

Humphrey Asks Aid, Advice from Japan

TOKYO (AP) — U.S. Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey arrived in Tokyo tonight on the first leg of a brief Asian tour and appealed to Japan for help and advice in "our common endeavors."

Humphrey planned an 18-hour stopover on route to the inauguration of Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos. During his Asian swing he will talk to leaders about Viet Nam but won't go there.

Met by Prime Minister Eisaku Satō and Foreign Minister Etsusaburo Shibusawa, the vice president delivered an arrival statement which appeared to anticipate Japanese calls for no-holds-barred discussion of U.S. policy in Viet Nam, a touchy subject in Japan.

"The brevity of my stay should not obscure the importance we in the United States attach to frequent and frank consultation with your leaders," he said.

"Our goals and aspirations are much the same. We share the same deep commitments to peace, liberty and the prosperity of all peoples. We value your friendship, we look for your advice, we need your help in our common endeavors."

This last sentence could have been a veiled reference to the fact that the Japanese, though still pro-American, are reluctant allies where Viet Nam is concerned.

About an hour before Humphrey arrived, police cleared some 200 Communist students from the airport's viewing ramp.

Shortly before he landed some 2,500 leftists demonstrated for 45 minutes in downtown Tokyo. They shouted "War against Humphrey go home." Police said the march was noisy but orderly.

Police escorted an intersection leading to the U.S. Embassy and kept the demonstrators from heading in that direction.

The march followed a rally at a downtown park where the Communists adopted a resolution accusing the United States of "trying to organize an Asian military alliance among the Philippines, Nationalist China, South Korea and Japan" by sending Humphrey to Asia.

Humphrey goes to Manila Wednesday to represent the United States at the inauguration Thursday of Philippine President-elect Ferdinand E. Marcos.

The U. S. vice president also is scheduled to meet with President Chiang Kai-shek of Nationalist China and South Korea in Seoul and with President Chiang Kai-shek of Nationalist China on Formosa. He returns to Washington Jan. 2.

Before taking off from Andrews Air Force Base Monday night, Humphrey said he welcomes the opportunity to meet with the leaders of Japan, Nationalist China and South Korea. He described them as "old and good friends" of the United States.

Humphrey said he hopes the talks will be both "cordial and mutually beneficial."

On his first major trip since becoming vice president, Humphrey is expected to explore with the Asian leaders the future of the Asian pact.

New Four-Day Truce Announced by Cong

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Owen Harris, D-Ark., who was named to a federal judgeship last August, announced today he will resign from Congress and take the new post next Feb. 3.

Among other things he will be leaving the chairmanship of the House Commerce Committee, which handles legislation dealing with all forms of transportation, radio and television broadcasting, public utilities and other activities supervised by governmental regulatory agencies.

Rep. Harley O. Staggers, D-W.Va., is in line to become chairman of the committee, which Harris has headed for seven years. Harris, 62, has been a member of Congress for 24 years.

President Johnson nominated Harris last August for a long-vacant Arkansas District Court judgeship, and the Senate quickly confirmed the nomination. Harris delayed taking the new post, however, to continue through this year's session of Congress.

Rhodesia Begins Rationing of Oil

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (AP) — Rhodesians began to feel the pinch of the oil embargo against their government today. Rationing began of gasoline and diesel oil for passenger cars, trucks and buses.

Prime Minister Ian Smith waded until after Christmas to announce the measure Monday.

Owners of private cars will get three to five gallons of fuel per week. There is no restriction on diesel oil for commercial vehicles, but those using gasoline are limited to five to 10 gallons per week depending on size.

Doctors, veterinary surgeons, undertakers, diplomats and most government organizations are exempt.

Britain announced the oil embargo against Smith's white minority government 10 days ago. Smith declared independence from Britain Nov. 11 after independence talks broke down over Britain's insistence that Rhodesia's four million Africans be given a progressively bigger voice in the government. There are 200,000 whites in Rhodesia.

Most major oil producing countries joined the ban. But the success of the embargo depends on diesel oil from neighboring South Africa and on Portugal.

