Big Personal Income Gain Shows in Holiday Spending

NEW YORK (AP) — Where in all the money counting there is all that Christmas shopping! People are crowding the stores and buying higher-priced items and spending more than ever before.

A lot of it may be going on the cut to be paid for later. But this year people have more money in their pockets and bank accounts the ever before.

And they are parting with it, some because their own personal finances are better, some because they believe the war in Viet Nam will set off a boom like the Korean War did, some because they think goods are going to be higher priced in the future and better be bought now.

Back of all this feeling of well being are such things as record personal incomes, more jobs at higher pay, and orders pouring into the factories which seem to guarantee that prosperity will be around for awhile.

Personal income has made a big gain this fall. In November it was running at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$64.5 billion. All signs point to a further advance this month. That's a lot of money to spend.

Wages and salaries account for \$70 billion of it, up \$3.1 billion from October. Of the November advance, factory pay rolls account for a gain of \$1.4 billion to \$12.2 billion.

Much of the buying of high priced goods in the stores today may be linked to the big gains in cash dividend payments on stocks. Merchants say sales of luxury goods often fol-

Police Give Winter Hints For Drivers

MONTEVERDE, Vt. (AP) — Think you know how to drive in winter, being a professional New Englander?

Try the following list of winter driving rules, compiled with the help of the Vermont State Police. They are for all those other fellows who seem to coltreat with the first snowflake on the road.

Clean the back and side windows as well as front. Give a switch to the snow which may cover brake lights.

Don't add "dry gas" to the gas tank with a lighter cigarette around. This is as bad as checking the level of the fuel in the tank with a match.

A full tank of gas eliminates the possibility of condensation in the tank. If your car starts, then dies, consider a frozen fuel line.

If you need parking lights you need headlights. The next time you drive, note how useless the other fellow's parking lights are until you're pretty close to his car.

Would-Be Robber Who Didn't Run Ruled Competent

HARTFORD (AP) — Clifford A. Hamilton, who set out to rob a bank and was caught while discussing landscaping with one of the bank's employees, was ruled mentally competent Monday to stand trial.

The 31-year-old Montville resident walked into the Chelsea Savings Bank in Norwich on Oct. 11 and handed two notes to a teller demanding money.

A bank employee engaged Hamilton in conversation while police were summoned, and on back to jail under \$7,000 bond.

The ruling was made by U.S. District Judge T. Ernest Clark after a psychiatric report found Hamilton able to understand the charge against him and able to aid in his own defense.

Hamilton pleaded innocent after Clark's ruling. His new lawyer, Hamilton was deep in a discussion of landscaping when he was apprehended.

Mass. Legislature Reports Progress in Tax Program

BOSTON (AP) — A Senate conference committee controlled by Democrats has moved off dead center and meetings today may result in some agreement on a tax program and a budget bill.

There were signs Monday night that House members of the committee might be willing to accept some increases in the \$116.5 million tax passed by the House.

For the first time since the committee was named last week, the chairman, Sen. James F. Burke, D-Brookton, announced "light progress."

Burke said that House conferees have "indicated they might be willing to consider added revenue."

Senate members are pushing for a \$150 million tax program designed to balance a \$60 million budget. The House has been adamant that there be only \$116.5 million in new revenue and a budget of about \$200 million.

Burke said several taxes are being considered as a way to boost the \$116.5 million yield of the House tax bill.

The House bill would increase the tax on cigarettes from 8 to 10 cents a package and the committee is talking about adding another penny to make the tax 11 cents.

Also under consideration is an increase on the tax rate on unearned income to 8 per cent to raise \$5 million, a tax on the out of state investments of domestic insurance companies and additional excise taxes on local telephone service.

Burke said all the proposals in the discussion stage and no decisions have been made.

Rep. Anthony M. Sebille, D-Springfield, proposed the cigarette tax hike, the insurance tax and telephone tax increases as a compromise that would boost the yield in the House.

