





More and more it seems, however that the President, whatever his words may be from time to time, finds his own policy instincts, and his interpretation of the duties and responsibilities of his office, decreeing that his acts shall be those of deeper involvement, and

greater risk. We have now waged escalating war in Vietnam for nearly a year, bombing North Vietnam at will, increasing our own fighting strength in South Vietnam to 200,000 men. Other than that demonstration, results of our year of escalation have been a sort of stalemate. The Victoria still controls perhaps two-thirds of South Vietnam. It has been steadily reinforced, since our bombing of North Vietnam began, with troops from North Vietnam. It still operates at will within a few miles of Saigon. However unsatisfactory this stalemate

may be, however, it has one plus fac-tor. Our escalation into this stalemate has not, so far, produced World War III. Elither because Communist China is terrified of our might, or discreet, or per-haps because Russie and China are just as anspicious of each other as they are opposed to our role in Vietnam, we have, so far, been operating in Vietnam with

it, ne matter what the personnel of leadership at Washington.

There is no such easy solution. There is no such easy solution. There is only a choice between unsatisfactory propositions. There are those who think that, having made plain our intention to stay and prevent the Victoring from ever completing its military conquest our best strategy would be to stan firm and hold, letting the enemy seek out whatever fighting takes place.

The President has refused that strategy, and decided otherwise. We fear he is wrong. We hope, as for survival itself, that he can somehow be right. As for the war of words which acompanies the war of deeds, that is now apparently to be transferred, for the moment, to the United Nations. Any real effort on the part of the United Nations to discuss Vietnam has, so far, been considered impractical because it was not considered likely that the United States would submit itself to any United Nations judgment as to the legality or morality of its role in Vietam. If, however, the President has now ecided really to yield to the world organization some of that peace-keeping and peace-enforcing role for which it was created, we may find some additional hope for peace building.

What "The Economist" finds is that we here in America have at last found a system for paving our farmers to cut production which does not actually result in more production. While we have been doing this, more Communist coun-tries have been coming into the world food market, while India, a friend of ours, has been developing an increased

It's a good thing we have all the planners and experts we do. Otherwise,

how would we ever have solved the problem of over-production just in time to get ready to solve the problem of under-production?

Not the least of these is the absence of any detailed financial statement that would permit prospective donors to know precisely how much money is raised or spent. The most RFE will say on this score is that its fund-raising goal for 1966 is \$13 million.

RFE says it is a "private, non-profit, non-government network broadcasting through the Iron Curtain to 80 million captive people in Poland, Czechoslo-vakia, Hungary, Romania and Bul-garia." It is said to have 28 transmitters at three sites—two in West Germany and one near Lisbon—and to employ 1,500 persons. Unlike the Voice of America, Radio Free Buropa presum-ably is free to operate without government restrictions and to employ what Gen. Lucius D. Clay has described as a

"tough slugging voice."
The semi-claudestine RFE came under serutiny by David Wise and Thomder sarutiny by David Wise and Thomas B. Ross in "The Invisible Government." Their talk with an REE spokesman went as follows:

"We're supported by contributions from the American people, mainly from the Radio Free Europe Fund, a spokesman said. He added that RFE is privalely managed and privately financed. Asked how it went about making sure that the broadcasts were consistent with United States foreign policy, he replied, 'We read the New York Times.'"