Rhodesia needs about 280,000 tons of oil a year and gets most of it through the pipeline that runs across Portuguese Mozambique from the Indian Ocean to Rhodesia. Portugal's African territory of Angola produces about 800,000 tons of crude oil a year and could easily increase its production to meet Rhodesia's needs. South Africa supplies about \$2 million worth of petroleum products to Rhodesia.

Rhodesia cut off the flow of oil to black-ruled Zambia, its neighbor to the north, after Britain announced the embargo. Britain and Canada have started an effort to keep Zambia supplied with oil and Canadian sources in the Congo said the trade with the rebel British colony. A Cabinet decision to ban trade goes into effect Wednesday. Trade between the Netherlands and Rhodesia amounted to \$5.8 million a year.

Fanfani Quits Job In Italy

ROME (AP) — Amintore Fanfani, president of the U.N. General Assembly, resigned today as Italy's foreign minister after a storm of criticism over his role in handling a purported North Viet Nam peace feeler which Hanoi disavowed.

The resignation of the 67-year-old Fanfani came only a week before a special session of the Chamber of Deputies called to question his part as middleman in the purported peace maneuver.

Fanfani made it clear he still wants to face the commission and answer its questions.

"He asked that his resignation become effective Jan. 6, one day after the extraordinary commission hearing, so that he can appear before his critics while still foreign minister."


Some here expressed the opinion that Premier Aldo Moro would refuse to accept the resignation as a sign of solidarity with Fanfani, who is of his same Christian Democratic party but who often has been his political opponent.

In his letter of resignation, Fanfani indicated that he still

2 Wounded By Gunfire In Hospital

NEW YORK (AP) — A doctor and a maternity patient were critically wounded in a wild hospital of gunfire at Bellevue Hospital Monday night before police overpowered the fleeing gunman.

Detectives said the assault was Nevaldo Serrano Medina, 42, a laborer who had lived with the woman, Gloria Santiago, 23, for six years. Police said he opened fire when she spurned his attempt at a reconciliation.

The woman gave birth to a girl on Christmas Day. Police said the couple, who have three older children, parted eight months ago.

Detectives gave this account: Serrano came to New York Monday from Hollywood, Fla., where he works, to seek a reconciliation with Miss Santiago, who had been living in Manhattan.

He met her in a corridor outside a maternity ward, and created a disturbance when she refused him. A nurse made Serrano leave the hospital.

Serrano returned to the hospital Monday night and confronted Miss Santiago in the presence of Dr. Jerome Seller, 27.

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LBJ, McNamara Meet on Budget

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — President Johnson and Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara conferred today at the LBJ Ranch about the new Pentagon budget and developments in Viet Nam.

McNamara flew to the ranch for dinner Monday night, talked with Johnson until after midnight and began a new round of conferences about 7 a.m. over breakfast, acting press secretary Joseph Laitin reported.

The President is pushing plans for a gun-and-butter federal budget for the 1966 Congress. Normally, the budget would be due by Jan. 25 but Laitin said an extension of the deadline might be sought "because of new hard looks at possible new economic."

In addition to meetings with McNamara, Johnson conferred by telephone this morning with speaker of the House of Commons, the Lord Chancellor, and Secretary of the Treasury Henry H. Fowler.

Laitin said Johnson and McNamara talked about the budget of the Christmas cease-fire in Viet Nam, material and manpower needs and "the general Vietnamese situation."

He said the two men also reviewed reports forwarded from Viet Nam by Gen. Earle G. Wheeler, chairman of the Joint

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3 U.S. Leftists Reported In Hanoi on Illegal Visit

NEW YORK (AP) — Staughton Lynd, a Yale professor and a spokesman for the "new left," is reported to have talked with leaders of Communist North Viet Nam and the Viet Cong.

Lynd, accompanied by two other Americans, is on an unauthorized mission that could result in stiff federal penalties.

The trip is sponsored by the magazine Viet Report "in an effort to clarify the position of the National Liberation Front (Viet Cong) and the Democratic Republic of (North) Viet Nam," said John McDermott, associate editor of the magazine.

McDermott said an afternoon news conference would be held today to elaborate on the trip and its purposes.

