Air Force Advisor

'Big John' in Viet Nam Is Town's John Kleperis

Capt. John V. Kleperis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Kleperis of 17B Hawthorne St., is an Air Force advisor to the Vietnamese Air Force, and an article on his experiences is in the Feb. 14 edition of the U.S. Armed Forces publication, "Stars and Stripes."

He is a 1952 graduate of Manchester High School and received a bachelor's degree from the University of Connecticut in 1957. He was an engineer with Chandler-Bryant Co., West Hartford, before entering the Air Force. In 1954 he received a master of science degree in materials engineering at the Air Force Institute of Technology, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio.

His wife, the former Margaret Dean of Old Lyme and two children, remained in Fairborn, Ohio, when Capt. Kleperis went to Viet Nam.

Following is the "Stars and Stripes" item in full:

BY LT. LT. GEORGE KIDD — Big John rode his best through the entrance to his bedroom just as I was about to turn out the light. "Doing anything tomorrow?" he asked. "No, I'm going to bed."

From his tone, I knew that whatever I might have had in mind, he had something better. "We're having a fairly good operation tomorrow. Thought you might like to go and see some Viet Cong. Most of them are in the area of 0507."

Capt. John V. ("Big John") Kleperis, a 30-year-old native of Manchester, Conn., is an Air Force advisor to the Vietnamese Air Force (VNAF).

Paired with a VNAF observer, he flies up to 50 combat hours a month as a forward air controller in the Mekong Delta. The nickname "Big John" is no joke. Kleperis stands at a full 6'4", the maximum for an Air Force pilot. He has trouble fitting his large frame into the tiny O-1 Bird Dog and U-17 aircraft he flies. But he just grins, pulls his neck in, and squeaks "I was ready at 6:30 a.m."

Kleperis — spotting my equipment — says he usually gets up at 5:30. "I hope the planes make it off the ground," he said, a ton of doubt in his voice.

I was halfway wondering myself, burdened down with two cameras, a 35 mm. camera, a 35 mm. camera with extra film, a borrowed flask suit. Then he laughed, and I saw that, with an exception of the camera, the equipment was as expected.

