To Press for
Pay Increase

NEW YORK (AP) — The Transport Workers Union says it will insist that its members' contract be honored by the city, despite a state court's view that the bus and subway workers cannot collect a pay raise for three years.

State Supreme Court Justice Irving H. Saypol, in a ruling Wednesday on a taxpayer's suit, sharply rebuffed the authority for its agreement to pay \$4,000 transit workers about \$60 million they won during the month's crippling 12-day strike.

Air Power: Passionate Issue

There were many moments during the testimony of Gen. James M. Gavin when the debate over air power in Vietnam was not really a debate over air power at all, but merely the latest chapter in an historic rivalry among services and weapons.

More of the policy debate over Vietnam than we might like to admit has really been debate over the efficiency of air power.

Air power—pro or con—more than Communism, pro or con—has been the thing which has really been stirring the blood of so many of our generals and policy makers and senators.

To some people, Vietnam is a battlefield where we are testing the relative strengths of democracy and Communism.

But to many who go beyond the ideological conflict, the fascinating thing about Vietnam is that it provides a testing ground for the plane and the bomb.

Among our generals, among our policy makers, among our senators, there are some who think in terms of land war, and those who think almost entirely in terms of air war.

We know, from our atomic national past, that theories for and against air power can prove powerful disturbers of our national unity.

And so we can guess today that there are some to whom Vietnam is really one thing more than it is any of the other things it may also claim to be.

It is a new theatre where the theory of air power is being put to the test. Can air power win? Can we bomb an enemy into submission? Is there this relatively easy way—cheap in American lives, extravagant in enemy lives—

to a victory? On one side, there are those who claim that air power alone never did and never will win a war.

Owners of Apartments Object to Refuse Costs

A number of owners of apartment buildings, appeared at a hearing yesterday morning to oppose their disbursement at sewer and refuse collection services.

A special committee working on users charges, required by the new charter, has been meeting for several months in an effort to propose equitable charges for users of both services.

They announced their proposal at a recent annual meeting of \$15 for each dwelling unit for sewer cost, and \$14 for refuse collection.

Under the charter, users of the services must pay costs of operations but amortization of the filtration plant is borne by all taxpayers.

After the proposed charges were announced, a number of apartment owners voiced opposition on grounds that the charges were unreasonable and too high.

No action was taken as a result of the hearing, but Mayor McCusker said he recognized the hardships of the proposed charges on apartment owners, and added that some adjustments may be made.

He invited the owners to submit their own proposals for more equitable charges. Another hearing will be conducted next week.

One owner, realtor Peter Humphrey, proposed an alternate charge schedule.

Humphrey suggested raising the base charge from \$15 to \$20 per dwelling unit, which covers single homes as well as apartments, and an additional \$5 per unit in multi-family buildings.

Therefore, an apartment owner with six units, for example, would pay \$20 for the first unit, plus \$10 for the other five units, for a total of \$110 charge.

Under the committee's proposal, the same owner would pay \$90 charges, based on a flat rate of \$15 per unit.

One owner said that costs for apartment dwellers are less because they use less facilities. He noted that most apartment dwellers do not have washers, machines, dishwashers, and usually have just one bathroom.

He added that single families average out to about 1.5 bathrooms per home.

Another owner said that his apartment contained an average of 1.8 persons per apartment, but single homes averaged more than three persons per unit.

Operating costs of the sewer system totals about \$60,000 per year. Users of the services were broken down into dwelling units. There are 1,200 single-family homes presently on the assessor's list; 387 two-family dwellings; 138 three-family units; 18 four-family units; 25 five-family units; 6 six-family units; and one each seven and eight family unit buildings.
