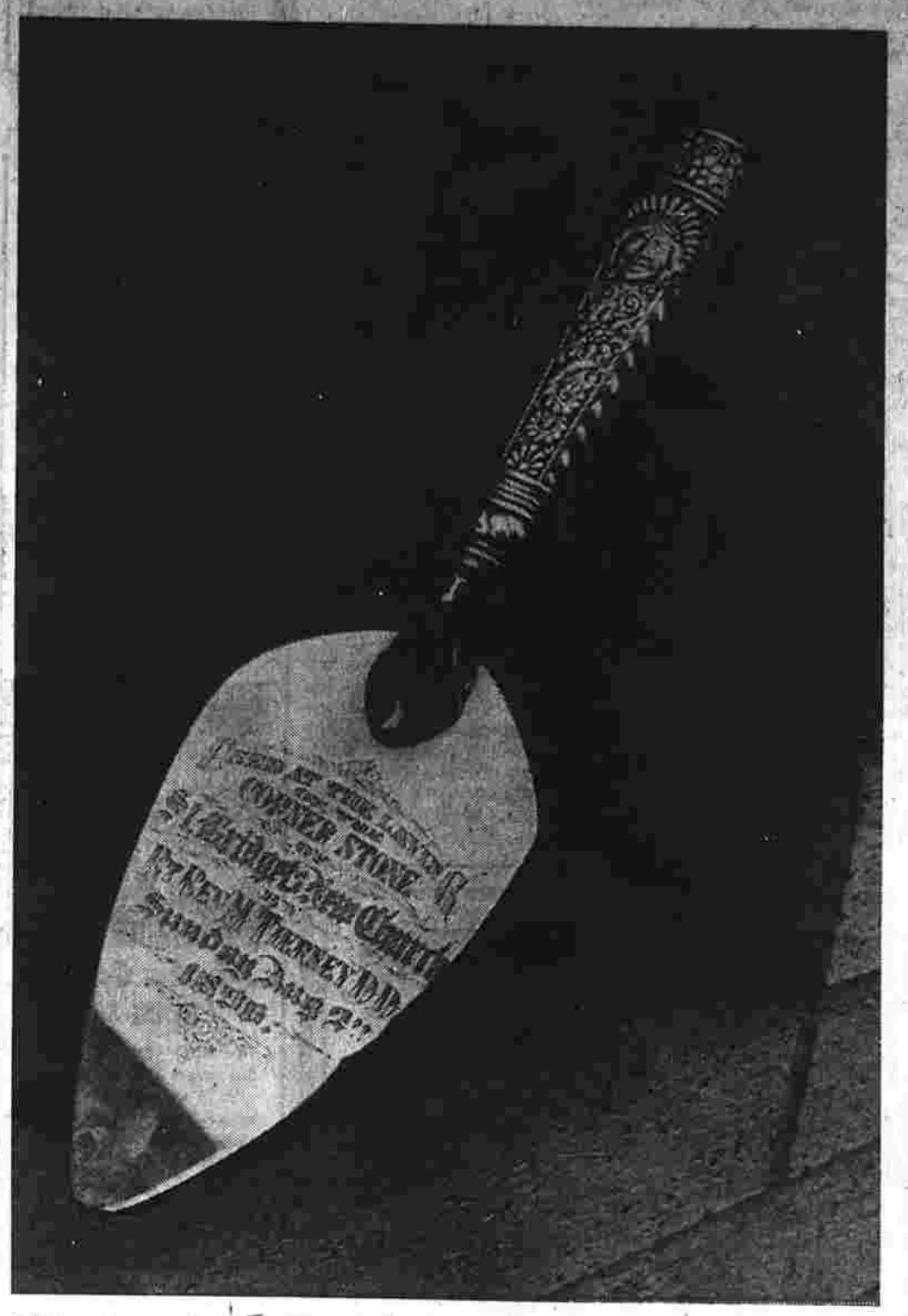

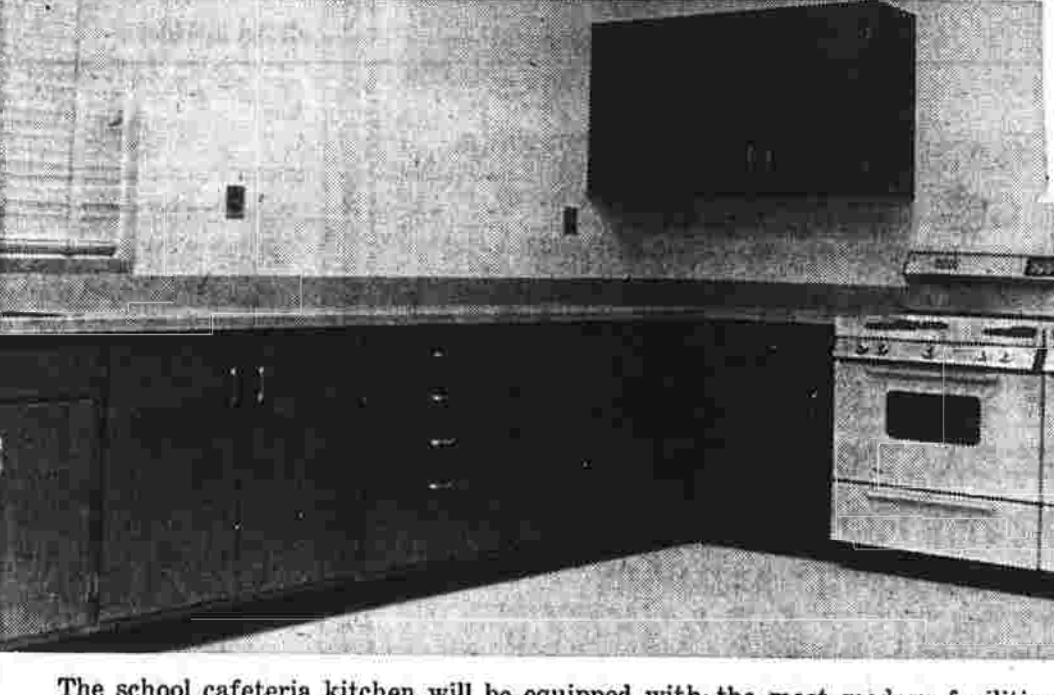

Dedication Sunday Patience Rewarded, Parish Gets School

In itself, a school dedication holds little that is really very remarkable. Even in a city of Manchester's modest proportions, the ceremony of a school inaugural seems no less commonplace than the travels over money that inevitably precedes it.

Nonetheless, each time the doorway to a new school is opened to the accompaniment of pomp and magnificence, the ghost of something finished flutters out invisibly, perhaps the idea of its creation, or merely the energies of those who built for a livelihood.

When the new school of the parish of St. Bridget is dedicated Sunday, certainly the ghost of a century of patience will finally leave, for the parish is now 114 years old and this school is only its very first. It is not as though the parish has chased a long-elusive dream only to realize it in its old age. For, despite its history, St. Bridget has never forgotten its future.

Movement and expansion were almost from the very beginning obvious needs for the growing church, yet, because of its unfortunate location right in the midst of a residential area, there was never the opportunity for physical growth. To further aggravate the situation, none of the property owners ever seemed willing to sell their land to the parish. The parish solemnly watched its 100th birthday go by; it had already spawned two new parishes and a third, St. Bartholomew, appeared in 1958.

As Manchester grew, and the Catholic population grew, St. Bridget sat patiently, without a school and in a building already too small for the parish's surging membership.

Into this quagmire came Father John Delaney in 1954, the congregation's first pastor since the present church was of six.

Construction of the new school was begun in 1963. Discouragingly, the task of building a school had to be postponed in favor of reconstructing the church according to modern safety requirements, the half-century old building having been declared unsafe by both state and local fire officials.

