

If, at the United Nations, there is whispering in the corridors and the lounges; if various factional managers count noses and votes; if there are all kinds of propositions for compromise and trading-all this is good, all this welcome.

It would, of course, be much easier, as it would be much easier in other urisdictions if the right thing, whatever it is, just went ahead and happened easily, like a train rolling down the right track. It would be easier in Manchester if the vexing problem of consolidation of fire districts would just go ahead and happen, without being stalled by rigid differences of desire and opinion. It would be easier up in Massachusetts if a Republican governor didn't encounter the experience of having a Democratic legislature turn down seven tax plans one after another when everybody knows some tax plan has to be adopted. It would be much easier in the United States if suddenly the agony.... uncertainty were to disapp the race problem, in one happy consen-

sus of positive unanimity. And it would be much easier in the world if the twin twilights, crowding so swiftly after one another, the one the fwilight of colonialism, the other the twilight of nationalism, could be weathred without storm, without brutalities, thout fears and suspicions, without ragedies, without the repeated presenation of problems beyond solution. But it has never happened that idyle way in town, or state, or nation, and t is not going to happen that way even

though the world is now almost as small s a town. Politics can be defined in many ways, nd almost all of them are, in contrast

There may come, some day, in Poland or even in the United States, the time when the religious side of life succeeds merely in keeping itself alive, but actually achieves some influence over the action of the secular "rulers, princes and authorities." Neither in Poland no in the United States, however, does that day seem close at hand.

hog is beyond our province and capac-It is legitimate and almost obligatory however, to point out that, this year,

the threat of six weeks more of winter cannot seem a very dire proposition. If, by the verdict of the shadow, we still have half our winter left, that

would seem to establish, by influence or by some process of subtraction perhaps known to the newer mathematics, what has gone before has been

If the weather we have had up to February has been truly half a winter, then, all halves being equal, the weather which remains cannot legitimately prove to be more of winter.

And if we depart from the laws of mathematics which, after all, new math old math, has never been anything more than a solemn fussing around with concepts which could never stand being tested out in realities, we find that two halves of such a winter really will not add up to as much as a quarter of a winter.

And there, mathematics-wise at least, we have the winter almost gone. That is the real way it has acted and felt in this first week of February, woodchucks to the contrary.

The Buds Are On The Lilac

The buds are already formed and firm on the lilad bushes-if you don't believe us, go outside and see. The azaleas by the front door are budded, too, and if you look sharply you can see next summer's leaves furled tightly at the tips of the maple branches. They've been there, in point of fact, since last October when the old leaves fell off. Life has a way of getting head start on itself, and the process o eaf-formation is completed in embryo months before the green bursts forth. But it wasn't until this week that we noticed the buds, even though we knew from the book, that they were there. It must have been the change in the sun's rays that brightened them up and made them stand out. In the past couple of weeks the old earth has begun to shift back on its axis, and the journey of the sun back to the top of the sky has begun again. Like the buds, it doesn't amount to much yet. A few more minutes of light in the afternoon, a slightly warmer glow, shadows on the grass no quite so long at noon-barely noticeable And winter, we are reminded, is still to come. So far we've escaped the big

blizzard, we've had only an occasio day of near-zero weather with wind and ice, we've enjoyed more than the usual level of warm air and sunny skies. The months of big snow and long cold still He ahead.

But the buds won't freeze on the twigs; they'll continue, imperceptibly and very slowly, to get fatter and red der. Some occult chemistry, some protective alchemy of nature insures the cells against destruction and maintains the perfection of the microscopic lehf-forms against the attacks of winter. Through the wildest snowstorms, through the most arctic drops in temperature, the forces at work in those buds continue serenely the process of producing next summer's foliage. It's too early to look for pussy willows or crocuses. It's too early even to cut forsythia in hopes of a winter bloom on the window sill. It's too early to regard a thaw with anything but healthy iciam.
