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### 5-Year Plan Asked For Storm Sewers

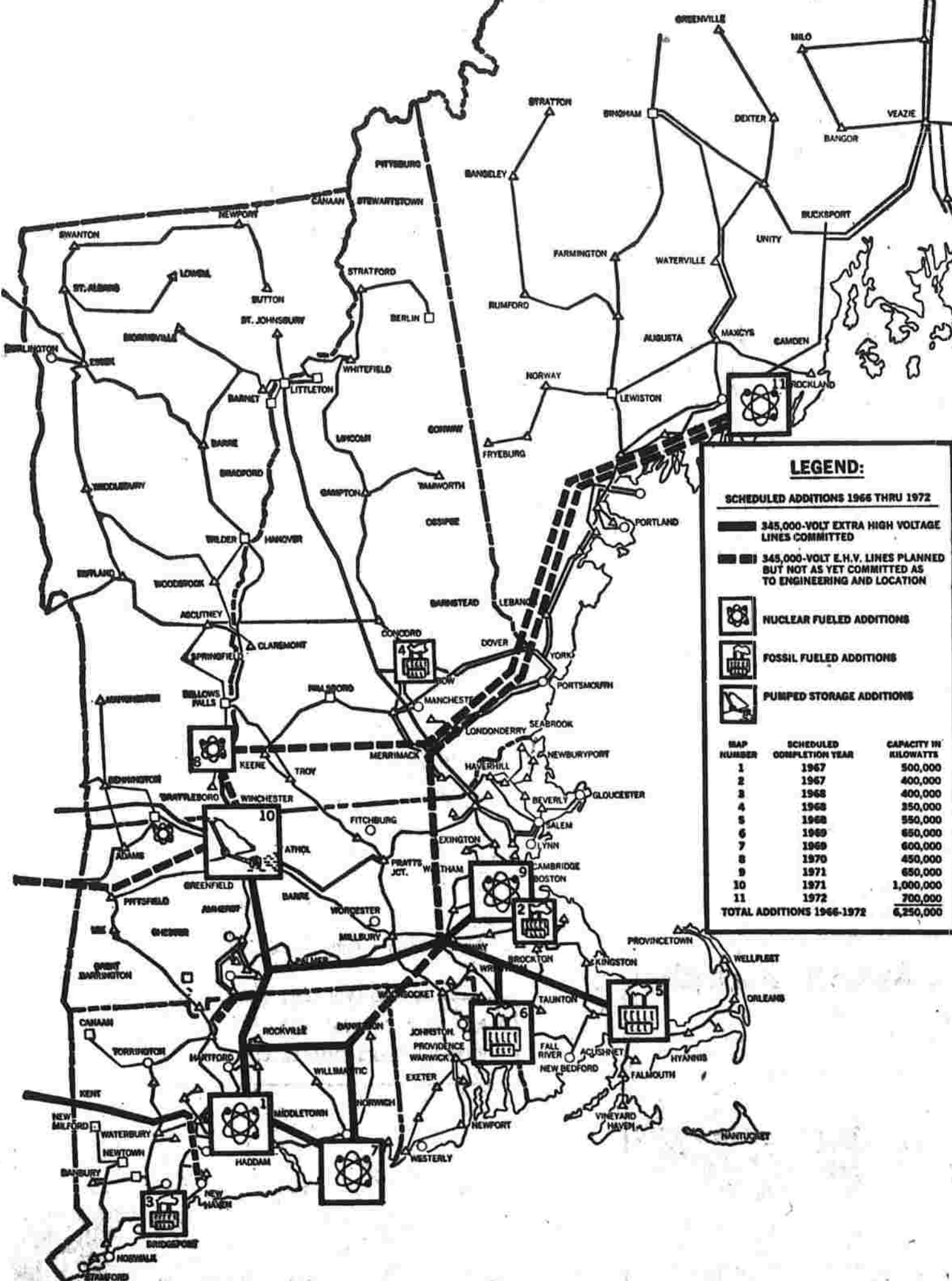

# Viet's Black Market Attacked in Congress

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk, seeking more foreign aid funds for Congress for South Viet Nam, ran into charges today that corruption and black market operations are draining off much U.S. aid.

"I'm reluctant to vote for this," said Rep. Wayne L. Hays, D-Ohio. "I think most of the aid we are sending out there is being stolen."

Hays said the wife of an American civilian worker in South Viet Nam sent \$86,000 in money orders back to the United States in six months.

Rusk asked the House Foreign Affairs Committee to approve a \$15-million increase in foreign aid funds for the current year, of which \$70 million would go to South Viet Nam.

The funds are needed mainly to ease the war strain on South Viet Nam's economy, he said, and to head off a threat of inflation.

Concern over the way in which aid is being used in South Viet Nam was expressed by Rep. Clement F. Zablocki, D-Wis., as well as by Hays.

Zablocki said there were indications previous South Viet Nam government leaders had left office "up to their armpits in gold."

He asked for assurances that the United States was taking measures to prevent corruption.

