Hence's Only Basket Decides CCIL Thriller

Winning the race with the clock, Bruce Hence sunk his only basket of the game with three seconds left last night to give Manchester High a 63-61 win over CCIL rival Maloney High of Meriden. A crowd of 1,000 watched at the arena as the Indians, now 2-2 on the year, presented Coach Paul Hyde with his 50th victory. Maloney drops to 1-3.

Maloney had fought back from a 37-26 halftime disadvantage to tie the 61-61 in the final minute. Playing for the last shot, the Indians and the ball stolen by Manchester's Mark Heller, who threw to Hence for three winning seconds.

The Indians are active at home again Tuesday, hosting Bristol Central at 8 o'clock.

Jim Kuhn turned in one of his finest performances in guiding the winning offense with 28 points and 10 rebounds. "It was Kuhn all the way," said Hyde.

"He did an excellent job and his 14 for 16 points from the line made the big difference. Foul shooting all around was a little better tonight and didn't forget the three key rebounds. Bob Ward made in the closing minutes."

Foul shooting provided the edge, the hosts connecting on 27 of 35 tries and the visitors 21 for 32. Maloney held the edge from the floor, showing 20 hoops in 42 tries, Manchester was 12 for 32.

Jim Hessel led three Maloney double figure scorers with 22 points, followed by Willie Sapiro, 16 points, and Joe Crowley, 12. Chat Kobinsky (14) was also in double figures for Manchester.

Rebounding went to Manchester by a 24-20 count. Soprano led the visitors with seven grabs, five of them defensive. Seven of Kuhn's rebounds came off Manchester's hoop.

East Wrestlers Bow to Penney

Crowley broke the strait with a hoop for Maloney but the Indians maintained the 31-point bulge with a 37-26 lead at intermission.

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — The long-range weather forecast for Packersland calls for a little rain and possibly a little snow for the rest of the week, leading up to a cloudy Sunday with the thermometer in the mid-20's and perhaps a light dusting of snow for the big game.

Green Bay is not ready for anything. Green Bay has been working all week on a damp practice field with heavy turf over a frozen base. It is something like lemon chiffon pie with cream crust.

A capacity crowd of 50,822 is assured for the National Football League title game between the Packers and the Cleveland Browns at 2:10 p.m. on Sunday at Lambeau Stadium.

The game will be seen and heard on CBS radio and television, with Green Bay backed out on TV.

Because of the slipshod field, Coach Vince Lombardi had to be careful with his limping wide receiver, Paul Warfield. The Packers fullback has a groin muscle recently and is not sure if it will hold up for the game. As a result he has been running full speed on the practice field.

Don't get the idea that the game will be played in the rain. Lambeau Stadium is not a very good place to play a tarp. It will be playable and surprisingly good, depending on the weather that rolls the tarp back Sunday morning and remove the Sunday rain.

With about 60000 in state for every winning share and \$4,600 for each loser, everybody expects a big day for the Packers. Like last Sunday's Baltimore-Buffalo game, in case of a tie, the Packers will win overtime once again.

Cleveland is the tonight and the Packers are the tomorrow. In Appleton 26 miles away, Coach Tom Brown plans to head the Packers to the field for the Saturday morning game following Green Bay's final home game.

If it is true that the odds-makers have made the Packers a 1 1/2-point favorite they must be kidding on the Packers. The Packers gave up only 22 touchdowns in regulation in 1965. Cleveland gave up 19 in the air. The Browns yielded 43 TDs, 12 in the air.

With these statistics in mind it is easy to see why Bart Starr, the Packers' star quarterback, is expected to start the game. Starr is the only Packers player to have thrown for 20,000 yards in his career.

Timetable Set On Road Design

A timetable for planning a connector street between Parker St. and Oakland St. has been worked out by Public Works Director Walter Fuss.

The schedule calls for completing the design work for the road and its construction cost estimates by about the first of June.

The new road, strongly favored by the Chamber of Commerce, would open up a landlocked area to industrial development. Tentative plans call for running the road from a point on Parker St. somewhere near Mitchell Dr. to a point at Oakland St. near Mill St., near N. School St., or near N. Main St.

An appropriation of \$2,300 has been made to pay for surveying work which will be done by the Griswold Engineering Co. of Manchester. The survey is the first of four planning steps and is scheduled for completion by Feb. 15.

The other three steps will be undertaken by town personnel, according to Fuss. In a letter to the Chamber of Commerce, Fuss says he does not know whether an added appropriation will be needed to complete those steps.

The steps consist of making base line calculations and laying out stakes, drawing cross sections, and completing the design and construction cost estimates.

A connector road is related to long-range plans to relocate a portion of Parker St. where it makes a steep bend. The move has been recommended by the Town Planning Commission.

Dean Will Ask For New Boilers

Dean Frederick Lowe of Manchester Community College has indicated that the existing facilities at the old Nike site may not be tested after all before letting out contracts for the project of converting the military site to the college's new campus.

Dean Lowe said that the cost of new boilers for the site was found to be only a few hundred dollars more than the price of testing the plumbing system. He said that he therefore was asking the State Department of Public Works for permission to forego testing in favor of purchasing new boilers.

