

"Driving directly to Constitu tion Plaza is really very simple. Just follow the signs reading "New Haven-New York." "The Highway Department apparently expects any logical motorist coming in from the East to guess this! Lillian B. Holway."

We are grateful. And, if we can conquer that horrible impulse which, in such situations, keeps grabbing the wheel and insisting that it doesn't want to go either to New Haven or New York, we will give the Holway route formula a try some day. Another helpful friend, who prefers

to remain anonymous, has contributed a pleasant suggestion of a route by which people who live East of the Connecticut River can at least obtain a good view of Founders Bridge. You go out through South Windsor, cross the River on the Bissell Bridge, take a left toward Hartford on Rt. 91, and this will soon bring you to a point where you can see Founders Bridge, even though you can't get on it for your return journey. To get back to the East side of the river, the safest route might be to keep going South, looking for signs for the Rocky Hill ferry.

With such logic, and such talented scouting addressing itself to the problem, we are now confident that Founders Bridge will become increasingly easy to find, so easy that perhaps, some day, the Highway Department itself will be able to locate it again long emough to put a sign or two pointing in its direction.

"do-good" international programs and funds into one operation. After January, the United Nations Special Fund and the United Nations endum on December 14. Expanded Program of Technical Assistance will cease to exist separately, and will become unified and centralized

parts of a broader United Nations Development Program. The international activities of these two agencies have been financed by voluntary contributions from individual members of the United Nations. These voluntary contributions have now risen until they total \$155 million a year. For the new year it is hoped that \$200 mil-

lion can be pledged. With such financing, the two agencles have so far contributed about a billion dollars to the support of special economic projects in underdeveloped countries around the world.

This allocation of funds and selection of projects and supervision of expenditure has been done as an international project, administered by an international civil service, responsible only to the United Nations itself.

The merger of these two United Nations agencies into one, presumably to allow more efficiency and cordination in work being done, is a welcome development, from two points of view. First, it represents a strengthening of

The new Constitution requires that the General Assembly, in the first session following the Federal census, shall enact by a two-thirds vote a districting plan. If the General Assembly fails to this, provision is made whereby a commission appointed by the governor or a three-member board, including two Superior Court judges, shall attend to the districting. To be sure that there will be no fur-

ther hiatus or conflict with the U.S. Constitution over matters of legislative representation, the new state Constitution, in a special section provides "The establishment of districts in the General Assembly shall be consistent with Federal constitutional standards." This provision allows for flexibility and latitude, keeping Connecticut within the law and avoiding any such court-ordered redistricting as prompted the current revision of the Connecticut Constitution. — MERIDEN RECORD
