By actual count, 28 of the 433 representatives were on hand when Rep. Peter T. Flaherty, D-Iowa, started reading the first president's address, the only business on the day's calendar.

Five children, relatives of members, helped boost the attendance. Among them was Cleveland Mink, 15, daughter of Mrs. Mink.

Mrs. Mink, the first woman of Japanese ancestry elected to Congress, said she was "treaty quite honored" to be chosen for the annual reading of what she called "a great profound message."

She said she had been called in 10 days ago by speaker John W. McCormack, D-Maine, who asked her to read the message.

A special stamp marking the introduction of postal codes in Austria has just been issued by that country. It is a 1.50 schilling multicolored stamp depicting an outline map of Austria with the nine routing postal zones in black. The stamp was designed by the Austrian Postal Administration.

Here is some pertinent information on two big stamp exhibitions scheduled this year. The 1966 Combined Philatelic Exhibition of Chicago and (COMPEX) will be held Sept. 9-11 in that city. Over 1,000 frames will be on exhibit, sponsored by 12 Chicago philatelic organizations. An exhibition of material from the National Space Agency is planned as well as space stamps from various countries open in "The Space Age."

The American Philatelic Association will be holding its 10th international convention in Walden, Mass., June 24-28. The 1966 COMPEX will take place in the Cardinal Spellman Museum on the campus of Regis College, Weston, Mass. This will be the first local exhibition in the museum.

The AFL-CIO was a major force in the sweeping election victories of Johnson and other Democrats in 1964.

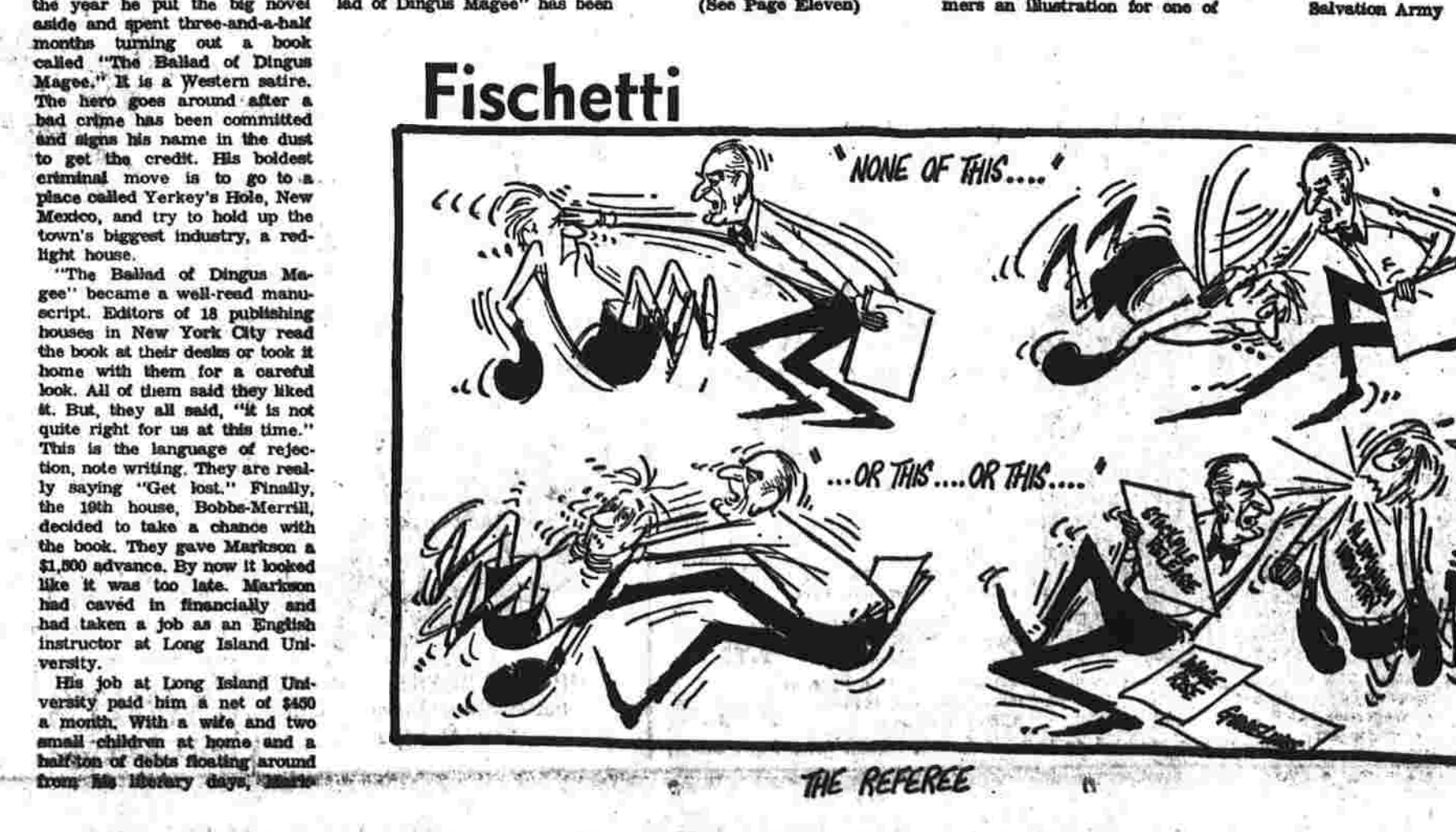

Slayer of 2 Texas Coeds Says Life Sentence 'Fair'

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — James O. Cross Jr. says his lawyer would like to see the slaying of two University of Texas coeds. After he was sentenced Tuesday night to life in prison, Cross said he considered it "a fair verdict."