The Senate voted to add \$6.5 million to the House bill by increasing the rates on earned and unearned income to 4 and 8 per cent. So far, the House has refused to go along with such an income tax increase.

Over the weekend, Senate Democrats have been making a request for a caucus of House and Senate Democrats. House Speaker John F. X. Davoren, D-Milford, vetoed the idea.

Davoren said there was little use in a caucus until the conference committee issued its report.

And Rep. James F. Kelly, D-Boston, a leader of the so-called "no tax" forces in the House, announced he would boycott any such caucus.

GI's Scrounge Material For Mekong Delta Creche

CAN THO, South Viet Nam (AP) — A lifeline mannequin in GI latrine stands guard behind a sandbag bunker over the Mekong estuary in the entire Vietnam.

The Christmas creche in the 4th Corps Military Compound was put together with clothing store dummies, procured from a Saigon department store supplier, contributed by American soldiers and by church workers from surrounding Vietnamese Christian churches.

"We worried about the propriety having the security guard on duty at the bunker," said Lt. Col. Frank C. Riley, the chaplain from Augusta, Ga. "But after all the commotion was under mortar fire within the past five months, peace on earth is obtained only with eternal vigilance."

Six State Sites Eligible For National Landmarks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Six Connecticut sites were among 65 places throughout the country declared eligible today by the Department of the Interior for designation as Registered National Historic Landmarks.

The latest group brings to 673 the number of sites the department's National Park Service has cited in this manner since the program began in 1960.

The sites are not in any way maintained, supported or administered by the service.

These were the Connecticut sites named:

Frederick Remington House, Ridgefield, Remington (1861-1900) was one of the most successful of the many artists who painted the people and scenes of the West in the era after the Civil War.

John Trumbull Birthplace, New Canaan, Rogers (1820-1904) was a popular and successful sculptor. More than 100 copies of his works were painted scenes of the Revolution and leaders of that time.

A number of his massive canvases hang in the rotunda of the Capitol in Washington.

Coventry Historical Society Offers Holiday Display of Bells

Bells, bells for Christmas and every other season, form the display in the hallway case of the Town Office Building at Rt. 31 this month. The exhibit was assembled from the collection of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Grant of Willimantic, and have been loaned to the Coventry Historical Society for the remainder of the month. The bells are from widely-scattered parts of the world, are made of various materials, and were used for many different purposes. One brass bell was probably used as a "calling bell" for church activities; two porcelain bells are from Germany and Vichy, France; wooden bells were used by dancers during a ball; a brass bell with a wooden clapper comes from Java; symbols from Guatemala are also among the collection.

Another bell, called a "Sally Bennett" comes from Bermuda, where Sally was burned at the stake on June 5, 1730, after being charged with poisoning her employer. Since that time, the date has been known as "Sally Bennett Day" on Bermuda. Also shown is a cow-bell from Java, temple bells from Indonesia, and a string of Italian goal-bells. A story tells of a little girl who lived outside a town on the island of Capri, who heard a goat-bell at night and got up to see what was the matter, only to find that the Turks were coming in to share the village in time to give the warning.

Mrs. Hilda M. Keller of the historical society notes that "one bell in the collection was made by the only woman bell-caster in this country." Made in 1830, it appears to be of cast iron.

Mrs. Maud L. Murphy of the society arranged the display. Direct Dialing About 2,600 residents in the Coventry area can now dial long-distance telephone calls directly, without having to contact an operator to ask for the number they wish to call.

Tolland Census Shows 2,932 Children Under 20 Years

Tolland's population includes 1,820 youngsters under the age of 20, according to the enumeration report for 1965, released at last week's Board of Education meeting. Of these children 2,932 are under 17 years of age, an increase of 293 over last year's figure of 2,641. The pre-school population in August when the census started, is 1,200 compared with 1,004 last year. The new enumeration of pre-schoolers indicates the following breakdown of children eligible to start school in the fall of 1966: 1964, 201 children; 1967, 241; 1968, 196; 1969, 220; 1970, 215; 1971, 120 children.

