Need for Middle School Stressed by Officials

The need and functions of the proposed middle school were stressed by officials of the board of education and school administration last night.

Assistant Superintendent of Schools William Ferry noted that, without the middle school, some other new school, by 1970 the town would be 40 classrooms short of the number needed to house the student population in Grades 1 through 8.

Because the middle school years serve as the beginning of the transitional period from childhood to adulthood, the administration says, a special program should be provided for pupils of this age.

Water systems should reflect the "transitional nature" of these grades, and include educating the student to meet the needs, interests and abilities of boys and girls during early adolescence.

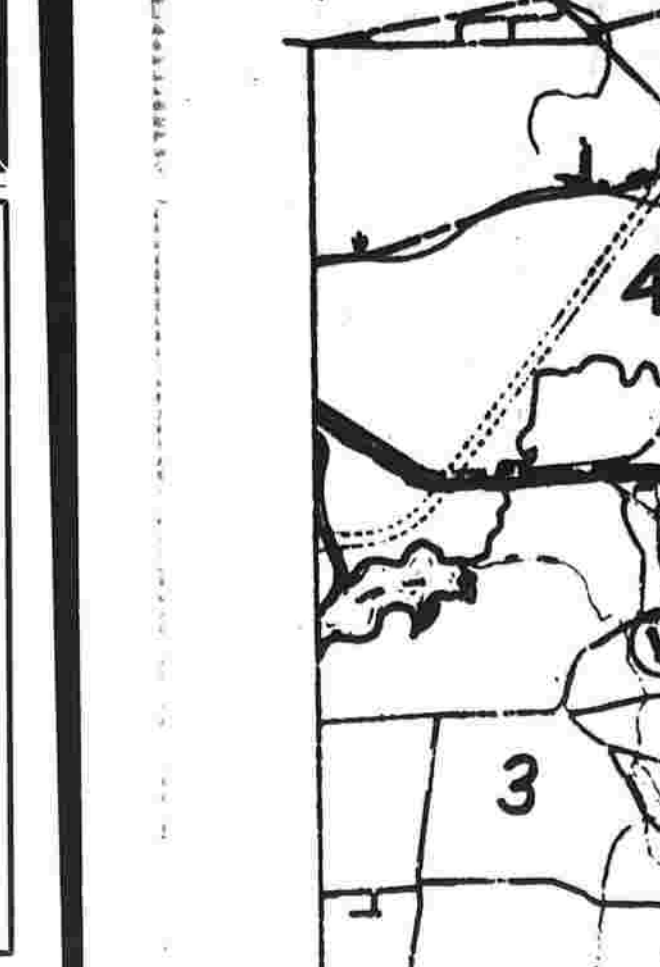

Pope May Leave Palace During Lengthy Repairs

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul VI may move to the Lateran Palace in Rome and live in the beginning of the century until the beginning of the 14th century. The repairs that are planned are so extensive that they might take years. And the most terrible theory for this whole course of events, being suggested by those who think no ethic or morality of any kind is being given much of a chance in the decisions of our government, is that the "peace" option is a bombing lure itself was nothing more than a military device which allowed us to catch up with our own promises of reinforcement and supply in Vietnam.

Not all of these theories can be right. And perhaps none of them really matters.

What really matters should be the fact that the issue is finally before the United Nations, where it belongs.

But its members should move with courage to take the United States to the surface position the United States has suddenly taken. In that new position of ours, we are asking the United Nations to be the world policeman we ourselves have hitherto considered ourselves alone privileged to be in Southeast Asia.
