Pentagon Hit For Stalling On N-Ships

GROTON (AP) — Rep. Chet Holifield, D-Calif., accused the Department of Defense today of dragging its feet in applying nuclear power to surface ships for the Navy.

The congressman said that while construction of a nuclear submarine fleet has proceeded on a top priority basis, the Department of Defense has been resisting the "clear expression of the will of Congress" that surface ships also be built with nuclear propulsion systems.

"The Department of Defense," Holifield said, "has vaccilated and procrastinated, studied and restudied nuclear power for sur-face warships in what appeared to me and to many of my fellow members of Congress to be an attempt to kill nuclear power for the Navy by studying it to



Mission Aide Marched Off Into Jungle

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—The Viet Cong kidnaped an American civilian official today outside the village of Trung Lap, about 25 miles north of Saigon, and marched him into the jungle, his hands in the air.

The missing man is Douglass Ramsey, 28, of Boulder City,



And if the taxpayer can find another computer that can out-write and out-think the IRS computers, the IRS may find itself so busy trying to reprogram its com puters to cope with this unexpected manifestation that it won't have time

But if as is more likely the taxpayer can't get access to a computer that can outwit the IRS machines, there's an alternative. He can ignore computer written letters from the IRS. If he ignores them long enough the IRS will send around to talk to him a real live person whose message, we have no doubt, will be unmistakably clear. - WALL STREET JOURNAL.

One of the few separate self-care units in this area, the one story brick structure is designed to further the hospital's concept of progressive patient care. It will be used by ambulatory patients who can care for their own needs with a minimum of nursing supervision, but who require hospital services such as tests, X rays or therapy treatments.