Nevins said he believed such a projection should be made each year. Las Vegas Tower Called Turkey

By JOHN LENDEL, Associated Press Writer LAS VEGAS (AP) — A 31-story shaft of concrete looms over Las Vegas as a reminder that the best made plans of mice and promoters often go awry. The building is called Landmark Tower, a mushroom-shaped affair which soars high enough to rate as Nevada's tallest unoccupied structure. "It's gotta be the biggest trucker in town," marvels a subcontractor who worked on the project. Construction began in November 1961, but the giant was moved to a Lilliputian tangle of litigation by December of 1962. Work has been at a halt since. As conceived, the tower would be a 140-room hotel, topped with a steel dome to house a restaurant. It was inspired by the Space Needle of the Seattle World's Fair. Lack of money, suit and counter-suit resulted in new owners and new plans. "We had so many changes," says architect Gerald Moffat, "that it was hard to determine what our end was, or is. "If we don't know our end, I guess it will be difficult to achieve it," he says, adding that his plans have been impounded by the court. As imagined now, the tower should include space for a casino, dancing floor, shows and a 350-place restaurant. Moffat and others concerned with the project estimate it is 80 per cent complete at a cost of nearly \$5 million. The company which controls the project says the tower needs six months more work and will be completed. Work is not scheduled to resume in the near future, a spokesman says. Meanwhile, the tower is visible for 20 miles in any direction, rising from a shopping center like a long shade tree in a brand new subdivision. One promoter stepped forward and suggested he be allowed to use the tower for a carnival-type parachute jump. The idea died for a lack of a second floor. And it's easy to find promoters who swear the building is the American desert's answer to the leaning tower of Pisa. Casual critics, sighting the tower along power poles in the area, are told that actually it is the poles that tilt. Moffat, the architect, says "it doesn't tilt. The tower is three-eighths of an inch different in diameter from top to bottom. A weak low pressure area will move over the ocean into this morning and is then expected to intensify and begin moving in a more northeasterly direction. As this occurs, the bureau said, there is a chance that the northern edge of the light snow may briefly reach into Southern New England. However, significant snow is not expected. No date was set for sentencing.

259-Page Plea For Freedom Is Turned Down

HARTFORD (AP) — Frank C. Smith's massive plea for release from State Prison has been turned down by the U.S. Court of Appeals and Circuit in New York City. Smith was convicted of first degree murder in 1960 for the 1946 slaying of Grover E. Hart, elderly caretaker at the Indian Harbor Yacht Club in Greenwich. Smith's death sentence was commuted to life imprisonment on June 7, 1964, two hours before he was scheduled for execution. The former Norwalk resident, like many other convicts, spent much of his time in legal studies and last year sent a 259-page plea for a writ of habeas corpus to U.S. District Court. Smith listed 221 ways in which he said his rights had been violated during his prosecution. U.S. District Judge Robert C. Zampano rejected the document and rejected Smith's bid for freedom. Smith did no better before the three-judge appellate panel in New York. It unanimously upheld the lower court's decision, disclosed Monday.

Man Bound Over In Robbery Case

Philip B. Owen, 29, of Vernon, charged with robbery in connection with the holiday Dec. 8 of the East Hartford Federal Savings Assn. branch in South Windsor, pleaded not guilty yesterday in the federal court. Owen is free under a \$10,000 bond, and is represented by Atty. Allan Thomas of Manchester.

