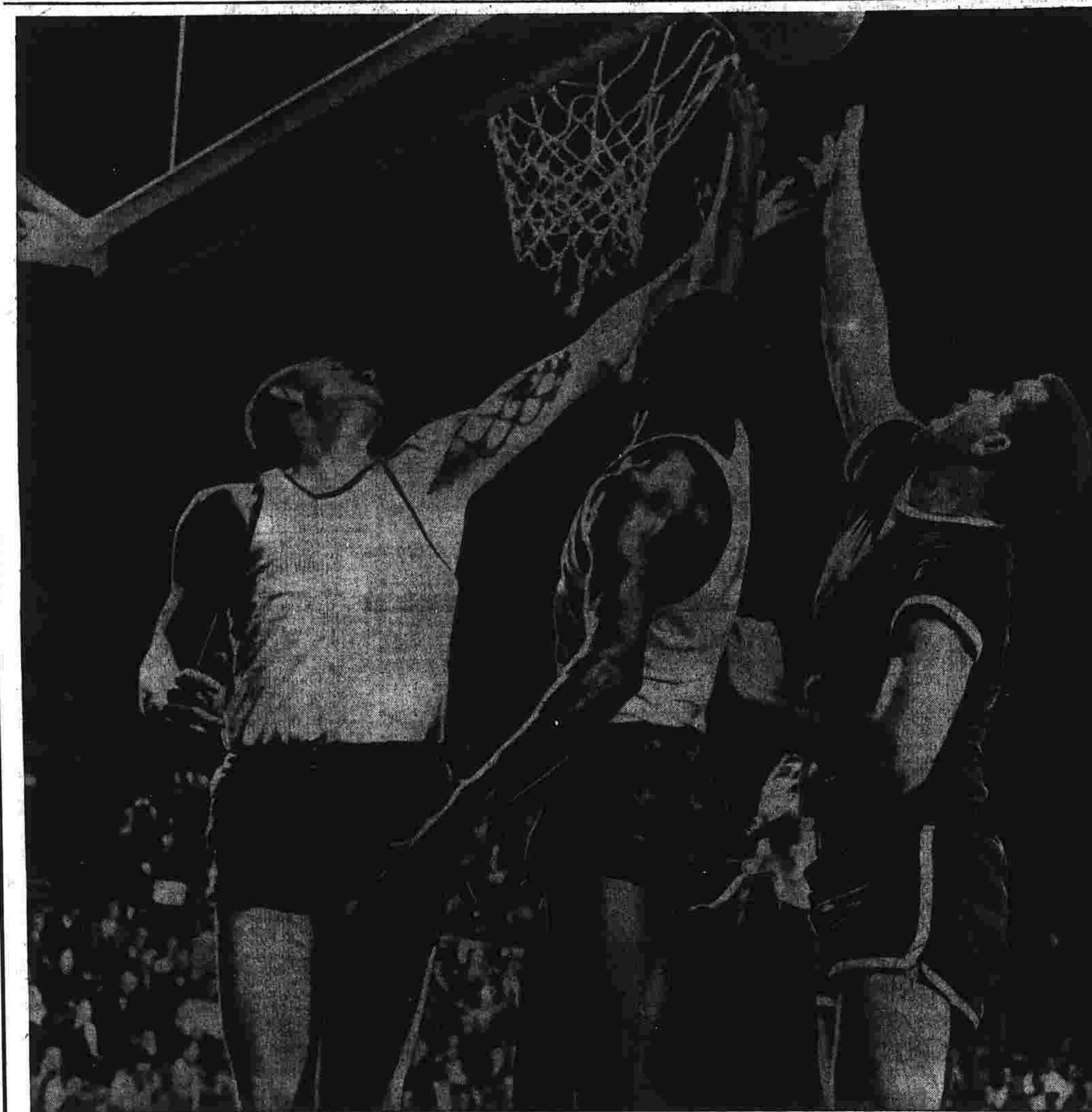

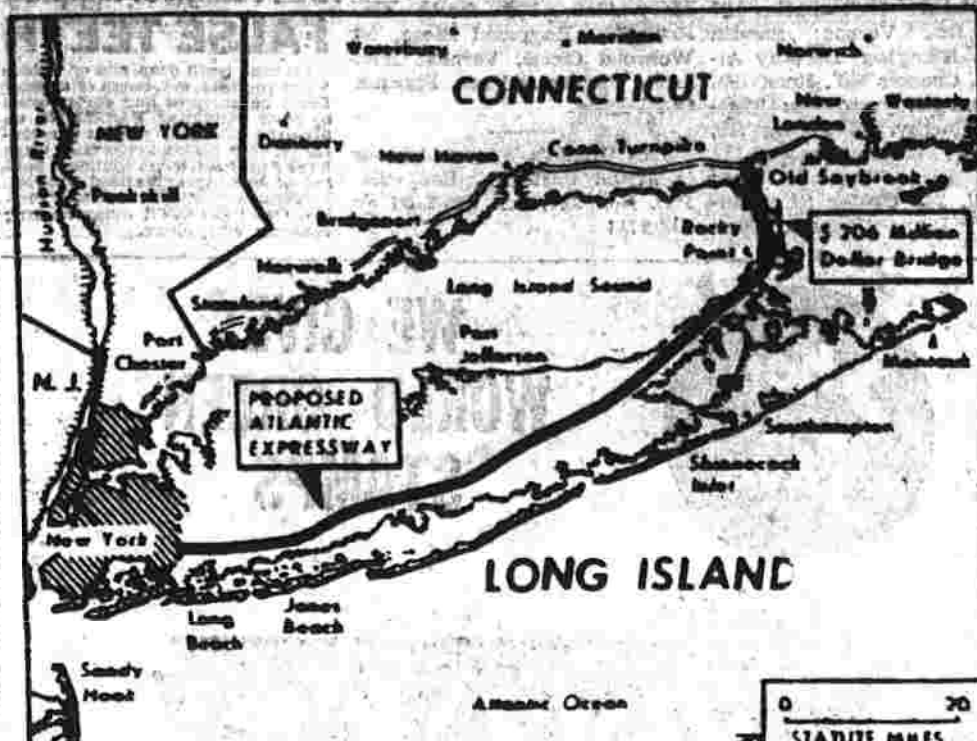

Board Denies Enlargement Of Grove St. Gas Station

The Vernon Planning Board of Appeals last night rejected an application for the enlargement of a gasoline station at Grove and Hale Sts., in Rockville. The application was approved by general residents and property owners in the area.

Standard Investors Inc. of Portland, Chevron gasoline distributor, applied for enlargement of the station, from two to three bays, and either a used car sales license or a general repairer's license.

The objects were headed by Antoni N. Sadlak, executive secretary of the Rockville Area Chamber of Commerce, and former Rockville building inspector Roland Usher.

The station was built in 1957, but has been open only about six months since that time, the applicants said.

Atty. John Pickett of Middletown, representing Standard Investors, told the appeals board that his firm is interested in purchasing the property from Gulf Oil Co. and leasing it to an operator—but only if the changes are made.

Atty. Pickett said that the service station could not be operated successfully unless cars could be sold or a general repairer's license could be obtained for car repairs.

He noted that the firm would agree to any restrictions as to the number of cars placed in the station for sale.

"We have no intention of turning the site into a glorified junk yard," he said. "We want to be able to serve those living in the area, and we can best do that by maintaining a neat area."

Sadak told the appeals board that he represented only himself and his wife, and objected on grounds that, if an additional bay and a repairer's license were granted, "the station would become a nuisance."

He said that during the brief period the station was open in the past, he used to bring his car in for service. "But it was stolen from the station," Sadak lives nearby.

Usher told the board that the original building permit for the station "was taken out with the express idea of deterring zoning."

"The permit was issued just before zoning came into effect, but was not constructed until six months later."

Usher said that permitting the construction of a third bay, or leasing a used or new car sales license, would be illegal under present zoning regulations.

Mrs. Esther Kemmister of Ellington, a Rockville native who owns property in the area, said that approval of the application would be "an affront to the neighborhood."

"No hardship has been presented," she said, "except upon the individual homeowner or resident in the area."

Also objecting to the issuance of the license were Robert Linton, who said the expansion would create a hazard to children walking to and from the Northeast School, and by Atty. Herbert Hamnabury, representing David Webster, owner of an adjacent apartment building.

