Two Jets Collide During Refueling

ALMERIA, Spain (AP)

A U.S. B52 jet bomber and a KC135 jet tanker collided over Spain today and crashed on the Mediterranean Coast. Five of the 11 crewmen aboard the two planes were rescued, U.S. Air Force officials said. Four of them were identified as bomber crewmen. Headquarters of the 16th U.S. Air Force near Madrid said the B52 with a crew of seven was from the 88th Bombardment Wing at Seymour Johnson Air Base in North Carolina. It was being refueled by the tanker, carrying four crewmen. The tanker was from the 910th Air Refueling Unit at Bergstrom Air Force Base, Tex. It was temporarily stationed at Moron Air port near Seville.

Swiss Seek Release Of U.S. Shrimpers

HAVANA (AP)

Swiss Ambassador Emil Stadelhofer sought the release today of nine fishermen held by Cuban authorities after their three boats entered Cuban territorial waters Sunday. Stadelhofer, who represents American interests here, said he had been in conference with Cuban officials but declined to elaborate. The nine were reported held at the port of Santa Lacia, west of Havana, in Pinar del Rio Province. The U.S. Coast Guard reported one of the vessels ran aground off the Cuban coast and two sister ships went to her aid, each carried three crew members. They were reported to be en route from Tampa, Fla., to Nicaragua. All were identified as U.S. citizens except one who was listed by the shrimp company as a Honduran. The U.S. Coast Guard said the 73-foot Charles Singleton ran aground off northwest Cuba Sunday and her two sister boats — Penny Singleton and Mark E. Singleton — were directed to a

Coup Unsuccessful Army Commander Rules in Nigeria

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP)

Nigeria's Army commander emerged as the dominant figure today following an unsuccessful coup attempt by military elements in the armed forces. Maj. Gen. Aguiyi Ironsi declared himself temporary head of the federal government and chief of all armed forces Sunday night and suspended key provisions of the Nigerian constitution. He also suspended the nation's top civilian officials, including Prime Minister Sir Abubakar Tafawa Balewa, President Awolowo Nnamdi, the heads of Nigeria's four regions and the federal and regional parliaments. Balewa was kidnapped during the coup attempt by his finance minister, Chief Festus Okotie Ebo. The rebels are believed holding them hostage. Ironsi's troops were reported searching for them. Troops loyal to Ironsi guarded government buildings and other key points in Lagos and manned five roadblocks between the airport and the capital. Remnants of the rebel force appeared to be on the run. One report said Kaduna, the chief northern city, was the only main center in rebel hands. Ironsi said military governors would take over in the four regions and would be responsible to his military regime for keeping order. The federation of Nigeria is composed of the four regions plus the federal territory of Lagos. The federal government handles such matters as foreign affairs, trade, communications, railways and defense. Ironsi called on civil servants (See Page Seventeen)

Pentagon Hit For Stalling On N-Ships

GROTON (AP)

Rep. Chet Holifield, D-Calif., accused the Department of Defense today of dragging its feet in applying nuclear power to surface ships for the Navy. The congressman said that while construction of a nuclear submarine fleet has proceeded on a top priority basis, the Department of Defense has been resisting the "clear expression of the will of Congress" that surface ships also be built with nuclear propulsion systems. "The Department of Defense," Holifield said, "has vacillated and procrastinated, studied and restudied nuclear power for surface warships in what appeared to me and to many of my fellow members of Congress to be an attempt to kill nuclear power for the Navy by studying it to death." Holifield's attack on the Pentagon was delivered at the ceremonies marking the laying of the keel for a new nuclear attack submarine, the Narwhal, at the shipyards of the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp.

