U.S. Renews Bombs Plus Peace Moves

UN Meeting Sought To Hear Peace Talk

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson launched a new Viet Nam peace move in the United Nations today immediately after he ordered the resumed bombing of North Vietnamese targets at the end of a 37-day pause.

Johnson told the nation and the world that he ordered resumption of bombing of military targets in North Viet Nam to save lives of U.S. South Vietnamese and allied troops fighting Communist forces in South Viet Nam. The Reds are reinforced by supplies and men sent from North Viet Nam.

On Johnson's orders, which the President himself announced, U.S. Ambassador Arthur Goldberg then called for an immediate meeting of the U.N. Security Council to hear a report on the collapse of the U.S. peace offensive and to receive a resolution for new diplomatic action.

"The end of the pause does not mean the end of our own pursuit of peace," Johnson said in his broadcast statement. He added that the resolution could "open the way to the conference table."

Bridges, Highway Hit

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—The United States unleashed its bombers against North Viet Nam today after holding off air attacks for 37 days while vainly trying to bring the Communists to the peace table.

The first waves of U.S. Navy and Air Force planes hit bridges, ferries, barges, warehouses and storage facilities well south of the Hanoi-Haiphong industrial area. Later flights pummeled Highway No. 1, a main artery along the coast, wrecking a truck convoy and destroying a bridge, a U.S. spokesman reported.

The later attacks were centered around Vinh, on North Viet Nam's central coast. On the ground, U.S. and South Vietnamese forces stepped up their offensives against the Viet Cong, but the Communists inflicted heavy losses on a militia unit and Red guns hammered allied positions.

A U.S. Spokesman said Navy pilots claimed destruction of a bridge about 10 miles southeast of Dong Hoi and damage to the approach to the Quang Khe ferry landing about 20 miles northwest of Dong Hoi.

Bad weather prevented estimates of the damage in other raids. Spokesmen declined to say how many sorties were flown or what types of bombs were dropped.

Support in Congress

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson's decision to resume air attacks on North Vietnamese targets brought approval from congressional leaders today. Some expressed hope the President could continue peace efforts.

Others called for intensified military efforts to win the war quickly. Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana, who had advised Johnson to hold off bombing resumption, said in a statement that the President "has my sympathy and understanding and I will do my best to support him to the best of my ability."

Mansfield said "I fully appreciate the difficulty and the agony of the decision which was his — and his alone — to make."

Sen. J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and another foe of the bombing resumption, said now that Johnson has made his decision "We must support our fighting men in the field."

"The wisdom of the policy may be questioned," Fulbright said, "but we must back our men in the field."

High Court To Review Hoffa Trial

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court agreed today to a limited review of James R. Hoffa's conviction in 1964 on jury tampering charges.

In a brief order, the court said it would hear the Teamsters Union president's appeal on one question alone.

That is, "whether evidence obtained by the government by means of a secret informer in the quarters and council of a defendant during one criminal trial so violates the defendant's Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Amendment rights that suppression of such evidence is required in a subsequent trial of the same defendant on a different charge."

Hoffa asked reversal by the court of his conviction. He was sentenced to eight years in prison and fined \$10,000.

Three codefendants, each sentenced to three years in prison, filed separate appeals. Their petitions to be heard also were granted, limited to the one question. The three are Thomas Ewing Parks, Larry Campbell and Ewing King.

Hoffa and the three others were tried in federal court in Chattanooga, Tenn., on charges of tampering with the jury in Hoffa's 1962 conspiracy trial in Nashville. The Nashville trial ended in a mistrial when jurors could not agree.

In his 82-page appeal, Hoffa said his case presented 18 questions for Supreme Court consideration. The Justice Department opposed hearings for the four men.

Police Probe License Fix, Payoff Deal

NEW HAVEN (AP)—State and New Haven police authorities say they have been investigating for at least a month an alleged motor vehicles operator's license fix and payoff.

They say it involves a New Haven resident who allegedly paid \$1,000 to a state official for the return of his suspended operator's license.

The authorities said the man's driving license had been suspended indefinitely by the State Motor Vehicles Department after he was convicted of a speeding violation, one of over 40 motor vehicle violations he was charged with since 1968 in New Haven alone.

State's Atty. George R. Tierman, who initiated the investigation, quoted the man as saying he "had paid to get it (his license) back" when confronted by police.

The prosecutor said the man has since left for California, rendering himself unavailable for further questioning.

He said no arrest warrants have been signed at this time.

