### THE WAY I HEARD IT

Two things seem quite notable about Berkshire Festival programs this summer. Several other things have also been changed, according to present plans announced in a recent publicity release.

Of chief interest to many is the fact that the Friday evening concert will begin at 8. Mr. Leinhardt is experimenting with the later starting time in order to allow people to get to London after a day's work in Boston or New York, not to mention Hartford and vicinity.

In the past, of course, many have made it to the remote location in time for the more conventional 8:15 starting time, at Mr. Leinhardt was confronted with the problem of what to do with those people who would undoubtedly still be able to get there at an earlier hour.

The answer seems to be something along the lines of "Western Frontiers." The release is not very clear about these. For one thing, nothing is said about the time of these supplementary programs, although they are supposed to precede the seven Friday evening concerts. Neither is it very clear just what they will comprise.

Mr. Leinhardt is thus quoted, "For many years I have thought of doing such an extended or expanded concert because the composers of great variety and consequence have so many interesting compositions which do not fit a normal symphonic, or chamber program, thus, the works make extremely rare appearances."

I suppose he has reference to such works as Mendelssohn's "Cello" or Beethoven's Opus 61-which are beyond the scope of the conventional string quartet and yet not large enough for inclusion in a symphonic program. There are also songs with orchestral accompaniment, suitable in nature for a symphonic auditorium, but demanding the tone colors which piano cannot provide in conventional recitals.

This extra programming is of more than passing interest to the serious concertgoer for whom such works are usually an unknown quantity. Manchester fortunately heard one such work recently when Vytautas Marjonius program in a d Stravinsky's "Serenade for Winds," but there are numerous important works of such a nature which, because of size or format, remain an unknown quantity except to the musician who can acquaint himself with these works by reading them in silence.

If only we knew just when these programs were to start it would be helpful, since the Berkshire Festival could always be reached in plenty of time from hereabouts. Thus residents of this area are particularly benefited by the new idea.

The other remarkable change at the Festival is the list of guest conductors, who in the past have been comprised of a relatively small group of those in the baton end of the business. They've always been good, but

Board Considers Expanding Business, Industry Courses

The board of education will be asked to consider expanding the program of business and industrial course offerings at Manchester High School when it meets tonight at 8 at Bannet Junior High.

The projected expansion has been worked out by Sidney Cohen, the town's occupational coordinator, together with members of the business and industrial arts departments and School Supt. William Curtis.

The plans call for reinstituting distributive education — absent from the curriculum for several years — otherwise strengthening the business offerings, and establishing four new industrial occupations courses for junior and senior boys.

According to Cohen, the program would be geared to training terminal students in specialized skills that would make them more readily employable upon graduation.

If accepted by the board, the program would necessitate some policy changes, as the present offerings are intended to be mostly exploratory in nature, Cohen said.

The program would be set up according to a State Department

partment of Education plan, would be overseen by its Division of Vocational Education, and would be funded under the Vocational Education Act of 1963 and Connecticut Act 361.

In other business, the board will reconsider its policy of supplying transportation to Manchester for retarded children from the Bunce Center now that Manchester has established a sheltered workshop.

Supt. Curtis will report on the status of Project Outdoors, Lutz Junior Museum's proposed regional nature center, and on the recent convention of the American Association of School Administrators, which he attended.