Atty. Hamnabury said that Webster would not object to the use of the station as it is now, "but we do object to additions that are not in the zoning plan."

The board denied the application on grounds that the expansion of the station would be adding to a non-conforming use.

The board granted the application on grounds that the application constituted a primary livelihood, an application from a named person, to operate a washing shop and retail sales outlet at 15 Windsor Ave.

Council was formerly located at Vernon Circle, and makes ornamental iron railings.

David J. Webster, Rockville developer, was granted permission to construct a commercial structure at Vernon Circle, with unaffiliated setback.

Webster said he intends to build a unit which will house a store and seven offices. The board noted that a hardship is present because of the change in the use of the property.

William M. O'Brien was granted permission to change a single-family house to a duplex on an underused lot.

The board noted that this is the best use for a house that size, and that the application conforms to zoning regulations.

The structure is located at Lawrence and Pleasant Sts.

A federal postal authority says that the post office does not have enough men to do both fire and mail delivery... as volunteer firemen.

The opinion was rendered by John D. Svygert, director of the postal administration division of the Post Office Department in Washington, in a letter to Mayor James Throve.

Svygert has advised that the two volunteers, Frank Jones and Bradford Alpers, carry heavy mail delivery routes, and that the Wapping Post Office, from which they operate, is not authorized any additional help to make sure the mail is delivered.

The letter notes that, during their duty hours, "the men may not absent themselves from their assigned duties to perform routine duties as volunteer firemen, without the approval of the postmaster."

Mayor Throve questioned the use of the word "routine," and the phrase "the approval of the postmaster."

In a subsequent letter requesting clarification of the phrase, the mayor said, "May I take it to follow that, for non-routine matters such as actual fire duties, they may absent themselves with the permission of the postmaster?"

He noted that the problem in town is having available the services of the trained leaders to command the department volunteers during normal business hours in the event of a fire call, and only for such an emergency.

Mayor Throve also called attention to the fact that one of the mail carriers, Frank Jones, has a position in the town fire department, and the person upon whom the town relies for leadership during the business day, designated by the mayor to re-

Folk Singer Getting Rich At College

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - Glenn Yarbrough is working his way through college - not to get a lot of knowledge, but to retire a rich man.

That time may come soon. Unlike most performers who believe the show must go on and on and on, Yarbrough is willing to quit when he gets ahead. He did it once before.

He is a 23-year-old man of 55, more reemphasized in his horn rimmed glasses of a bookkeeper than a folk singer. But sing he does. In a manner that has captured a large segment of the young population, he sings hot and cold, with the joys and sorrows of the wanderer's life.

"Time to Move On" was his first album, and the title is apt. One February night he will be moving on to Colleges all over the nation, singing as many as eight concerts a week. He'll be on the road until July.

"That will be my last long tour," said the folk singer. "I'm tired of just singing. I want to start acting, and I'm doing a 'branded' soon. One I act? I think anybody can do it. I've never had any acting lessons, but then, nobody taught me to sing, either."

"Things seem to come naturally to Yarbrough. He's following his way across the country in his 30's. A husband and father, he sought a more stable career by buying the Lighthouse Club in Aspen, Colo. Then he and two other singers formed the Lighthouse, and the success of the team put him on the move again. It also helped end his marriage.

"When something starts to level off, I like to leave it," he said. "Otherwise it becomes a meaningless repetition."

So Yarbrough cut out from the Lighthouse, even though the team was grossing over a half-million dollars annually. The sea was luring him, and he bought a boat to the South Pacific. He did sail as far as Hawaii. Meanwhile he had made a single album for RCA Victor. It sold 30,000 copies in the San Francisco area alone. So Yarbrough decided to try his luck nationally.

The luck was good, especially with the college crowd.

"I'm surprised more artists don't work the college circuit," he remarked. "You can make a lot of money there, and the audiences are fine. If anything, they like too responsive; a performer could get lazy because of it."

There is little chance of that happening to Yarbrough. He is too restless, too eager for new challenges. He is aiming at an early retirement, with earnings of \$300,000 a year and upward, it's entirely possible Yarbrough's present goal is a school for gifted orphans which he would like to establish on a plantation he recently bought in Jamaica.