The other two men on the trip are Thomas Hayden, a founder of the Students for a Democratic Society, and Herbert Aptheker, a reputed Communist theorist.

Lynd's wife, reunited at her home in New Haven, Conn., Monday night, said: "He is going because of his concern for peace."

The three left New York Dec. 15 and flew to Brussels, France, by way of London, and then to Moscow, Peking and then to North Viet Nam by way of Cambodia, said McDermott.

He said the magazine had not

Lynd, 36, an assistant professor of history at Yale University, has a long identification with pacifist activities. He is regarded as a leading spokesman for the "new left" — the ad hoc committees, student groups, and the lonely rebels and revolutionaries.

The mission represents the bringing together of a number of critics of U. S. policy in Viet Nam.

Lynd has demonstrated against the war in Viet Nam and the magazine Viet Report is a frequent critic of American policy there. The Students for a Democratic Society has been an organizing force in the antiwar demonstrations.

The three men could face a \$5,000 fine, five years in prison, or both for visiting North Viet Nam without permission from the State Department.

Lynd, a 35-year-old Quaker, has defied the Internal Revenue Service over a matter of \$200 in income taxes. He was spatiated

Queen Inaugurates Abbey's Anniversary

LONDON (AP) — Queen Elizabeth II placed a bouquet of red roses on a small altar in Westminster Abbey today to inaugurate the year-long celebration of the 900th anniversary of British premier church.

The abbey was consecrated on Dec. 28, 1065, Holy Innocent Day. Edward the Confessor, who had ordered it built, died soon after without seeing the completed structure.

Since its consecration as a Benedictine monastery, the abbey has been the coronation church of all of England's monarchs but two. Elizabeth was married there in 1947 and recrowned there in 1953. Thirteen British kings and five queens are buried there.

It was to honor the abbey's builder that the queen took the roses today from a cushion carried by the abbey's senior chor-

ister and laid them on the altar near the marble tomb of King Edward.

As the queen arrived with her husband, Prince Philip, her sister, Princess Margaret, and other members of the royal family, a ceremonial prelude was played on the great abbey organ. It was composed for the occasion by Sir Arthur Bliss, master of the queen's music.

Resplendently garbed officials took part in the stately ceremonial. The Archbishops of Canterbury, York, Wales and Dublin were on hand along with the Primus of Scotland and representatives of other churches in Britain and overseas.

Also attending were the speaker of the House of Commons, the Lord Chancellor, and members of the government

'A Total Bust' Sound's Oyster Beds Are Virtually Empty

HARTFORD (AP) — For the first time since record-keeping began in 1881, a spokesman for the State Shellfish Commission said today, there are virtually no baby oysters in Long Island Sound.

"We've always had something," said Ernest J. Bontya, the commission's engineer of shell fisheries. "This year was a total bust."

Bontya and his crew investigated the spawning area immediately after the July to September season and found no baby oysters "for all practical purposes" ready to grow to maturity.

When born, baby oysters ("spat") swim around for a few weeks and then take up permanent residence on a rock or an old shell near the shore. Then they grow their own shells and in three years are ready to produce spat of their own. But for this to happen there must be enough fresh water running off into the sound from the land.

This year, nothing went right. The lack of rain produced only a trickle of runoff. The oysters either consumed their young ingested the spawning area immediately after the July to September season and found no baby oysters "for all practical purposes" ready to grow to maturity.

Bontya made waves the pollution that caused the industry's annual worth to decline from about \$50 million in 1955 to about \$2 million or \$3 million now.

Despite the disaster of 1965, Bontya said, the future isn't completely bleak. Pollution has decreased in some places and

Registration for the winter season of classes at Lutz Junior Museum starts Tuesday, Jan. 4. The classes themselves begin during the week of Jan. 17.



BURLINGTON, Vt. (AP) — They had come from a Christmas party in Burlington, Vt., where they were celebrating the 25th anniversary of the death of their father, Paul Blackmore, who had died in a car crash, tragically twisted out of shape.

"I asked a man if anyone was hurt and he said yes and that for the first time since the crash, he could see only one car, prostrated twisted out of shape.

Seven persons died in the collision. Seven others — including four children — escaped with their lives but must spend months in cases because all have one or more broken bones.

