South Windsor Historic District Proposal Is Topic for Coffee Hours

A series of coffee hours is being planned by the South Windsor Historical Society to discuss the proposed historic district.

The purpose of an historic district is to preserve the historic character of a municipality. The formation of such a district is an area of Main St. Members of the committee include: Mrs. John Burdett, Cor. Fred Dooley, Mrs. Frederick Mahr and F. Martin McGrath.

The committee must study the historical significance of the area under consideration. It will then submit a preliminary report on the history of the area to the Connecticut Historical Society, the town planning and zoning commission and the town council. These agencies must respond favorably or unfavorably to the report within 90 days; otherwise, if no answer is given within 90 days, the report is approved automatically.

A public hearing is then scheduled between 120 and 150 days after the filing of the initial report. At this time the report and a map of the area is presented to the public. A proposed ordinance is then drafted for submission to the town council, based on the recommendations of the commission.

Falcon Coach Seeking Assistants

Hecker Set To Operate Atlanta Club

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—The new head coach of the Atlanta Falcons sometimes goes by the name of J. Jones.

By now, those interested in National Football League affairs know that the Falcons' main coach is Tom Hecker.

He used the name "J. Jones" to keep secret Falcon owner Dan Riffe's selection of a new head coach.

"I feel like I've spent 18 months in the Atlanta area," Hecker said. "I've been here for the past six years as an assistant coach with the Green Bay Packers. I thought when a stewardess recognized me and said, 'Hello, Mr. Jones', that was the end of it. Hecker wanted little time getting to work. He started working for the Falcons Wednesday afternoon in a search for five assistant coaches.

He said he doesn't plan to move his wife and five children to Atlanta until school is over. He said he is going to be busy 11 months a year and he would not have time to spend with them anyway.

Hecker was first contacted by the Falcons last Saturday, and was told Tuesday to fly to Atlanta to be interviewed at a new conference Wednesday.

Hecker said that he feels Atlanta has some top talent players on its roster, "and with the 42 players we will be adding to the roster I believe we will have pretty good talent."

The former Baldwin-Wallace College star, who played half-back for the Los Angeles Rams and the Washington Redskins before a knee injury ended his NFL career in 1961, said he will be looking for a strong defense with the Falcons.

"You can't win in the NFL without a good defense," Hecker said. "I've been defensive backfield coach for the Packers. I would really like to have something to do with the Falcons."

Hecker has been considered one of the best defensive coaches in the NFL. He led the Redskins to Lombardi's top aide, but he lacks Lombardi's brooding intensity and is slow to anger.

"North has all the qualifications of a paragon," Lombardi said. "He is a very fine young gentleman, highly intelligent and with a fine personality. He is extremely loyal and one of the finest workers I have ever known on my staff."

Lombardi, who recommended Hecker for the Atlanta job, said he didn't know his former aide's coaching philosophy. "He's been coaching for several years now and he has done a very good job," Lombardi said.

Chicago Awarded NBA Franchise

CHICAGO (AP)—The hopes of Chicago's entry in the National Basketball Association for next season undoubtedly rest on the possible acquisition of home-grown Cazzie Russell, the All-America star from Michigan.

Chicago twice before has failed to make a go in the NBA, but Wednesday night it was given another chance by the league's board of governors in New York.

They voted to expand to 10 teams with the new franchise awarded to a Chicago group headed by Dick Riets, former basketball player at North Carolina State.

The last time Chicago made a run for it in the NBA was 1961. The team was first called the Packers and then the Zephyrs, and moved to Baltimore in 1962.

Whether they are to be discussed today at a new conference in St. Louis, the Chicago group is headed by Riets, president of the expansion committee, and Ken Kerney, owner of the St. Louis Hawks, who is to be in charge of making the franchise a success.

Chicago's first game was scheduled for 1961, but it was postponed because of the team's financial problems. The team was eventually sold to the Baltimore Orioles, who moved it to Baltimore in 1962.

Stottlemyre 'Odd Sort' Of Yankee

NEW YORK (AP)—Mel Stottlemyre is an odd sort of Yankee. He doesn't make many errors, no operations for Mel. He's just a winning pitcher.

The first citizen of Malton, Wash., is a quiet, easy-going guy who would make an ideal choice for a movie casting director looking for a grocery clerk of a filling station attendant.

The only time Mel appears to get excited in discussing his pitching is when he is being pitched in. The lean youngster hates home run hitters—when they're not Yankees—like home-baking housewife takes cigarette and cigar ashes.

Mel, a natural throwing sinker ball, doesn't give up too many homers.

The 6-foot-4, 175-pound right-hander has become the ace of the Yankees staff and one of the best hurlers in the American League.

Signed out of Yankins Junior College by scout Eddie Taylor for nothing in 1963, Stottlemyre moved up from Richmond of the International League in the summer of 1964 after posting a 13-3 record.

Bennet Pupils Learn About Offset Printing

Grade 8 and 9 pupils at Bennet Junior High School will soon be learning the processes used in offset printing in their Graphic Arts class. Their instructor, Arthur L. Milano, recently purchased the offset press and photo-copy camera shown in the picture through government grants. The grants are being reconducted by students for actual classroom use.

Having taught Graphic Arts at Bennet for eight years, Milano said he had been on the lookout for equipment for quite some time, hoping someday to add offset printing—one of the most important methods—to the curriculum.

Graphic Arts has been taught at Bennet for the past two years, Milano said, and attempts to give the youngsters a "mastering" but a basic understanding of the various substances that are used in the printing process. It is considered a terminal course, but boys interested in printing as a trade can get additional training at state technical schools.

Milano explained that offset printing is based on the principle that oil and water will not mix. First a pasteup or layout is prepared (at table in photo) and photographed (copy camera, right) on a rubber plate. The very thin, light-sensitive ink plate is then "developed" with chemicals, which either bring out the image, and is coated with a thin substance that enables the plate to pick up ink and repel water.