Y.N. Cigarette Sales Falter, Revenue Higher

NEW YORK (AP) - Cigarette sales in New York State have dropped about 14 per cent since the state tax was established last April, but the doubled tax has resulted in an almost 75 per cent increase in revenue, it was reported Monday.

The drop in sales was due to the higher price, the cancer scare, and smuggling, said a spokesman for the State Department of Taxation and Finance.

But the revenue from sales in the first year of the doubled tax was running from \$18 million to \$20 million a month, the spokesman said.

The average price of a pack of cigarettes in New York is 40 cents, but they sell for as much as 80 cents, he said. The total pack amounts to 22 cents; federal tax, 8 cents; state tax, 10 cents, and city tax, 4 cents.

Smuggling has presented a continuous problem, with persons trying to bring cigarettes by the truckload from North Carolina or in much smaller quantities from neighboring New Jersey.

New York law allows 40 cigarettes to be brought in for personal use. The penalty for violation is up to 30 days in jail and a \$500 fine.

Jerseys have been known to bring a couple of cartons daily into the city, selling them to coworkers or friends.

Elementary School Cost Estimated at \$560,000

The cost of building an elementary school, according to the architectural firm of Charles and Eleanor, under contract for the work, is estimated at \$560,000.

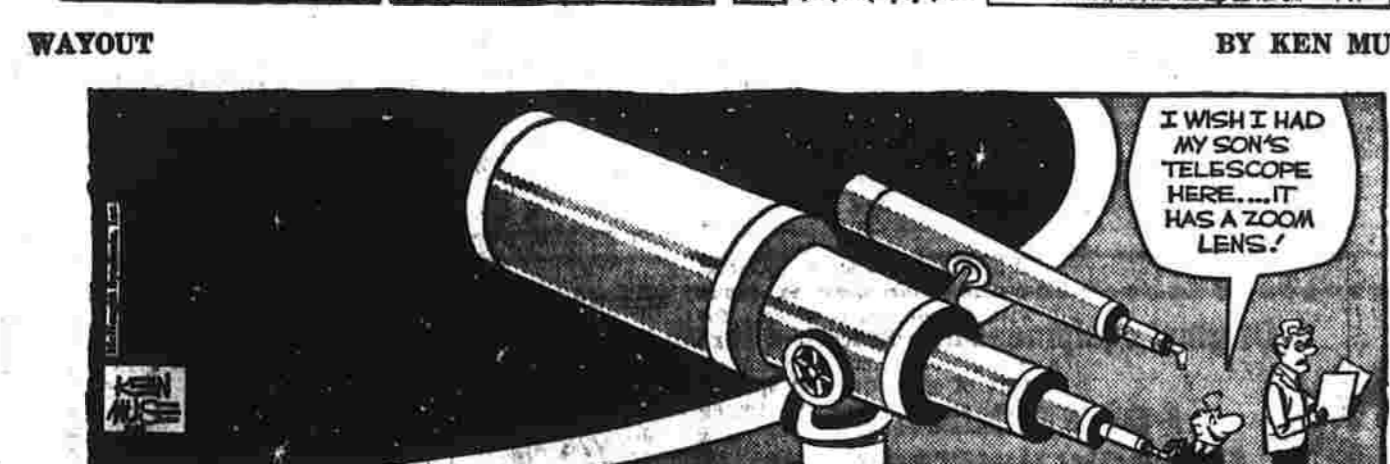

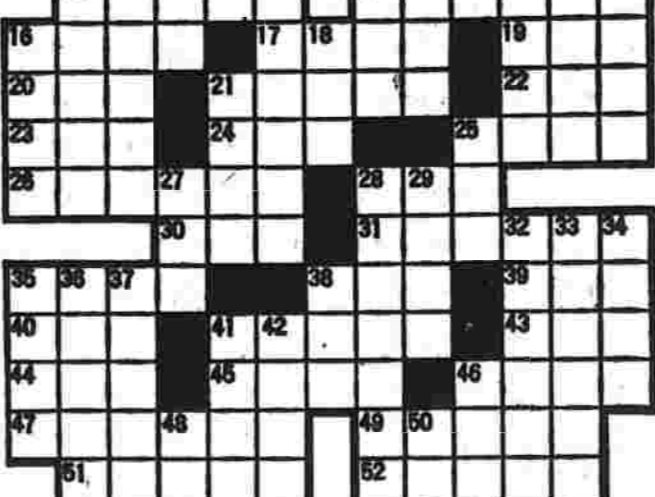

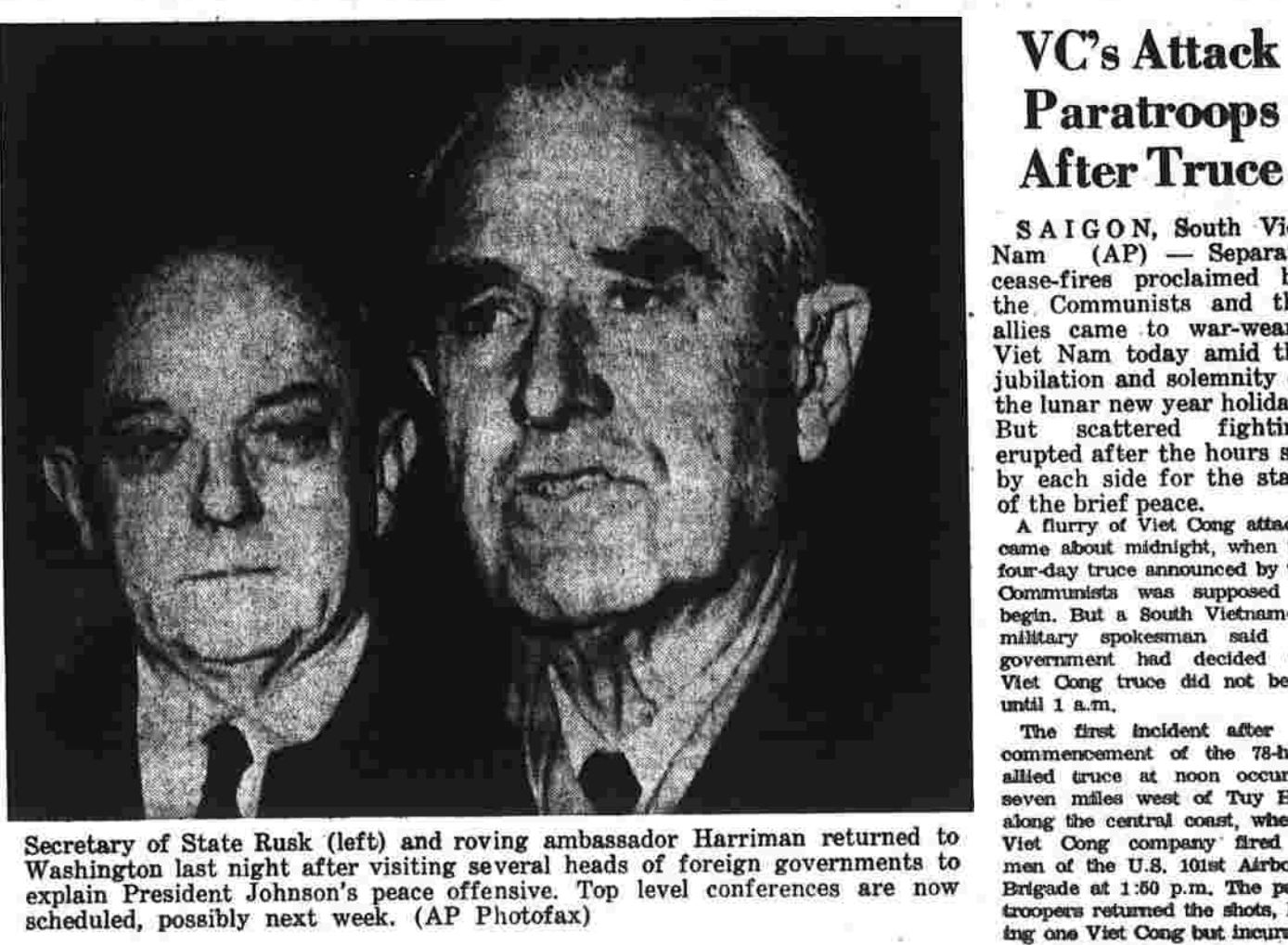
