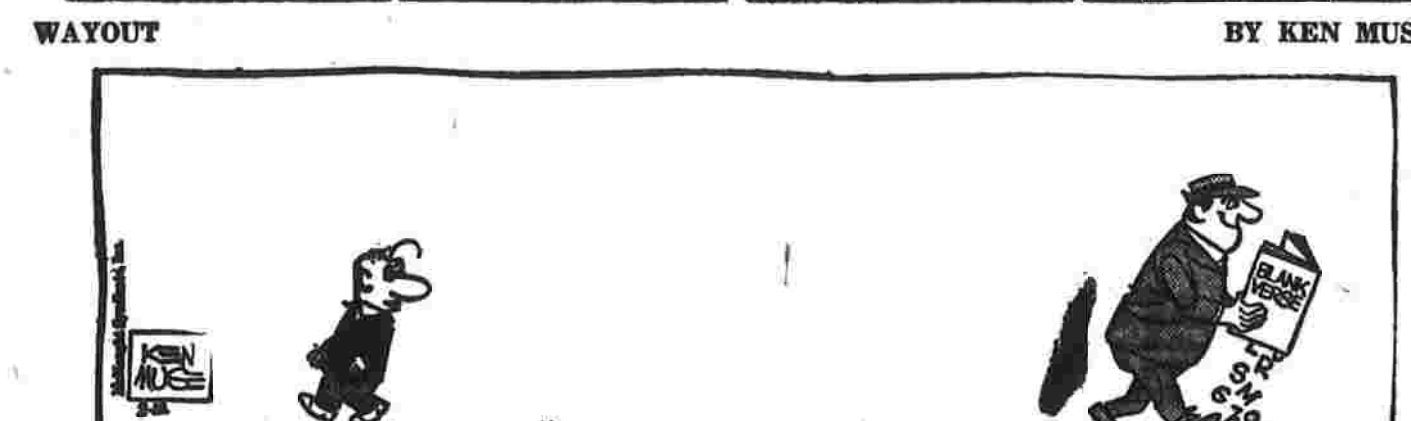

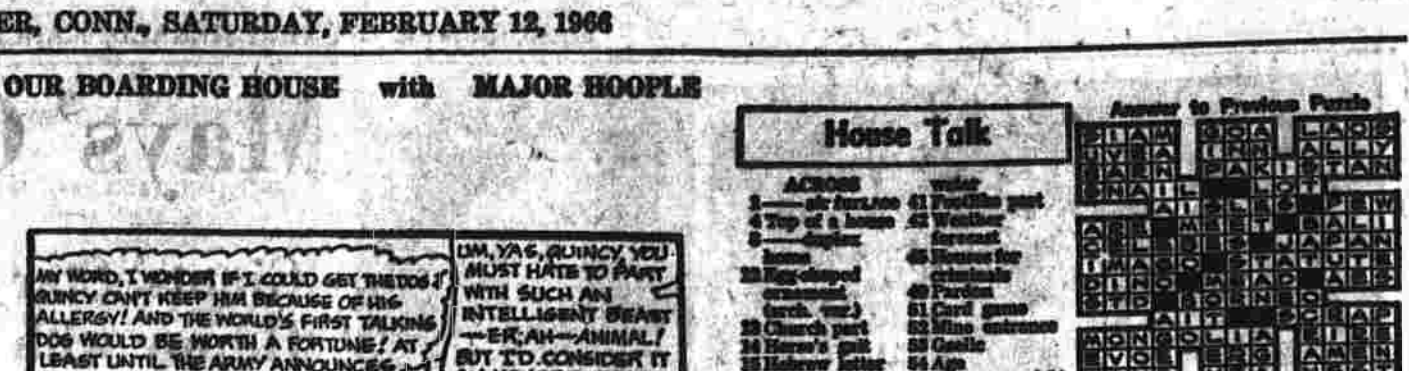

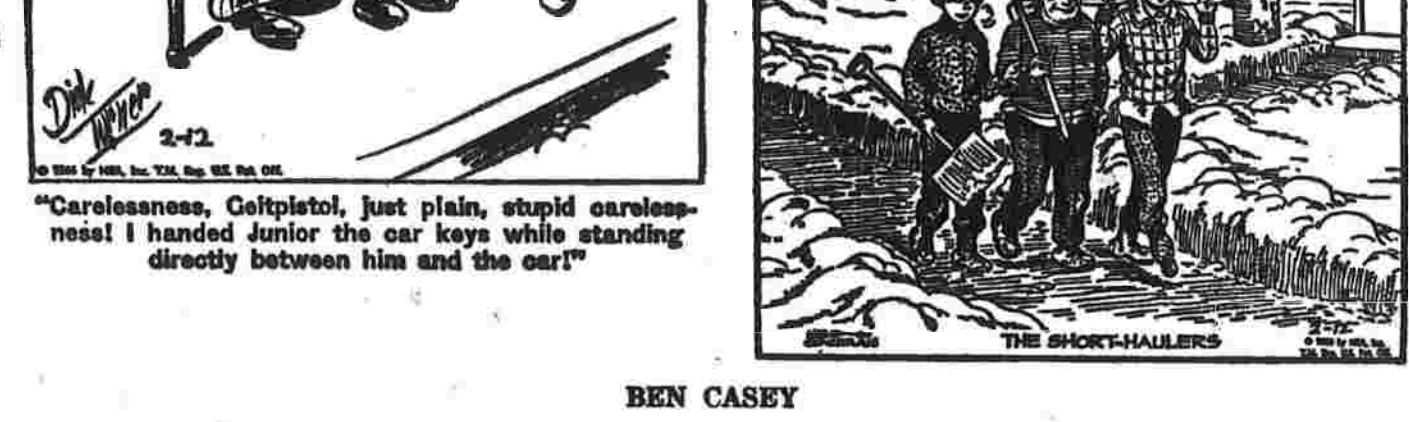

**Morin Cited In Fatality**

The death of Joseph A. Armentano was caused by criminal negligence on the part of James F. Morin, 27, of East Hartford, according to a report issued by Louis W. Schaefer, coroner for Hartford County. Armentano was fatally injured in a three-car accident on W. Middle Tpk. on Dec. 10 last year. Morin was also injured and taken to St. Francis Hospital, Hartford, where he underwent brain injury. A third person, Edward Kuczynski, 35, of 110 Walnut St., a passenger in the Armentano car, was taken to Manchester Memorial Hospital. Ronald Rutherford, 31, of 18 Cornell St., driver of the third car, escaped injury. The inquest into the death of Armentano was held in the inquest room at the coroner's office. According to the inquest report, the Morin car "was traveling west at a high rate of speed along the turnpike. The Morin car crossed onto the east-bound lane and crashed into the Armentano car. Morin was alone. He had drunk beer before the collision. He claimed to be unable to explain the collision other than to say he had fallen asleep. His car was extensively damaged." The following witnesses were examined: Patrolman Richard Lewis, East Hartford Police Dept.; Patrolman Raymond Mazzone, Manchester Police Dept.; Kuczynski, Rutherford, and Morin. Schaefer's report concludes: "Upon the evidence, I find that the death of Joseph A. Armentano was caused by the criminal negligence of James F. Morin as set forth. Speed and lack of control were factors. What part alcohol played is not determined."

Armentano, who was the brother of Superior Court Judges Nicholas and Anthony Armentano, was held in Hartford on Jan. 7. Atty. John J. Mahon was present at the inquest as counsel for James F. Morin.

