Rainfall Yesterday Heaviest in a Year

WINDSOR LOCKS (AP) — In the black as regards precipitation for 1966? Connecticut residents who had the feeling Sunday that it hadn't rained like that for a long time were absolutely right.

It's been a year, as a matter of fact, since so much water came down on Connecticut in one day, according to the U.S. Weather Bureau at Bradley Field.

Water supplies shrunken by years of drought swelled perceptibly. People who had almost forgotten that their cellars leaked found themselves manning the pumps.

In Stamford, cave-ins appeared in two places on Main Street and a car plunged into each hole.

In Darien, Stony Brook got too big for its bed and turned West Avenue into an auxiliary stream.

Underpasses in Fairfield and Stratford were under as much as four and five feet of water during the downpour.

Bridgeport measured 2.28 inches of rain. The wettest place in the state, however, was Hadam, with 2.84 inches.

At the weather bureau in Windsor Locks, the total was 1.7 inches.

There was apparently no serious flooding, although snow melt added to the runoff.

Two Writers Found Guilty In Moscow

MOSCOW (AP)—Two Soviet writers were convicted today of anti-Soviet propaganda because of books they published abroad under pen names.

Andrei D. Sinyavsky was sentenced to seven years at hard labor, and Yuli M. Daniel was sentenced to five years of ordinary labor, the Soviet news agency Tass reported.

Prosecutor Oleg Temushkin had recommended the seven and five-year sentences but in addition demanded that Sinyavsky serve five more years in Siberian exile and Daniel three years.

Tass said Judge L. N. Smirnov sentenced both to what was called "a strict regime corrective labor camp."

They were sentenced in the Supreme Court at the Russian Federation under an article of the penal code that was originally written for use against internal opponents of Communist power. The article makes no mention of publication abroad.

