The result is that crabgrass expands and moves in to flourish in the open spaces left by the weed-killers. Freed from the normal competition from other weeds, crabgrass really goes to town. Dr. Rosenman said high blood pressure and a high fat-protein level in the blood significantly en-hanced the risk of heart trouble only occurred in the aggressive subject.