## Networks Readying 30 New Programs

NEW YORK (AP) — The three major television networks are now frantically putting together entertainment schedules for the new season that starts in September. To make room for new shows about 30 old ones, as usual, will disappear.

NBC expects to have its schedule in shape by the end of next week. CBS will make its decisions a short time later. ABC hopes to keep its plans a secret until the end of March for a splashy announcement.

Few new shows have actually been announced. ABC is firmly committed to an anthology series called "ABC '68." Its new Milton Berle variety hour probably will precede Lawrence Welk on Saturday nights.

NBC's almost definite prospects include some new adven-

tures of "Tarzan," a spin-off of an established show called "The Girl from U.N.C.L.E.," a suspense series titled "T.H.E. Cat," which is the hero's name, and a series about a policeman called "My 15 Blocks" starring Dean Jones.

CBS seems likely to surface with a new show for Garry Moore but is yet to make final choices from some 22 pilots it has ordered.

More interesting at this time, however, is the list of likely candidates for network oblivion. CBS has already lost Dick Van Dyke to movies and Jackie Gleason to a sabbatical year. Lucille Ball still is resisting the prospect of another season with her series. There is doubt whether "Hazel" will go for another year, primarily because star Shirley Booth has not been in good health lately.

Almost certainly, there will be no return for "Perry Mason," "The Smothers Brothers Show," "The Loner" and "Hollywood Talent Scouts." It is probable that "Secret Agent" also will go, but be ready for use as a replacement. Status of both "The Munsters" and "My Favorite Martian" is a question mark but there is a good chance both will return.