The State Public Utilities Commission (PUC) has approved the application of William J. Eslinger of 33 Grant Rd. and has issued him a general livery service permit to operate the Eslinger Limousine Service Inc., limited to one motor vehicle, with a seating capacity of less than 10 adults.

Eslinger will operate a seven-passenger Cadillac limousine within Connecticut, with headquarters in Manchester.

In an unopposed public hearing before the PUC on Dec. 9, he had stated that, after making a personal canvass of prospective customers, funeral directors and motel owners, he had reached the conclusion that there is sufficient demand for the livery service. The PUC concurred.

Pool Plans Given Okay

Director of Public Works Walter Fuss has prepared a site plan for the new Waddell School swimming pool which, contrary to previous expectations, will not necessitate the relocation of the Little League ball field, and will not disturb any of the existing utilities.

When the town directors early this month appropriated \$70,000 for pool construction, they were told that, because of existing sewer connections, the ball field might have to be moved to the west.

Fuss revealed that the pool and bathhouse will be erected about 35 feet behind the field's backstop and that the sewer lines will be straddled. A high screen will be placed above the backstop to prevent foul balls from falling into the pool.

The plans, approved yesterday by the Rec and Park Advisory Commission, will be presented to the board of directors Tuesday night for approval and for authorization to invite bids.

The facility, scheduled for July 1 completion, will consist of a swimming pool and bathhouse, similar to the ones at Verplanck School. The bathhouse will be planned to blend in with the Waddell School and will have a gable-type roof. The facility will be placed in the northeast corner of the school yard and will require only the relocation of some swings.

TV Columnist Finds 1965 A Dismal Year for Viewers

NEW YORK (AP)—With the end of the year comes the usual assortment of blank ballots from magazines and trade publications and those who watch a lot of television and write about it are urged to fill in their choices of the best of this or that category.

But 1965 has been, on the whole, such a dismal year in terms of television entertainment that picking the best of any type of show is about as easy as choosing the best loaf of bread in a bakery.

One questionnaire asks my candidate for "the best show of the year." The winner of the general election will probably be "My Name Is Barbra," the Streisand special of last May or the Julie Andrews hour of more recent date. But looking back over 12 months and hundreds of hours of viewing, it is hard to recall offhand many specific programs during which one was transported with delight.

The best entertainment show of the year probably was in one of those weekly two-hour spots the three networks are dedicating to rerunning old movies. They are this year's substitute for television drama and of course some of them were superior shows. But they hardly qualify for television blue ribbons.

An enormous quantity of material has been ground and re-ground in the television mills in 365 days and nights but most of it was casually viewed and immediately forgotten. Who recalls for any sentiment, for instance, "The Entertainers," an ambitious variety hour, or "The Cara Williams Show," or even the well-intentioned "Profiles in Courage," which tried, but never got off the ground?

"That Was the Week That Was," delighted a small audience, infuriated others but

never had a big enough audience to survive. Les Crane had two chances to make the late evening scene but neither one resulted in a welcome mat. Does anyone recall "The Journals of Lewis and Clark"? or the night when the panels of "To Tell the Truth" and "I've Got a Secret" switched shows? Or the night of Jack Paar's last show before, he insisted, he retired? There is no particular reason anyone should.

This was the year when the audience finally wearied of medical problems as a substitute for real drama. It was a year when television turned to military stories in order to get a high quota of conflict into its plots. It was a year when the audience began to show the first signs of boredom with the perennially running-away of "The Fugitive" and its imitators.

Dick Van Dyke kept tripping over the family hassock once a week but his scripts began to show signs of age and attrition. "The Man From U.N.C.L.E." got so far out, possibly to confound its imitators, that it lost all touch with reality. So many actors started playing their parts with their tongues in their cheeks it seemed that Hollywood was having a mumps epidemic.

This viewer does recall, without prodding, watching the performances of Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontanne with apprecia-

Goulet Stars in Spy Series

In 1960, Robert Goulet, a virtually unknown Canadian singer, won the role of Sir Lancelot in "Camelot." In five years he has become famous through his recordings and appearances on television, supper clubs and motion pictures.

Next week Goulet launches a dramatic career in "Code: Blue Light," where he portrays double-agent David March.

"Blue Light" follows March, a foreign correspondent before the beginning of World War II, who renounced his citizenship and went to work as a secret agent for Germany. In reality, he is a volunteer for a dangerous Allied mission.

Hated by his countrymen and hunted by the partisans and underground leaders not aware of his dual role, March carries the stigma of disgrace, knowing he will probably die without the truth ever being revealed.

For Goulet his first straight dramatic role on a television series comes as just another challenge to be faced and overcome.

At the age of eleven, his father passed away, and he, his mother and his sister left Lawrence, Mass. for Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, where the family had relatives.

While a schoolboy in Edmon-

ton, Goulet started singing in choirs, at community social functions and made numerous appearances with the orchestra there in local shows. He even had a brief stint as a disc jockey on station CKUA in Edmonton. He was soon after awarded a scholarship for singing to the Royal Conservatory of Music and moved to Toronto.

The new mother returned to "Bewitched" two months later to enact the birth of Samantha's baby. Boy or girl?
