

Nine Miners Killed As Gas Explodes

REDSTONE, Colo. (AP)—Nine miners were killed in a methane gas explosion in a coal mine in isolated wilderness country of western Colorado shortly before midnight Tuesday.

The bodies were brought to the surface from the No. 4 south tunnel of the No. 1 Dutch Creek coal mine today.

The mine is 28 miles south-east of Glenwood Springs.

Officials closed off the area, deep in the White River National Forest, to all but mine officials, mine inspectors and others in official capacities.

The men all were married and most of them had children.

The mine is operated by the Mid-Continental Coal & Coke Co. with headquarters in Chicago and offices in Glenwood Springs.

Miners in other tunnels of the workings were not injured.

Officials said the explosion hit at 11:48 p.m. The crew had gone on shift at 2 p.m. and was working overtime to get extra time off for the New Year holiday.

As soon as all the bodies have been brought to the surface, officials said the tunnel will be sealed to await inspection by federal and state mine inspectors.

Sen. Saltonstall To Retire in 1967

BOSTON (AP)—Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, R-Mass., announced today he is closing out a 45-year career in public office by retiring when he reaches the end of his present term in the U.S. Senate in January 1967.

Saltonstall called a news conference to make the announcement. He read from a piece of yellow paper, he said he wanted to read from it, his own longhand, for sentimental reasons.

He said he would be difficult for me to serve for another six-year term with the seal, ability and conscientiousness that I would want to serve," he said.

Saltonstall is 73 and he would be 74 at the start of another term.

"Are you feeling your years?" a reporter asked.

"Well, I'd be glad to take you on," he replied.

He said that he would not attempt to suggest a successor to the list of the names of U.S. Senators.

He listed Atty. Gen. Edward W. Brooke and Gov. John A. Volpe as possibilities and added to the list the names of Lt. Gov. Elliot L. Richardson and four of the five Republican congressmen from Massachusetts.

White naming U.S. Reps. P. Bradford Morse, William H. Bates, Hastings Keith and Silvio O. Conte, he omitted the name of Rep. Joseph W. Martin Jr., who is 80.

Asked if he would include in his list the name of former Rep. Laurence Curtis, who ran for the Senate in 1962 but lost in the GOP primary, he said:

"Larry Curtis is a friend of long standing. I played hockey with him in 1914 and tennis too until he lost his leg in the first World War. I don't know what his ambitions are."

On the Democratic side, Boston Mayor John F. Collins is regarded as a candidate, and former Gov. Endicott Peabody has said he plans to run for either senator or governor next November. Also a possibility is former Gov. Foster Furcolo, who was defeated by Saltonstall in the primary in a second try for Senate in 1960.

Saltonstall first was elected to the Senate in 1944 to replace Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. Lodge had resigned to go on active duty with the U.S. Army in Europe in World War II.

He won his first full term in 1948 when he was the only Republican in the state to survive a Democratic landslide paced by former President Harry S. Truman.

He won again in 1954, and was re-elected in 1960 despite the massive Democratic turnout in the election which saw native son John F. Kennedy elected to the presidency.

Saltonstall is the senior Republican on the Senate Appropriations and Armed Services committees. He ranked third in seniority among all Senate Republicans.

Before going to the Senate, Saltonstall had served three terms as governor of Massachusetts, the only man to hold the office that length of time in this century.

While Saltonstall did not give a specific reason for retiring, he said the speculation that he "is nothing to what I was."

Her baby was born on Christmas Day, not long after Mrs. Coates attended the wedding of her 19-year-old daughter, Pauline.

"I felt really ill during the wedding service," said Mrs. Coates.

"I stayed at the church only long enough for one wedding photograph and then I went home and took to my bed. I believe it was my mother who decided that the doctor should be called."

"I had taken two sleeping tablets, and I was half asleep. Then I heard him say, 'Why, she's going to have a baby!'"

"I said 'never,' but he was right. They got me to the hospital. My husband and I are delighted."

Mrs. Coates' daughter and her new son-in-law postponed their honeymoon to look after mother and child.

Mrs. Coates and her husband, 44, a miner, also have a son, 21. They named the baby Angela.

Said Mrs. Coates' husband:

"She says she was surprised. That's nothing to what I was."