NBC will probably drop "Wackiest Ship in the Army," "Dr. Kildare," "The John Forsythe Show," "Hullabaloo," "My Mother, the Car," "Please Don't Eat the Daisies," "Camp Runamuck," "Hank" and "Mr. Roberts." The jury is still out on a renewal of the Sammy Davis Jr. variety show.

ABC, which has already dispatched "Ben Casey" and "The Jimmy Dean Show," is not expected to renew "The Patty Duke Show," "Gidget," "The Flintstones," "Tammy," "Honey West," "The Donna Reed Show" and "The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet."

There is a question about "The Long Hot Summer," "The Farmer's Daughter," "The Legend of Jesse James" and "Shenandoah" as well as three of the four new series that recently were entered as mid-season replacements. "Batman," of course, stays put.

The sight of a television cowpoke ordering tea instead of red-eye on the rocks would ordinarily be enough to make a horse opera fan head for the hills. But Clint Eastwood is no longer a TV cowpoke. "Rawhide" having suffered a mid-season demise after eight years on the range.

He is now an international film star.

Eastwood, 35, is a fortunate fellow. The Hollywoods are full of saddle weary stars of defunct TV westerns who don't even get calls to appear at the Waco rodeo any more. Eastwood is signed to star in a European-made western at a salary of \$250,000 plus 10 per cent of the western hemisphere profits.

It's no press agent's dream. Eastwood, from Oakland, Calif.,

related his happy escalation. "Two years ago, I got an offer to do a western for an Italian company in Spain during my vacation from 'Rawhide,'" he said. "I figured it would be a lark — a way to get a change of scenery. I was paid \$15,000 for 11 weeks' work and the whole picture cost \$225,000.

"The director, Sergio Leone, injected enough satire to interest the intelligent movie goer, but not enough to scare off western fans. I figured the picture would either hit or miss — nothing in-between."

It hit. Eastwood said that the film, titled "For a Few Dollars," drew more money in Italy than any western in history, and that includes "Shane" and "High Noon." It also did smash business in Spain and Germany.

Eastwood went back to Europe during his last hiatus to film a sequel, "For a Few Dollars More," at a salary of \$50,000. He has heard that the film is outdrawing "Thunderball" in Italy. The result has been his inflated salary for the next film by Leone, tentatively titled "Magnificent Vagabonds."

Before that one, he will co-star with Silvana Mangano in an episodic film "The Witches," to be directed by Vittorio De Sica. Eastwood leaves today for Rome.

## 'Uncle Miltie' Coming Back

The big news this week at ABC is that Milton Berle, who between 1948 and 1955 literally was "Mr. Television," will be back next season with a variety show.

Berle's long-term contract with NBC, his old network, was modified recently and since then he has appeared on several shows including ABC's "Hollywood Palace."

In view of television trends, if Uncle Miltie makes a comeback in the ratings, we may see more of those old shows at which we squinted on our 12-inch screens. Remember "Rocky King Detective" and "Leave It to the Girls"?

## Cinderella Didn't Get TV Slipper

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — What happens to Cinderella after the ball is over? In the case of Lesley Ann Warren, nothing.

At least Lesley, 19, reports that the benefits to her career from starring in the Rodgers and Hammerstein version of "Cinderella" were nil. In fact, the television special may have held her back.

But weep not for fair Lesley; she is not back among the cinders. A year after the CBS musical was first shown — it will be repeated Feb. 23 — she is beginning to realize her professional promise. No thanks to Cinderella, it might be added.

"When I go on interviews for acting jobs, I encounter a degree of resistance," she admitted. "Casting people tell me, 'Now we don't want any virginal Cinderella approach in this role.' I have to convince them I am capable of something else."

The casting men appear to be convinced. She recently finished a four-partner on "Dr. Kildare." When I caught up with her, she was portraying a frontier gal on "Gunsmoke."

Next for her: The feminine lead in "The Happiest Millionaire," Walt Disney's first musical since "Mary Poppins."

Things are finally looking up for her, but after "Cinderella" she was beginning to wonder. At the time the special was taped in Hollywood, she was appearing on the road company of "110 in the Shade." So she wouldn't have been able to accept any offers if there were any, which there weren't.

Returning to New York, she won a role in a play with John Payne, "Sign of Affection." It closed in Philadelphia. She signed on with a television series called "For the People." It perished after 13 weeks.

Next she appeared in the Broadway musical "Draught the Cat." It suffered a quick demise.

"But such experience was valuable to me," said Lesley. "The play offered me the only girl's role in a three-character script. The series taught me how to work before a television camera. And 'Draught the Cat' brought me the first reviews I'd had in New York."