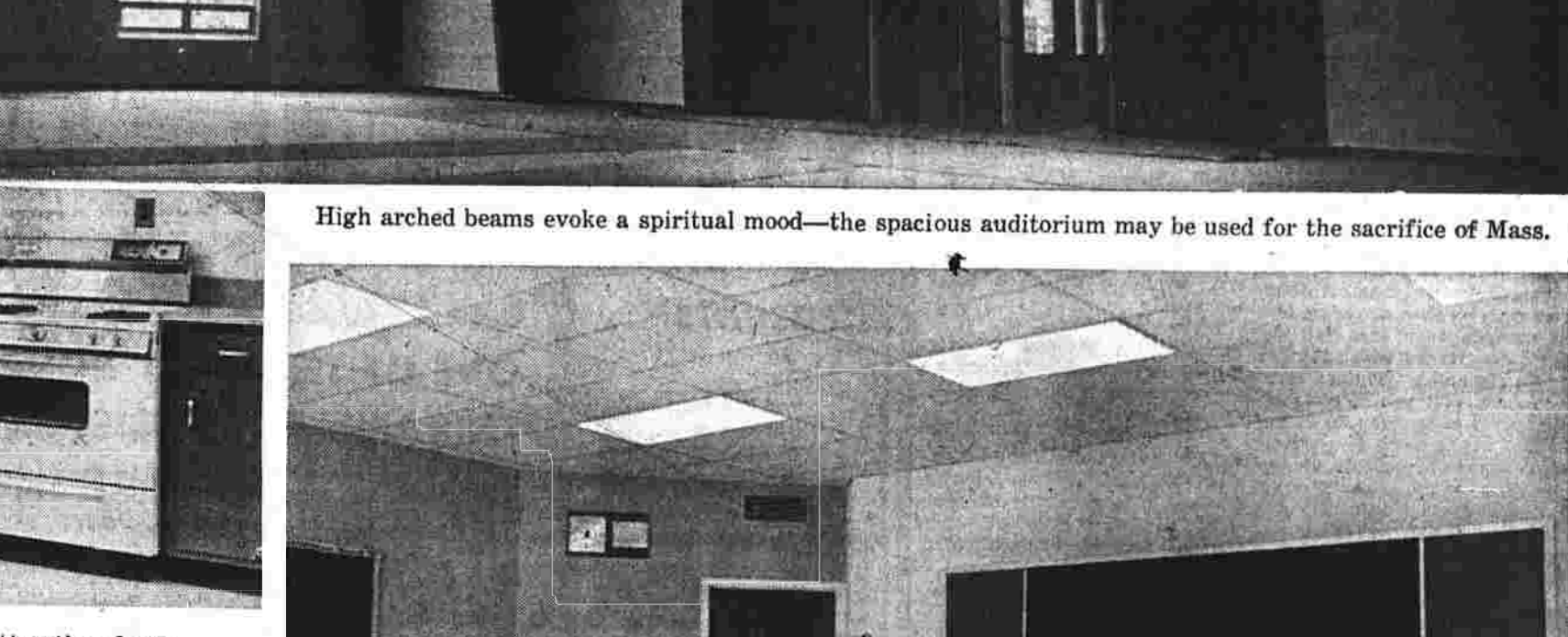
A second postponement occurred in 1965 when the building of East Catholic High School was proposed. Archbishop O'Brien asked the parishioners to sacrifice their ambitions, then almost about to be realized, for a while longer, at least until the high school was finished.

New Rocket Case Developed by UAC

A small rocket case from one of the strongest structural materials yet developed has been fabricated by United Technology Center, the Sunnyvale, Calif., division of United Aircraft Corp.

The material is a combination of boron filament and epoxy resins— is two times stiffer than steel, yet lighter than either aluminum or glass fiber.

Officials at United Aircraft Research Laboratories, where the boron filament was produced, and at UAC describe the material as a significant advance in the aerospace field.

Fabrication of boron-filament structures is similar to winding glass fiber. A machine draws the filament from a spool, through an epoxy resin bath and onto a rotating mandrel, or form, in fast patterns. After the winding process has produced a material of the desired thickness, the structure is hardened by heat curing, and the mandrel is removed.