Many Tropical Features To State's Snow Storm

NEW HAVEN (AP)—A brutal winter storm that dropped most of its snow to the south swept across Connecticut Sunday, leaving 6 to 10 inches of snow in its wake.

The snow will probably be around for awhile, since the U.S. Weather Bureau at Windsor Locks expects a cold wave to move in.

Two persons died of apparent heart attacks while shoveling snow during the storm. They were William E. Rudolph, 64, and Mrs. Annabelle E. Houlter, 68, both of West Haven.

Many schools were closed today, primarily in the western, north central and northeastern portions of the state. Some others opened an hour later than usual.

The storm had several features more commonly associated with tropical storms, a weatherman said.

For one thing, the barometer dropped to a startlingly low 28.74 inches Sunday afternoon at the center of the storm passed by on its way north.

The storm also had an "eye," somewhat like a hurricane, which allowed the sun to break through in the afternoon. A rain-

bow was sighted in the Willimantic area.

Between noon and 2 p.m. the temperature dropped 10 degrees in Hartford, from 36 to 26.

The snow was tamped down by rain and sleet Sunday morning but still averaged about 8 inches across the state, the weather bureau said.

Depths of 10 inches were common in northern and western Connecticut, while along the shore only 6 inches or so was measured.

At times it was difficult to tell whether the snow was falling or just blowing around, as gusty winds raised the state.

The winds were particularly strong along the shore, where Bridgeport reported gusts up to 50 miles an hour and an unofficial clocking of 80 miles an hour was reported at Clinton. At Block Island, at the eastern end of Long Island Sound, one gust was officially measured at 81 mph.

Tides were higher than normal, but there was no recurrence of the previous Sunday's serious flooding that drove hundreds of people from their shoreline homes in Milford, Fairfield, Norwalk and other coastal towns.

Windblown mist added to the driving snow reduced visibility

to nearly zero at times along the shore. Stratford police reported that 25 traffic accidents occurred in a short space of time because people couldn't see where they were going.

Looking on the brighter side, the storm brought badly needed moisture to the drought-stricken state.

The U.S. Weather Bureau which measured 6.2 inches of snow Sunday, melted it down to .96 inch of water, which brought the month's precipitation to 2.97 inches, less than half an inch below normal.

The storm also brought the total snowfall for the month to 17.5 inches at Bradley Field. Only 22 inches have fallen since winter began.

It was the second consecutive Sunday that Connecticut was hit by a major storm.

Deep Snow, Strong Wind Chill East

CHICAGO (AP) Lashed by a storm piling up deep snow whipped by violent winds, the East Coast shuddered today in the icy grip of a record-breaking cold wave extending from Florida to Maine.

The blizzard, and extreme cold in other areas, contributed to at least 72 deaths from highway accidents, fires and heart attacks in 16 states.

The severe storm swept up the coast over the weekend, leaving cold behind and virtually paralyzing travel in major cities of the populous Northeast, including the nation's capital.

Two states struck the hardest, Delaware and Virginia, declared a state of emergency. Two feet of snow fell in some parts of Virginia and National Guard units were ordered to help clear clogged highways in Delaware.

In northern and central Florida, the gigantic citrus crop was threatened by freezing temperatures.

Thousands of travelers were inconvenienced as airports in Washington, New York, Baltimore, Boston, Philadelphia and Montreal were "socked in" by conditions that made take-offs and landings almost impossible on ice-caked runways.

Washington struggled under 16 inches of snow — the worst accumulation in the city in 44 years. The storm dumped 12 new inches of snow with four inches still on the ground from a storm a week ago.

Federal government and city employees in the capital were told to stay away from work in the morning except for emergencies. However, Congress was scheduled to meet.

The award was earned because of the town's year-round clean up efforts and beautification campaign, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, with assistance from the Jaycees.

The C of C had entered a scrapbook, compiled by Dr. Douglas H. Smith, chairman of its City Beautiful Committee, depicting the volunteer efforts and accomplishments of local civic groups and individuals.

Of especially noteworthy interest to the committee which made the award was the division of Manchester into six sections for the trash pickup by Boy Scouts, and the construction, by the Jaycees, of a bus shelter at Westhill Gardens, housing for the elderly.

A delegation of those responsible for Manchester's clean up program will be invited to attend an elaborate Awards Ceremony in Washington on Feb. 15, when Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson will make the presentations.

Immediately following the Presentation Ceremony, a luncheon, honoring the winning cities, will be held, with Secre-

tary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall, the main speaker.

Manchester, along with all population-class winners, is also eligible for the Trigg Trophy, the national award of excellence, to be won by that city, regardless of classification, which best exemplifies the principles of the Bureau's nationwide community betterment program.