"Now I'm getting as much camera experience in television as I can so I'll be ready for the Disney movie. Everything is working out just fine."

Sounds just like Cinderella.

He's Batman. Holy residuals! You know what that means: He's going to be rich. He may also be branded for life with a bat emblem on his chest. Is he worried? Not our hero.

"I was worried at first," admitted television's foe of wrongdoers. "I was afraid that my own identity might be submerged in the trappings of a freak in tights. But then I realized I should be able to make the craze work to my advantage."

"Before, I was limited to playing leads in low-budget movies. The series has given me the exposure — God knows — so that perhaps I would now be considered for important pictures, which is what I'm after."

"Unless the thinking of the major production has become senile, they can perceive that I'm not Batman."

Indeed he is not. Batman is the square's square; Adam

West is hip. Batman lives in a manor that looks left over from a George Arliss movie; Adam West has a pad at Malibu Beach. Batman spends most of his time in the company of his ward Robin. When not working, Adam West is often accompanied by a local chick.

You see, there is a difference.

West terms himself "an overnight smash after 12 years." He started as a television announcer in Sacramento after leaving Stanford University, has been a writer, milkman, cowboy and actor. His most notable achievement heretofore was playing a secondary banana to Robert Taylor in "The Detectives" series.

Following breakup of his marriage — he has two young children — he went to Italy in an attempt to break out of the B-picture rut. He was making progress as an American actor abroad when Batman signaled his return.

West approached the role with

the same cogitation of Laurence Olivier planning Othello. Well, almost.

"Batman must be played with utter conviction," he reasoned. "There is a thin line which I must follow, between satirizing the character and playing it dead-serious."

"He can't be tongue-in-cheek or outie-pie, because that would alienate the young audience which believes in Batman. Nor can he be the complete hero, because the more sophisticated viewers would ridicule him."

"Take the famous line of the first show when Batman enters the discotheque in his bat suit and says, 'I'll stand at the bar; I shouldn't wish to be conspicuous.' You gotta believe in a line like that."

"The main thing I strive for is to overlay with style what is basically a pretty square character. You might say I'm trying to invest Dickensian surroundings with an Oscar Wilde flavor."

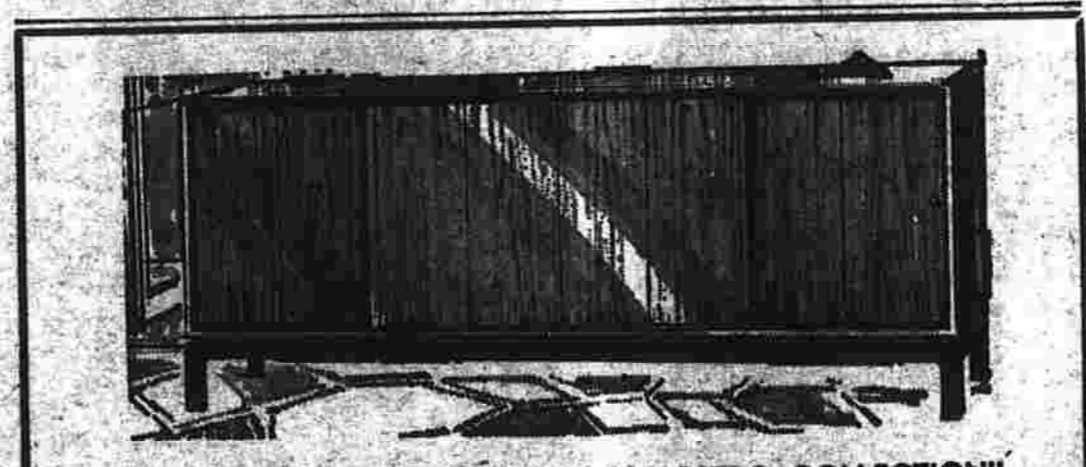

She had just hurried back to her hotel suite from a long, lovely visit with designer Norman Norell who is in fashion what the Fenelon Room is to supper clubs. If Miss Shore loves anything besides her two children and certain songs, it's beautiful, high-fashion Norell

clothes. She wears them well. Dinah looked taut and a bit strained when she quit the weekly grind a couple of seasons back, but she had put on a few well placed ounces.

"Ah, it's been great," she said comfortably as she attacked a late breakfast of Canadian bacon, eggs over lightly and English muffins. "Imagine waking up in the morning with nothing more pressing than to decide whether to play golf or tennis."

"There is really only one way to do it every week, do a big show and try for the ratings. Make it a way of life. But then, after a while, I stopped and suddenly realized I didn't really have to keep putting my head against the wall."