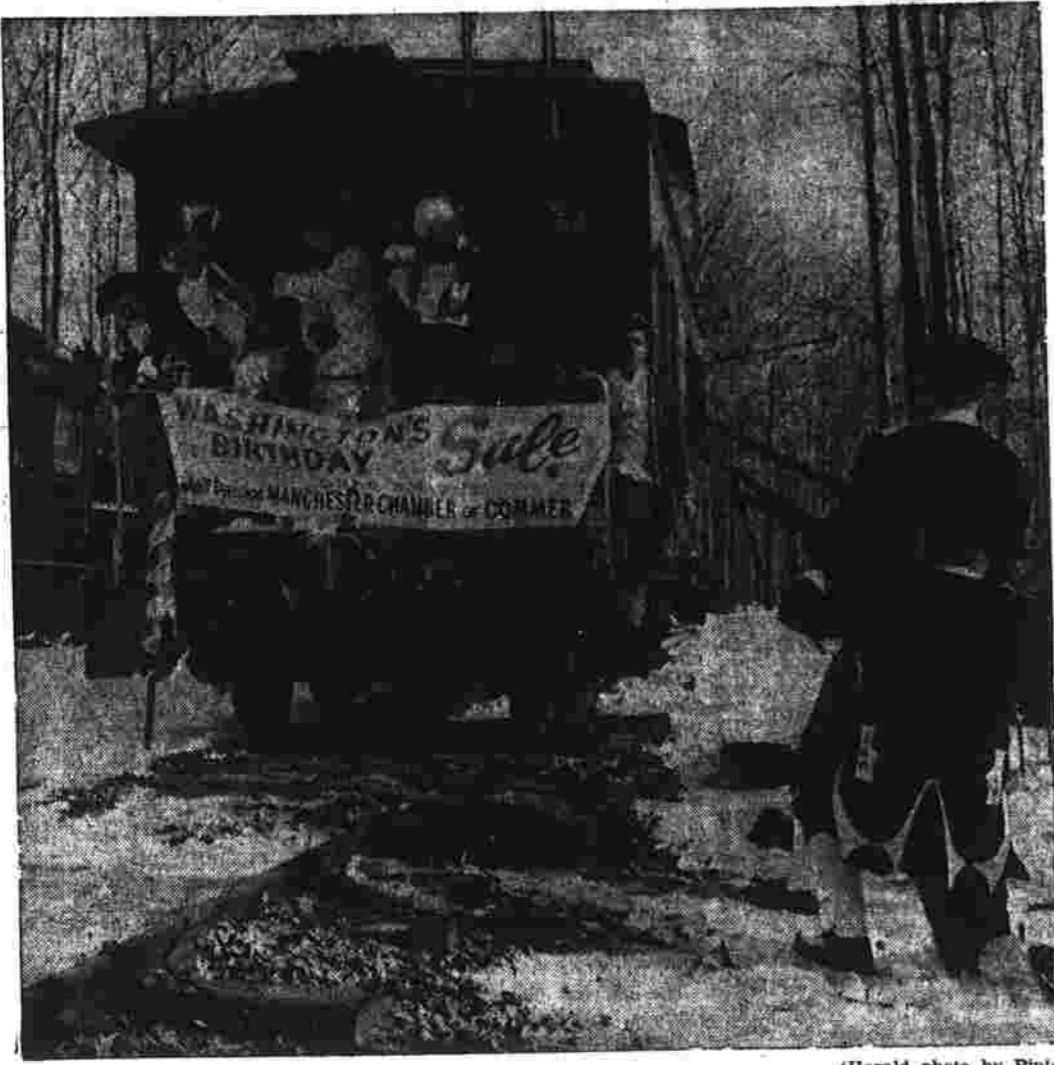

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Ground Units Kill 150 VC; Planes Busy

By EDWIN Q. WHITE SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—The Viet Cong mined three buses today, killing 54 Vietnamese civilians and wounding 18 in retaliation for an allied operation that is guarding a huge rice harvest.

Allied ground forces reported killing 150 Viet Cong in scattered clashes elsewhere in South Viet Nam in the past 24 hours, while U.S. planes hammered Communist targets in North and South Viet Nam.

The death-dealing Viet Cong mines were set off on a road 10 miles southwest of Tuy Hoa, on the central coast where the U.S. 101st Airborne, South Korean marines and South Vietnamese troops have been roaming the countryside for several weeks while the rice was being harvested.

An American spokesman said the first blast was touched off about 7:30 a.m., catching a busload of farmers and killing 27 and wounding 11.

The explosion left a crater nine feet deep in the road, hurled the bus into a canal and scattered bodies along the roadside.

About an hour and a half later, the spokesman said, a three-wheel vehicle used as a bus and jammed with passengers drove along the same stretch of road and touched off a second mine. Another 30 Vietnamese were killed and seven wounded.

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No Survivors Seen Plane Wreckage Found in Spain

PALOMARES BEACH, Spain (AP)—Air and ground searches today located the wreckage of a U.S. Air Force Globemaster with eight Americans aboard which crashed while delivering material for the search for a U.S. nuclear bomb missing off the coast of Spain.

A U.S. spokesman said the wreckage was sighted six miles northwest of the village of Trevales, on the snow-covered slopes of 11,425-foot Pico Mulhosen, in the Sierra Nevada.

There was no mention of survivors.

The giant C124, based at Hunter Air Force Base, Ga., disappeared Saturday night after leaving Seville with two buses for use by Bomb searchers here on the southern coast.

The plane was on a temporary assignment in West Germany when it was called to Spain to assist in the nuclear bomb recovery project.

It left the Moron, Spain, Air Force Base Saturday evening for a 70-minute scheduled flight to San Javier, air support center for the nuclear recovery mission.

Location of the wreckage indicated a sweeping storm that blew up from Africa had carried the Globemaster north of its intended route and into the towering mountains.

It appeared there were developments in the search for the missing nuclear bomb at sea.

Two Navy landing ship docks, acting as mother ships for a pair of deep-diving midnet submarines, pulled about five miles offshore, and it appeared were beginning a search in deeper water.