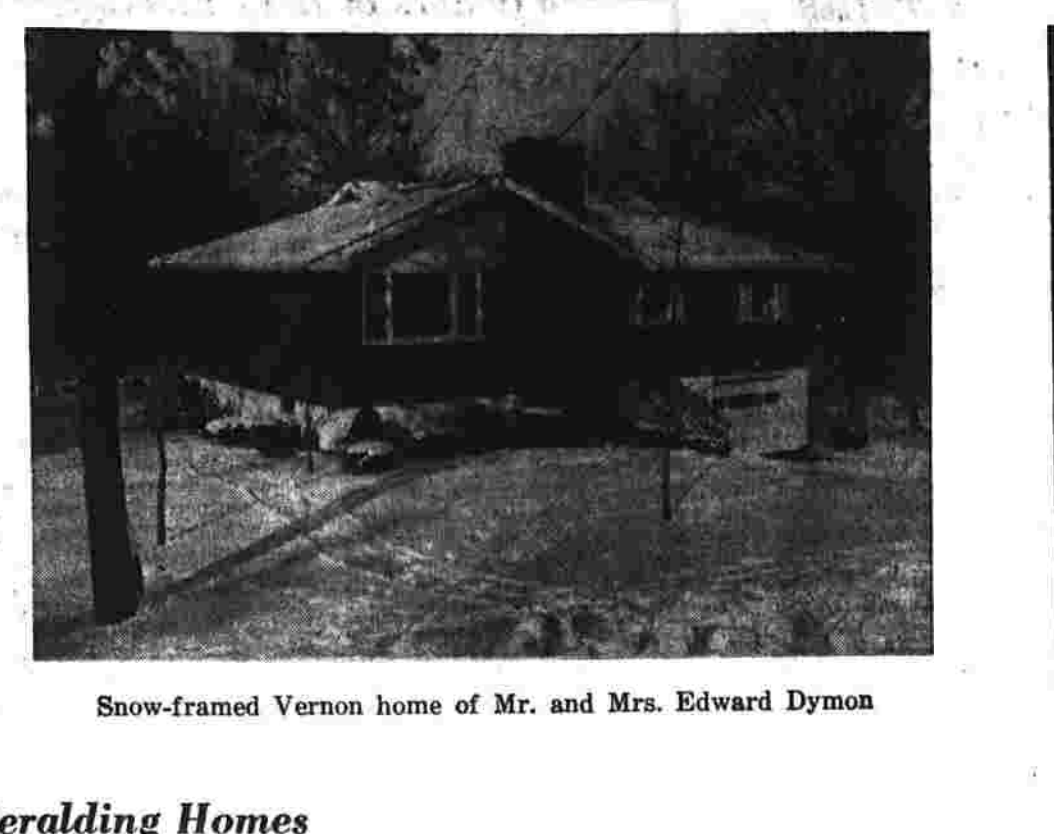

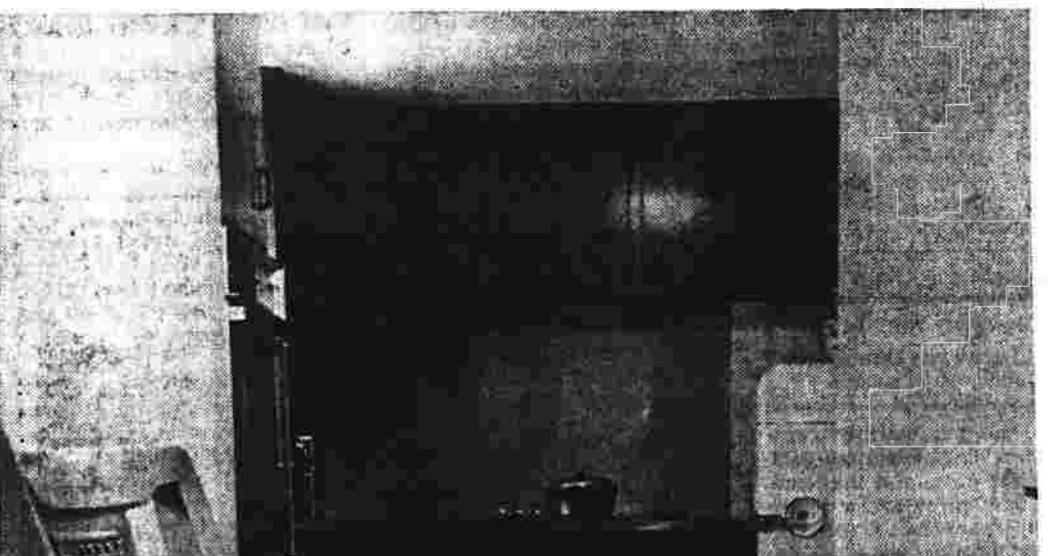

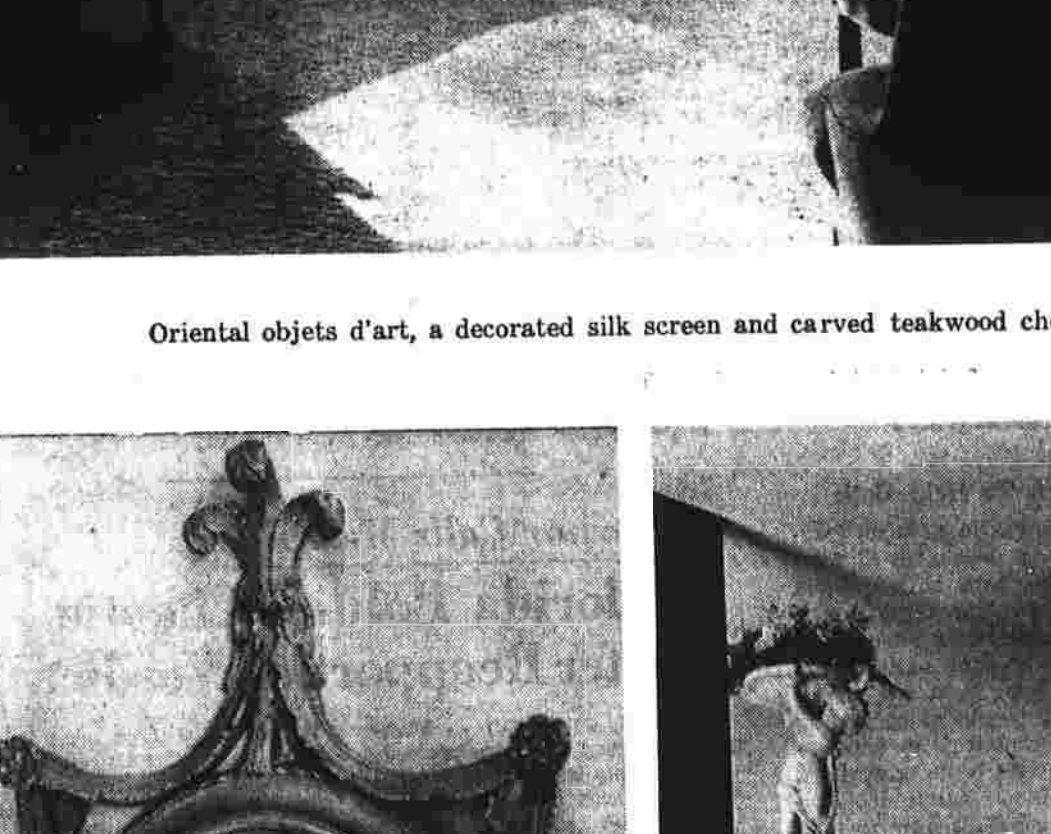

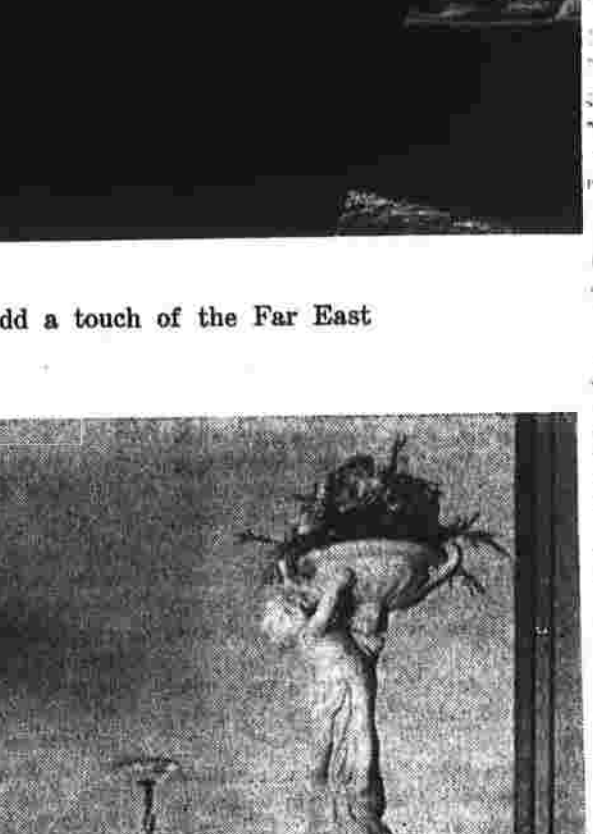

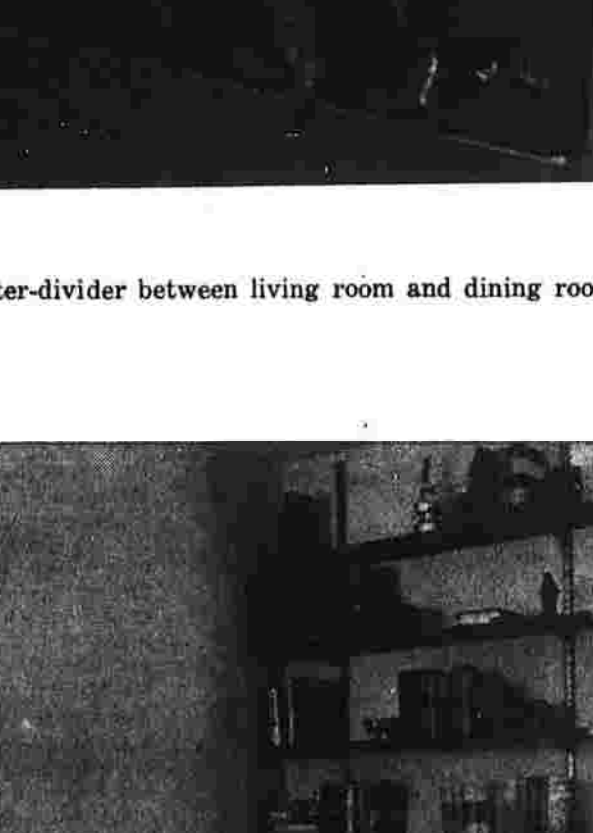

Florida Politics Chaotic After Reapportionment Verdict

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Florida's political structure has been thrown into chaos by a U.S. Supreme Court decision striking down the state's legislative reapportionment plan.