Kohler Meets With Podgorny

MOSCOW (AP)—U.S. Ambassador Foy D. Kohler met for an hour today with President Nikolai S. Podgorny and U.S. Embassy spokesman said Kohler requested the meeting "in the nature of a courtesy call."

Despite this description, the meeting was bound to arouse speculation about possible U.S. Soviet attempts to bring peace to Viet Nam.

Asked if Viet Nam was discussed, the U.S. spokesman said that he could not disclose anything about the nature of the talks.

Podgorny became president Dec. 9, replacing Anastas I. Mikoyan, who quit because of age and poor health. Ambassadors in Moscow, following protocol, have been seeking courtesy visits with him.

The U.S. Embassy spokesman said that the Kohler meeting was requested shortly after Podgorny became president.

The talk took place shortly after the Soviet Union announced that Alexander N. Shepin, a top-ranking Soviet troubleshooter, will go to Hanoi also came while W. Averell Harriman, President Johnson's troubleshooter, was in Warsaw, Poland, on a secret mission.

But there have been no indications in the Soviet press that Viet Nam — full support for Hanoi — has been a topic of the talks.

ICC Denies Report Rail Merger Okayed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission issued a formal denial today that it has approved the Pennsylvania-New York Central Railroad merger.

Referring to a Wall Street Journal story which said the merger had been approved, the ICC said:

"The statement that the commission has approved the Pennsylvania-New York Central Railroad merger is contrary to fact."

"The application for merger of the two railroads, and related issues, is pending before the commission and final action has not been taken."

"The commission has neither approved nor disapproved the application. The proceeding has not yet been initiated, and is, under active consideration."

A spokesman for the commission said Tuesday the agency had not voted on the issue "nor is a vote imminent."

The newspaper said the ICC was expected to announce its decision in mid-January and that the unionization would be effective April 1.

Its story, written before the ICC denial, added:

"In Washington, the ICC, which normally would have quickly struck down such a report if untrue — refused to comment."

"The two railroads filed their merger application with the ICC in 1962. Two ICC examiners last March approved the merger, subject to certain conditions."

The merger would form a 19,600-mile system, largest private rail network in the world, linking 14 states and part of Canada.

Under the merger proposal, holders of Central stock would receive 1.3 shares of Pennsylvania for each share held. Penny holders would get one share of the new stock for each share of Penny.

Truce Aura Pervades Vietnamese War Zone

Manila Is Second Stop On Humphrey's Journey

MANILA (AP)—Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey arrived in Manila today on the second stop of his brief Asian tour after asking the Japanese government to help bring peace to Viet Nam.

Humphrey will represent the United States at the inauguration Thursday of President Ferdinand E. Marcos.

During his 18-hour stopover in Tokyo, Humphrey asked Prime Minister Eisaku Sato for the help of Japan "or any other government to achieve peace in Viet Nam."

His humanity would appreciate Japan's efforts if they succeeded, Humphrey told Sato during a 30-minute conference earlier today. Their talks were closed but newsmen were told what was said by U.S. Embassy spokesman Owen Zurbellen Jr.

Humphrey apparently was not expecting a Japanese reply to his appeal, and Zurbellen said it was in such general terms that none was called for.

If Humphrey's statements seemed to be directed more at Japan for military aid, American critics of American policy in Viet Nam than at the government, which supports the U.S. stand.

Zurbellen said Humphrey gave Sato a document outlining 150 conversations which Secretary of State Dean Rusk held with diplomats and other persons in an effort to get a peace conference. It also enumerated 14 other actions Rusk took in "the pursuit of peace."

The vice president said the American people look forward to a "time when the great resources now being used for the war can be applied to peaceful progress instead."

He told Sato that when demonstrators call for the United States to "get out of Viet Nam," Humphrey when his chairman Koos Sasaki boycotted a luncheon for the vice president at Sato's residence.

U.S. Still Sends Men Into Jungle

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Truce talk pervaded the Vietnamese theater of war tonight, but the United States underscored its commitment to South Viet Nam by airlifting another brigade of U.S. troops into the jungle conflict.

The moratorium in the U.S. air war on North Viet Nam went into its sixth day, but the halt in the air attack still drew no public peace feeler from Hanoi.

The South Vietnamese government was reported ready to sign the Viet Cong in proclaiming a cease-fire for the Vietnamese New Year next month. The United States entertained some doubts but was expected to concur in the truce.

