Viet Christmas Truce Hailed in Washington

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and congressional leaders hailed today a truce between the men in Hanoi who use these precise hours to come to the conference table.

"We've got nothing to lose by making an offer," Humphrey said.

"It would like to see us propose the possibility of a cease-fire to stretch from Christmas Eve to the Tet—the Vietnamese New Year," he added.

Humphrey described the American offer as "the center of peace on earth come true."

"Let us hope that these 24 hours can be used to secure a permanent peace," the vice president said in a telephone interview from his home in Waverly, Minn. "Let us hope the men in Hanoi will use these precise hours to come to the conference table."

Humphrey also praised the persistent peace pleas by Pope Paul VI. "There is no doubt that the interest of the Pope has been very helpful."

"As President Johnson has repeatedly said, we welcome any efforts that are made to bring peace into Southeast Asia," he added.

Humphrey described the U. S. offer for a cease-fire "as a very welcome action on the part of the commanding general to end the hostilities. As you know, the President has left the matter to the field commanders."

House Speaker John W. McCormack, D-Mass., reached in his December 22, home, also voiced the hope that "the cessation will restore reason to the Communists and that they will enter into negotiations under honorable circumstances."

"The American proposal is not only justified but also a fine countermove," McCormack said. "And we have shown our willingness to go even further."

House Republican Leader Charles W. Price of Michigan described the pending cease-fire as "a good test of the legitimacy of the Communist forces."

"I'm delighted," the Republican said. "It would be the first time that anyone has thought to make this a partisan issue."

But Ford also cautioned that the cease-fire "may or may not have a relationship to further negotiations and a peaceful settlement."

However, another Republican leader, Sen. Leverett Saltonstall of Massachusetts, urged Americans "to hope and pray that it (the cease-fire) is a stepping-stone to negotiations."

"I'm delighted," the Republican said. "It would be the first time that anyone has thought to make this a partisan issue."

Rescue Operation

LIMA, Peru (AP) — The Peruvian air force rushed doctors, nurses, and supplies today to three small villages high in the Andes where officials said 15 persons were killed in a landslide.

Early unofficial reports from the area 100 miles northeast of Lima said between 100 and 200 were killed, but Luis Lopez Ramon, prefect of Arequipa, reported only 15 dead.

The slide roared down on the Andean villages of Acopas, Yurayacu and Olajon before dawn Wednesday after heavy rains on Tuesday.

The slide was 100 feet high and 100 feet wide. It fell from a mountain and flooded a tributary 12,000 feet above sea level.

Rome Trade Plan

ROME (AP) — Rome, where all roads lead to a traffic jam, Monday started a 10-day experiment limiting private automobiles from a 10-block-long residential district.

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Memories of Explosion Dull Keokuk's Christmas

KEOKUK, Iowa (AP) — As in any Christmas season, gay decorations adorn the streets of Keokuk.

Christmas trees blaze with lights. Shoppers ring out from stores. Carolers sing out from sidewalks. The town is gay.

Yet a somber note runs like a dirge beneath the holiday gaiety in this city of 18,000, shaken less than a month ago by its worst tragedy.

The National Guard Army blew up during a Thanksgiving Eve square dance at the Spring-Edwards Club, in one farmhouse in a nightmarish scene of death for the 60 to 70 dancers.

Twenty-one persons have died of burns and other injuries suffered in the blast. About 400 others were injured. Many faces were scarred, and many lost limbs.

Eight children were orphaned, twenty-six others lost one parent.

In one way or another, the blast has touched the lives of virtually every family in Keokuk and surrounding communities of Illinois, Iowa and Missouri.

It also has touched the hearts and opened the pocketbooks of people all over the United States, and as far away as Australia, Hawaii and British Columbia.

Kenneth Anderson of Burlington, who was called to the scene to help with the cleanup, said the tragedy "is a disaster that will be remembered for years to come."

State News PUC Works On Report Of Blackout

HARTFORD (AP)—The Connecticut Public Utilities Commission has finished its inquiry into the Nov. 9 power blackout and is preparing a report on its findings for Gov. John N. Dempsey. Dempsey requested the investigation, during which testimony was given by the heads of Connecticut power companies. Testimony was presented at the final session Thursday by Charles L. Derrick, president of the Hartford Electric Light Co., who joined previous power company officials in defending the "grid" system. Derrick told the commission that the system of joining utility companies into a connected network results in "reliable, uninterrupted service and lower electrical costs to the consumer." Derrick said the present trend is toward more and larger grids. His own company is linked with two other major Connecticut utilities and the Western Massachusetts Electric Co. in an organization called CONVEK for Connecticut Valley Electric Exchange. Derrick said he has no plans of divorcing CONVEK from the larger Northeastern grid which failed Nov. 19. "Basically," Derrick said, "the whole electrical industry has been building year by year on the principle that we need interconnections."

