Air Power: Passionate Issue There were many moments during the testimony of Lieut. Gen. James M. savin when the debate over a war in Vietnam was not really a debate of the issues of Vietnam at all, but merely the latest chapter in an historic rivalry among services and weapons.

More of the policy debate over Vietnam than we might like to admit has, in reality, been debate over the effichency of air power.

Air power-pro or con-more than Communism, pro or con-has been the thing which has really been stirring the blood of so many of our general and policy makers and senators. To some people, Vietnam is a battlefront where we are testing the relative

strengths of democracy and Commu-But to many who go beyond the ideolegical conflict, the fascinating thing shout Vietnam is that it provides a test-

ing ground for the plane and the bomb. "If responsible officials cannot stand Among our generals, among our policy nakers, among our newspaper colmnists, among our senators, there are some who think in terms of air war and those who think in terms of land in terms of air wars are the truly exremist "hawks" for the war in Vietam. Those who think of war in terms ground troops are more likely to be vary of escalation in Vietnam.

We know, from our stormy national ast, that theories for and against air power can prove powerful disturbers of our national unity. We know, from the eval accounts and assessments of the ormances of various services i World War II, that the rivalry between meories carries itself right into wars, nd survives after wars.

And so we can guess today that there are some to whom Vietnam is really one thing more than it is any of the other things it may also claim to be. It is a new theatre where the theory of air power is being put to the test Can air power win? Can we bomb an enemy into submission? Is there this relatively easy way—cheap in American

On one side, there are those who claim that air power alone never did and never will win a war. They are likely to be either doves or non-escalators, when it comes to Vietnam.

We are not, assuredly, fighting this war just to prove what the plane and homb can do. But we might watch it and check it, now and then, to be sure we aren't. For when an air force senstor questioned an army general in the Vashington spotlight, it almost seemed that the importance of air power pro or con ranked far ahead of all other minor issues, such as communism, democracy, liberation, dictatorship, self-deter-

The Lottery Nostrum

The Legislature threatens to put a constitutional amendment on the Novamber ballot for a state-operated lottery. The optimists say this would provide \$400 million a year for schools. Let's skip the matter of the morality of betting, per so. The state profits handsomely from taxing horse races without noticeable injury to its integ-

rity. It even encourages racing for revenue's sake, though it sensibly balks (in part, perhaps, for economic reasons) at legalized off-track betting: Bingo, for private charity's sake, operates under state supervision. Thus the official atti-But the state didn't establish the prec-

tice of betting on horses in order to help pay for government. That it authorised ri-mutuel betting at the tracks, and part-mutuel betting at the tracks, and seized the taxing opportunity, was realistic dealing with facts. If it's schools we want, the right course is to be efficient and honest. The Legislature has shamed itself and the state by advancing the lottery non-trum. Courage and understanding are absent. But if Albany persists with its lottery hocis-pocus, we trust that the voters next November—when it goes to a referendum—will show greater asset.