Neither Washington nor Saigon saw the Communist offer of a truce on Tet, the lunar New Year festival Jan. 20-23, as a significant breakthrough toward peace. In the long guerrilla war, a military lull during the national holiday has become an annual ritual.

The airlift of some 4,000 jungle fighters from Hawaii to the Vietnam theater of war went into its sixth day, but the halt in the air attack still drew no public peace feeler from Hanoi.

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Girl, 6, Saves 12 from Death In Resort Cabin

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—A 6-year-old girl woke a group of San Antonio women and teenage girls early today when their resort cabin filled with deadly carbon monoxide fumes.

The girl, Tamara Sue Taylor, was credited with saving the lives of 12 other girls and women at the Baptist encampment on Lake Travis. Tamara is the daughter of the Rev. Jack Taylor, pastor of the First Baptist church in the San Antonio suburb of Castle Hills.

The women and girls were treated at a local hospital before daybreak for severe headaches and nausea. Tamara, her mother and two other women were transferred to a San Antonio hospital where their condition was listed as satisfactory.

"It was Tammy who saved us," said LaDonna Blacklock, 36. "She felt sick and started crying. That woke up her mother, Barbara Taylor, who got up and started trying to get the rest of us up."

The women and girls were in a group from Castle Hills First Baptist church of San Antonio making a three-day midwinter retreat at the encampment. Today was the last day of the retreat.

Deputy Sheriff Dee Button said the carbon monoxide was traced to a butane heating stove "running wide open with all the windows closed."

Tomorrow's Doctor Shows Many Changes

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—A physician today predicted that 10 years from now when you go to a doctor:

He will be a member of a team caring for you.

The stress will be on preventing illness in the first place.

You may have as many as 30 or more tests run — most of them simple — with automated equipment and a computer analyzing the results initially for your doctor.

But you will get total, comprehensive care with one doctor taking personal charge of you regardless of how many specialists you might see.

The predictions — and "it is precarious trying to prognosticate" — came from Dr. C.C. Cutting, executive director of the Permanent Medical Group, Oakland, Calif.

"We are standing on the brink of a medical care explosion," due to vastly expanded knowledge, greater public interest and a rash of health legislation, Dr. Cutting told the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

"The resulting tremendous demand, coupled with a serious shortage of medical manpower, will of necessity sweep medical medicine into entirely new concepts of providing service by 1976," he said.

Town's Anniversary Is Year's Top Event

Tolland had an election in 1965, that was the regular one, but the anniversary of the town's founding is a determined effort by the Democratic to celebrate the town's new school building which was dedicated in 1965, and found it well along as the year drew to a close.

Tolland, with its rapidly increasing population, saw a number of new buildings erected or begun during the year to meet its growing needs.

Despite all these events, Tolland story stands out in 1965: The town celebrated its 200th anniversary of its founding with a week of festivities which drew people throughout the area to partake in the festivities.

The celebration, under the direction of Selectman Frank Kales, was held here June 27 to July 3rd.

Opening ceremonies were attended by more than 1,000 people and included a speech by Governor John Dempsey, Sen. Carmelo Zanghi and Congressman William J. O'Connell and Chief Justice John H. Hollister.

Children's Day was held on Monday, and the modern-day strains of the "Big Boat" were heard on the historic Town Green, as local teenagers competed in a boat race.

The town's entry in the Presidential Campaign was a highlight of the week. Mrs. Gay defeated Mrs. Backus 74 to 74 on the second round.

A historical museum featured many articles representative of Tolland's heritage, and was well attended during the anniversary week. It also generated interest in the formation of a Tolland Historical Society and museum.

The anniversary also saw the history of Tolland rewritten and brought up to date by Mrs. Theodore Palmer, with assistance from David Cook.

The town witnessed a boom in public building, to meet the needs of Tolland's rapidly growing population.

Construction of Connecticut's first all-electric school began. Plans for the building with a 22-classroom core, including administrative offices and a gym, cafeteria, and locker room, were approved in May, and the construction contract was awarded to Anderson-Park Construction Co. of Hartford.

The roof will be put on the structure next month, and masonry work on the outside of the classroom core is more than half completed.

The new Tolland post office was dedicated at a ceremony attended by U. S. Representative William St. Onge in June. A new fire station is built on Marrow Rd. and controls very over its location in residential zone.