Boron filament is produced by a continuous high-temperature process in which boron and chemically deposited on a base of fine tungsten wire.

Boron is a metalloid, a so-called half-way element that has some properties of metals and some of nonmetals. It is 10 per cent lighter than aluminum, but its modulus of elasticity, or stiffness, is six times that of aluminum, a desirable quality in structural materials for preventing distortion under load.

Quoted price for the filament produced by United Aircraft Research Laboratories is \$1,500 a pound. Cost per pound a year ago, if the material had been available commercially, would have been about \$7,000.

To fabricate the six-inch diameter, oval-shaped rocket case, UAC used about 40 miles of boron filament.

Although relatively slow and expensive to fabricate, UAC researchers believe the boron filament will offer advantages beyond material worth.

VATICAN CITY (AP) — With the end of the Vatican Council, Pope Paul VI comes into his own.

Large as he has loomed at the head of the Roman Catholic Church, he has stood up to now in the broad shadow of his predecessor, John XXIII.

Into the third year of his reign, Pope Paul's great dedication has been to fulfill his pledge to successfully conclude the ecumenical council that Pope John convened eight months before his death, June 3, 1963.

Source close to the pontiff, has predicted that now that this duty has been fulfilled, Pope Paul's own character will emerge. It is expected to be dramatic.

His actions up to now have given indication that he may enter as mediator for peace in war-torn areas of the world.

He went into the third year of his pontificate with a record of a speech a day. His doctors say that despite his frail condition, he seemed to be in vigorous, good health.

Mayor Makes New Attempt To Reverse Postal Ruling

Mayor James Throws has written to Postmaster General Lawrence J. O'Brien in an effort to have reversed a ruling prohibiting two Wapping Post Office employees from answering fire calls during working hours.

The town has already asked for a ruling from the post office department's district office, reversing the earlier decision of an area postal official barring the two firemen, Frank Enes and Bradford Alpers, from responding to fire calls.

A Boston post office department official has responded that the post office makes no provision for excusing post office employees for fire duty.

In a letter to Postmaster General O'Brien, Mayor Throws says that "The consequences of this order border on the disasterous."

"For several years, it has been the practice of the former (Wapping) postmaster to allow employees to act as volunteer firemen and go to fires."

"I am surprised at the manner in which our request for a ruling has been handled. That is, as a disciplinary matter," the mayor says.

The directive sent to Wapping postmistress Shirley Little by the personnel director in Boston states that "There is no provision for excusing post office employees from duty for the purpose of acting as volunteer firemen. The only exception would be if the employees were selected as firemen in connection with a Civil Defense assignment."

The fact that the fire department and that volunteer firemen are a part of the town civil defense organization was noted in Mayor Throws's letter. He believes that natural disasters such as fires are of no less importance than the civil defense assignment which is cited as an exception," Throws says.

"I urge that you direct your agency to reconsider its ruling in this matter and take the necessary steps to execute an appropriate administrative order to allow our citizens who are employees of the post office department to serve as volunteer firemen."

Soon after Mrs. Little was appointed postmistress in Wapping, an order was given directing the employees from serving as firemen during duty hours. They were ordered to report to fires from their jobs and were ordered to remove a fire radio in the post office.

Fire Chief Philip Cromble says that, "Until the matter is resolved, the fire department is relying on emergency fire truck arrangements which are far from satisfactory."

Slaying Suspect Is Acquitted of Manslaughter

HARTFORD (AP) — Norman J. Berube, who allegedly killed another man because the man was interfering with Berube's attempt to commit suicide, was acquitted of manslaughter.

The verdict handed down Thursday in Superior Court followed testimony by two psychiatrists that Berube had been suffering from schizophrenia and was psychotic when he fired the shot.

Berube and the victim, William Walters, 63, both lived at a hotel in Unionville. The shooting occurred outside the hotel on Aug. 20, 1964.

U.S., Dominican Officials Probe Passport Forgeries

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — Dominican officials and U.S. immigration authorities in Puerto Rico are investigating the forging of hundreds of Dominican passports by a ring operating in the Dominican Republic.