The 28-year-old former student from Fort Worth was sentenced from the courtroom to the state penitentiary, where his wife and family waited.

Miss Rigby and Miss Stark went to Cross' apartment to shower and change clothing after arriving in Austin July 15.

Cross stated he struggled both physically and emotionally after they emerged from the shower, and by and by they were both dead.

Miss Stark returned enough to tell only in the Rigby elevator. His father, a Fort Worth advertising executive, and his mother spoke through tears to the judge.

Cross, state side throughout the eight-day trial, would say only that he was "re-pressed."

A jury of 11 men and one woman reached a guilty verdict 3 hours and 34 minutes after hearing impassioned pleas from prosecutors and defense lawyers.

Several lawyers expressed pleasure at the outcome, although Dist. Atty. Tom Blackwell had demanded the death penalty.

Judge Moses D. Thurman Jr. sentenced Cross to life in prison.

NASA Schedules Final Testing Of Huge Rocket

HOMESTEAD, Fla. (AP) — The world's largest known solid-fuel rocket will be test-fired tonight to complete a \$25-million National Aeronautics and Space Administration contract.

The 80-foot rocket with a 22-foot diameter is scheduled to be fired upside down at 7 p.m. at Aerojet-General Corp.'s plant on the edge of Everglades National Park. The test will be the last of two ground firings planned under the contract.

The first test of the motor — 10 times more powerful than the solid-fuel Polaris missiles fired from submarines — occurred Sept. 25 and was declared a success by NASA.

Despite the success, the future of large solid-fuel rockets has been hurt by a budget squeeze. Although some research will continue, money is not available for further market test firings. NASA policy makers have indicated they favor investing in proven liquid-fuel rockets.

Held snugly in its 160-foot-deep test pit, the rocket is expected to produce thrusts up to 3.6 million pounds as it spews flame toward the sky. NASA said the firing is expected to be visible for nearly 100 miles.

The defense based its case on testimony by psychiatrists who said Cross suffered from "auditory, brutal sexual fantasies." These psychiatrists testified that he entered one such fantasy and killed the coeds while in a dream world.

WASHINGTON (AP) — India has been urged by the United States to recognize that her border troubles with Red China reflect a pattern of Communist expansion that also operates in the Vietnamese war.

Many Students Hear Discussion on Sex

Students of Rockville and other schools in the area heard a discussion on sex control methods. The discussion was held at the Rockville High School auditorium to hear a panel of experts.

The event was sponsored by the Toland County branch of the Children's Services of Connecticut in an effort to check the rising rate of illegitimate births especially among teen-agers.

Moderator for the program was Ellington High School senior Peter Skipper who kept the discussion, and particularly a question period which followed, flowing smoothly.

Skipper explained that one of the purposes of the panel was to help young people understand themselves and sex. He asked those present to "do a little thinking" during the discussion.

Miss Margaret Parker, district director of the Northeast office of Children's Services of Connecticut observed that one out of every 19 births involves an unmarried mother and most of the unmarried mothers are no older than 21.

She said that illegitimate births in Toland County have doubled since 1960.

Miss Parker observed that many social factors are involved with an illegitimate pregnancy and homes are disrupted, education and jobs suffer, along with the mother's relationship with other young people.

Miss Parker also observed that the increase in illegitimate births has been met by the increase in available foster homes or homes where adoption is desired.

She said that the time is coming when an unmarried mother may have to keep her child.

Dr. Michael Atkins, a Vernon gynecologist, observed a three-fold increase in venereal diseases in the country. Prevalent are gonorrhea and syphilis.

He said that antibiotics are not a cure all for VD people think.

Dr. Atkins explained some of the symptoms of the diseases. He noted that syphilis can cause degeneration of the brain and body organs, and, if not caught in time, is not curable.

The Rev. Ralph Kelley, pastor of the Sacred Heart Church, commented on social pressures which assault the teen-ager with sex stimulants. He said that youths are being assaulted ruthlessly.

"Sex is only part of the human picture," Rev. Kelley said, "but an important and beautiful part."

Commenting on a popular magazine, Rev. Kelley said, "this Playboy approach that sex is fun... is unfair to sex... it's anti-sex. Sex is a more wonderful thing than (just) fun."