Thomas Manning, nominee for first selectman, accused incumbent first selectman Carmelo Zanghi of "lack of effective leadership" for permitting the situation to arise.

Zanghi called a town meeting at which residents voted to accept a possible water supply to exempt all municipal property from zoning restrictions.

The town's two churches, St. Matthew's and United Congregational, both worked on building plans.

St. Matthew's new church, nearing completion, is off the Green at the corner of Dunn Hill Rd. The new church will accommodate 720 worshippers; the parish, formed only last year, has over 1,500 parishioners.

The United Congregational Church has started a fund drive.

GREEK STRANGE REASON FOR HUFFING IN DUMMAY

You often ruff a side card with one of dummy's trump to help get up the suit; or even if the suit is set up — if you want the lead in dummy. When also would you ruff a side suit in the dummy?

Opening lead — Ten of Diamonds.
When this hand was played in the recent national tournament in San Francisco, declarer took the first trick in dummy with the ace of diamonds and led out the ace and king of clubs at once. If the queen failed to drop South would ruff a club in dummy to set up the rest of the clubs.

As it happened, the queen did drop. The rest of the clubs were good, so South abandoned the suit in order to get the trumps out.

When South led a low trump from his hand West played low, allowing dummy's jack to win. West took the next trump and led his last card, a heart, whereupon East ruffed to defeat the contract.

Medal for West
Pin a medal on West for refusing the first trump trick. He had to get the trumps out of dummy before he could give East a ruff. Don't look for any medals for South. If you go back to the first paragraph you'll see where South went wrong.

Even though the clubs are all good, South should lead a third club and ruff it in dummy. There is no need to get the lead in dummy, but South must get the last club out of West's hand.

Only then can South safely lead trumps. West gets in with his ace of trumps but cannot defeat the contract with a ruff.

U.S. Force May Reach Half Million Next Year

EDITOR'S NOTE — Unless they don't seem to be limited in Vietnam, this is something new for the American people. This is the third of four articles on the American role in Vietnam.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. military effort in Vietnam may approach or exceed the 400,000 man peak level of the Korean War by next summer.

With this buildup, the tempo of the fighting will increase. There will be longer American casualty lists.

These doubts will bring the Viet Nam fighting to the John administration to bomb such so-called "privileged sanctuaries" as Hanoi, the port city of Haiphong and the Cambodian border areas where the Communists rearm and rest.

So far the United States has committed about 240,000 men to the Viet Nam fighting — 180,000 on land and 60,000 with the fleet in adjoining waters.

Official sources indicate American strength may be increased by another 100,000 in the next six months or so. Some high military officials believe the Viet Nam force will be increased to 400,000 by next summer.

Some call for bombing dikes and irrigation works, thus imperiling North Viet Nam's food supplies.

Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, retired Air Force chief of staff, believes that if North Viet Nam's entire oil supply were knocked out, the Viet Nam war would be over.

That action last summer stripped away whatever was raised the stakes by closing to the South Vietnamese armed forces. It made the United States a major combatant in the ground war.

Now U.S. prestige is on the line — and North Viet Nam has raised the stakes by closing to the United States its air base at Vinh.

The land forces opposing the Reds total about 700,000. This includes U.S. troops, more than 500,000 South Vietnamese, 18,000 South Koreans and small contingents of Australians and New Zealanders.

The ratio in favor of the anti-Communist side is roughly 8-1. This is far less than the 8-1 and 10-1 preponderance often cited as the effective requirement to win a guerrilla type war.

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South Windsor Board OK's Class for Disturbed; Approves Shortened School Day

The board of education last night authorized Superintendent of Schools Charles W. Warner to present to the next meeting cost estimates and recommendations for a special class for emotionally disturbed children to begin in February.

The board's action followed a description of the problems of the emotionally disturbed by Mrs. Susan Albert, psychological examiner for the town school system.

Mrs. Susan Albert defined an emotionally disturbed child as one on either of two extreme balances on a scale, either hyperactive, over-sensitive and destructive, or withdrawn from reality.

Each child is unable to function in a regular classroom either academically or socially, and create a problem not only for themselves and for the teacher, but for other students as well.

Mrs. Albert said that disturbed children are of average to above average intelligence, but do not respond as do children without emotional problems.