David R. Hall, director of the Agency for International Development, who appeared with Rusk as a witness, said the United States was making a determined effort to tighten controls. But he acknowledged that some aid was being siphoned off through corruption and black markets.

"This is a fast moving, large-scale operation," he said of the movement of goods and money into South Viet Nam, "and it's not air tight. There is a black market. The Viet Cong play it and contribute to it and there is bound to be some diversion."

Hays, noting that the State Department has withdrawn the dependents of its officials from South Viet Nam, said four large private American firms operating there permit their families to employ to have their families left office "up to their armpits in gold."

**Police Foil War-Type Jail Escape**  
HARTFORD (AP)—State police described today how a group of prisoners in the Hartford State Jail were methodically working their way toward freedom by cutting a hole in a brick wall.

The escape attempt was discovered Sunday night. The prisoners, which had all the earmarks of a movie about World War II prisoners of war camps, had been under way since the preceding Thursday or Friday, state police said.

The wall being worked on faces directly on East Street, so some they broke through the wall and were able to escape. The prisoners would have had no other obstacles to overcome, state police said.

As it turned out, they said, the men were only through one layer of brick in a wall that was three layers when they were found out.

## U.S. Power Displayed

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. warplanes flew more than 400 combat missions against Viet Cong targets in South Viet Nam today and three U.S. 7th Fleet destroyers unleashed a coastal barrage of 72 heavy shells in a massive display of American firepower.

A spokesman said hundreds of jets and small bombers were in the bombardsment of Viet Cong concentrations and supply camps, but the suspension of American air attacks against the Communist front continued into the 14th day.

U.S. Air Force and Navy planes, including the eight-engine B-52 Stratofortress from Guam, took part in the all-out assault.

On the ground, U.S. and other allied troops extended their post-troop offensive but failed to prod the Viet Cong or North Vietnamese regulars out of their jungle hideaways.

Although long columns slogged through the forests and rice paddies, military spokesmen reported no major successes with the enemy or any signs of the whereabouts of the North Vietnamese troops in the central highlands.

U.S. Marines fanned out of their base at Da Nang, 80 miles northeast of Saigon, on 300 patrols in the last 24 hours, but most met only an occasional gunshot, mine or booby trap. They were seeking the Communist front in the area.

One patrol came across an unknown number of Viet Cong shortly after midnight and a moderately heavy firefight.

## Security Surrounds Test Plane's Crash

ROY, N. M. (AP)—The military clamped a tight security cover around a northeast New Mexico ranching area after the flaming crash of a 2,000-mile per hour American reconnaissance plane.

One test pilot was killed and another injured slightly when the black SR71 spiraled to earth near the Texas border Tuesday. Both men parachuted out of the burning jet. One was found dead by ranch workers.

The Air Force stopped everyone but ranchers and their employees from entering the area, and refused to elaborate on details of the crash.

A spokesman at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., said the SR71 was on a routine long-range test flight. The spokesman said it was the first reported accident for the new series of twin-engine surveillance craft capable of scanning 60,000 square miles of earth from an altitude of 80,000 feet.

## Johnson Reveals Plan For Rebuilding Cities

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson proposed today a \$2.3-billion, six-year federal aid program for rebuilding selected American cities "on an unprecedented scale."

The President, in his message to Congress on the cities, outlined a vast program for rebuilding center cities, reorganizing and governing metropolitan areas and building new towns outside existing metropolitan areas to provide for the nation's fast growing population.

In his demonstration program, available to any U.S. city, Johnson proposed:

"That we make massive additions to the supply of low- and moderate-cost housing.

"That we combine physical reconstruction and rehabilitation with effective social programs throughout the rebuilding process.

"That we achieve new flexibility in administrative procedures.

"That we focus all the techniques and talent within our society on the crisis of the American city."

Johnson said "there are few cities or towns in America where there would be special grants of 90 per cent of the needed cost of the demonstration projects.

"These grants are to supplement the efforts of local communities."

## Bomb Renewal Seen

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson is expected soon to order renewal of bombing attacks on Communist North Viet Nam.

This expectation is widely shared among administration and congressional leaders.

Press secretary Bill D. Moyers said today that Johnson is still "weighing all the factors involved in our position in Southeast Asia and is assessing and evaluating those factors."

RETOR'S NOTE — If a couple files a joint income tax return, the lowest rate applies. Also, individuals who qualify as heads of households get a lower rate than they file as single persons. This article, third of a series of five, goes into such matters.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Here are a few rules on the 1966 income tax returns of married couples and those individuals who get a tax break if they qualify as head of household or surviving spouse.

A husband and wife almost always save by filing a joint return, rather than separately. To be joint, a return must be signed by both. A wife is not a dependent for income tax purposes. The rules on wives and dependents are not the same.

If your wife had 1965 income, no matter how small, you cannot claim her exemption unless she files jointly with you and she has 1965 income. If you had \$600 or more, she would, like everyone else, have to file a return.

You could do it jointly with you or separately. If separately, she'd take her own exemption. But if her income was less than \$600, which wouldn't require a return, she could take the exemption jointly with you, even if she had none, falls to file jointly.