Gov. Haydon Burns called it a crisis and set an emergency session of the legislature for today in Tallahassee.

Hundreds of candidates who already have qualified and begun campaigning for the 88 Senate seats and 100 representative jobs under the discredited plan were bewildered.

They didn't know whether to suspend their campaigns to wait and see what the new districts would look like, or to keep plugging away in hopes that the Supreme Court would be lenient.

There was also a possibility that the Supreme Court would decide in December to let the reapportionment stand until the next election.

The Supreme Court, in a 6-2 decision, said: "The reapportionment plan was unconstitutional in 1962. The effect of the district court's decision is to delay effectuation of a valid reapportionment in Florida until at least 1968."

While recognizing the desirability of permitting Florida's Legislature to itself determine the course of reapportionment, the court said it was not to be bound by the plan.

Selection of the architect would be made by Walter Foss, director of public works, who together with Building Inspector, Thomas Monahan and School Supt. William Curtis,

has worked out a preliminary site plan for the proposed 13-classroom school, which has already been approved by the board of education.

The site itself would utilize a 20-acre tract of town-owned land south of Dartmouth Rd., part of the 1,000-acre Globe Hollow tract purchased from Cheney Bros. in 1955 for \$1,250,000.

Quick action on building the school is necessary, Curtis has stated, to eliminate overcrowding and to forestall the possibility of double sessions in several elementary schools which now take surplus pupils from the tiny South School.

The school board's preliminary plan, approved Jan. 31, calls for the purchase of some small amounts of private land adjoining the town-owned site, in order that Dartmouth Rd. could be extended to Fern St. As it exists, the site is practically landlocked, connected only by a winding gravel road, which would give poor access to the school.

Networks 'Leak' Hints of Change

NEW YORK (AP)—Salesmen from the three major networks are busily peddling next season's shows in tentative entertainment schedules to Madison Avenue. Hints of all sort of change are, as usual, leaking out.

For instance, Andy Williams' current sponsor expects to put a western in Williams' current spot. NBC, which likes the variety show, is currently trying to persuade the singing star to move his show in the difficult hour period Sunday night after "Bonanza."

CBS' "Perry Mason," it now appears, is almost certain to disappear, and Garry Moore

and his new variety hour will challenge the perennial giant of the ratings, "Bonanza."

Among shows which may disappear are "The Munsters" and "My Favorite Martian" on CBS, both excursions into comedy-fantasy. But the expected demise of these plus the new "The Smothers Brothers Show," do not mean that comedy-fantasy is dead: ABC's "Bewitched" and NBC's "I Dream of Jeanie" are still coming on strong. And, of course, there's always "Batman."

"Laredo" appears to be a casualty after a season, and so does "The Legend of Jesse James," but all the older westerns seem to be good for another season and some new ones are penciled into the schedules of all three networks. Status of "Shenandoah" is still uncertain.

"Gomer Pyle" may wind up in a Wednesday night spot, taking over the half hour now occupied by "The Dick Van Dyke Show," which will call it a day to give Van Dyke a chance to pursue his film career.

NBC's "The Man From U.N.C.L.E." may be scheduled at an earlier hour — 8:30 EST — Friday evening. Also there will probably be a sequel to it, "The Girls From U.N.C.L.E.," early on Tuesday nights. And ABC's "Peyton Place" is expected to be cut back from three to two episodes a week.

After the success of NBC's "Get Smart," spoofing secret agents, there will be a comedy show on CBS spoofing "The Fugitive," a successful adventure show on ABC, and another, "The Hero," kidding TV westerns, on NBC, which has at least two very successful ones.

Of course, fate of all the candidates depends upon whether the networks can find sponsors for them. And there are likely to be many erasures on the fall blueprints before it is in final form.

Gross Take By Paladin \$13 Million

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (AP)—"Have Gun, Will Travel," a television western starring Richard Boone, earned Columbia Broadcasting Systems, Inc., and affiliates gross revenues of more than \$13 million from September, 1957 through December, 1958, testimony in U. S. District Court shows.