Giving Christmas Pretties Planned Again in Kentucky

PIPPA PASSES, Ky. (AP) — A Christmas custom, planted in this tiny community nearly 50 years ago, will bloom again this year in the smiles of about 20,000 poverty-stricken children. Since last summer, students at Alice Lloyd College have been preparing small Christmas gifts for elementary school children in one-room schools of the eastern Kentucky mountains. For many of the children, it is all there is to Christmas. "For eight years—all through grade school — received gifts from the project," a mountain girl, now a student at the school here, said. "Some of those years, my Daddy had no work. He's a miner. They were cold times. Christmas parties were about all we got." Alice Lloyd started a Christmas giving program three years after she arrived in 1918 from Boston. She also founded the school that was to become a junior college bearing her name. Mrs. Lloyd, who came to the hill country for quiet places to write and stayed to become an angel to the needy, started her project with Christmas parties for local residents on the school's green. "We took flour sacks and put presents in them for the whole family—maybe a coat for the man of the house, an apron or a dress for the mother, and toys for the children," Miss June Buchanan recalls. Miss Buchanan, who came here to help Mrs. Lloyd during a week's vacation and never left, said Dan Martin became the program's first Santa Claus in 1922. "But the program got so big that a few years later we stopped having a yearly party and started giving gifts at the schools. "Why, people had started coming from miles away—on foot and on horseback—and there were nearly 1,500 of them at one time," she said. Mrs. Lloyd continued personal supervision of the Christmas project until her death several years ago. Now, Mrs. William Hays, wife of the school's president, is in charge.

2. It will require that the street be designed to town subdivision specifications. 3. It will require a bond to insure the street work if done to the town's satisfaction.

Vernon Double Sessions Predicted Unless New School Built

Vernon schools may go into 1968 the town will be quite double sessions unless the number of classroom space, and number of classrooms is increased. Dr. Raymond Ramsdell, superintendent of schools, announced that the town will be required to hold two sessions of representatives last night, and that the building will be required to be completed by the first year.

Ramsdell appeared before the board to explain his request to have an elementary school built by 1963 to house about 1,000 pupils who will be entering the school system in 1966 and 1967.

The board of education recently downgraded Dr. Ramsdell's request for immediate action on the school and voted to propose that the school be built for occupancy in 1969.

It was almost like a return to school for the town fathers last night. Ramsdell, noting that the board had a commitment which would limit his appearance before them, passed out information regarding the school population and the estimated enrollment increase.

"I'm going to give you some homework and I suggest you study it," Dr. Ramsdell said. The board tabled action on Ramsdell's request until their next meeting in January.

The information put the school population at 5,723 students on Dec. 1.

In 1961, Dr. Ramsdell explained, he presented an estimate of future enrollments of the public schools, which he projected an enrollment of 5,720. "We may very well have this number enrolled by June," Ramsdell said.

Other estimates of pupils indicated that in 1962, there would be 4,340 school children. Actual enrollment was 4,430.

For the following school year, 1963, Dr. Ramsdell made an estimate of 4,863. The actual school population was 4,810.

In 1964, Dr. Ramsdell estimates a total of 7,387 enrolled in public schools, in 1970, 8,290. Dr. Ramsdell explained that his estimates were based on a formula so far has proven fairly accurate.

The town is now renting eight classroom facilities which accommodate 200 pupils. Ramsdell noted that there is a room in all elementary schools and kindergartens to accommodate about 750 ones a new addition now being planned is completed, and the Rockville High School can accommodate as many as 1,600 pupils.

Zoners Clear Way For Fire Station

The way was cleared last night for the construction of a new firehouse at Lawton and Weaver Rd., on a two-lot parcel, offered to the town free of charge by James McCarthy and William Peck, owners of the adjoining 23-unit apartment complex.

The Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) unanimously approved a request from the Town of Manchester, and granted it a variance to diminish the parcel on which the apartment stand, thus freeing the two lots for town use.

The two lots had helped to fulfill zoning regulations, which require that a minimum of 4,000 square feet of space be provided for each apartment. By granting the variance, the ZBA reduced the space provided to 3,040 square feet per apartment.

The ZBA laid down one condition: That the two-lot parcel be used solely for the construction of a firehouse, and for no other purpose.