Sources ashore said this could indicate recovery work in the inshore area where more than 100 objects had been pinpointed

Goldwater Calls for Toughness

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona says an American demonstration of determination—and not what he calls "groveling" peace offensives—will bring Communist North Vietnam to the conference table.

"I don't think it's our job to get the Communists to the conference table by begging, by going through other emissaries, by going through other leaders," Goldwater said.

"I think we'll get the Hanoi government to the conference table when we continue to show that we have the will to attack and that we are attacking them," Goldwater said.

"It is a very sad spectacle to see the greatest power on earth begging for peace," Goldwater said.

President Johnson's peace offensive—and its failure thus far—brought these other top weekend developments:

Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, former ambassador to Saigon, said the probability is "quite low" that increased military pressure by the United States in Viet Nam would lead to a conference with Red China.

Administration officials reported that the United States has started black-listing non-Communist and Polish ships that trade with North Viet Nam.

Sen. Edward Lydon, 55; Philip French, 45, and Barbara Merrill, 45, and Frank Rotundo, 72, suffered smoke inhalation and were on the danger list at St. Elizabeth's Hospital.

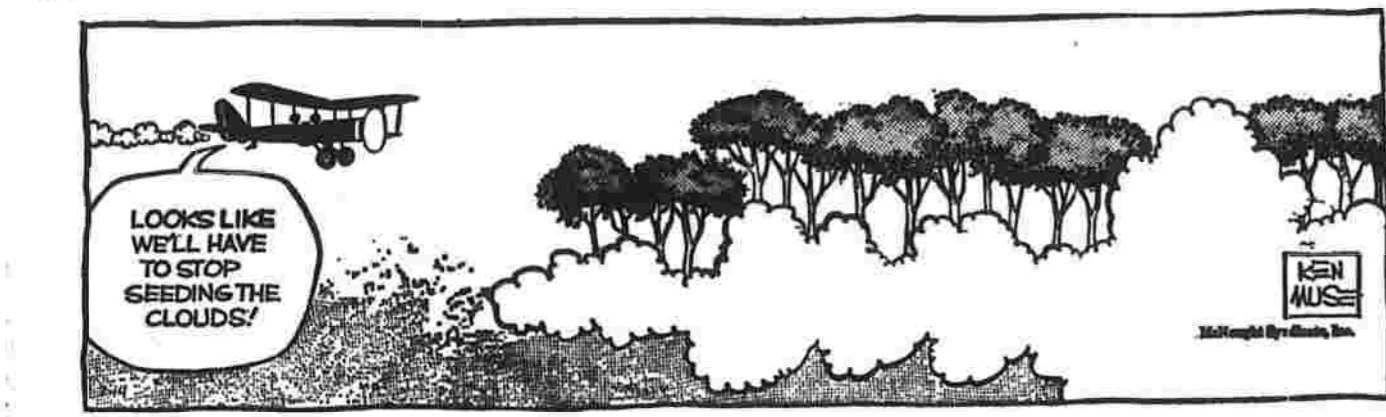

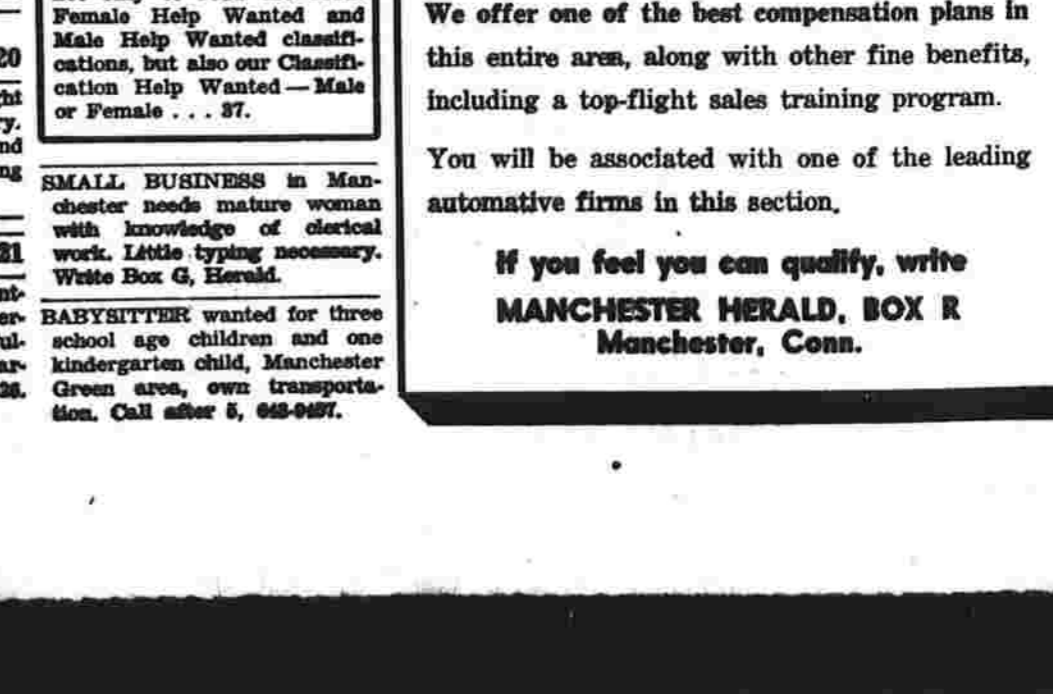

Operation Night Owl Started in New York

NEW YORK (AP)—Operation Night Owl, a program to raise New York's drinking age from 18 to 21, is an effort to compromise with neighboring states run into trouble today almost as soon as it was unveiled.

Sen. Seymour R. Thaler, chairman of a legislative committee studying the state's drinking law, said today he hoped to introduce such legislation in an effort to reach agreement with neighboring states, who want the limit raised to 21.

Gov. Richard J. Hughes of New Jersey said Monday, however, that any compromise on the drinking age was out of the question.

Thaler, a Queens Democrat, told a reporter that Hughes' attitude was "unrealistic" and said that a check with New York's legislative leadership indicated a boost to an age-21 limit "was not in the cards this year."