The accident occurred Sunday at the intersection of two U.S. highways in the flatland country in Vermont. Visibility across the road was excellent. The road was dry, the sky was only slightly overcast. It was mid-afternoon.

BURLINGTON, Vt. (AP) — For the fifth consecutive year, the Burlington Free Press is offering a free funeral to anyone planning to drink and drive on New Year's Eve.

To be eligible, all you have to do is notify the newspaper of your holiday plans before 4 p.m. EST, Dec. 31. If you get killed, the paper pays for everything.

In past years, a total of 39 persons have taken advantage of the offer. Four of them lived in Adelaide, Australia, and registered by cable.

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

but a person of high intelligence and in many respects a stern moral principle.

We had a highly intelligent and sternly moral present American Secretary of State on the record the other day to the effect that we were fighting in Vietnam for a similar objective.

The Monitor article explains the title Mr. Barwick gave his book.

"The guilt of the Germans, according to Mr. Barwick, is that they failed to do what they would have been able to do. They failed to wage wars they would have won.

"The Germans," he writes, "are guilty before history" because "they were too peaceful, too guileless, too decent. For that they are still being punished to day."

There is quite a vocal American cult which charges that the United States has committed similar sins, in not "winning" the war in Korea, the revolution in China, the battle for American occupation of Berlin and all Germany, the Hungarian revolution, and the war in Southeast Asia long before this, and even in not smashing China before it gets any stronger than it is.

The Monitor article does civilization a service in reminding us of the kind of values and moralities none of us want to see reviving themselves in Germany, or growing too tall out of human and national natures anywhere else.

Where There's Honor We haven't read all the John F. Kennedy books to know whether they get around to giving full credit to the importance of his dry, sophisticated sense of humor had in establishing his precious parity on our national scene.

But it was, in retrospect, the essential feather in the hat of all the young gallantry, and the continual reminder that there was and could be a grim responsibility of our time.

A good deal of the Kennedy humor was not easily reproduced. It depended, sometimes, on the facial expression which accompanied it, or upon the particular voice inflection he employed; but even when it could not be exactly reproduced or recounted, it left its long-lasting flavor inside those who had been exposed to it.

All of which is disproportionate pride to our greeting of a hope that we may be about to give, in American public life, another personality a little different from the grim normalities of the day.

Where is the saving sense of humor in American public life today? In President Johnson, the Texan revivalist? In Vice President Humphrey, the passionate persuader? In the good Governor Dempsey? In the bald and balding Goldwater? In the poli-heated Governor Rockefeller? In the frolicsome Richard Nixon?

So help us, the only humor we have seen in the national scene since the departure of President Kennedy has been the delightfully deadpan performance in which Senator Everett Dirksen renders those magnificent parodies of himself for the benefit of press conferences and television cameras.

But the other day Mayor-elect John Lindsay of New York City addressed a luncheon of the Women's National Press Club in Washington, and that was where and when our new hope was born.

"In the immortal words of Jack Vance," said the Mayor-elect, "I step much better at night knowing my wife is in charge of playing Marlene Dietrich."

When he was asked if he would "support Richard Nixon for the Presidency in 1968" he had trouble hearing the proposal.

Asked if he agreed with "Republican proposals regarding an escalation of the war in Vietnam," Mayor-elect Lindsay replied, first, that he didn't recall "that anybody was so unkind as to ask Mayor Wagner that question."

Then, after he had made his quip, he proceeded to give his honest, candid answer, in which he did not think escalation was "the answer" and that he favored a "greater exercise in vigorous diplomacy" and that his observation was that American operations in Vietnam up to now have "seemed to snowball themselves into policy," which is one good way of describing how we get ourselves into such a dead end there.

Find a little controlled humor in public life, and there's likely to be a little sanity dwelling right close to it.

For The Birds? Alexander Calder, one of the more famous Waterbury area residents, and a world-renowned artist, has advanced an argument in favor of pigeon-proofing outdoor sculpture. While in New York City supervising the erection of his statue at Lincoln Center, Mr. Calder observed that his work, unlike other contemporary outdoor sculptures, is not susceptible to the vandalism of pigeons.

