51 Lost In Crash Of Airliner

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — A DC-8 commercial airliner with 61 persons aboard crashed Friday night into a dark-forested section of the coast of Colombia. Unofficial sources said 51 persons were dead or missing.

The propeller plane broke in two and its rear section sank into heavy snow about five minutes after taking off from the Caribbean port of Cartagena for a 20-minute flight to Barranquilla. A Cartagena hospital said six bodies were recovered. Eight survivors were treated for minor injuries, the hospital added.

Prognosis from the Cartagena naval base, mainly tried to rescue an estimated 40 passengers trapped in the rear section of the plane.

About 19 Colombian navy boats, 20 fishing vessels and a U.S. amphibious plane joined the search but rescue efforts were suspended early today due to the rough seas and the danger from sharks.

The Avianca airliner carried a crew of five. Most of the passengers were Colombian, according to the report.

It was not immediately known what caused the crash.

## TV Shows Never 'Fail'

By CYNTHIA LOWBY

NEW YORK (AP)—In television's positive lexicon there is no such word as failure. At least it is never used in connection with a program or a series until long after it has quietly "disappeared."

Some of the explanations offered as to why a show fades badly are more fascinating than the programs.

If it is faltering in a Friday night spot, for instance, it is never because of a rival show. It is because the audience is out doing the weekly shopping. If it is too late for shopping, it is because everybody has gone bowling.

When a program is fading badly in a niche that was also a dim spot the previous season, the reason is that viewers formed a habit of keeping away from the channel before and have never even "sampled" the new wares.

Participants of such programs as "East Side West Side" and "The Richard Boone Show" insisted that their low ratings were caused by a determination to say something important to an audience that wanted mild entertainment.

When a program is fading early in the evening it is because there are too many children in the audience. If it is a sour note later in the evening it is because the audience is starting to retire, even if it is only 9:30.

"The King Family" collapsed, it is alleged because its primary appeal was to older viewers; "Shindig" is on its way out

because only teen-agers would look at it. However, "Lawrence Welk" stays on because his appeal is to older viewers, and "The Man From U.N.C.L.E." is a success at 10 p.m. — because the kids adore it.

The time spot of a program is obviously important. Surveys inevitably show that the youthful audience builds up until about 8:30 p.m. when the adults take over, and that the audience starts to drop off from a peak at around 9:30.

The real reason for high or low ratings is in the quality and

"I don't like to place my music in pigeonholes, and I don't like the word jazz. It has too many meanings, some of them bad, for too many people," he said. "This concert is a very personal statement, so let the theme of the concert speak for itself."

Commenting on two church performances, Ellington said he feels "most fortunate because I know that God has blessed my timing, without which nothing could have happened—the right time or place or with the right people. They must converge. Thank God."

## Comedy Will Still Be King

NEW YORK (AP)—As far as one can see from the New Year's Day peak, comedy will continue to rule the network television channels at least for another year.

Nearly half of the current prime evening time offerings are designed to produce laughter. And, if press releases and news leaks about next September's product are accurate, the percentage will continue about the same. Out of 34 releases received in the past month or so, 16 announce comedy projects; eight, action-adventure; five, westerns and five series, ranging from science fiction to drama.

If ABC's TV spoof of a comic-book character, "Batman," catches on, it promises to unleash the usual flood of reasonably exact facsimiles. Already on the studio docks are "The Green Hornet" and "The Perils of Pauline," plus a project called "Sedgewick Hawk Styles . . . Prince of Danger," which is set in Victorian London and has all the earmarks of a Sherlock Holmes burlesque.

"Stan, Jack, Ran," concerning two young men wandering around the country, seems to be "Route 66" played for laughs; "The Clumbys" is a situation comedy built around an accident-prone couple, and "Daphne" concerns a jetset widow who retreats to life in suburbia.

One big star name is involved in a pilot, "The Jean Arthur Show," in which the former motion picture star plays a woman lawyer battling things out with her son, who has joined a rival firm. Then there is Tammy Grimes playing "My Twin Sister" and a series-carved out of Stephen Potter's "Gamesmanship" and "Lifemanship" books called "School for Scoundrels."

A number of successful films have spawned television series ideas, including "From Here to Eternity," "Shane" and "High

Noon." The latter has been remodeled so that the hero will be the son of the movie marshal, Will Kane, memorably played by Gary Cooper.

Suspense writer Eric Ambler has dreamed up a new action series named after one of his best books, "Journey Into Fear." This will undoubtedly involve a lot of spy stuff as will also "The Man Who Never Was." "Stranded" revolves about 100 passengers of a crash-landed plane in the jungle. Still another nominee for network attention is a science fiction series called "Star Trek." There is also a TV adaptation of "Three Coins in a Fountain" and "The Sweet Life," in which Bobby Darin plays an American expatriate living it up on the French Riviera.