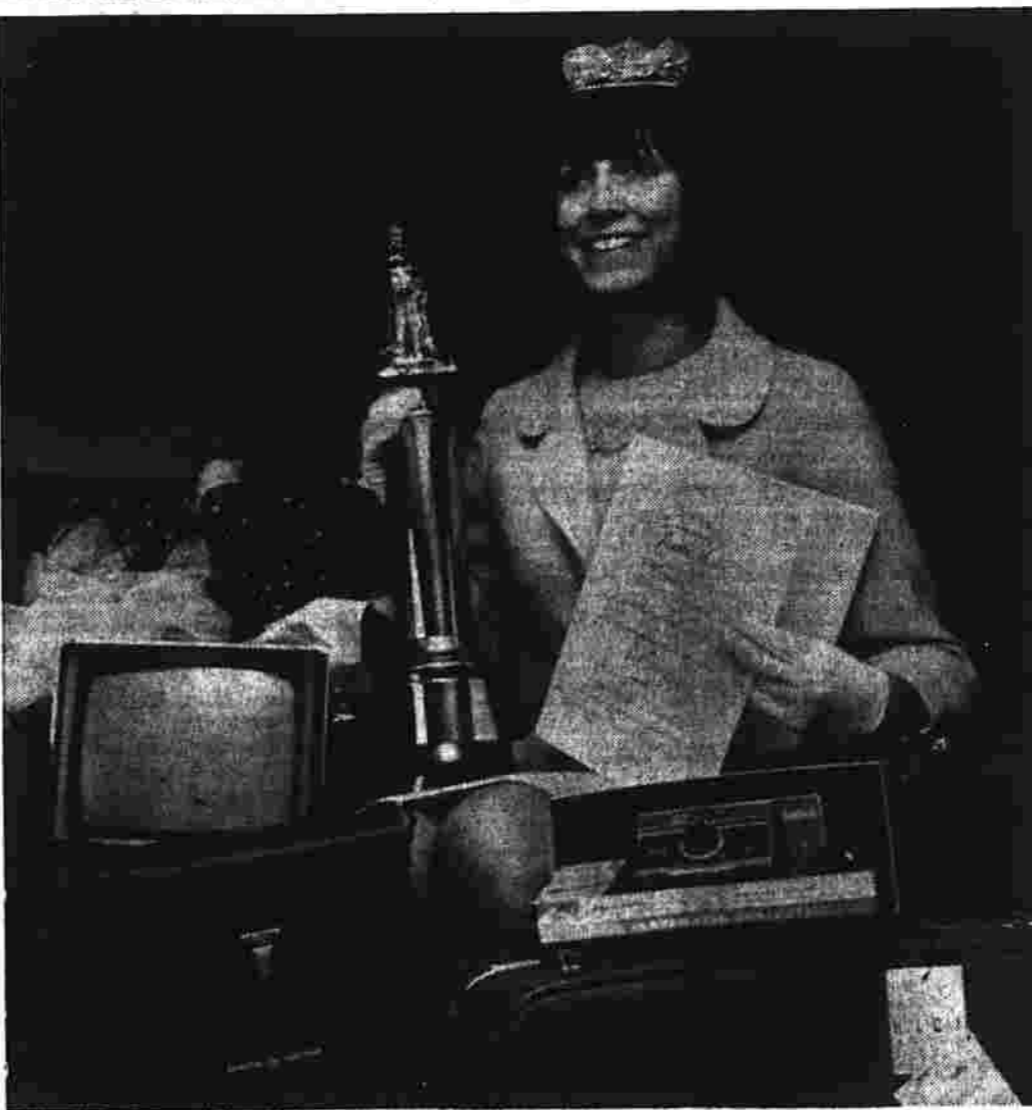
last night at Bushnell Memorial Hall, Hartford.

Highway Crews Busy Combatting Hazards

Alternate shifts at plowing snow or slush and spreading sand or chemicals, interrupted by a few hours sleep, kept crews of the highway division busy over the weekend as they fought to combat a variety of weather hazards.

The long battle with snow 6 o'clock, when most of the men and rain began with the division was alerted at midnight today, spot plowing and some sanding was carried on by a smaller crew using five trucks. Then the full crew came back on duty, and the 17-route plowing started again, ending about 9 o'clock this morning.

The work was slowed by one truck and it had to be put out of plowing service. Other breakdowns were minor and caused delays of 15 minutes to an hour.