Thaler said that representatives of church and temperance groups had told him they would, if necessary, go along with a boost to 19½ rather than insisting on an age-21 limit.

Thaler said that checks with other states showed that 19½ was making moves to lower the age to 18 and said that a lower drinking age appeared to be a trend nationally.

"Gov. Hughes has thrown a roadblock across possible compromise," Thaler said.

Spectacular Flight Plan Gemini 8 Set March 15

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—A spectacular flight plan has been drawn up for America's next Gemini space adventure calling for a "walk in space" of nearly three hours—twice around the world and twice as long as most observers expected.

During his lengthy stroll, Gemini 8 astronaut David R. Scott will cling to the rear of the two-man capsule, looking like a man who almost missed his street car, while command pilot Neil A. Armstrong fires maneuvering rockets on the spacecraft to approach and couple with another satellite.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration is now in the process of deciding whether the unmanned target will be an Agena rocket or a substitute satellite, called an Alternate Target Docking Adapter.

The space agency wanted to go with the Agena, but an Agena engine failed in a test campaign last Saturday and muddled plans. NASA has suspended further testing until a cause has been determined and corrected. Officials would prefer to use the Agena because it has a motor to maneuver around, which the ATDA does not.

Whatever target is used, it will be launched by Atlas rocket from a pad 8,000 feet away from Gemini launch complex 13 at Cape Kennedy. If it achieves a proper orbit, Air Force Maj. Scott and Armstrong will catch up with the rocket from the rear of the spacecraft, source said, while Armstrong will put on a special backpack with life-supporting oxygen bottles and other equipment inside.

After some maneuvering with a hand-held jet gun, the astronaut will cling to hand and foot grips on the rear of the spacecraft, source said, while Armstrong will put on a special backpack with life-supporting oxygen bottles and other equipment inside.

The astronauts then plan to tie in formation with the satellite—at a distance of 10 to 15 feet—with Scott "swimming" in space, taking pictures and possibly touching the satellite. The life-line connecting him to the Agena is used, the agency said.