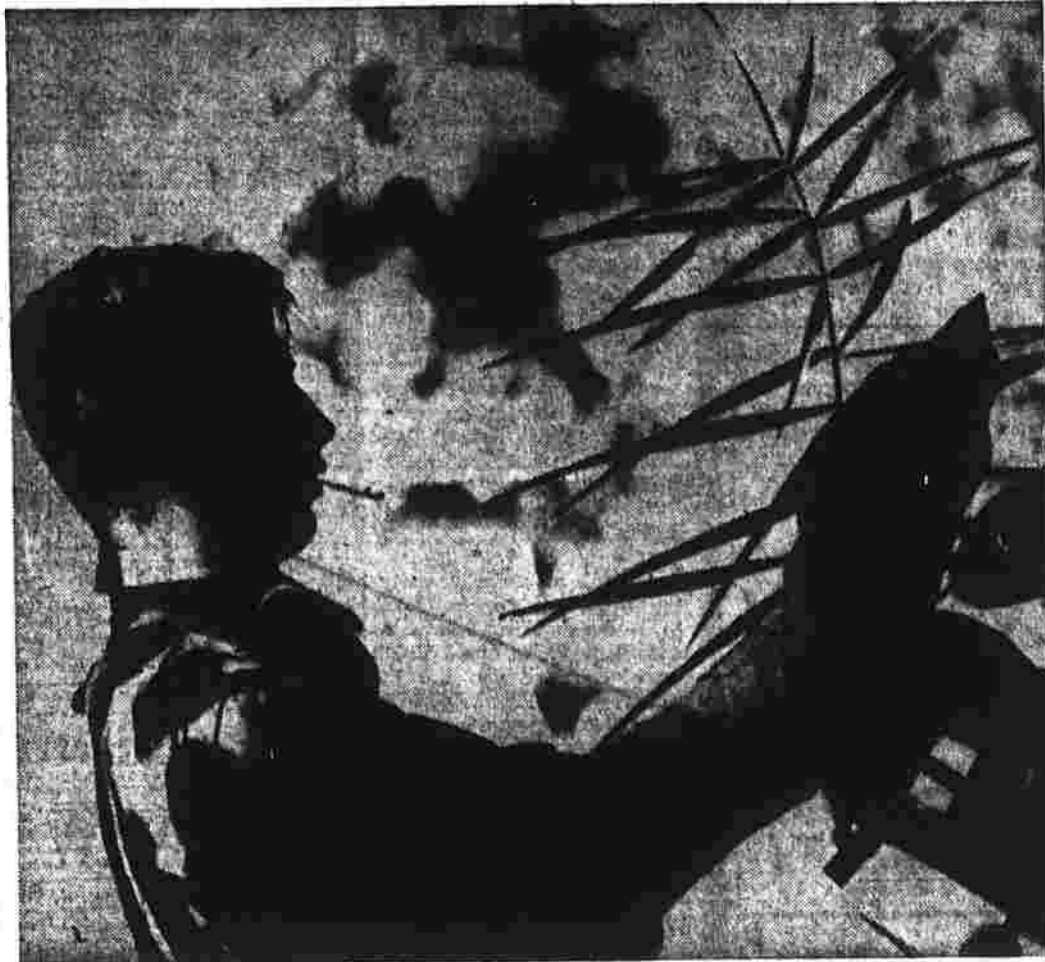

Bendix Strike Cuts Production Of Weapon Parts

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP)

Machinists at the Bendix Corp. plant, one of the largest producers of parts for the Atomic Energy Commission's weapons complex at Albuquerque, N.M., went on strike today. About 4,000 members of the International Association of Machinists are affected by the dispute over a wage agreement. A three-year proposal by the company was rejected 1,996 to 946 by the union Sunday. The old contract expired at midnight and pickets kept the early morning shift from going to work. The plant normally operates three shifts a day, six days a week. Vito Mazzacano of Chicago, an IAM representative, said economic factors were the main issue in the dispute. Mission Aide Marched Off Into Jungle

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)

