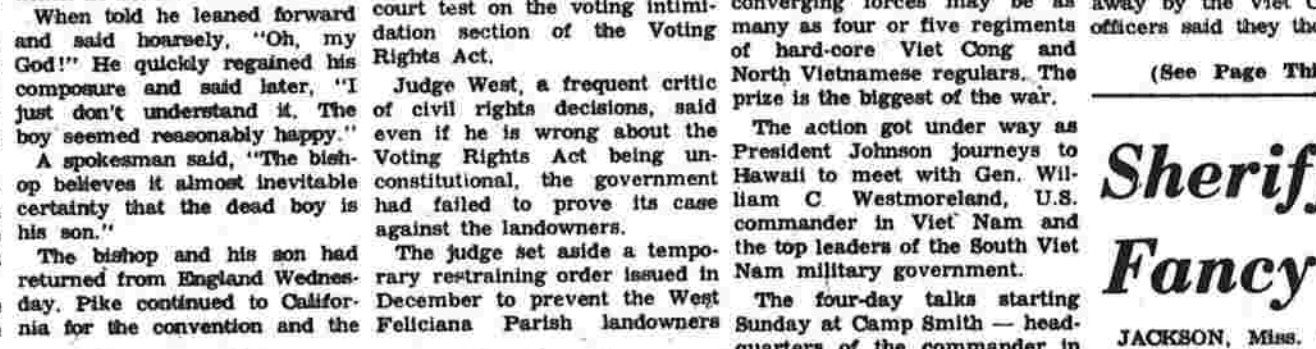

"Pursuit" — Telly Savalas on the run in a "Fugitive" — "Run for your Life."

The Roger Miller TV special, I was not Ditty, nor did I do a native of a spy show. I am not Ditty on my Capitol record album, "Music - A Part of Me." Nor was I Ditty in the TVM-Film.

"All this is part of a design to avoid being overly identified with the role I play on TV. It extends to the films I do when the series is not in production."

McCallum's career is branching out in varied directions for the very reason that he realizes the teen-age clamor can be a tenuous base for a career.

"I'm grateful for their attention now," he remarked, "but I realize that the teen-agers are enormously fickle. Today's sensation can be quickly forgotten as they grow up. The new generation of teen-agers comes up, and they want to establish their own particular favorites.

"But that teen-age following can prove valuable - if you can appeal to them on a different level later on. I hope I can exploit other facets of my career to give teenagers reason to come back to me when they have grown up."

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Last fall when it was announced that Jack Paar had been persuaded to come out of television retirement to narrate a special program, his show was called "Hunk in Politics."

The title immediately suggested that the show would replicate the bon mots of Adlai E. Stevenson and the sallies of John F. Kennedy, perhaps in a setting of funnies by George Washington, tales by Alben Barkley and, of course, a large serving of Lincoln stories.

This week, however, NBC announced a change in title: On May 18 the special will pop up under the title "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the White House."

By switching to a title patterned on that of a recent Broadway musical, the producers have certainly improved the rating chances of the show. The first sounded as if it might be a lecture on the light side. The second one really swings.

CBS earlier this season made an inspired show-title change. One of its specials, a documentary, was originally called "Miss Goodall in Africa," which suggested a spinster missionary story. CBS thought it over and changed it to "Miss Goodall and the Chimps," a more descrip-

ive tag and certainly one better designed to attract an audience.

Some title changes are made for more mysterious reasons. A forthcoming ABC special has been announced and widely publicized as "Poppies Are Also Flowers." Recently notices of a change were mailed out. Henceforth it will be called "The Poppy Is Also a Flower." Why?

The whole business of tacking titles on individual shows, particularly single episodes in series, is interesting since in the case of series, viewers rarely if ever use them. For instance, does anyone say he had watched "The Inchworm's Got No Wings At All" Wednesday night? No, but a lot of people reported that they saw "The Virginian."

In titles for news programs and documentaries CBS is the undisputed punctuation champ. One of its titles was "CBS News Special: Vietnam: How We Got In—Can We Get Out?"

Where CBS prefers the lavish use of the colon, NBC prefers the dash to break up long titles.