Judge Edward W. Day and a jury are hearing evidence in a \$5 million trademark infringement suit brought against CBS and co-defendants by Victor Decosta of Johnston, Decosta claims he originated the cowboy character "Paladin" some 10 years before CBS began the TV series.

"Baby Bundles for Viet Nam," a special WTIC-TV report on the station's campaign to help the women and children of the war-torn country, will be presented at 5:30 p.m. tomorrow on Channel 3.

Filmed in South Viet Nam for WTIC-TV by the First Cavalry Division, the report will tell southern New England residents how their generosity has been appreciated by Capt. Larry McKinstry, the young doctor operating the hospital, and the people of An Khe.

Since Thanksgiving, when WTIC-TV launched the "Baby Bundles" campaign, Capt. McKinstry has received nearly 700 packages of baby clothes, diapers, soap, powder, oil, sheets and mothers' nightgowns for his small hospital 280 miles north of Saigon.

The report will show some of the bundles arriving at An Khe and being given to mothers and their new-born infants. Dramatic footage will also show the wife of a Viet Cong guerrilla surrendering in order to receive medical care and clothing from a "Baby Bundle" for her seriously ill infant.

The "Baby Bundles" campaign was begun by WTIC-TV on the recommendation of Paul Kuntz and Bob Dwyer, the team who interviewed southern New England service men in Viet

'Innocent Andy' Can Be Toughie

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Don't be deceived by that innocent air that Andy Williams exudes on his Monday night songfests. He can also be tough, as NBC is discovering.

Andy is engaged in the annual fencing match that most television stars face when they near the end of the season.

The case of the Andy Williams show is reported by its owner-star thusly:

"Kraft (his sponsor) would like the show for another year, which I am under contract for, NBC tells me that I must sign for another two seasons after the

next year—at the same price. I said forget it.

"Why, I lost \$100,000 this year over last because production costs have gone up. Actually I lost \$240,000, the reason being that Kraft doesn't want reruns. I figured to make \$140,000 on reruns.

"I'm not saying that I've lost money over-all. Naturally I haven't done that. But I'd be silly to sign any deal without a 5 per cent annual increase; that's what the union raises are."

The singer declared he is willing to scrap the weekly show rather than sign on NBC terms. He'd prefer to limit himself to a few specials and develop his movie career; he's up for a role in "Any Wednesday" with Jason Robards and Jane Fonda.

Another NBC demand that rankles Williams is that he must do 32 shows instead of his regular 26. "I don't know how we're going to get enough ideas, enough guest stars for 32 shows; we have enough trouble with 26," he said.

Yet the Andy Williams show manages a high average. It is doubtless the most tastefully produced weekly show and hence attracts rare guests such as Julie Andrews and David McCallum. The quality is no accident.

"We try harder," said Andy. "I think you have to, in order to compete with the memories peoples have of our best shows. For instance, people keep telling me I should bring back Kay Thompson and the Williams Brothers. I wouldn't think of it. We could never be as good as people remember us the first time we did the old act on the show."

And so the fencing continues between star and network. Probably both sides will give in a little, and Andy Williams will be back next season, displaying his innocent ease in living color.

Bob Earle Has Odd 'Weekend'

NEW YORK (AP)—Robert Earle, the quick-tongued, scholarly looking moderator of NBC's "College Bowl," is now in the middle of a job that finds him with a middle of the week "weekend."

When most of the husbands and fathers of Ithaca, N.Y. are doing their Saturday and Sunday relaxing, Earle is furiously busy — 230 miles to the south.

Actually Earle, 40, has what sounds like a broadcasting and family man's dream job. The price is right, his work week is three days — he usually stays over in New York for Monday conferences with staff and sponsor. The rest of his week belongs to him.

Earle literally walked into the job of moderating the Sunday afternoon "College Bowl" in 1962 after he read in a television column — this writer's, in fact — that Allen Ludden, the program's long-time host, was quitting to take over both the daytime and the evening editions of "Password." Earle, who had been in broadcasting 16 years, grabbed some tapes of his work, drove to New York, walked into the office of the producer and asked for the job.

The tapes proved satisfactory. Earle had the same general style and mien of Ludden and he was hired on the spot. At first, he thought of moving closer to the New York broadcasting studios.

But Earle and his wife had lived in Ithaca since 1933 when he was made chairman of Ithaca College's Radio and Television Department. Their four children, three boys in their teens and a girl, had been born there and the family had sunk roots deep in the community.