The Viet Cong kidnaped an American civilian official today outside the village of Trung Lap, about 25 miles north of Saigon, and marched him into the jungle, his hands in the air. The missing man is Douglas Ramsey, 28, of Boulder City, Nev. He is the assistant province representative of the U.S. mission for the area. His driver, a South Vietnamese, came back and told American authorities they were traveling northeast from Cu Chi when they came under Viet Cong gunfire. The driver said he stopped. He added that Ramsey got out and raised his hands in a surrender gesture. Several Viet Cong guerrillas marched him away. The driver was wounded slightly in the first ambush fire but was able to navigate on foot. Trung Lap is in the middle of the sector where U.S. forces conducted their biggest search and destroy operation of the Vietnamese war — Operation Crimp — which has just been terminated. In that area the Viet Cong, and the Viet Minh before them, dug into caves and tunnels ever since the past decade and even longer. The maze is so complex that the 173rd Paratroop Brigade, Royal Australians, and U.S. 1st Infantry Division, find out of explosives trying to blow some of it up. U.S. Troops Will Observe 78 Hour 'New Year' Truce

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)

The commander of U.S. forces in Viet Nam, Gen. William C. Westmoreland, today ordered all American troops to cease firing for 78 hours starting at noon Thursday in observance of the Vietnamese lunar New Year holiday, Tet. Westmoreland's order seconded the decision of the South Vietnamese government to halt fighting during the national celebration. Similar instructions went to South Korean, Australian and New Zealand troops fighting alongside the Vietnamese and Americans. The truce more than doubles the 30-hour cease-fire observed by allied forces during the Christmas holiday. But it falls 18 hours short of the Tet truce proclaimed by the Viet Cong. They have promised not to attack from 11 p.m. Wednesday to 11 p.m. Sunday, a total of four days. Westmoreland ordered a cease-fire from noon Thursday to 6 p.m. Sunday. It was assumed the allies agreed on different hours to avoid giving the impression they were simply reacting to the Communist proposal. Westmoreland's order said: "All U.S. forces in the republic will not fire at or on the enemy except in self defense." There was no sign in the Saigon sector of any lull in fighting before the holiday, although elsewhere in the country military activities continued at a slow pace. In a lightning stroke, a Viet Cong company attacked a government infantry and armor school at Thu Duc 10 miles north of Saigon at 1 a.m. While one part of the guerrilla force fired two mortar shells as a diversion, another hit part of the compound with automatic weapons. The guerrillas pierced the barbed wire of the officers' candidate school and raked the billets, killing five wives and three children of Vietnamese officer candidates in their beds. Three other children were wounded. Armored troops fought back and killed 10 of the Viet Cong, a government spokesman said. Those bodies were left behind, but the fleeing Viet Cong were seen to be carrying other dead or wounded. One Viet Cong was captured. Twenty-six civilians were killed and four were wounded when a busload of civilians hit a Viet Cong mine on the road from Moc Hoa to Cai Lay, near Kien Tuong, 85 miles south of the capital. Northwest of Saigon, a Viet Cong attack on a U.S. troop convoy backfired. Supported by planes roaring in over the trees, the Americans turned the bitter fight 20 miles northwest of Saigon into a drubbing for the guerrillas. As the suspension of U.S. air attacks on Communist North Viet Nam went into the 28th day, Radio Hanoi charged that American planes strafed and dropped four bombs on a North Vietnamese village in the western part of Thanh Hoa, causing "a number of losses in human life, houses and property." Massive Propaganda Launched by US, Viet

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)