He explained that his pieces have fewer horizontal planes than the sculpture of Henry Moore, for example, and that his metal shapes can be repainted to cover any indiscriminate pigeon markings.

Mr. Calder's observation is probably unique in sculpture theory, although since he also has a reputation for puerile humor it may all have been said with tongue in cheek. But at any rate it might be interesting to speculate what would be the effect on the form and shape if all outdoor sculpture were designed to prevent pigeons from roosting on it and defacing it.

And why not similar considerations for buildings, whose facades are favorite targets for the feathered city pests? We might, in fact, develop a new anti-pigeon school of art and architecture. — WATERBURY REPUBLICAN

Connecticut Yankee

By A.H.O. Meade Alcorn, Republican floor leader in the Constitutional Convention, and therefore a chief spokesman for the bipartisan product of that Convention, was also the prime mover behind the single appeal question which had equal place on the voting machines with the new Constitution.

As the referendum date approached, Alcorn obviously was devoted to the approval of both questions. The Constitution he had helped produce, and the eminent domain amendment he had also introduced, were brought through Convention storms. And he had been a completely free agent, the possibility is just that he would have campaigned just as ardently for the new put amendment as he did for the entire new Constitution. In fact, when the campaign opened, he seemed to be leading in that direction. He soon recognized, however, a duty and obligation to the Convention itself and to his party which was greater than his possible personal preference.

From that moment on he became the chief champion of the Constitution on the campaign platform and in the deliberations of the Constitutional Convention. It is capitalizing the position of world socialism, which provided the public climax to the campaign, and this was a role which forced him to relinquish any special public advocacy of the eminent domain proposal.

So, in the voting, the Dec. 14 outcome was both a victory and a defeat for Alcorn—a victory because the Constitution he defended was approved by the voters—a defeat because the position of world socialism was defeated. Even the defeat was not without some credit, however, because as we have indicated, Alcorn deliberately chose to save the Constitution first.

But a discussion of what happened in the voting on Dec. 14 is only the beginning of the Constitutional crisis in Connecticut, plus the mixture into it of the eminent domain issue, has done for or to the Alcorn career.

An Alcorn, Hugh Meade the elder, ran for Governor in 1924 and lost to Wilbur L. Cross. And Meade the younger ran for lieutenant governor in 1948 and lost. In both defeats, the fact that both had been state attorneys, the son directly succeeded his father in the office.

Moscow's Foreign Policy Seeks Security, Insurance

By WILLIAM L. RYAN, AP Special Correspondent. The shape of Soviet foreign policy in 1966 will have important bearing on chances for negotiation in Viet Nam. By spring, the world may have a better idea of those chances.

All signs indicate Soviet policy is being retorted to fit new situations, including finding prospects for any reconciliation with Red China.

Soviet aims seem concerned with security and insurance; security to pursue internal economic goals, and insurance against involvement against its will in direct conflict with the United States.

Soviet policy now is zeroing in on Western Europe, suggesting that Moscow wants to make friends with its Western neighbors, expand economic and cultural contacts and reap long-range benefits. A Soviet-British summit meeting is in prospect for February.

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Volpe, Donahue Dominate Bay State's Tax Battle

BOSTON (AP) — The Massachusetts tax battle boiled down once again today to confrontation between its two dominant figures, Republican Gov. John A. Volpe and Senate President Maurice A. Donahue, D-Holyoke.

A combination of minority Republicans and dissident Democrats trumped the House Democratic leadership Monday night and carried Volpe's sixth tax bill to final House passage by vote of 120-102.

Now the bill, based upon a two-year 3 per cent limited sales tax and a number of excise taxes, goes to the Senate. Volpe's fourth bill also passed the House but was defeated in the Senate.

The bill was designed to raise an estimated \$200 million. The House leadership was able to trim the total by only \$3 million before debate was shut off.

The key difference in the nature of the rate tax which would become effective Feb. 1, 1966, and terminate Dec. 31, 1967, unless the legislature acts to extend increases.

After the vote, Volpe said, "I am gratified at the action taken in the House. I am hopeful that the Senate will take favorable action in the near future."