"So we decided to stay," Earle said. "It is a very pleasant life and a great place to raise kids."

In good weather, he drives to New York each Saturday, a fast trip on the state Thruway. He used to drive in winter, but since a slight but scary skidding accident, he has been flying the round trip.

The toughest part of moderating the fast-moving "College Bowl" is keeping up the hectic pace. Earle runs through the questions in advance, to check his pronunciation of foreign words and avoid stumbling.

"The important thing is to

These showed:

Gross revenue from advertising sponsors totaled \$11,446,478 during the seven-year run of the network.

Gross proceeds from television sources licensed by CBS to put gross totaled \$841,000 within the United States and \$240,800 in other countries as distant as Australia.

Total gross receipts from sources licensed by CBS to put out merchandise based on the Paladin character, such as cowboy attire, were \$212,304 through 1964.

These figures, adding up to \$13,440,478, do not include revenue since the show went off the network.

Gross proceeds from the network, which is owned by the network, are being updated by defense counsel.

look at the sun and I want to stay up until two or three or four in the morning if I feel like it."

No matter what happens, Inger now has something she didn't have when the show began, three years ago. She has security.

"Security, both financial and professional," she says. "It's a very good feeling. I am comfortable from now on—I can't live like Paul Getty, but I can get by."

Her success, she feels, hasn't radically altered her way of life. She isn't the extravagant sort. In her years in Hollywood, she has only owned three cars. She has bought a new house, but it isn't split-level lavish.

"All I want and need in a house," she says, "is some place I can come home to and be comfortable. This is a small house, but it has everything I need—two bedrooms, a studio, a steam bath, a swimming pool and a pool table."

She thinks, too, that success has not changed her personality, either.

"I still feel like the same girl who got off the boat from Sweden," she says. "Maybe a little taller and a little more money, that's all. But I'm not changed inside."

"In fact, sometimes when people stop me on the street and try to touch me, I can't understand why, what they think I am. It's only me, Inger Stenlund of Sweden."

That name, incidentally, was changed when she began her career in New York by "a stupid man." He felt it was too long; Stevens is shorter by a big two letters. Now she wishes she hadn't let him do it, but it's too late.

Maybe you've noticed that, on The Farmer's Daughter, Katy's Swedish accent is gradually fading out. That's Inger's idea; she thinks an intelligent girl—such as Katy—would encourage her accent to disappear.

In real life, Inger Stevens' accent vanished quickly; there is none at all left now. She laughs at those actors who deliberately retain what she calls "professional accents."

The imprint of Inger's thoughts are strong on her show. She is a forceful personality and, moreover, she is part-owner of The Farmer's Daughter. At first, she was very active in the day-to-day operation of the show, but she found that too time-consuming.

"One thing the show taught me," she says, "is how to say no. I can't always feel like 'ja'—sometimes I feel like 'him-mel.'"

CBS Retains Slight Lead In Nielsens

The latest national Nielsen ratings, covering the two weeks ending Feb. 6 disclosed Monday that CBS had regained a slight lead over NBC with ABC trailing NBC by a fraction.

The averages covering prime-time network shows, gave CBS a rating of 21.4, followed by NBC with 19.8 and ABC 19.5.

"Batman," ABC's new twice a week hit series that threatens to start a trend, dropped out of the elite top 10 to come in 11th and 12th. It had rated eighth and ninth positions in the previous list.

Leading in order were NBC's Bonanza, ABC's Bewitched, CBS' Red Skelton Hour, Gomer Pyle, The Lucy Show, Beverly Hillsbillies, Green Acres, Hogan's Heroes, Andy Griffith Show and NBC's Get Smart.

Audience studies made in the New York area of daytime television viewing during two days last week when NBC and CBS devoted more than six hours each day to live coverage of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearings on Viet Nam indicated that both networks suffered substantial drops in the sizes of their audiences.

Nielsen studies found that NBC's Thursday rating, normally 8.0, was out to 3.7, CBS, which usually gets 8.5, went to 5.1, ABC, which stayed with regular programming most of the time, dropped to 4.0 from a normal 4.4.

Friday, when all three networks were covering the hearings, NBC's rating was 3.9 and down from 7.8 the week before. CBS pulled 4.3 compared with 8.2, and ABC went to 1.4 from 4.8.