The United States and the Vietnamese government have launched the most massive propaganda offensive of the Viet Nam war, hoping to trigger large-scale Communist desertions. Geared to the lunar new year that begins Thursday, the campaign includes distributing 140 million leaflets, many in air-drops in Communist territory. The main planning and direction has come from the United States, which will pay the \$250,000 cost of printing and distribution. The effort reaches to Washington, where Voice of America broadcasts will beam heavy doses of propaganda to North and South Viet Nam. It reaches down to privates who are briefed on how to handle those who surrender. The program, which began late last year, will be a test of the extensive psychological warfare apparatus built up by both the Vietnamese and American sides. Agents are carefully watching for a Viet Cong response to detect just how serious a morale factor exists in the Communist camp. The propaganda offensive is geared to the Chieu Hoi, or open arms campaign, which long has sought to get the Viet Cong to desert. Despite optimistic claims of the success of this program, one key source who follows it closely said for the most part only those on the fringe of the Communist movement have responded. Expect Two Demands France Ends Boycott Of Common Market

LUXEMBOURG (AP)

France ended today a six-month boycott of the European Common Market. The other five member governments all had their eyes on President Charles de Gaulle's foreign minister, Maurice Couve de Murville, wondering what price he would set to restore full French cooperation. Couve de Murville was one of the first speakers today on the program of a meeting of the foreign ministers at Luxembourg's City Hall. When he arrived from Paris earlier in the day he told reporters that with good will it ought to be possible to get the Common Market back on the rails again. But French spokesmen were saying it probably would take more than this two-day meeting. Couve de Murville was expected to make two major demands: 1. A firm agreement to allow each of the member nations to hold their veto over major Common Market decisions. This veto has existed all along but it had been due to disappear Jan. 1, 1966. 2. A curb on the powers of Chairman Walter Hallstein and his nine-man commission. De Gaulle feels Hallstein is acting too much as if he were the president of a United States of Europe. Couve de Murville walked out of the last full meeting of the Common Market Council July 1, 1965. The reason given was that the members had failed to meet an agreed midnight deadline for a plan to subsidize the exports of farm surpluses. (See Page Five)

The White House said today there has been no decision, even tentative, on a date for calling off United States probes for peace in Viet Nam. Press secretary Bill D. Moyers told reporters: "I know of no deadline that has been set or discussed between the President and his advisers." The New York Times said in a Washington dispatch today that the administration plans tentatively to end its peace offensive with the end of the Vietnamese new year next week unless a favorable response appears by that time.

Birchers Top Troublemakers

More School Pressure, NEA's Report Reveals

WASHINGTON (AP) — The public schools have been the target of increasing pressure and harassment during the past three years, a committee of the National Education Association reported today.

The NEA's commission on Professional Rights and Responsibilities said the Birch Society was the No. 1 troublemaker. However, the Birch Society also appeared as No. 20 on the list of groups helpful to the schools.

The commission report said there has been an increase in censorship or attacks on books used in the schools since its last survey in 1962.

The survey was prepared for the 1964 annual conference on "The Schools and the Community." It summarized the responses to a questionnaire of nearly 15,000 teachers and other educators.

The survey showed 54 percent of the local reporting noted a damaging effect from destructive criticism, compared with 49 percent in 1962. The percentage of schools reporting "much damage" rose from 17 to 18 percent in the same period.

Ninety per cent of criticism in the form of charges of Communism or subversion in the schools, the report said, came from three states — Michigan, Michigan and Ohio.

These three states also reported the greatest activity by right-wing groups in connection with book criticism and censorship.

Survivor of Plane Crash Reveals Pre-Rescue Ordeal

FRANK FURT, Germany flew to Frankfurt to be reunited with his wife, Len, and their five children.

Survivors with Smith were Lt. Col. Frank Bailey, Westm. Va.; Capt. Dick M. Crowell, Fairfax, Va.; and Staff Sgt. James L. Ferguson, Madisonville, Tex.

At least four others died. Two Americans and his comrades were found huddled in the battered fuselage, nearly freezing, when the Greek ground rescue party reached them Saturday.

Smith, 34, a veteran pilot, was a passenger aboard the flight from Cigli base, Turkey, to Naples when suddenly "the right wing hit the fuselage and the plane rolled over," he said. "There was a terrific hole and I was thrown out into the snow."

