## Rusk's Basic Theme

Secretary of State Dean Rusk, fore the Senate Foreign Relations Committee yesterday, made a slight tentative shift in the Johnson administration's claim of legal justification for the full scale war it is fighting in Vietnam. Te shifted over, at least temporarily, to the SMATO Treaty.

But, at the end of the day, he was back to the Johnson administration's earlier and more consistent reliance on the so-called Gulf of Tonkin Resolution adopted by Congress in August, 1964. That was the indeed sweeping document Congress voted, almost perfunctorily, after President Johnson had ordered our first attacks on North Vietnam, in retaliation for an alleged attempt to attack American destroyers on patrol in the Gulf of Tonkin,

Subsequently, there developed considerable doubt over whether any real attack had even been made. More importantly, many Senators have recenty been claiming that the Resolution in question was not an indefinite openended blank check for the President. Answering this dispute, Presiden Rusk concluded his testimony yesterday by challenging Congress to take another vote, to vote down or vote up the

To make this challenge, and to seem to consider it an appropriate and effectary Rusk to continue his very light estimate of the basic intelligence of the American people. not be rescinded, and it is as safe for

Secretary Rusk to suggest that somebody try it as it is ridiculous for Senator Morse, at the other extreme of things, to want to try to do it. Whatever disapproval there may be of administration conduct of the war in the Senate would be automatically barred from voting to strip away from the President, in the eyes of all the world, his authority to act. The problem of this democracy is indeed to find some way in which the President and the Senate, and the opposing theories of policy with which both are being pressured, to reason together without tearing each other apart in front of the whole world. Secretary Rusk, with such a silly and

empty challenge, does not wish to play that kind of game. He was saying, to the Senate, put up or shut up. And his basic argument on the issues yesterday was in the same shallow, glib, bland, non-debating vein.

He was using yesterday, merely at greater length than before, the deceptively simple, the magnificently myopic argument he has been featuring throughout the growing Vietnam controversy. It is, in his book, a very simple story of the badmen versus the good guys and all the choices belong to the other side, with the only good choice that of lying down and rolling over and giving up. This is a beautiful compression of the history of Vietnam since 1945, and a very tidy passing over of the actual military and political sitnation now existing in Vietnam, and it would make a very satisfactory prescription for the end of the trouble there, if it could ever pretend to be truthful, realistic analysis, and not merely the facile verbal line behind which Secretary Rusk has chosen to set his defenses. Of all the major witnesses in this Foreign Relations Committee round - General Gavin, Ambassado Kennan, and General Taylor, Secretary Rusk ended up saying the least, although he talked the longest.