New March Is Planned By Negroes NATCHES, Miss. (AP)—On the Eve of Christmas, Negroes plan new marches in two Mississippi strongholds of the Ku Klux Klan to dramatize their "Black Christmas" protest. The marches coincide with Christmas-buying boycotts in Natchez and Fayette, 25 miles to the north. Even so, Charles Evans exhorting crowds Thursday night, the Grand Dragon of the United Klans of America swore out an affidavit charging Natches Police Chief J. T. Robinson with willful neglect of duty. The segregationist maneuver came after civil rights chieftains ordered a renewed boycott against merchants in Natches, accusing them of violating a three-week-old treaty on racial differences. Evans, field director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, rebuked the Christmas Eve march in Fayette to dramatize a boycott similar to one which shackled the economy of Natches, until it ended Dec. 2. NATCHES, Miss. (AP)—On the Eve of Christmas, Negroes plan new marches in two Mississippi strongholds of the Ku Klux Klan to dramatize their "Black Christmas" protest. The marches coincide with Christmas-buying boycotts in Natches and Fayette, 25 miles to the north. Even so, Charles Evans exhorting crowds Thursday night, the Grand Dragon of the United Klans of America swore out an affidavit charging Natches Police Chief J. T. Robinson with willful neglect of duty. The segregationist maneuver came after civil rights chieftains ordered a renewed boycott against merchants in Natches, accusing them of violating a three-week-old treaty on racial differences. Viet, India Hostilities Smoldering

NEW YORK (AP)—As the Christian world prepares today to observe Christmas, war and tension on a more marred celebration of the birth of the Prince of Peace. In Viet Nam, both the United States and its allies on one side and the Communists on the other announced the start of a Christmas truce—30 hours on the American side and 12 on the Communist side. But the 24 hours before were as bloody as ever, and U.S. officials expected the war to resume in full violence after midnight Christmas. India and Pakistan stood entrenched in hostile positions along their border, disaffected in the Kashmir dispute. India also confronted the menace of Communist China, whose border troops have been involved in recent shooting incidents with Indian patrols. Threat and fear still stalked the streets of Santo Domingo in the wake of last April's revolt in the Dominican Republic. In Africa, black-ruled nations kept up demands that Britain invade Rhodesia and crush the white-minority regime. The British, who limited their reaction to economic sanctions, are wary of a race war. Indonesia, though wracked by instability at home, showed no signs of letting up its "Crisis Malaysia" campaign. Iran was reported reinforcing its border with Iraq after two alleged attacks by Iraqi troops. But, as always, there were prayers and hopes for peace. Pope Paul VI in his annual Christmas message appealed for peace negotiations in Viet Nam.

France to End Market Boycott

PARIS (AP)—France is ready to end its boycott of the European Common Market and attend a meeting of the council of ministers in Brussels. The French have proposed that the foreign ministers of the six countries in the European Economic Community—its Common Market partners—West Germany, Belgium, Italy, Holland, Luxembourg and France, meet in Luxembourg Jan. 13, 1966. The French proposed Luxembourg as the meeting place.

Bus Crash Kills 12

CHICAGO (AP)—Millions of motorists heading for the highways today in the first part of the extended Christmas weekend were warned of hazardous driving conditions in many areas. Traffic accidents in the early hours of the holiday period killed at least 12 in a Greyhound bus which went off an icy highway north of Medford, in southern Oregon. The count of traffic deaths started at 6 p.m. local time, Thursday. The National Safety Council said that at the end of the 78-hour holiday period at midnight Sunday between 860 and 880 persons may die in traffic accidents. A state police officer at Medford said the bus went over an embankment on Interstate 5, going over a ditch and fence. Thirty persons were reported injured. The bus was en route from Spokane, Wash., to San Francisco, and had stopped at Portland. Ambulances and emergency vehicles from surrounding communities took the injured to three hospitals in the city. Erving Carew, Greyhound superintendent at Medford, said there were 23 persons on the bus when it left Portland. The driver, Joseph Bailey of Iron Ground, Wash., told police he was traveling about 45 miles an hour when the bus began to skid. Bailey said steering failed to respond and the bus skidded off the highway. He was reported in satisfactory condition with possible internal injuries. Police said the bus was lying on its side about 100 feet from the highway. It tipped completely over a ditch and a fence police said. The council terms this Christmas weekend as the most dangerous holiday period of any year, a time of long trips, minimum daylight and inclement weather. 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Viet Truce Quiets Guns

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—A Christmas Eve truce declared by both the Allied armed forces and the insurgent Communist Viet Cong appeared tonight to have stilled the guns, the terror and the slaughter that has tortured South Viet Nam for years. The American-South Vietnamese decision to stop all offensive action for 30 hours went into effect at 8 p.m. and the Viet Cong seemed to have been faithful to their announced promise of a 12-hour truce as of 7 p.m. The cease-fire in the embattled country turned out to be at least some of it back to the little people. Most noticeable was the reaction in Saigon, the capital. The streets were a mass of humanity. People who have not been on these streets for perhaps months were out in force with their children. The truce orders went to infantrymen in the jungles, to Air Force units that had been striking in both North and South Viet Nam and to Viet Cong fighters playing the South China Sea in support of the ballooning war effort. The truce went into effect at 8 p.m., which was 5 a.m. Eastern Standard Time. The Communist Viet Cong announced three times that they would undertake no offensive action or acts of terrorism from Christmas Eve, one hour after the cease-fire started, until 7 a.m. Saturday, 17 hours before the U.S.-South Vietnamese truce ended. The Viet Cong had offered to observe what happens at the end of the Viet Cong moratorium while the American truce still was to be in effect for another 17 hours. Official concerned this might call for some split-second moral decisions. At midnight Christmas, however, the U.S. forces will be free to resume "normal operations," a senior Army spokesman said.