"There was a terrible hissing. Within minutes, our hands were covered with half an inch of solid ice."

The officer said he put three survivors in the fuselage to get them back to the landing field, then stuffed debris into the hole. "I opened two paracutes and put them over me," he said. "That stopped the wind."

Smith and another officer "scrambled into the fuselage with our mother and child until both our hands and feet were warm."

The rescue party arrived about 10 p.m. and found the survivors in a state of shock. They were taken to a hospital and treated for frostbite.

Gen. Hodges, 79, Dies; Led WW II 1st Army

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Gen. Courtney H. Hodges, 79, died today.

Train Derails In Kansas; 15 Passengers Hurt

MINNEOLA, Kan. (AP) — Fifteen persons were injured, none seriously, when six cars of the Rock Island Golden State Limited No. 3 derailed as the train sped through this southern Kansas town early Sunday.

GM President Cites Increase In Car Demand

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — The president of General Motors, James M. Roche, said today that the average annual demand for cars and trucks in the United States could exceed 11 million by 1970.

Roche's remarks came in a speech at the annual convention of the National Automobile Dealers' Association, Roche said the demand for motor vehicles "has been increasing at a pace that few people outside the industry thought possible."

Ship Survivors Praise Mate, Radio Operator

NEW YORK (AP) — A rescue ship radio operator who stayed at his post for 48 hours and a third mate who was lowered to the frigid North Atlantic were praised as brave rescuers.

The four survivors of the Spanish freighter Monte Palomares which sank, they were plucked from a small wooden raft, 80 miles northeast of Bermuda, by the crew of the U.S. freighter Steel Maker last Monday night.

They arrived here on the Steel Maker, which docked Sunday night in Brooklyn.

Only six of the 38-man crew of the Monte Palomares survived. The crew of the rescue ship, the USSCC-10, picked up three men — one of them dead — from another small raft. Members of the U.S. Coast Guard, Spanish consular general, greeted the four men rescued by the Steel Maker.

All were well, and they shouted "My Contents" (very happy) to the consular general. They thanked the captain and crew of the Steel Maker.