It ruled that its decision conformed with its powers to promote the health, welfare and safety of the community, within the structure of the town's zoning regulations.

It agreed with Town Counsel Irving Aronson, who had requested the variance for the town, that "where the welfare of the public is paramount, the welfare of the individual must give way."

Aronson said that, under the town's powers of eminent domain, it could take the land in the public interest, but that he thought it best to request the variance.

He said that, as town counsel, he was ruling in advance of any request for his official opinion that "there is no rule of law to prohibit the granting of the variance."

He said, "Generally speaking, a town must abide by its zoning regulations, but only for zoning regulations which would not be used for governmental functions, and that a firehouse, or even a sewerage plant, comes under those governmental functions."

Aronson said that the Lawton Weaver Rd. site was preferable to the other two sites under consideration, because of its location, at Woodbridge St. and E. Middle Tpke., and on Community Baptist Church property on E. Center St., would each necessitate the demolition of an existing building.

Police Chief James Reardon told the ZBA that the proposed firehouse would not aggravate nor add to the existing traffic pattern in the area.

He said that there would be no greater traffic problem than would exist if one of the other two sites were chosen.

He revealed that plans call for the elimination of parking on Woodbridge St. from Weaver Rd. to E. Middle Tpke., and for the interruption of the traffic.

He signed at the Green, in the event the fire trucks move. The light would be controlled from within the firehouse in the same manner as is now done at the Central firehouse.

Town Fire Chief W. Clifford Mason testified that he anticipated no problems of accessibility or maneuverability if the firehouse is constructed at the Lawton-Weaver Rd. site.

He said that the proposed site is within the boundaries of the area which had been zoned for the New England Fire Rating Association.

Opportunity to the variance grant was led by Mrs. Dorothy Jacobson, former executive director of the Town Planning Commission and former town representative on the Central Region Planning Agency.

She said, "My opposition is based on the grounds that a variance grant would be a clear violation of the spirit and letter of the zoning regulations, and would violate a decision you yourselves made less than two years ago."

She added, "The saving of money is not the issue for, if you grant this variance, it will cost you in the form of a complete revision of zoning standards."

"The integrity of the zoning regulations and the board's adherence to them," she said, "is the character of the town."

ZBA Chairman John Clifford, obviously bristling at Mrs. Jacobson's remarks, said that the board was not sitting to discuss the philosophy of zoning, but to consider a request, within its province.

Others who spoke in opposition to the variance grant were Mrs. Leo Juran of 30 Lawton Rd., who had opposed the Feb. 26, 1964 grant of a special exception for construction of the apartments; Henry Stephenson of 6 Lawton Rd., who was a potential traffic problem; and Charles Pirie of 10 Weaver Rd., a rear area hospital, or back to the United States, we have to send him out in pajamas.

Emphasis Moving to 'Supply'

NEW YORK (AP)—The voracious appetite of Americans for goods and services has kept the economy booming for almost five years. U.S. producers and businessmen have been able to meet the demand and profit by even though supply still exceeded the growing appetite.

But for the first time the emphasis is swinging toward supply rather than demand—supply of production facilities, supply of workers skilled enough to man them. This could determine how long the boom lasts.

Consumer, business and government demands for goods and services are expected to go on expanding in 1966. Will the supply be enough to meet all of them? Or will there be a pinch? And will this pinch mean rising prices or will it cause a slowing down of the expansion at last?

The Viet Nam war will increase the demand for both goods and manpower. So will the programs started or planned under the label of the Great Society.

It is the amount of this increase which economists are trying to assess. They have a pretty good idea of what the productive capacity will be, and what the increase in manpower could be.

What could pinch the supply side of the supply-demand equation is how much production capacity will be added up through filling defense orders and the government's civilian program.

When the current upswing ended early in 1961, life facilities were in a state of potential production then at 30 per cent.

But demand has grown more rapidly than new productive facilities have been built and now the gap is about one-fifth what it was, and only a big more than half what it was a year ago.