An increase of 1,676 new borrowers at Rockville Public Library is reported by librarian Miss Natalie E. McLean in her annual report. The new total is 36,898, as of Dec. 31, 1965. Of the new borrowers, 800 are adults and 270 are children ages 16 and under.

Circulation rose slightly last year, 360,888 in 1964 to 361,364 last year, but fewer books were sent to the schools.

No Surprises In New Autopsy On Mott's Body

(SHEFFIELD, Mass. (AP)) — A second autopsy on Newcomb Mott, Jr., who died on a Soviet airplane, has revealed the "surprises" in the way of his death.

The body was returned to the United States Saturday for the general autopsy at Old Parish Congregational Church.

Medical Examiner Dr. Michael A. Longo, who performed the autopsy in Boston, said a full report on the autopsy would have to wait until a copy of the Soviet autopsy reached the Mott family's lawyer.

Last Sept. 4, Mott walked across the Russian border at Hirtshelva, Norway.

Mott was arrested just inside Soviet territory near Borisobek, charged with crossing the border without a visa, found guilty and sentenced to 18 months in a labor camp.

Then, when a Russian prison train moving out of Murmansk Dec. 20, Mott died.

Mott was buried in the Russian capital of Moscow.

The U.S. State Department had asked the Russians for the body before the trial, but Mott was to be given the 18-month sentence.

The State Department said it considered the sentence excessive for the offense.

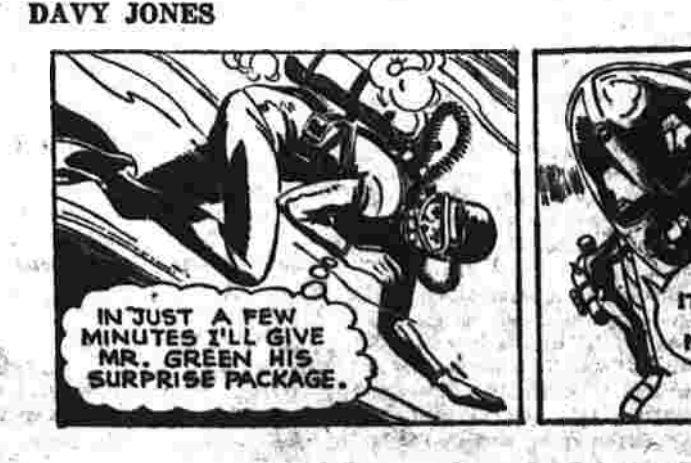
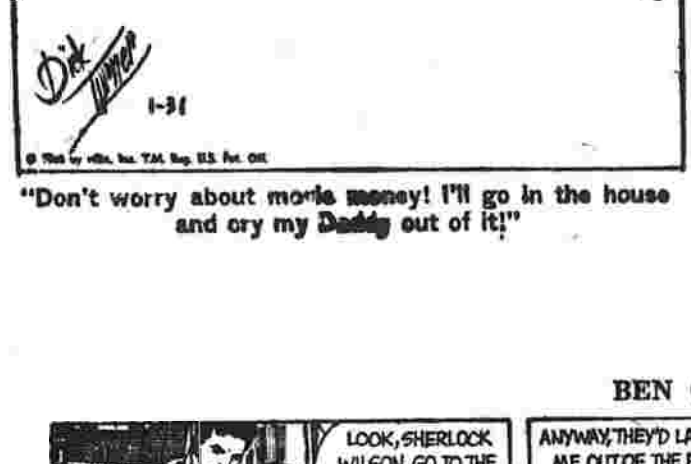
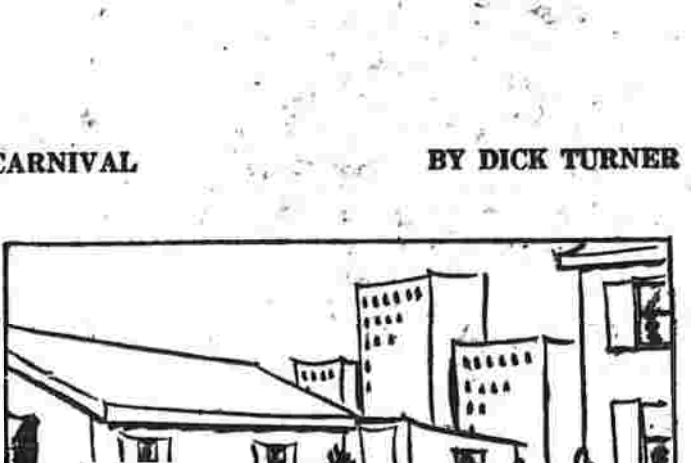