Rafael Edmundo Espinal, director general of Dominican immigration, said Thursday night the ring apparently is operating with about 5,000 blank passports stolen from the Foreign Ministry during the revolution.

The ministry is in a suburban area of Santo Domingo that was controlled by the civilian-military junta at the time.

At least two men have been arrested in connection with the case, Espinal said after he returned from discussing the matter with U.S. authorities in Puerto Rico.

He said the forged passports look so authentic that they almost defy scrutiny. They are being sold for between \$25 and \$50 pesos each, he added.

Strike Threat On Subways Called Off

NEW YORK (AP)—A subway and bus strike threatened for Wednesday has been called off.

By Michael J. Quill, president of the AFL-CIO Transport Workers Union, still says there will be a strike on the subways and city-owned bus lines at 8 a.m. New Year's Day unless the union and the City Transit Authority agree on a new two-year contract by then.

Contract negotiations—broken off by Quill last week in a fit of anger at Mayor-elect John Lindsay—will be resumed with the aid of a three-man mediation panel.

Quill Thursday night lifted his threat of a strike at 8 a.m. next Wednesday after Mayor Robert F. Wagner and Lindsay persuaded Theodore W. Kheel, nationally known labor mediator, to be a member of the panel.

The toner official said the strike would have been especially deadly because of the winter weather. Kheel agreed to serve, although he had said last week he wanted "no part" of the task. Kheel has been the impartial arbitrator of TWU-transit authority contracts since 1963.

U.S. Sailor Ends Red China Visit

HONG KONG (AP)—A 11-year-old U.S. Navy sailor walked across the Red China border bridge today and told British immigration officials he had been on the Communist side since he disappeared from his ship in Hong Kong a week ago.

Officials identified him as Edward Ross Armstrong, an apprentice seaman reported missing when his ship left Hong Kong Dec. 2 after a five-day visit.

Armstrong's home town, next of kin, and further identification were withheld.

Reports from the border said Chinese Communist officials said a "crossing" document across the bridge a few minutes before the sailor walked across. Officials refused to confirm this but it is the usual procedure when a foreigner leaves Red China at the Lourenco station.

U.S. consulate officials said the Hong Kong immigration authorities had turned the youth over to U.S. Navy officials here.

U.S. Marines Sent Into Da Nang Battle

SAIGON, Viet Nam (AP) — Helicopters dropped two more companies of U.S. Marines today into the four-day battle that has pitched several Viet Cong holed-up units and touched off a heavy gunfight that continued through the afternoon.

The American newcomers deployed south of the main forces as a blocking element while the others probed cautiously for points at which to deliver the hammer blows. Contact was reported to be light, but constant.

A religious rift threatened complications at Da Nang, the big air base 200 miles northwest of Saigon. Vietnamese Buddhists charged that a U.S. Marine had beheaded a golden Buddha and scattered sacred ornaments and artifacts in the Khue Bac pagoda there Dec. 2.

U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge is known to have told the Buddhist hierarchy he will look into the matter immediately and all damage will be repaired with U.S. money, regardless of whether Americans were involved.

Buddhists make up the majority of Viet Nam's people and to them the decapitation of a Buddha is equivalent to desecration of a cross in a Christian church.

Reports reaching Saigon from the field fight suggested the government troops flushed a hard-core Viet Cong battalion, one of the outfits which has been in the field a long time.

This is the kind of Viet Cong force that has plagued and battered the Marine command troops and U.S. Marines for more than three days 300 miles to the north in the "paddy fields inland from the South China Sea coast.

Marines, continuing the battle with troops from shore bases and the Marine Corps' 1st Marine Airborne Task Force, had rough going under heavy attack Friday night but reported today that the Viet Cong were evading an open night confrontation with the multibattalion American force.

Moving up from the south toward the government forces, the Marines, including a heavy unit, contact with Viet Cong snipers and the main enemy force slipped away during the morning.

Marine patrols took heavy fortified positions north of the front line, including a barbed wire outpost and a big tunnel system 10 feet under ground.