There are neither dramatic anthologies—each show a self-contained story without continuing heroes—nor variety shows in the list of candidates. However, it is expected that Garry Moore will be returning to television on a regular basis in some variety-type format.

According to my opaque crystal ball, the next 12 months of television will be practically indistinguishable from the past 12.

## Peter Pan Flies For Fifth Time

An average of 50 million viewers in the United States has seen each one of the four colorcasts of Mary Martin starring in "Peter Pan," the two-hour musical dramatization of Sir James M. Barrie's ageless story. In addition, the NBC TV production has been enjoyed by sizable audiences in Great Britain, Australia and Hong Kong.

Mary Martin will again star as Peter Pan, the boy who refused to grow up, and Cyril Ritchard portrays the villainous Captain Hook Friday evening at 7:30 on NBC.

## 'Mona McCluskey' to Go

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—This is the sorrowful season when cancellation notices begin to fall on television series.

Among the doomed is "Mona McCluskey." Its star, Juliet Prowse, returned from a 26,000-mile trip home for Christmas — to South Africa — to learn that NBC will pull the plug on the series after 26 segments.

Did she fret or toss a tantrum? Not in the least.

"Things generally happen for the best," she philosophizes. "I never worry about what happens in my career, because I can always do something else."

This has been going on since she started dancing professionally in Johannesburg at 14. She progressed to night clubs in

Europe, where she was discovered by Fred Astaire's longtime choreographer, Hermes Pan. He brought her to America for "Can-Can" which was notable principally for Nikita S. Khrushchev's derogatory comments.

Juliet continued at 20th Century-Fox, where her movies were "mostly pretty bad." After that, she mined the gold to be found in night clubs and summer theaters, then was tapped for "Mona McCluskey."

The plot had Juliet, a 25,000-a-week movie star, married to a 200-a-month Air Force Sgt. Denny Miller, and it didn't take the fancy of the critics.

"It took five or six weeks for us to shake down the show," explained Juliet. "We added Robert Strauss and Elena Verdugo as second bananas, and that was a good move. We needed someone to play the comedy."

"The show was coming along, but we never had a chance in the ratings. We were up against 'Feynman Place' on ABC, but our biggest competition was the CBS Thursday night movies. They threw some great pictures at us, in color, and it's awfully hard to compete."

## Mary Tyler Moore a Hit As Pin-Up Gal in Viet Nam

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Dear Miss Moore, I saw your picture in Stars and Stripes, and I enjoyed it. When I was back home, my wife used to say you had skinny legs. I didn't think so, and I'm glad to find out I was right. Would you please send me a photograph?"

The message was typical among the hundreds of letters Mary Tyler Moore has been receiving from GI's in Viet Nam. What started as a publicity stunt is shaping up as a full-scale move to make her a pin-up queen of the Asian war.

Miss Moore spends her professional life as the fully clothed wife on "The Dick Van Dyke Show." But she is also an accomplished dancer and beneath those frocks and aprons is a whistle-worthy form.

Alert press agents, realizing this, proposed that Mary pose for some cheesecake photos that could be sent to interested servicemen in Viet Nam. A dozen photographers were invited to a snapping session, competing to produce the most attractive pose.

A photograph of the photographers at work appeared in the overseas service newspaper, Stars and Stripes. That prompted the letters.

"It happened so suddenly that I haven't been able to get the photos yet," said Mary during a break in TV filming. "But I've been answering all the letters, turning out 25 to 50 a day in ev-

ery moment I can spare. I'm getting writer's cramp but enjoying it.

"Some of the letters come with 20 signatures, so the work mounts up. But it's a very small thing that I can do, compared to what they're doing over there."

Mary quoted some of the letters: "It's nice to know that someone in the States cares. We see pictures of these demonstrators in Berkeley, and we begin to wonder..."

"All I have to look at are snakes and the Viet Cong, neither of which is very attractive. A photograph of you would certainly brighten up this foxhole..."

In the photograph that Mary will be sending, she wears a form-fitting dancer's costume slit down the front. Only the legs are exposed. But then, Betty Grable did all right in another war.

Mary Tyler Moore will soon be shedding her housewifely role with the Van Dyke show and heading for other pursuits. The series will end after this season, not for the usual reason of poor ratings. It continues among the CBS leads.

But Van Dyke has a logjam of film commitments, as does producer-creator Carl Reiner. Mary told her plans:

"I'll go to Universal to start the first of 10 pictures. Or, if it's a bomb, the first of one. They have the options."