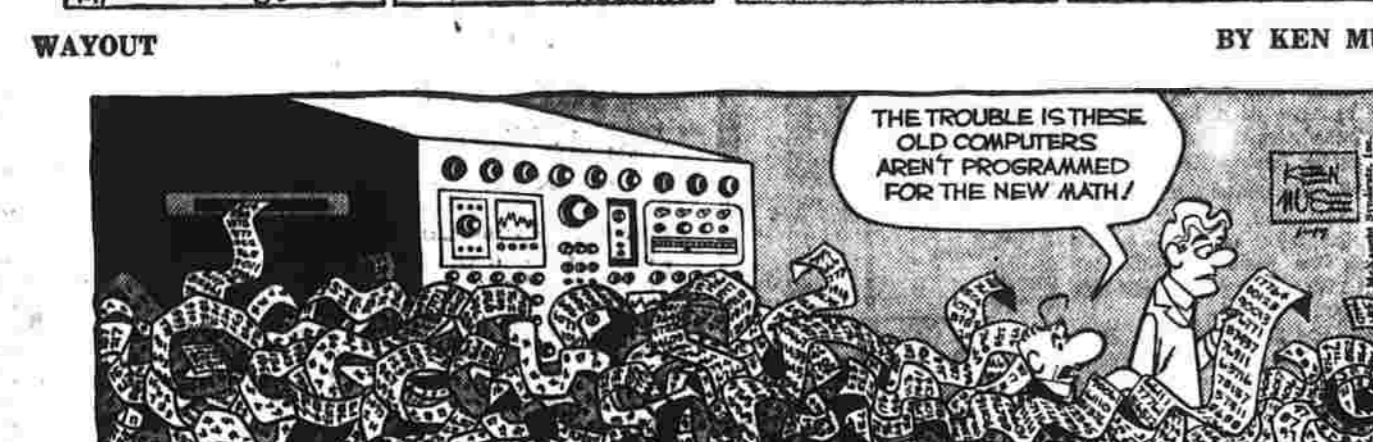

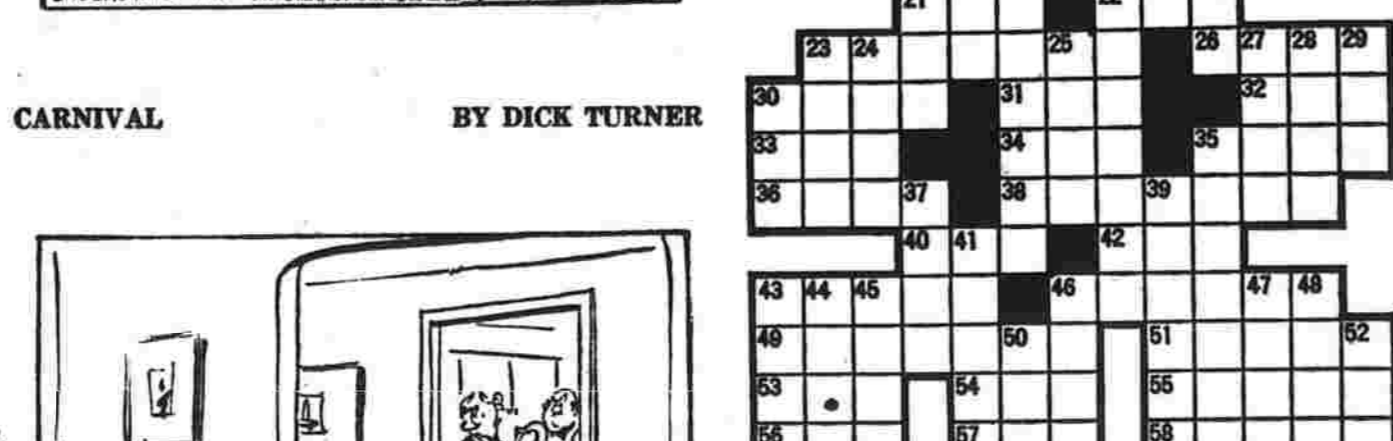

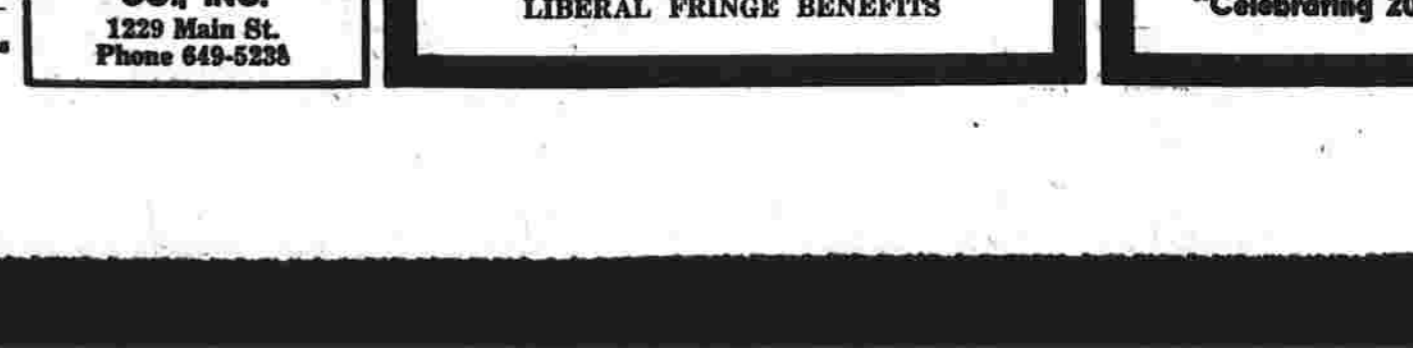