The Rev. John Lacey, pastor of the Vernon Congregational Church, remarked on the realistic attitude of sex, and that help is available to those in trouble.

"Sex is a creative thing, but outside of marriage it is destructive," he said. "Sex is not the context of love, but love is the context of sex."

Dr. William Zeller, a Hartford psychiatrist, said that promiscuity in our society is abnormal and creates tensions, anxieties and other symptoms.

He said that depression often follows other emotions connected with promiscuity.

He noted that young people who "go astray" are often unidentified, don't know what they want to do.

"A girl will give her body in an effort to be loved; a boy becomes promiscuous if he is unsure of his manhood or is trying to show what a man he is," Dr. Zeller said.

Dr. Zeller noted that the promiscuous adolescent grows up to be the promiscuous adult, but "they gain no lasting pleasure... sex to be meaningless means giving... it must be done with someone, not to someone."

Atty. Robert King commented on the legal problems of illegitimate births, and commented on criminal and civil law concerned. Criminal law in Connecticut concerning sex charges "is one of the most severe in the country," Atty. King said.

He termed it "Victorian."

Atty. King noted that rape, including statutory rape (sexual relations with a girl under 16) carries a maximum of 30 years in prison. "This is a penalty more severe than second degree murder," he said.

Questions Answered: Students attending Monday night's panel were given the opportunity to ask questions of the panelists by means of writing their queries on a card. The method insured anonymity.

The questions were then screened by students, and presented by other students sitting with the panel.

Bonnely Changes Dominican Election

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — The Dominican presidential election has been altered by the candidacy of Rafael Bonnelly, a conservative former president.

A realignment of rightist factions, heretofore expected to support Dr. Joaquin Balaguer, is considered certain.

Observers here are looking cautiously, however, at suggestions of a weakening of conservative strength favoring Juan Bosch, the only leftist moderate in the Revolutionary party.

This is because of dissonance between moderates and rightists in the Revolutionary party.

Bonnely, 61, a prominent businessman who announced his candidacy Saturday, presided over the seven-member council that governed the country from January 1962 until Bosch took office in February last. Bonnely succeeded to the council's presidency when a military counter-coup ousted Balaguer Jan. 19, 1962.

Bonnely is expected to draw his chief support from four factions: the splintered remnants of the National Civil Union which ran second to Bosch's party in the 1962 vote, and the Liberal Revolutionists, Revolutionary Vanguard, and National Revolutionary groups. The latter three profess to be liberal but are regarded as conservative within the spectrum of Dominican politics.

Balaguer is backed by the Reformist party. This and Bosch's party look like the two largest political forces in the country.

Bonnely's entrance into the race is believed due to assurances of support from influential Dominicans, including some of the business community, opposed to Balaguer's record of service to dictator Rafael Leonidas Trujillo, and suspicious of his price-cutting, interest-reducing policies while president of the governing council.

These circumstances are expected to politically identify Bonnely, justifiably or not, with the Dominican far right while placing Balaguer more toward the center, where he could benefit from dissidents among revolutionary party moderates.

The struggle for control within the Revolutionary party is expected to involve traditionalists who helped organize the party in 1961 and a new breed of moderate Nationalists who surged into prominence during the April revolt. The vote is expected to come into the open when the forthcoming national convention nominates candidates.

The party-backed strike failed in its primary objective, to force the Revolutionary party to call for a presidential election. Party officers who thus far have failed to obey a presidential order to meet for a national convention nominating candidates.

The Revolutionary party's decision to aggressively lead before it had achieved its announced aim is believed to have been prompted mainly by fear among party moderates of potentially damaging repercussions building up around Communist-led terrorism. Just as the strike summons had alienated much of the hard-pressed business community, the last decision drew censure from some labor leaders.

NCAA Faces Rebellion in Ranks

Ivy League Up in Arms Over Ruling

BOSTON (AP)—The NCAA, long embroiled in a bitter fight with the AAU, is facing a major rebellion within its own ranks as a new rule fixing scholastic scholarship requirements for athletes.

Led by the powerful Ivy League, more than 100 schools, most of them in the East, are refusing to comply with the NCAA ruling that an athlete must score at least 1.6 on a four-point scale in the classroom to be eligible for scholarship aid.

The NCAA, faced with a showdown, appears to be trying to back down graciously and honorably. Whether it will be able to do so under the heavy pressure being applied remains to be seen.

A deadline for compliance with the new rule originally was set for a week ago. However, the NCAA extended it a week until last midnight.

The Ivy League's eight members, joined by scores of other schools, refused to budge from their stand. A few hours before midnight, Dr. Robert P. Goheen, Princeton University president and Ivy spokesman, announced that the NCAA had granted another extension of several days.

The deadline was extended after the Boston Herald reported that the NCAA's 771 member schools, 108 have refused to comply with the rule adopted at its annual convention in January, 1965. Another 64, the paper said, are "in the correspondence stage."

New England schools lined up with the Ivy League include Holy Cross, Amherst, Bowdoin, Middlebury, MIT and Tufts.