Mrs. Albert said the elementary school classroom is very often the place an emotional problem is discovered and the earlier that treatment can be started, the better the chance for aiding the child.

While help is available from such agencies as the Child Guidance Clinic in Manchester, resources are limited and thereby is often not sufficient for the illness, Mrs. Albert said.

Mrs. Jane Romeyn, chairman of the school board, asked who would evaluate and place a child in such a class and if parental permission would be a prerequisite.

Mrs. Albert said that parental permission should be obtained in the best interest of helping the child, since cooperation of both parents and teachers is instrumental in achieving results.

One Man-One Vote Edict Kicks Off Rash of Lawsuits

WASHINGTON (AP) — Voters who want a bigger say in the election of their city councils, county commissions and school boards have taken their case to court in Connecticut. The suit also challenges the one man-one vote edict set down by the Supreme Court for apportionment of state legislatures.

In at least 16 states, local government reapportionment cases have been filed or threatened. Some cities have reapportioned their elective bodies in the 23 months since the Supreme Court determined that both branches of state legislatures should be apportioned on the basis of population.

New York State's Court of Appeals already has held that the one man-one vote rule applies to local legislative bodies. So has a U.S. District Court in New York.

New York City reapportioned its council eight months ago to meet the one man-one vote test. But the city still has a problem. In addition to the 27 district councilmen, there are 10 councilmen at large, two from each borough. That adds two votes for the 22,000 people on Staten Island, and two for the 2.7 million in Brooklyn. Members of the Liberal party have challenged the at-large election system. After a three-judge federal court upheld the system, the challengers appealed to the Supreme Court.

In Snohomish County, north of Seattle, Wash., district apportionment for the election of three county commissioners is being challenged.

State Sen. Robert Grove of Seattle said he might try to carry the one man-one vote rule into political organization, starting in court to force election of delegates to the Democratic State Central Committee on a population basis.

In Ohio, state officials expect to see reapportionment suits at the local level before long. Atty. Gen. William Saxbe said he is sure there will be action in one of the 13 Ohio communities which elect their councilmen on a ward basis.

What Saxbe forecast in Ohio already has happened in cities and counties scattered through much of the nation.

Among them: —Butte, Mont. There a woman named Fioche Herweg challenged population discrepancies in the city's eight wards. The City Council was elected on an at-large basis this year. Then U.S. Dist. Judge W. D. Murray handed down an order which equalized the eight wards so that the smallest has only 96 fewer voters than the largest.

Next year, county precincts and school district precincts are to be realigned to conform with Butte's new apportionment.

—Rutherford County, Tenn. Sixteen citizens have filed suit in U.S. District Court seeking reapportionment of the school commission. Charging "invidious geographic discrimination," the suit says voter population in the county's school zones ranges from 466 in the smallest to 10,119 in the largest. Reapportionment demands have been aimed, as well, at the Washington County Court by people in Johnson City, Tenn., and at the Coffee County Court by the Bar Association in Tullahoma, Tenn.

—Tulsa County, Okla. Here, a new apportionment designed to equalize population in county commissioner districts goes into effect Dec. 20 after a long political feud.

Reapportionment came in Osage County, Okla., after a State District Court ruling, and in Washington County when a suit was threatened.

—Jackson County, Mo. Kansas City Mayor J. W. Davis and Della Hadley of the League of Women Voters filed suit seeking reapportionment of two County Court (commissioner) districts.

The reapportionment they seek would give Kansas City a far stronger voice in county government. They said the western district, which includes the city, has 440,379 people; the eastern district 182,361.

—South Ben, Ind. The City Council, controlled by Republicans, is arguing about reapportionment now. State Sen. Leonard Opperman, a Democrat, said legislation to require population balance within 10 per cent may be filed at the next General Assembly session, in 1967. He said it would apply to city and county councils, and to county boards of commissioners.

—Suffolk County, N.Y. A three-judge federal court has ruled invalid a system allowing each of the county's 10 towns to choose one county supervisor. The towns range in population from 1,312 to 172,000.

The Democratic-controlled state legislature passed a bill to require that county boards be reapportioned on a population basis. Republican Gov. Nelson Rockefeller vetoed it. His chief complaint was a provision prohibiting the submission of county reapportionment plans to the voters for a final decision. Republicans now control 51 of
