A Sad Commentary

Wednesday, January 5

Last night CBS television presented a

documentary titled "The Volga." This morning the New York Herald Tribune carries a TV Review which labels the program "an attractive and informative color tour," which compliments the camera work involved in presenting contrasting features of present day Russian life, and which observes

there were sidelight excursions in the form of Marvin Kalb essays on the hisory, economics and bureaucracy of the Soviet Union. Mr. Kalb supplied some unsavory details with tart relish." In the television columns of the New York Times this morning there is al-

most no critical appraisal of the program, but narration at length of the protests the Russians made to CBS over the program in the days preceding its showing. The Russians, it appears, had many complaints about the details in the program, terming the Kalb commentary slanted, and alleging that some of the pictures used were selected deliberately to "insult the dignity of Soriet people." This department watched "The

Volga" last night, and was fascinated by the photography and by the pictures of the various contrasting phases of Russian life, and was also annoved by the Kalb commentary. The "tart rellah" the Herald Tribune reviewer noticed in his references to backward phases of Russian life actually seemed something a little stronger than that, and another equally noticeable part of refusal to admit anything pleasant or normal or improving in Russian life. In fact, this department's impression while watching the telecast was that it achieved a degree of American boorishness which must seem, to any Russian viewer, or perhaps even to dispassionate viewers anywhere, to have been dominated by a sneering emotion of

The net result seemed to be that instead of taking American viewers into what might have been an historic journey up the Volga, CBS took its audience into a somewhat pointless and sourtasting exposure of its own smart-aleck pettiness. It will claim' credit for defending the principles of a free press in Its exploit, and it will pose as martyred, no doubt, if Russian authorities, as seem likely, are crude enough to respond to CBS insults with a totalitarian curtailment of CBS privileges inside Russia. But the crudeness on view last night was that of the Kalb commentary which neglected even a minimum effort to be fair and objective. One wondered why in the world anyone had gone to so much trouble to prove to Americans that they have higher wages and better living conditions than the Russians.

Strike Postpones Strike The odd thing that happened in New York City on the first day of the transit strike might have contained its symbolic verdict on strikes in general. What happened was that the transit

strike postponed a teacher's strike. Some of the professors at St. John's University had scheduled their picketing, over a stormy issue of academic freedom, that morning. But the University, because of the subway strike, postponed its opening of classes. This removed the setting and the drama for the scheduled picketing by professors. so they called off their strike because Mr. Quill's strike was on. It is hard to strike against something that isn't being operated. The act of striking, like everything else in nature, doesn't love

Pursuing such logic to its ultimate conclusion, it would also appear that the people of New York did their best, on that first day of strike, to create something of a vacuum for Mr. Quil and his transit workers. The city itself went on a strike of its own-enough of a strike to refrain from creating the dire and drastic emergency which Quill

was expecting to be his ally.

Such experience defines the ultimate purpose and resource and potential efectiveness of the strike as an institution. It is supposed to hurt somebody. ROCHESTER, Ind. - How does piece of mail get from this sleepy county seat of 4,900 in the heart of cen Indiana corn country to Mentone, hamlet of 800 a dozen miles to the

It travels 190 miles in four differen directions, none of them northeast, that's how. Mentone-bound mail goe first to Kokomo, 50 miles south. Ther it's sorted from the flood of mail tha pours into Kokomo from 87 towns in area. Next, it's trucked 80 miles north to South Bend, bypassing both Rochester and Mentone on the way. From South Bend, it goes 60 miles southeast to Warsaw and, finally southwest to Mentone, where it's delivered, as much as four days after leav-

Paradoxically, the long, looping path this mail takes is part of a complex liveries and boosting the efficiency of the postal system. But talks with angry Hoosiers affected—and this includes everyone from small town business men to overworked postal clerks-indispeeding deliveries, is resulting in long delays, particularly in rural areas, and is swamping some post offices with in decline in mail service brought about by the new system as one more example of Jovernment planning gone awry.

The system is based on 553 sectional centers across the country. Each center sorts all mail going to and coming from smaller towns in a particular zip code district. The first three members of zip code designate a sectional center. In cases where local train routes have been discontinued, the sectional centers de the sorting that was formerly done in mail cars. The sectional centers are one step in the post office plan to get the sip system in gear by January 1967. from Rochester to Mentone first goes to Kokomo because Kokomo is now Rochester's sectional center. It then goes north to South Bend before being sent to Mentone because South Bend is Mentone's new sectional center—ever though Mentone is just a few fields of

a thriving enterprise with a circulation of 4,239. As Mr. Overmyer sits in his office looking out on the century-ol Rochester courthouse square, he tells an nquirer that "slow mail service can cill a small newspaper. When we get to oscribers two or three days late, we stand a good chance of losing those subscribers and then advertisers who aim ads at those subscribers. By taking that round-about route, the post office winds up delivering Thursday's paper on Monday. Who wants Thursday's news on Monday? What advertiser wants his Thursday sale ads read by customers the next Monday?"

After several fruitless complaints to postal authorities, Mr. Overmyer gave up. He now sends papers to Mente subscribers by truck and pays for it from his own pocket.

Just as affected, but less vocal than newspapermen, are businessmen Indiana's small towns. L. J. Castald vice president of the Midwest Spring Co., in Mentone, says he must "keep in constant and quick mail communications tion with our offices in Chicago. But as airmail, special delivery letter from Chicago to Mentone-120 miles-usualy takes two days to get here." Mr Castaldi says the same letter would have made the trip "in a matter of hours" before sectional centers. And in Wisconsin Rapids, Wis., which

has been part of a sectional center district for 18 months, the chamber of commerce kept tabs recently on 2,087 pleces of first class mail sent to distant points. The chamber says 57% of the letters mailed to Milwaukee, Minneapolis and Chicago took two days to arrive and 12% took three, four and five days.
